rease in the past ten years in the number of women engaged in various industries, of women engaged in various industries, while some entirely new classes of female labor have been created. In the civil ser-vice there are 3216 female officers and olerks, while the municipal and other local authorities furnish employment for 3017. There are 1660 women engaged as mis-sionaries, Scripture readers and itinerant preachers, and 3795 appear as nuns and sisters of charity. There are 100 female law clerks, 2646 midwives and 35,175 women engaged in subordinate medical service; 122,846 women are engaged in educational work. Female musicians and music mistresses number 11,376; inn or music mistresses number 11,376; inn or hotel servants, 26,487, and domestic servants, 1,230,406.
