## REPORT.

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THE return of another Anniversary of this Auxiliary reminds us of the flight of time, and calls us to review the dealings of a gracious Providence towards the widely extended Missions of the Parent Society. It is a circumstance highly gratifying, that though efforts have been made, during the past year, as on some former occasions, by misguided men, to diminish the flow of Christian liberality into the exchequer of the Society, the income has amounted to the large sum of £102,730 19s. 9d. sterling, besides a donation of £10,000 sterling, for the purposes of the Society, by the late Thomas Marriott, Esq., who was for a long period a very active member of the Committee of the Wesleyan Missionary Society. Perhaps no other man has occupied the Chair at so many Anniversary Meetings of the Society in different parts of the kingdom. He was one of the Secretaries of the Auxiliary Society for the London District, and was a member of the Committee from the time of its formation in 1813, until his death.

### EUROPE.

IRELAND.—At the last Irish Conference, the Rev. William G. Campbell was appointed as a "General Missionary," to visit the various Mission Stations, with a view to promote the revival of the work of God. We have before us copious journals reaching from the 3rd of July to the 28th of September. They contain most gratifying examples of zeal on the part of the Missionary, of faithful co-operation on the part of his brethren and friends, and, above all, of the readiness and power of our adorable Lord to bless His faithful servants. The labour of our Missionaries, in the markets, fairs, and remote districts of Ireland, in former years, was one of the chief agencies which the Lord honoured in preserving the remnant

of Protestantism, then in many places ready to die, in pointing out the Irish tongue as the fit instrument for evangelizing the really *Irish* population, and in moving the national and the Presbyterian churches to go forth and call sinners to repentance. Those churches have recently laboured with admirable diligence, and with a success wherent all Christians must rejoice; and we doubt not that our own devoted Brethren will be favoured of the Lord to accomplish a good proportion of the harvest-work, for which the fields of Ireland now seem whitening. Among the band of sainted men who first led the way in proper Irish Missions, the names of Ousley and Graham ever stand pre-eminent; and we are pleased to remark, that Mr. Campbell is a near relation of Ousley's worthy colleague, Charles Graham.

Immediately after the Irish Conference, Mr. Campbell entered on his work, first preaching in the streets of Ballyclare. Thence he proceeded to Downpatrick, and preached in a grove, which Mr. Wesley calls "one of the most beautiful groves which my eyes ever beheld," and in which he had preached eighty years before. Here about five hundred persons drank in the word with great avidity; and the soul of the Missionary rejoiced to spend the first Sabbath of his new labours proclaiming Christ from the spot whence Wesley had often proclaimed Him, and close by that where the remains of St. Patrick, the great Evangelist of Ireland, are reputed to rest. Hence he proceeded to Cavan, and to the late scene of his labours, Lowtherstown; thence to Donegal, where, preaching in the market, both Protestants and Romanists paid great attention, and, during prayer, "several" knelt upon the ground. Mr. Richard Campbell, the Missionary on the spot, stated, that lately a man in the country, who had been a Romanist, had died rejoicing in a good hope through grace, and tracing his conversion to the instrumentality of a sermon delivered in the street by a member of the Missionary Deputation. In subsequent services on different parts of this Mission some souls were brought to the enjoyment of peace with God. At a very remote spot, called Lóerús Point, a large congregation assembled; "every word

appeared to be devoured, some cried aloud, and, after a long time spent in prayer, several declared that the Lord had delivered and comforted their souls." At seven o'clock the next morning, a large congregation assembled, and a "similar scene" of penitential feeling was witnessed.

Before leaving Donegal, Mr. Campbell preached in the fair; "vast attendance; many were the tears, many the Amens to the prayer for mercy; while Mr. Stephens prayed, scores on their knees, and some smiting their breasts;" and our Mission Schoolmaster fervently exhorted in the Irish tongue. The next morning, at seven o'clock, the Missions were in the street; workmen stopped, sleepers arose, and opened their windows; many followed the Preachers to the chapel, where they continued for an hour, praying with them and exhorting; and then Mr. Campbell proceeded to Rathmelton, a distance of sixteen miles. Here again he visited a country Station, and preached in the market of the town, "standing on the very stone where Dr. Coke stood sixty years before;" the congregation was large, two stones were thrown at the Missionary; but the only effect of this was to bring a crowd of hearers to the chapel in the evening.

Calling at the city of Londonderry, he accompanied Mr. McMillen, the Minister of the Circuit, to New-Buildings, where Dr. Adam Clarke preached his first sermon, and where a memorial is now erecting in the form of a chapel and school. Here was a crowd assembled for a race, and to these Mr. Campbell delivered his message. "At first they shouted, gazed, and wondered; but finally drew nigh and heard." In the city, the work of the Lord seems in a state of steadily-growing prosperity, to which "a fresh impulse was given last Spring by the visit of the Rev. John Rattenbury, on the Missionary Deputation."

