An Escaped Lunatic's Deed. DWIGHT, Ill., July 13 .- Andrew White, formerly a wealthy citizen of Chicago, has been living on a stock farm near here. Yesterday morning he stood on the step of his house, and called his family. His wife, a son aged 10, and a daughter aged 18, rushed to welcome him, believing he had been discharged cured. In the house of lords, June 22, the Ear of Northbreck, in moving the grants of £30,000 to Lord Wolseley and of £25,000 to Lord Alcester, said: It is a curious coincidence that they saw ther first active service together. It is thirty years ago, in the Burmese war, that Lord Alcester, then Commander Seymour, serving upon Gen. Goodwin's staff as a volunteer, led the storming party at the capture of the works at Pegu, while Ensign Wolseley led another storming party at Donabew, where he was severely wounded. Lord Woleseley next served in the trenches at Sebastopol, where he was twice wounded. He was then engaged with distinction in the Indian mutiny, where he obtained the rank of lieutenant-colonel, and afterward in the China war of 1860. In 1870 he directed with signal success the Red river expedition. In 1873 he successfully conducted the Ashantee war, for which he received the thanks of both houses of parliament and promotion to major general for distinguished services. In 1879 he commanded the troops in the operations which concluded the Zulu war. Lord Alcester has embraced every opportunity of service which presented itself. He took out to the Crimes one of our first two iron-clads, and in 1860 he commanded the naval brigade in New Zealand on shore for thirteen months, and was severely wounded. He commanded the flying squadron in 1872, the channel squadron in 1874, and the Mediterranean squadron from 1880 till a few months ago, when he showed high diplomatic ability, emulating the distinction gained by Sir William Parker in the same important command. he was twice wounded. An Old State Trial.

The details of the trials of the dynamite conspirators in London read very much like those of the "Cato street conspirators," away back in 1820. These were a number of English socialists led by a discharged army officer named Arthur Thistlewood who contemplated the overthrowing of the English monarchy by the assassination of English monarchy by the assassination of the government ministers. The savage decisions of the judges on all points raised in behalf of the prisoners were not more curtly expressed then than were similar ones in the recent trials. The obnoxious informer figured then as now. The result of the "Catostreet conspiracy" trials was, however, more sanguinary than that of the dynamiters. LEAD IN SODA WATER.

A World reporter a couple of days ago tried to find out where the lead formed in sods water sold at city stores came from, when some of the dealers declared that there was no lead of any kind in connection with their apparatus or fountain. The Montreal Herald of yesterday contains the fol-

lowing:
"The disclosures of the Herald, based o "The disclosures of the Herald, based on the report of Dr. Baker Edwards, as to the character of some of the stuff sold in Montreal as soda water, have excited a wide degree of attention, and have been quoted all over the United States and Canada. The result will be a general movement in all the large cities for the analyzing of this summer drink to see to what extent people are being poisoned by it. In Thronto an analysis of twelve samples of soda water has been made by the public analyst, only three of the samples being found free from metallic impurities. This analysis completely confirms that of Dr. Edwards in Montreal, and it is certainly a curious coincidence that, in regard to poisonous metals, the proportion of impure to drinkable sods water is Montreal and Toronto should have been the same. All to drinkable soda water in Montreal and Toronto should have been the same. All these poisonous soda waters were taken from fountain cisterns, bottled soda water being invariably found free from metallic impurities. The remedy is therefore to cleanse soda water fountains and to keep them, at all times, scrupulously clean.

WHY IT IS WRONG.

Why is it wrong for banks to lend money on bank stocks? (1) Because it impairs the security which noteholders and depositors are entitled to, and which they think they enjoy, but which is reduced by exactly the amount so loaned. The principal security that a bank offers its clients is its paid-up capital. But the moment the bank lends money ou its stock is reduces its capital by the amount of the tion could not be maintained throughout close, and consequently the security that it the line and we should speedily be flying has to offer. Another way of putting it is along our own road to the Rockies. that the bank becomes its own stockholder where it loans on its own stock. A bank has a paid up capital of a million. This million is supplied by the public. But if the bank loans \$900,000 on its stock, the public have no interest, or only a one-tenth interest

to the original shareholders who have all "got out" so to speak. Instead of the million the depositors and noteholders have only the one hundred thousand security. Because it enables the bank to in crease its circulation without increasing its security. An example : A bank has a paid-up capital of a million and a half, on which it is by law allowed to issue a certain amount of bank notes; it decides to double its capital and to allow the new shares to the old holders at a certain premium; the old holders do not care to take it, but the ingenious manager says, "Oh take it-we (the bank) will carry it for you n a slight margin;" they take it, but pay in no money, or rather they pay it up in

full and immediately borrow the whole amount back less the margin, putting up the new stock for security; the ingenious manager is quite plessed, for has he not twice the paid-up capital of yesterday, and can he not double the amount of his note issue of yesterday? Certainly he can and he does. But is there any additional security for this additional note issue? Not a dollar. There has been an expansion of the bank's liability without a corresponding increase in its security. And it is just as bad if the advances are made on the stock of other banks for the impairment of security, and the expansion of liability are just as pronounced, though i is manifested in connection with the combined bank capital of the country, and not in connection with a particular bank. Our statesmen are rather noted for their


