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Miscellaneous.

Reports from the Ottawa Valley regarding the crops are of gratifying character.

A little colored girl blown from a bridge at Millerville, Ga., ascended sixty feet in perfect safety, her parol acting as a parachute.

The Russians have destroyed six railway bridges between Jamboli and Philippolis. Rolling stock has been sent to Constantinople.

Nineteen times within the last hundred years the Russian forces have crossed the Danube with hostile intent, without including the present crossing.

Capt. James Warner, who died at Warwick, N. Y., on Wednesday, aged 98 years, is believed to have been the oldest Freeman in the United States. He was admitted to St. John Lodge, Providence, in 1803.

Advises from Black Hills state that some twenty of the best known citizens of Dead Wood have been murdered by Indians. Nearly all the ranches along Red Water River and in Spanish Valley are devastated.

As people the Jews are flocking back to the land of their forefathers in great numbers, from all the countries in Europe. In Jerusalem and its neighborhood particularly every plot of ground for sale is eagerly bought up by them.

The Newfoundland Fisheries—News from Newfoundland respecting the Shore Fisheries is of a gloomy character; no previous year, for at least fifteen seasons up to this date, has shown so short a catch for the quantity and quality of the craft and fishermen employed.

The Starr Manufacturing Company has just completed and handed over to the Intercolonial Railway Superintendent the first iron bridge built in this Province. It is a single span of 150 feet crossing the Elmsdale River near the station of the same name. It has been well tested. The bridge cost about ten thousand dollars.

Western Counties Railway Co.—Mr. Linsley, late of the Great Western and Grand Trunk Railway Companies, has been appointed General Superintendent of the Western Counties Railway. The Windsor branch line, it is understood, will be transferred to the Western Counties Railway Company on the 1st of August.

The Old World coming to the New for labor is something new. England's greatest manufacturing city is sending to New York for carpenters and joiners, and, unhappily, since the stagnation of trade, many of our best mechanics will be glad to cross the water to find employment. We can spare our crops to Europe, but it is a loss to lose our skilled workmen.—New York Sun.

The Johannesburg, a black breed used largely by the Russian army for food, is made with a quantity of some kind of grease, which forms a substitute for butter. It can be eaten dry, but the Russian soldier prefers, when he can get it, to break the bread into small pieces, these he puts into a bowl and pours hot water over them. The grease then develops into a gravy, and the whole forms a simple kind of soup.

Henry Croft and his wife, of Lancaster, were travelling to Market Harborough in the Scotch train. As the train was passing Crewe, a sudden crash took place, and a long row of iron, which was being carried in the opposite direction by a luggage train, completely decapitated Mrs. Croft, and swept the greatest part of the carriage away. Her husband, sitting next her, escaped unhurt, and his wife, sitting opposite to his mother was not touched.

A monument to the memory of the late Mr. Bliss, who met his death by the fearful accident at Ashabula, recently, was dedicated at Towanda, Pa., the other day. Messrs. Moody and Sankey, the great revivalists, assisted at the ceremony, and there was upwards of 15,000 persons present.

Capt. Carven, of the Yarmouth barque "Kate Sanction," has been promoted by the Dominion Government, with a valuable Gold Watch and Chain, as a mark of commendation of his conduct on the occasion of the rescue of the crew of the United States barque "Alvers," in January last.

Artemus Martin of Erie, Pa., on whom the degree of A. M. was conferred by Yale College at the last commencement, is a market gardener, who sells vegetables in the streets of Erie twice a week. He is a regular contributor to foreign and American educational publications, and has a mathematical library of several hundred volumes. He is self-educated.

The area over which the great railway strikes against reduction of wages extends, is something extraordinary. It includes New York, Baltimore, Columbus, St. Louis, Pittsburgh, Omaha, Philadelphia; in fact, the whole Western and Southern Railway traffic has been temporarily disarranged; and enormous loss has already occurred in the destruction of property.

TWO GREAT TURF EVENTS FOR SEPTEMBER.

Negotiations were completed last night, for two races. At the first, McDuffie's stallion King William, now in the city, and the stallion Frank Allison, of Truro, N. S. The amount of stakes is \$500 a side and one race is to take place on Sept. 5th, at Kentville, N. S., and the second a week later at Moosepath. Articles were drawn up and signed and a forfeit deposited. Frank Allison is western bred and has a record of 2:36 over a half mile track. The record of William is well known here; suffice it to say that either race will be worth a long trip to witness.—Telegraph.

Telegraphic News.

Special Dispatches to the Morning Chronicle.

EUROPE.

BUCHAREST, July 25.—Grand Duke Nicholas has issued a report denying that the Russian soldiers committed any cruelties; he says foreign correspondents and attaches can bear witness to the same effect, but he admits possibility of isolated and unrepentable acts of vengeance by the Bulgarians. He charges the Turks with great barbarities and particularly mentions that heaps of Russian heads were found in the Shipka Pass when the Turks evacuated it.

A Russian official despatch from Timova conceding the defeat at Plezna, gives Russian loss at two columns and fourteen inferior officers killed; one general and 36 superior officers wounded, 1878 placed hors de combat. General Schilder has retired to Biela road.