At Newtownlimavaddy, Stranorlar, Belalt, Drumclap, and other places, Mr. Campbell laboured and found open doors. In the last-named place, "a revival has been going on with vigour for the last fourteen months." At Ault, he and Mr. Hewitt were to preach in the fields; but, the weather proving severe, the Ministers and Elders of the Presby-

terian Meeting-house kindly lent their place of worship ; and here many were melted ; “ we had both a time of mourning and a time of rejoicing.”

At Omagh, in the street, “ the scene was affecting. The windows were thrown up, the rich gazing, the poor weeping, and many on their knees while Mr. Moran called on God in prayer.”

Meeting on the road with two women, one of whom seemed far gone in consumption, Mr. Campbell earnestly pressed upon her the consideration of her soul’s state. At first, health was her chief care ; but she soon seemed moved. He then “ got down from the gig,” and prayed with them there, and went on his way, believing he had borne “ a message from God to her.”

Having thus given a summary of the greater portion of this journal, we quote at full from its concluding part, which refers to the Ballymena Mission ; and we are assured that many will not only feel more encouraged to pray for the salvation of Ireland, but will feel their own zeal stirred up to new diligence in the Lord’s work.

GERMANY.—Gratifying intelligence has been received as to the growing prosperity of the Society’s Mission in Germany. Notwithstanding some new political regulations of an adverse character, and various other hostile influences, which combine to present a formidable opposition to the interests of spiritual religion, this interesting Mission, under the fostering care of the Society’s faithful Agent, has not only succeeded in maintaining the ground already gained, but has also, by God’s blessing upon it, continued, in a very satisfactory manner, to extend its operations. The number of Mr. Muller’s fellow-labourers has increased, during the year, from sixteen to twenty.

FRANCE.—The accounts from France are satisfactory. The brethren at a recent District Meeting, held in Nismes, report that none of the Stations have suffered any permanent injury through the late revolution ; in none have the authorities, civil or military, interfered ; nor has there been, through political circumstances, any decrease either among the members or

hearers. On the contrary, as far as Methodist labors are concerned, the painful events incident on the affairs of the 2nd December, have been over-ruled, in many instances, for good. Backsliders, who having first lost their piety, have been led away into tavern company, then to political clubs, and finally to join insurrectionary movements, have been led to contrast, with penitence of heart, their former and their present state. One poor fellow, formerly a Local Preacher in the Cevennes, who is now a fugitive in the mountains, exclaimed to a friend, who, finding out his hiding place, went to exhort and comfort him: "Ah! I should not be where and what I now am, had my name remained on the Methodist preaching plan."

In other cases, families afflicted by the late events, now frequent our meetings; and some men who before spent their time to the detriment of their families and their personal salvation, in reading violent party newspapers, in discussing politics, and speaking ill of dignities, have had their eyes opened to the folly of such proceedings, and are, we now trust, seeking the "better part."

One circumstance which has come to our knowledge, although of another description to the preceding, is of as interesting a character as to claim being mentioned here. At *Bar-le-Duc*, a new department of the Meuse, and which is in fact, the only Protestant interest in the midst of a population of three hundred and fifteen thousand souls,—the authorities sent some *gendarmes* to the Methodist Chapel to watch the proceedings. Accordingly, the soldiers arrived, fully equipped, and stood inside of the door, during the whole of the service. Meanwhile, they had an unexpected and unsought for opportunity, as Roman Catholics, of hearing words of salvation through the only Mediator. Their term of service at the chapel being expired, one Sunday morning the same gendarmes returned, but not *alone*; they were accompanied by their wives and children, and proceeded to take their seats among the hearers, in the body of the chapel.—They have now become stated attendants.

SPAIN.—In Spain, at Gibraltar, a considerable amount

of success has been realized ; and Mr. Alton has seen and conversed with not fewer than 1000 adults, in their own houses, and publicly addressed hundreds more. The public examination of the School was a season of interest and promise.

## ASIA.

CEYLON.—Turning to this quarter of the Globe, we naturally look to our old Mission in Ceylon, where our friends will be glad to learn that a very extensive and valuable native agency has been raised up, so that thirteen Central Stations, with 1,245 full and accredited Church members, and 2,687 scholars, are worked by native agents, for whose superintendance only four English Missionaries are now employed.

