SHIPPING MATTERS.

Freight rates from Duluth to Buffalo are weaker. It is thought that tonnage will be offered at \$1.50 a thousand, which will be the lowest point touched last season.

The American barqentine, Northwest, loading lumber at the Brunette Saw Mills, New Westminster, B. C., for Southern Califor-She will carry away a cargo of 550,000

Captains of lumber vessels at St. John, N.B., are pleased in receiving word from Boston that the recent decision of the customs of that city, that vessels would not be allowed to discharge cargo at night, has been waived under certain reasonable conditions. St. John schooners will greatly benefit by this decision.

Robert Ward & Co., Ltd., Vancouver, B.C. Robert Ward & Co., Ltd., Vancouver, B.C., say: "Freights have continued to rule very firm, with an upward tendency, and although we are of the opinion that this state of affairs cannot be maintained very long, still a great deal of tonnage has been taken forward with canceling dated as late as 30th Dec., and this, of course, tends to keep up freights. In other parts of the world freights are low, and the consequence is that ship-owners are heading all available tonnage this wa, in order to take advantage of the high freights. Suitable vessels for lumber are very scarce at the increased tates."

CURRENT TRADE CONDITIONS.

ONTARIO.

THE approach of midsummer is having, to some extent, a quieting effect on the lumber trade. Confidence, however, is increasing, and the belief is, that if no large amount of trade is done immediately, better times are near by. The earnings of the Canadian Pacific for the week increased \$41,000, and those of the Grand Trunk \$14,549. Following an increase in railroad earnings in the United States business is improving, and a continuous increase in that same department of commerce may be expected to have a profitable influence on business in Canada. Manufacturers complain that prices with them are cut close and as a consequence they are forced to pay as little as possible for lumber. But as general trade improves, this difficulty will be overcome and lumber will be a gainer thereby. Prices are, on the whole, firm, with a rather large call for bill stuff in comparison with other lines.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRUNSWICK.

Shipping continues active in Quebec, though this is not to be taken as indicating a large amount of strength in the lumber business. Results depend on conditions on the other side of the Atlantic, and reports from there, while telling of an improvement, are yet only fairly encouraging. The Quebec Chronicle takes encouragement from the fact that work on the Parry Sound Railway is now being pushed on by some of its leading citizens. "The saving of 800 miles in distance between Duluth and Liverpool, which that road will effect," says this journal, "must unq zationably bring us at least a share of the western trade which now goes to England via Buffalo and New York; and as our leading merchants and deal shippers who will have to furnish cargoes for the new line of steamers are actively interested in the railway, it is only reasonable that their policy as to freight rates will be such as to bring back to us the deal trade of the Hawkesbury, Ottawa and Amprior mills, and also give us the export business of the valuable lumber country which the railway will open up in the interior between Amprior and Parry Sound, besides bringing to Quebec for shipment large quantities of other products." Shipments of lumber in New Brunswick are largely in excess of last season to the same date, and the markets are more steady than usual.

BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Shipments of lumber in British Columbia maintain the increased strength that they have taken on for the past month or two. Good quantities of lumber continue to go to California, and the exports to

foreign countries are of reasonable size. The shingle trade, it is believed, is improving, though prices are still a good distance from profitable figures.

UNITED STATES.

The improved outlook in agricultural districts of the United States, helped to some extent by recent generous rains, is proving a factor in increasing confidence in the business situation. It is believed that business will continue to move forward steadily until fall, when, with the hardening of values in leading products that has already taken place, followed by a good harvest, the general business of the country will take an upward step and lumber will certainly fall into line with other products. Just at the present time sales are being conducted on careful lines. There is an increase in the business of the past month, but still much of the stuff that goes out is in small lots. Every day it becomes clearer that white pine lumbermen have got to count in the Lake Superior district as an important factor in the business of the future. From Michigan, Buffalo, Tonawanda, Albany and othe, eastern markets the news comes of lumbermen there making purchases of no small size of Duluth lumber. It is to be sincerely hoped that this new element in the trade will not be an influence tending to depress prices. There is no need, with the condition of the white pine market, for anything of the kind.

Buyers in the British market, says the Timber Trades Journal, are showing decidedly more inclination to purchase lumber for prompt delivery, but are reluctant to enter into engagements for late ship ments. The absence of speculation and the determination to restrict business to a hand to-mouth trade as far as practicable, continues to be the most marked characteristic of current trade. In a certain degree this caution in buying is evidence of a healthy undercurrent of trade, and causes buyers to look forward to the future with greater confidence than was possible during the opening of the present campaign. It has also been the means of bringing down prices to a more healthy level and should enable importers to recoup some of the losses they are making over the realization of their deal stocks. In Liverpool sales are light. In Glasgow there is still a slow enquiry reported for the lower grades of Canadian timber, and prices are irregular. The arrival of pine and spruce deals have been more than equal to the demand.