LONDON, July 25.—London officials despatches from Biela announce that the Russian steamer Nicholas and two sloops armed with cannon and mitrailleuses engaged a Turkish monitor off Silistria. She was set on fire and considerably damaged, and several of her crew were killed and wounded. The Russian vessel sustained insignificant damage and no loss of life.

Five Turkish steamers and two monitors in going from Ruzhuk to Silistria, on the 23rd were attacked by Slobosia batteries. Three of the steamers were burnt and one sunk.

A Pesh despatch says that Gortschakoff has notified the Powers that Russia will not treat directly with the Porte. The question to be solved will be submitted to the Great Powers.

The Paris Figaro has the same statement. LONDON, July 25.—The embarkation of troops for Malva, yesterday evoked enthusiasm in marked contrast to the departure of the Euphrates on the preceding day, which passed almost unnoticed.

Law officers of the English Crown have decided that the attack of the Shah against the Hunzair was justifiable for the protection of commerce, as the Hunzair's action was that of a pirate.

LONDON, July 25.—The Marquis of Salisbury, yesterday, at the price distribution of the college for Indian engineers, gave a very gloomy view of the famine prospects in India; he said it appears to be in the second period. The famine is settling down over Southern India.

LONDON, July 25.—In consequence of the despatch of the British troops to Malta, the regular campaign is opened by the entire Russian press against England. Some journals laugh at the insignificant force England can spare for the Eastern war. Others severely declare that England is fighting the Russians even now, seeing that the Egyptian troops are equipped with English money; while all agree in regarding English antagonism as a matter of indifference, and not to be dreaded by Russia.

LONDON, July 30.—The Phillipolis railway is restored. The Russian retrograde movement to the Turkish Sahra is regarded as strategy. The Turks lost 8000 killed and wounded at Kaniunlu. It is positively stated when the Russians reach Adrianople the Sultan and government will go to Broussa on the Asiatic side of the Bosphorus.

An official report from Osman Pasha says the Russians having occupied Savata, Turks from Peshawar assaulted and recaptured it, July 26th, after six hours' fighting.

A despatch from Batoum on Saturday states that Hobart Pasha's fleet has arrived.

RUSSIA, July 30.—The "Political Correspondence" has a telegram from Bucharest, stating that General Omura, the Roumanian commander at Nikola, has his headquarters in the city of Bucharest, and is co-operating in certain cases with Russians, and even if requisite to take an active share in the fighting.

NEW YORK, July 28.—News from almost all points concerning the strike continues quiet and favorable, and as far as roads are concerned the strike is mostly at an end. On most of the lines the running of both freight and passenger trains has been resumed. This morning there are a few reports of violence, and none of any magnitude. The rioters in Chicago seem to have been effectually subdued, and order was maintained throughout the city yesterday, with a prospect of rioters making no further trouble.

Some excitement was caused in St. Louis by the gathering of a meeting of trades unionists, and a raid upon the mob outside by the police. No resistance was made, and the police broke up the meeting without opposition.

A SUPERLATIVE HORROR. This morning, about nine o'clock, a terrible accident happened at the steam mill of M. C. Hamilton, north of the city, resulting in the instant death of William Knowlton, an employe of the mill.

It appears that he went to get a saw, in close proximity to it, to pick up a belt which had been broken, and one of his feet slipped on the lumber, which caused him to lose his balance. He threw his left hand to recover his equilibrium, and in doing so it came in contact with the saw, and the hand was instantly severed from the arm just above the wrist.

NOW FOR BUDDING. It is to be taken for granted that every farmer, or one of his sons, or even daughters—for we have known daughters to graft—knows how to graft, and large numbers employ that knowledge in spring-time to put a good head on a wild tree, or to change the character of one to something more desirable.

But the spring is generally crowded with work. Few get done what they desire or intended to do; and among the put-off things very likely of all others will be the grafting.

Something of this can be made up at this season by budding or inoculation, as it is sometimes called. It does not find the same favor with farmers as it does with nurserymen, because no time seems to be gained over grafting the following spring, for the buds put in now do not push into growth till the next spring.

They grow immediately, and make stronger growths and form a good head much sooner than buds put in at this season will. But then there is the question of time.

If the buds are put in this season, they will be ready for budding in the spring. This is comparatively a season of more leisure, and a tree budded now is done with. It will keep on growing, and certainly will beat the tree that never had an operation.

Budding is so simple an operation, and has been over and over again described in our columns, that most people are likely to be benefited by this article. A piece of bark, cut from a tree, and placed under the bark of the stock to be improved, and which has been split and lifted or loosened by the back of a knife for the purpose.

The buds are put in, and any operation of the bud is fixed firmly in. Any person can understand this, and only experience will teach more. But there is one thing which all budding do not understand, and we will explain why even some good hands fail.

The branch on which the bud is to be put must be healthy, and in every way healthy, or the buds will not take. Failure in most cases comes from this. It does not make much difference whether the branch is cut or operated in more than one year old, so that the bark separates readily from the wood—as the bidders say "runs freely"—but it is essential that it should be in perfect health.

It is also essential that the buds should be in perfect health. They should be taken from a tree during the latter part of the summer, if in the condition we have described. In regard to the bud it must not be too young. Failure generally comes from this. There is far less chance of failure with very old buds than with young ones. All the buds must be of this season's growth.