The Missionaries in the northern part of Ceylon have addressed themselves very successfully to the work of Education. The results of Mr. Percival's long-continued efforts in this department are described by the Bishop, and we take the liberty again to introduce his independent testimony in place of the usual extracts from the reports of the Missionaries. The Bishop says, "As President of the School Commission, I accompanied the Inspector, the Rev. B. Bailey, to examine the Wesleyan Schools; they were large and fully attended; they were examined in Scripture history and evidences, ancient and modern history, and the usual subjects of general education, and the result was highly satisfactory; they are the best Schools in the town of Jaffna. I found Bishop Corrie's 'Manual of Ancient History,' in use for the first time. It was new to me, and much recommended as a very useful and judicious compilation by Mr. Percival, the active and energetic Superintendent of these Schools. The Girl's School, under the same effective superintendance, was next inspected, to which we were accompanied by Mrs. Chapman, and Mrs. Carr. All was here alike satisfactory; the writing, singing and chanting particularly so. One girl attracted the attention of all by her meekness and intelligence;

and on enquiring about her, we were all interested in hearing that she was the daughter of the first native girl who was *brided* to receive Christian instruction by the Americans; she afterwards became, and still is, a valuable and faithful teacher, and is bringing up her children in the fear and love of God.

“In the Chapel of the Wesleyan Mission with which these Schools are connected, they have daily prayer, in the morning in English, evening in Tamul; they use our Liturgy, but slightly altered and abridged; they chant the services. Mr. Percival, the head of the Mission, is himself engaged in translating the Liturgy, and Jeremy Taylor’s ‘Holy Living and Dying,’ into Tamul. He is revising also Rhenius’s Version of the Bible.

INDIA.—On the continent of India, wide doors have been recently opened for the entrance of Missionaries. Our Missionaries behold the certain though gradual approach of a great change among the people, and the opportunities of hastening that change, were they but adequately reinforced. One of them writes, concerning the feelings of natives on the success of Christianity: “We have received frequent visits at the Mission-house from respectable natives, with whom we have conversed on the things of the kingdom of God. It has surprised us to mark the opinion which prevails in Hindu society, that their religion will be overthrown and demolished, and Christianity will be universally established. They say, “Your *vaiithum* is the true one, and your religion will be, in this and in every land, triumphant. This we know; for all our great men say it.” But they invariably add, as an excuse for a personal and immediate attention to the claims of the Gospel of Christ, “The time is not yet come for us to receive your *vaiithum*, or to profess your religion; but when it is, we will all be Christians. If we do so now, shall suffer much trouble.”

“I have informed you, in previous letters, that the room in which the English school was conducted, was, by some malicious hands, twice burnt to the ground. It affords me no

slight gratification now to state, that it has been rebuilt, and that it forms a substantial and commodious brick and chunam edifice, an ornament to the spacious street in which it stands. It has cost some thousand rupees, or £100; and, you will be pleased to learn, is the munificent donation of T. Rungiah Naick, the Tashildar of this Talook. I subjoin a copy of a letter written to myself, in which he presents the building to our Society:—

‘MANAARGOODY, *November 22, 1851.*

‘REVEREND SIR,—The thatched school-room of your Mission, situated on the north side of King’s-street, in the middle of Manaargoody, having formerly been twice consumed by fire, I conceived a desire to erect in its place a solid and strong tiled building, so spacious as to accommodate a hundred boys, who would learn English and Tamul. I have therefore caused the building to be newly completed, by the contributions of myself and a few others, which building I have hereby the pleasure to present to the Wesleyan Missionary Society, who, I hope, will appropriate it for the use of their Mission. Its dimensions are fifty-five feet long, by thirty feet broad. A plan of the building is herein enclosed.

NEW ZEALAND.—In New Zealand, the European congregation and Society present pleasing indications. Though three additional places of worship have been opened, and three additional Ministers of different denominations have been settled here during the last two years, yet our congregation continues as good as ever it was; and the gradual increase of church-members proves that we do not “run in vain, neither labour in vain.” In looking back to the time when I was appointed to this Circuit, that is, the District-Meeting of 1844, and comparing the state of things then to our present state, I feel we have abundant cause for gratitude to the great Head of the church for the way in which He has prospered us. Then we had a

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small weather-board chapel that would seat about two hundred, and, at the close of 1845, twenty-eight church-members. Now we have a substantial brick chapel that would seat nearly five hundred, with one hundred and eighty church-members, and twenty on trial. Nor are we indebted to any extent to emigration for increase in members; but few have come to us from distant places; the greater portion has been raised up on the spot. God has blessed His own word, and caused it to bear fruit to His glory. As villages arise around us, we endeavor to spread the work. We have two small chapels in the country, one in the midst of a rural population at Epsom, where we have good attendance and a small class; another at one of the pensioners' villages, where we have also a small class. We have preaching-places at two other villages, where we shall, I trust, soon need chapels. The Lord has raised us up a few zealous young men as Local Preachers, so that we are able to get our entire system into operation. I am more than ever convinced, that Methodism is better adapted than any other system to convert the world. It seems especially adapted to meet the spiritual wants of a new country; for it supplies agencies that no other system adopts, makes available every particle of talent that a church may contain, and with the greatest facility strikes forth its roots in every direction.