BARDWOODS

Judging from the volume of trade to date, June will prove a fair month with hardwood men. Considerable stuff is going out in assorted car lots, though sometimes it is amusing to note the small lots into which a dealer will cut up his order. We saw a letter a few days ago from a New York house, ordering a car of hardwood to consist of elm in four different sizes and maple in four different sizes. The spirit of caution has evidently not yet forsaken the lumber trade.

STOCKS AND PRICES.

CANADA.

Arthur Hill, of Saginaw, Mich., has sold the bulk of his Canadian output.

The lumber exports from St. John, N. B., for May, were \$309,846, as against \$290,376 for the same month last year.

The sch. Puritan hassailed from Moodyville, B.C., for Tientsin. She has 249,007 feet of rough lumber and 12 spars, valued at \$6,332.

Piling in considerable quantities is being shipped from Cumberland county, N. S., to New York. It is being carried in small vessels at the rate of 1½ cents.

The Arcturus has sailed from Vancouver, B.C., for Santa Rosalia, with a cargo consisting of 773,248 feet of rough lumber, and 49,255 feet of dressed lumber, valued at \$6,301.

During the past week 3,500,000 feet of deals, etc., cleared St. John, N. B., for British ports, and nearly 2,000,000 long lumber, 4,500,000 lath and a cargo of piling were shipped to United States ports.

UNITED STATES.

During the past week over 3,000,000 ft. of lumber left Tonawanda by canal.

A raft of 6,000,000 feet of logs from Georgian Bay, for Albert Pack, has reached Alpena, Mich.

The Saginaw Salt & Lumber Co., of Saginaw, Mich., sold last week 225,000 ft. of lumber to Michigan points.

Saginaw Salt & Lumber Co., of Saginaw, Mich., received last week a raft of 3,500,000 feet from the Georgian Bay. Others are following it rapidly.

Receipts by lake from Buffalo for the past week were 8,000,000 feet of lumber and 27,866 shingles, which, though light, is above the average for the last month.

BRITISH LUMBER CONDITIONS.

Farnworth & Jardine, Liverpool, Eng., in their June wood circular say: The arrivals from British North America during the past month have been 14 vessels, 14,842 tons, against 8 vessels, 3,929 tons during the corresponding month last year, and the aggregate tonnage to this date from all places during the years 1893, 1894 and 1895 has been 87,750, 72,626 and 75, 406 tons respectively.

We have little change in our market to report; imports generally have not been heavy, and the deliveries about an average at this season of the year; values of most articles continue low, although there is a slightly better feeling.

CANADIAN WOODS .- Of waney the arrivals have consisted of a large steamer shipment, which has gone direct up to Manchester and is all going into consumption; there is no change in value to re-port. Square pine: The demand is very imited, and the stock is moderate. Red pine moves off very slowly, and price rules low. Oak has been in fair request, but no change in value, and the stock is sufficient. Ash.—The arrivals have again been large from the United States ports, the deliveries have been fair, but the stock is accumulating, and is now too heavy. Elm. There has been little enheavy. quiry, prices are steady, and the stock is moderate. Pine deals have come forward too freely, and prices have given way, owing to the extreme low rates of steamer freights; the stock is much too heavy.

NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA SPRUCE AND PINE DEALS.—Of spruce the arrivals have been 2,980 standards, against 441 standards same time last year; most of the import is going direct from the quay into consumption, and although the stock is still too heavy there is rather a better feeling, and prices are steady.

BIRCH.—Of logs the import has been two heavy; however, there has been a fair enquiry, and prices are steady; the stock is ample. Birch planks have not been imported; prices still rule very low. Oak planks: The arrivals continue on a large scale, but the deliveries continue fair and prices are unchanged, the stock is moderate.

PITCH PINE.—The arrivals during the past month have been 5 vessels, 4,879

tons, against 4 vessels, 5,406 tons during the same time last year. Of hewn there have been two parcels; there has been a good consumption, but values are rather easier and the stock is ample. Of sawn the arrivals have been by six different vessels from various pitch pine ports; there has been an improved consumption, the stock has been considerably reduced though prices are still very low. Planks and boards have arrived freely, and there has been a fair consumption, stocks are too heavy.

