Tokio, Feb. 13.—The national budget for 1907-8 passed the house of repre-sentatives yesterday without the slightest curtailment. Such an occurrence is without precedent since the

rence is without precedent since the opening of the Japanese diet. The powerlessness of the opposition is regarded by many persons here as a bad sign for the progress of consti-tutional government in Japan. The budget for 1907-8 provides for the expenditure of \$300,000,000, \$60,-000,000 more than last year, and is twice as much as was required to cover all expenses prior to the Russo-Japanese war.