We have three educational establishments of great promise. 1st. The seminary formed for our own children.—The formation of this institution has been a great relief to many minds: we can now secure for our children a thorough Wesleyan training in connexion with sound education. Nor are their labors in vain. There is reason to believe, that many of the children truly fear God, and some enjoy His favor, and walk in the light of His countenance. I cannot but indulge the hope, that some of these interesting youths will rise up to carry the glad tidings to the regions beyond. If the Lord but pour His Spirit upon them, as I am sure He will in answer to prayer, we shall not have to look to England for a constant supply of Missionaries for the islands of the Pacific, and you will be able to spread your funds over a

wider extent. We have a day-school, too, on the chapel premises for the children of our poorer people. For this we are hoping Mr. Lawry will bring us a Wesleyan Teacher, who can introduce the Glasgow system. The school has not succeeded as it would have done could we have secured Teachers of our own persuasion, though it has quite met our expectations. If we get a good Teacher, we shall soon have a good school.

The Native Institution at the Three Kings is as interesting and perhaps more encouraging than almost any thing connected with our Mission. Mr. Reid is a most admirable man for this work, and has been greatly blessed: my only fear sometimes is for his health; he labors beyond his strength. Besides all the scholastic duties, he has a large farm to overlook, and keep the pupils at their industrial employments. They have fenced in during the year one hundred and six acres of land, and have now under crop,—potatoes, thirty acres; wheat, twenty-five; maize, twelve; pasture, fourteen. Several of the elder boys can plough and harrow, and ditch and fence, and others are learning carpentry under the superintendence of an experienced carpenter: they have erected the necessary buildings. The girls make and mend and wash the clothes both for the boys and themselves, under Mrs. Reid's superintendence. She is a most devoted woman: I wish her health was equal to her zeal. I am sure, if you could just go over this Institution, you would be delighted beyond measure; and its fame spreads. Most respectable visitors make it a point to see the Three Kings, and some declare it is the only thing worth coming to New Zealand to see; this is perhaps going too far: there is, thank God, much worth seeing in the land, as regards moral changes among the aborigines; but this may safely be considered one of the brightest spots. To the Governor, Sir George Grey, we are greatly indebted: he has ever manifested the most lively interest in this school, and largely helped us with funds. I received a note from him from Wellington the other day, in reference to additional buildings he wishes erected. I had sent him the plans, and the following is his reply:—

" GOVERNMENT HOUSE,

" Wellington, August 29th, 1851.

" MY DEAR SIR,—I this morning received your letter of the 7th of August, enclosing the plans for the girls' and boys' school at the Three Kings. I have approved the plans, and have written to the Lieutenant-Governor authorizing the advance of the estimated amount, £600, in such sums as you may require for the purpose of erecting the buildings. I hope, therefore, you will now have the girls' school commenced without a day's delay. Both buildings might, I think, be completed before next winter fairly sets in. I hope, therefore, by the time I return, I shall find the school completed. Your account of the progress of the Institution is very satisfactory: pray give my thanks for his exertions to its excellent Master and his wife. I shall always feel grateful to them for all they have done. Give my kind regards to Mrs. Buddle and your children..... My kind remembrances and regards to Mrs. Lawry, who will, I am sure, jointly with yourself, strive to keep alive an interest in the native school, of which I often think; hoping that God will perhaps, if I live till an old man, mercifully grant me the pleasure of revisiting it, and of finding it an Institution of vast usefulness.

I just send you the above to show you the interest His Excellency takes in the Institution.

There is one subject that sometimes makes us feel depressed, and it is the loss of some of our most promising youths by death; but this is the Lord's doing, and we can but bow in submission to His will. We are looking for the return of the "John Wesley" in all December, and trust she is bringing a reinforcement for the Islands.

I trust we shall still have your prayers, and, in answer to them, an abundant shower of blessings.

In the Island groups our great work is extending with marvellous rapidity, and the journals of the Missionaries are replete with interest, containing accounts of conversions, of the establishment of schools, of the building of chapels, and

the improvement of the natives in morality and civilization. Some of the Chiefs in those Islands are preachers of the Gospel, and it may not be uninteresting to present one specimen of a sermon delivered by one of the natives :—

SHADRACH MUMU'S SERMON.

