On October 15th, 1861, a second set of postage stamps ap-They are 1 obolos velpeared. low, 2 oboloi blue, and 4 oboloi wine red, with the same design and the same description as the preceding issue, but the color of the 2 oboloi value is darker, and the a oboloi value is more carmine than wine red, as the same values are in the 1859 issue. The quantities of this second issue are: --45,000 stamps of the 1 obolos value, 120,000 stamps of the 2 oboloi value, and 30,000 stamps of the 4 oboloi value. The post-offices of the Ionian Islands handled during 1861 mail pieces in number of 154,000, in 1862 a number of 171,000, in 1863 a number of 192,000, and in the year 1864 a total of land, and Trieste, Austria.

Now a word about the cancellation of the Ionian Islands postage stamps. Partly they were cancelled with a cross (written). seldom with the word FRANCO. Some European collectors reported also to possess stamps cancelled with the year, date and There are plenty of counterfeits made of the Ionian stamps, but they are lithographed and without watermark and a serious collector easily finds them out. The genuine unused stamps are very high priced, but the genuine used stamps are much higher, and all are very scarce.