SEQUOIA (CALIFORNIA REDWOOD).— The large cargo recently arrived is sufficient to supply the market for some time to come; the demand is very quiet, and no recent sales have taken place.

BRITISH COLUMBIA AND OREGON PINE. The demand continues very languid; there is no change in value to report; the stock is still too heavy.

UNITED STATES STAVES.—The arrivals have again been on a large scale, stocks are ample, and values unchanged.

BALTIC AND EUROPEAN WOODS.—The arrivals during the past month have been 23 vessels, 11,290 tons, against 25 vessels 13,898 tons during the like time last year. Of fir timber two cargoes have arrived from Danzic, which are going fairly into consumption; the stock, however, is too heavy. Red and white deals continue in dull demand, without change in value; the stock is still much too excessive. Flooring boards have come forward more moderately; the deliveries have been large, and the stock is now in a more moderate compass; there is no change in value to report. Masts and spars have not been imported.

EAST INDIA TEAK AND GREENHEART. Of Teak: The arrivals of both logs and planks still continue on too large a scale, and although there has been a fair enquiry prices have again declined, and the present stock is too heavy. Greenheart: The arrivals consumption has been moderate and the stock is ample prices are unchanged.

No wholesale transactions to report in Quebec pine, red pine, oak, elm, ash, or hickory. Quebec birch timber, 18 in. has been sold on private terms. St. John—by auction, 14½ in. average at 15½d per foot. Quebec pine deals 3rd quality regulars, at £8 15s; 3rd quality ends, at £7 10s per standard. Spruce deals, St. John by auction, at an average of £5 17s 6d per standard; Lower Port £5 15s ex quay. No sales to report in scantling, boards, or palings.

AUSTRALIAN CONDITIONS.

Fraser & Co., Ltd., Melbourne, Aus-n. in their monthly circular say: Only lia, in their monthly circular say: a limited amount has been done within the past four weeks, as the trade are fairly supplied with stocks to meet the actual consumption at the present time, which generally diminished during the early art of the winter season. Business has been concluded at unaltered values in most classes of timber which are in general use; but some re-sales of Oregon ex Cadzow Forest (which arrived on the 13th ultimo, and was sold in a line, at a price witheld, to one of our principal saw millers) have been effected, "ex wharf," at £5, have been effected, "ex wharf," at £5, militating, for the time being, against stocks in the yards out of late shipments, which have been quotable at £5 5s. We quite lock, however, for the latter figure to be obtainable now and in the immediate future, both for existing stocks and shipments which may come upon the market in the course of a few months. In the conclusion of some fairly large forward business of New Zealand white pine lower values have also ruled, rates being accepted showing a considerable decline on in the preceding year. prices paid anticipated that large supplies of this timber will come upon the market when the season commences for the manufacture of butter-boxes. Several charters have lately been effected for flooring, &c., from the Baltic at a reduction upon freight rates

previously ruling.

During the early period of the present winter season it is not to be anticipated

that inquiries will be of a brisk character, but at the turn of the half year we fully look for an increased demand to ensue, and timber generally to be more freely operated in, as by that time stocks will have been gradually worked down, and the necessity for renewed supplies will be apparent.

FLOORING, LINING, AND WEATHI R-BOARDS.—Imports: nil. A steady inquiry has been experienced at late quotations, which are sure to be maintained, if not improved upon, in the immediate future. RED DEALS.—Imports: nil. The demand does not improve to any material extent, and it is difficult to place stocks at present of either good or fair quality holdings. In the small business concluded, late values have been obtainable.

SPRUCE AND BALTIC WHITE DEALS. Imports: nil. Stocks in first hands are practically nil. The trade hold some supplies, which are being quitted at late valuations. The demand for this class of lumber has shown considerable improvement during the past season, and shipments arriving in the early summer should meet with good inquiry.

OREGON PINE.—Imports: 793,000 ft. super. Arrival: Cadzow Forest, from Vancouver. The above arrival was sold to one of the trade at a price witheld, and about one-third of the cargo was afterwards disposed of in various parcels at £5 ex., and at up to £6 for square sizes.

REDWOOD.—Imports: nil. Holding in the hands of the trade are being quitted at from £7 15s. to £8, but the demand still continues sluggish.

SUGAR PINE AND DOOR STOCK.—Imports: 13,500 feet super. Arrival: Adelaide (str.), from Adelaide. The demand is checked through want of supplies. Late quotations are asked for some holdings in second hands.