*God is a spirit : and they that worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth. (John iv. 24.)*

THIS is the word of Jesus to the woman of Samaria, of whom he begged water to drink, as she was drawing water at the well of Jacob.

We therefore know for certain the nature of God, in consequence of the spoken word of Jesus. We also know the kind of worship which is right for us to offer to His Majesty on High, and by which we may live. Let us attend to these things :—

I. *To make known the nature of God.*—"God is a Spirit." God is not like our idols which we once worshipped. Nor is He like unto man. He is not enshrined ; has no body, no flesh, no blood, no bones ; but is a Spirit. The Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, one God, is a Spirit.

1. He is a *great Spirit*. So great is God, that heaven is brim-full of Him, and the earth is full to running over with His Majesty. So great is He, that He is in every place, in every moment of all time.

2. He is an *uncreated, eternal, invisible Spirit*. He had no beginning : He will never end. He liveth not through the agency of another, nor does He depend on any thing, but has being in Himself alone. He is the trust and dependence, and and source of life, to heaven and earth. He is the root and core of our salvation and blessedness.

3. God is a *holy Spirit*. There is not the least thing defective or blemished in His Divine character. His being is holy, His nature is holy, His works are holy, His government is holy, His salvation is holy, His wrath is holy, yea, glorious is His holiness, (Isai. vi. 3.) Let us, then, seek to be made holy through faith in Jesus : for holiness is the mark of God's people. God is holy, be ye holy also.

4. He is an *almighty and omnipresent Spirit*. All things

are His, temporal and spiritual; all heaven and its glory, all earth and its people, are His. He was the Creator of all: therefore He governs the works of His hands and will reign for ever. Not the most diminutive thing can escape His notice, whether it be in the mind of man, or beneath the earth, or in the sea, whether it be open or concealed, whether it be difficult or easy. He alone is One God of power, wisdom, strength, (or ability,) ever present in all things.

Notice,

II. *The kind of worship Jesus tells us is good to be offered unto God by His people.*—“They who worship Him must worship Him in spirit and in truth.” This worship is not merely the word of the mouth, the hearing of the ear, or the seeing of the eye; nor is it an accustomed attendance upon the public services of religion, or a boast of being religious. It is to be spiritual and true worshippers.

1. It is for me, myself, to worship with my spirit, in the truth of my heart, in the earnestness of my soul, and with all my mind. Let not my mind be diverted, or my affections be divided; but give up all my powers of body and soul to the Lord, supplicate with thanksgiving, and with the effort of a sincere spirit.

2. God is the Author and Object of all true worship; and in this good work we shall receive life. There is no man who can worship God of his own mind: he knows not the way to eternal life, neither can he so approach the Father as to save his soul but through the Son. Christ says, “I am the way, the truth, and the life.” (John xiv. 6.) Man is sinful, foolish, and dark-minded; but by faith in the Saviour Jesus he finds the way of true worship to the Great Spirit.

3. Let us be earnest in this worship, that we may receive its benefits to our souls, though trusting in our Mediator. Repent, believe, entreat, in Jesu's name, that your sins may be forgiven, that your mind may be made new, and the Holy Ghost may enter your spirit. He will make light your darkness, make wise your folly, and help your weakness.

Let us be ready to perform this worship *now*, and on all

occasions, according to the spoken command of Jesus. Great, will be the advantages,—pardon, holiness, renewal, peace, eternal life, all through faith in Jesus.

Well, then, have we begun this true worship or not?

Mr. Amos adds, "Shadrach is the son of Tubou Mulohi, a late King of Tonga. He derived no assistance in the composition of this sermon, and I vouch for its being a literal translation."

AUSTRALIA.—The Missions in Australia have grown to such importance, that it is contemplated by the Committee to give them greater independence and freedom of action.

## AFRICA.

CAPE TOWN.—The Report from Cape Town states that the Society is in a healthy condition, and that the prospects are encouraging. The Kaffir War has seriously militated against the interests of our work in that part of Africa, though it is not without gratitude to the Almighty, we have found, that the lives of our Missionaries have been spared, when war and tumult were aroused there. It is hoped by this time, that the natives have been reduced to submission; and Mr. Shaw writes, that the movement of the British troops into Krielie's country, although regarded as successful for the military and political objects for which it was made, will, I fear, be attended with disastrous results as far as our Mission at Butterworth is concerned. The Commander-in-Chief refused to allow a small force to remain at that Station, who, with its native inhabitants, would have been able to protect and maintain it till the confusion produced throughout Krielie's tribe had passed away, and peace and quietness should be once more restored. The consequence is, that Mr. Gladwin and the whole Mission-family, together with about two thousand of the native inhabitants, have been obliged to abandon that Station, and come away with the last division of the troops. Mr. Gladwin has adopted this course with my entire consent and concurrence; as, in the new circumstances arising from the expedition of the troops into that

district, I consider that the Mission-family would be exposed, by a continuance at Butterworth, to such personal risk and danger, as could not be compensated by any benefits derivable from their continuance there under existing circumstances. Nobly has this Mission-family maintained its ground during a whole year of danger and trial, never shrinking from avowing their loyalty to our government, and sympathy with their own countrymen. I have, within the last half hour, received a short letter from Mr. Gladwin, reporting his arrival at King William's-Town. He says nothing in this letter of the circumstances of the brethren at Clarkebury and Morley. The war had cut off all communication. I hope these two Stations will be safe, as they are in the country of the Tembookies: the principal ground of fear is, that the Amagaleki may go in force to attack them, and make up their losses in cattle by plundering the people of those Stations. If unable to maintain their Stations, they will, I presume, retire upon Buntingville, which is in Faku's country, (the Anamponda,) where, I believe, they will be safe. Meantime, you may imagine my anxiety respecting them. I hardly expect to hear from them till they can communicate with me *via* Natal, and thence by sea. I trust our beloved people at home will continue to pray that the messengers of their churches in the Heathen lands of South Africa may be protected in all dangers, and guided in all difficulties.

Notwithstanding the discouraging contents of this letter, you will be glad to learn that there are hopeful symptoms of coming peace. Gladly shall we hail its arrival. The health of several of the brethren begins to fail under the constant anxiety arising from the painful events of the war. Mr. Appleyard is gone for a season to recruit his health at the Cape. Mr. Sargeant, from Mount-Coke, was sent to King William's-Town as a temporary supply; but I have desired him to give up the house for the occupation of Mr. Gladwin and family, while Mr. Sargeant returns to his work at Mount-Coke, and thus may matters remain for the present. Through Divine goodness, I continue in health; but I am burdened

with many and heavy subjects of anxiety and trouble : still out of them all the Lord delivereth.

At Plantberg in the Bechuana Country, Mr. Giddy was remaining at his Station, surrounded by many dangers. The Station had been preserved from destruction by this conduct, to the date of the last advices, but communications having ceased with the Station in consequence of the disturbed state of the country, we can only hope and pray, that Mr. Giddy and his family will be mercifully preserved from the perils to which they are exposed.

In Western Africa the cause flourishes, and the following extracts will convey some intimations to this effect :—

SIERRA-LEONE.—We have much pleasure in laying before our friends the statements contained in the following letter, which gratefully prove that the serious and often distressing sacrifice of valuable life which the Sierra-Leone Mission has cost, has been abundantly repaid to the church ; while the now blessed individuals who personally made the sacrifice reap on high a reward infinitely glorious. By a late Government census, it appears, that out of a total population of forty-five thousand, no less than thirty-six thousand are now professedly Christians ; these are attached to the several denominations according to the following proportions :—

It will be seen, on comparing the numbers given above, with those in Mr. Edney's letter, that while he only quotes the number of accredited church-members, the Government returns include all who are habitual attendants on the Wes-

leyan ministry, with their families. It is a fact eminently hopeful for Africa, and encouraging to the future efforts of Christians, as it is a sanction and reward of the past, that on the West Coast, once so deplorably afflicted with the slave-trade, so utterly abandoned to idolatry, it is now believed that the slave-trade does not exist in any port north of the equator; and along that line of seaboard (including Fernando Po) sixty thousand persons may be reckoned who have been led, through the English and American Missionaries of various denominations, to embrace the outward profession of the Christian name; many of them proving by their life, that their profession is accompanied by real faith.

*Extract of a Letter from the Rev. James Edney, dated Free-town, January 13th, 1852.*

"A YEAR WITHOUT A DEATH.—The brethren commenced their sittings at the District-Meeting on Tuesday, the 6th instant, and closed them on Saturday, the 10th, at noon. Two circumstances at the Meeting tended greatly to increase the gratitude and joy of every brother present. One was, that not one of the Missionary family has died during the year, which has been in this colony a year of much sickness. When the question, "What Preachers have died since the last District-Meeting?" was put, and the answer, "None," given, we all felt truly grateful to the God of our life, and, according to the custom of the brethren in such cases, arose and most heartily sang the Doxology."