LUMBER.—Imports: nil. Michigan shelving and clear pine have been in fair inquiry; the former at £11 for 12-inch and wide, and the latter at £15 for 2-inch and upwards.

KAURI AND NEW ZEALAND WHITE PINE. — Imports: Kauri, 20,000 feet super.; white pine, 433,360 feet super. Arrivals: Silver Cloud, from river Thames; Acacia, from Auckland; and steamers. Fair business in the former has been concluded at late quotations; and in the latter, stocks on hand have been dealt in only to a limited extent at about late quotations. Some large sales have also been made in white pine, "to arrive," at prices showing a considerable reduction on those accepted last season. The Silver Cloud's cargo was disposed of in a line shortly after arrival.

LATHS AND PICKETS.—Imports: Laths, 1711 bundles. Arrival: Cadsow Forest, from Vancouver. Supplies are small, but the demand is limited. A little business has been done in stocks on hand.

GETTING THE LOGS OUT.

News received by Bronson & Weston Co., of Ottawa, Ont., from up the river, shows that the firm's drive is almost all run into the Ottawa. The drive on the Schyan Pinneseault and Lusks Creek, Black River, is now out. There are over 53,000 logs and 1,000 pieces of boom timber on the Schyan River drives. 30,000 on the Pinneseault and 50,000 on Lusks Creek, in all nearly 140,000.

LUMBER FREIGHT RATES.

LUMBER freight rates for pine on the Grand Trunk Railway have been made a fixture, as below. Of any ntended change due notice will be given lumbermen

General instructions in shipping by Grand Trunk are embodied in these words in the tariff schedule: On lumber in carloads, inlimim weight, 30,000 lbs. per car, unless the marked capacity of the car be less, in which case the marked capacity (but not less than 24,000 lbs.) will be charged, and must not be exceeded. Should it be impracticable to load certain descriptions of light umber up to 30,000 lbs. to the car, then the actual weight only will be charged for, but not less than 24. weight only will be charged for, but not less than 24; coolbe. The rates on lumber in the tariff will not be higher from an intermediate point on the straight run than from the first named point beyond, to the same destination. For instance, the rates from Tara or Hepworth to Guelph, lirampton, Weston or Toronto, would not be higher than the specific rates named from Wiarton to the same points. The rates from Cargill and Southampton to points east of Listowel and south and west of Stratford will be the same as from Kincardine, but in no case are higher rates to be charged than as per mileage table published on page of tariff.

Rates from Toronto east to Belleville are 1½c. per 100 lbs.; to Deseronto, 9c.; to Brockville and Prescott, 10c.; to Montreal and Ottawa, 11c. The rates on hardwoods average about m.c. to ac. per 100 lbs. higher than on softwoods. For rates on railway ties, mahogany, rosewood, walnut, cherry, and other valuable woods, application must be made to the district freight agent.

On the Canadian Pacific the rates on pine and softwoods may be illustrated as follows: Cache Bay, North Bay, Sturgeon Falls and Warren, to Foronto, 10c. Algoma, Cook's Mills, Massey, Spanish River and Whitefish to Toronto, 13c.; Ottawa to Toronto, 10c. From Ottswa, Hull, Aylmer and Dutchesne Mills to station on the Lake Erie and Detroit River, Erie and Huron, Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo, and Michigan Central Railways, the rate is 14/2c. per 100 lbs. Regulations apply as to minimum size of carboad of 30,000 lbs., and an advanced rate is charged for hardwoods.

MODIFICATION OF HARDWOOD PATES THE Grand Trunk Railway and Canadian Pacific have made the rates on hardwoods fromcertain points to Toronto and Hamilton as follows. The regulations are over the signature of Mr. John Earls, W.D.F.A., of the G. T. R., and given in reply to a letter from Toronto hardwood men.

"After careful consideration we have come to the con-clusion that, on and after Jan. 1st, 1895, a modification will be made in the present arrangements for hardwood

lumber, to the effect that the rate will be 7½C per 100 lba from our Northern and Northwestern branches to Toronto and Hamilton. This rate, however, will not apply from main line points and the straight run between Toronto, Sarnia and Windsor; also that faras rates on common lumber to points like Guet London, Woodstock, lingersoll, etc., from all tumber shipping stations the rate will be the same on hardwood as on pine. On the old principle, we suppose, that half the loaf is better than none, hardwood men have something, possibly, to be thankful for, though there is no good reason why the rates generally on hardwood should not be as low as on pine. It is understood that the C. P. R. rate will be made uniform at 7½c. from same points.