GOLD COAST.—The following communication from Mr. Ossu Ansah, Native Assistant Missionary in Ashanti, will be read with much satisfaction, as indicating favorable prospects, both in that country and in the adjacent territories of the Queen of Jabin. It will be remembered that Mr. Ossu Ansah is himself of the royal family of Ashanti, being one of the Princes who were educated in this country, and here made a nominal profession of Christianity. Some time after his return to Africa, the Gospel came to his heart with power: he then willingly devoted himself to labor, as a subordinate agent of the Society, at Cupe-Coast; and, after some time, was judged capable of conducting the Mission in the capital

of his native kingdom. There he has faithfully labored, and we doubt not that one who stands in a position so interesting, and who presents so pleasing an instance of that native agency to which we have referred on a previous page, will be remembered in prayer by many.

*Extract of a Letter from Mr. John Ossu Ansah to the Rev. Thomas B. Freeman, dated Kumasi, December 27th, 1850.*

“REVEREND AND DEAR FATHER.—I am thankful to inform you of my safe arrival from my journey to Jabin, Insuta, and Manipon. The Queen of Jabin and the Chief of Insuta treated me hospitably and kindly, by their customary presents of gold, sheep, plantains, &c. Manipon Chief also behaved kindly to me on my day’s visit to him.

“I feel much interested on behalf of the Queen of Jabin and her people. The Queen and her men are anxious to have a school in their town; so I think it will be good if some attention can be paid to the youths and men of Jabin. I asked the Queen, whether the influence of the Ashanti’s would interrupt their resolution; but they all answered to the contrary. The Queen sent one of her men with me, to show me the ground which they have given already for the building of a Mission-house and a school-room; and said to me, “If you are intending to do me and my people good, you are welcome to it.” I beg to say that Jabin invited us very much.

“The people of Kumasi are in a state of slavery under their masters; they, indeed, listen to the preaching of the Gospel with attentive ear, and they know the freeness and happiness of those who embrace it; yet they so dread their masters that they will not come forward. Now, in my opinion, the Jabins are not like the Kumasites.

“I hope you may not think from this that I am at all discouraged of Kumasi people; but I only want to bring before you the earnest invitation for religious instruction by the Queen and people of Jabin; for I still trust in his mercy that in time all the dread and fear in Kumasi shall be done away.

“ I preached at Jabin before the Queen and her people, and they were very attentive.

“ I presented your presents to the Queen, for which she begs me to return you her sincere thanks. She begs me, also, to tell you, that she has made a little room, furnished in European fashion, and begs for a looking-glass and picture of your own likeness, to hang them up in it.

“ In a letter dated September 17th, 1851, the Rev. T. B. Freeman states, ‘ The Queen of Jabin still urges our commencing a Mission in her territories ; at this moment I have messengers here from her.’ ”

### AMERICA.

In the British West Indies, the Society's Missions still continue to suffer from the operation of those causes which have, for some time past, had so depressing an effect upon the commercial state of the Colonies. The promised blessing of the Great Head of the Church still accompanies the faithful preaching of the Gospel by the Missionaries, and many are brought, by their instrumentality, to a saving knowledge of the truth ; but, owing to causes wholly beyond their control, the aggregate number of accredited Church members continues to decline. In addition to the unfavorable influences which affect all the British Colonies, Jamaica has, this year, experienced the dreadful ravages of the Asiatic Cholera. The Committee are thankful to be able to state that our beloved Missionaries, with their families, have been preserved in safety during the afflictive visitation, although, in consequence of their faithful and unwearied pastoral attentions to the sick and dying, they were peculiarly exposed to danger ; but the Committee have, at the same time, to report, with mournful feelings, that at least eighteen hundred of our people have been cut off by the fearful disease ; besides some hundreds who have died from other causes. It is matter of great thankfulness that the sanctified effects of this awful visitation are already beginning to appear. A gracious influence rests very extensively upon the minds of the people,

and no fewer than three thousand five hundred persons have been received as candidates for membership at our several Stations in the Island.

For some time our advices from Jamaica have worn rather a discouraging aspect; but several letters, lately received, give pleasing evidence that the Lord has not in vain smitten that island with pestilence; and we lay before our friends, with gratitude, some extracts which will give them pleasure.

*Extract of a Letter from the Rev. John Vaz, dated Port Antonio, Portland, January 8th, 1852.*

**SPIRITUAL PROSPERITY.**—I rejoice to be able to inform you, that the good hand of the great Head of the Church has been upon us for good in this Circuit during the past year. The number of church members has increased considerably; and there is more of the mind and Spirit of the Lord Jesus in the hearts and lives of those in church fellowship with us. Our congregations are very large; the chapels are frequently crowded to excess; and we believe they do not hear in vain.

**CONVERSION OF A JEW, A MOHAMMEDAN, AND A HEATHEN.**—I am sure you will be glad to learn that, in the course of the past year, I baptized, in the presence of the congregation, a young man of the Hebrew religion, of considerable intelligence. It was deeply interesting to see this young disciple bowing at the cross of Jesus, and confessing Him to be the only true and living God. He has been, subsequently, admitted to the table of the Lord; he meets in class regularly; consistency marks his general conduct.

I have also had to perform another pleasing part of my duty. On Sunday last, a follower of Mohamet renounced Mohametanism, and embraced the religion of the Lord Jesus, and confessed Him to be "God his Saviour."

An African woman stood beside the man, and expressed her desire to flee from Heathenism to Christianity. I baptized her also at the same time. "They shall come from the east and the west;" and, blessed be God, they are coming; and they shall all bow to Jesus, and call Him Lord, to the glory of God the Father. Amen and amen.

The work steadily advances in North America, and is evidently designed of God to take a prominent place in the religious improvement of this vast country.

The Rev. E. Wood thus writes, concerning Wesleyan Methodism in Canada West:

"We are advancing gradually in this country, as you will see by the Minutes which I forwarded. The years 1847 and 1851 contrast very pleasingly:—then there were 21,749 members; now there are 26,213. Then there were stationed 130 Ministers; now, 220. Then the total revenue of the Contingent-Fund was £455 6s. 7½d.; now, £1,322 0s. 2d. Then the Superannuated Fund was £379 8s. 10d.; now, £610 15s. 9d. Then the Chapel Relief-Fund was £86 8s. 1d.; now, £213 16s. 1½d. Then the amount raised for the Auxiliary Missionary Society was £2,430 16s. 3d.; now, £4,031 16s. 9d. (The whole of these figures are in currency.) What stronger proofs can be given of the beneficial effects of the Union? We are extending our work to the north. A Rev. McDougall has just gone to Lake Huron, with the necessary implements to build himself a house and establish a Mission among a destitute class of Pagans, who have a settlement about eight miles from the Bruce Mines. It is a post where large numbers of the Ojibeways resort to on their way to the Manitoulin Islands, to receive their presents. The Missionary is a married man, received by the Conference with the expressed stipulation of devoting himself to the Indian work. He has spent much time amongst them as a trader, is already partially acquainted with the language, and promises fair for usefulness. Our ranks are to be increased by the return from the Western States of the Rev. Thomas Harburt, who is said to be the best Indian scholar in these parts. I have Translations of the First Catechism, Additional Hymns, &c., but am afraid to publish from the want of a critical reader. Why not give us the whole of the north-west for cultivation? Of course, you would have to help us for a while."

We cannot conclude better than in the words of the Report of the Parent Society: "The struggle has begun." The

conflict is going on. The Lamb shall overcome, and His dominion shall be universal; but if we would share His triumphs and witness the advancement of His kingdom,—if we would have Him ‘with us,’ we, as members of His Church, must be ‘with Him,’ in principle and purpose and aim, and in the employment and support of those evangelical agencies and means which He has ordained for the salvation of men, and for the manifestation of His own glory.

“The Church has embarked in a great enterprise, and has corresponding encouragement afforded her. She possesses promises such as God alone has authority to give: ‘As thy days, so shall thy strength be.’ She receives help such as God only can bestow: ‘My grace is sufficient for thee: for my strength is made perfect in weakness.’ She has examples such as the Word of God alone can furnish: ‘In nothing I shall be ashamed, but that with all boldness, as always, so now also Christ shall be magnified in my body, whether it be by life or by death. For to me to live is Christ.’ Her Members shall receive rewards such as God only can confer;—rewards too great for them to receive in all their fulness on earth, but which shall be distributed at the resurrection of the just, when ‘they that be wise shall shine as the brightness of the firmament, and they that turn many to righteousness as the stars for ever and ever.’ The word of promise shall be fulfilled. ‘For the arm of the Lord shall be made bare in the eyes of all nations, and all flesh shall see the salvation of God.’ The oath of the High and Holy One shall be accomplished. ‘I have sworn by myself, saith the Lord, the word is gone out of my mouth in righteousness, and shall not return, that unto me every knee shall bow, every tongue shall swear.’ The visions of Prophecy shall be realised. ‘And they sang a new song, saying, Thou art worthy to take the book, and to open the seals thereof; for thou wast slain, and hast redeemed us to God by thy blood, out of every kindred, and tongue, and people and nation.’ **‘WORTHY IS THE LAMB THAT WAS SLAIN TO RECEIVE POWER, AND RICHES, AND WISDOM, AND STRENGTH, AND HONOUR, AND GLORY, AND BLESSING. And every creature which is in heaven, and on**

the earth, and such as are in the sea, and all that are in them, heard I saying, BLESSING, AND HONOUR, AND GLORY, AND POWER, BE UNTO HIM THAT SITTETH UPON THE THRONE, AND UNTO THE LAMB FOR EVER AND EVER."
