PRAYERS OF THE SOCIETY.

BEFORE THEY COMMENCE BUSINESS.

PREVENT us, O Lord, in all our doings, with Thy most Gracious favour; and further us with Thy continual help; that in all our works begun, continued and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy Holy Name; and finally, by Thy mercy, obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—AMEN.

O GOD from whom all holy desires, all good counsels, and all works of piety and charity do proceed, we beseech Thee to visit with Thy favour our Sovereign Lady Queen Victoria, and to rule her heart; that she may in all things seek Thy honour and glory. Prosper with Thy blessing the designs of this Society. Comfort with Thy grace, those benefactors who contribute to its support. Bless the ministry of Thy servants the Clergy; the endeavours of all who are engaged in spreading the knowledge of true religion in the dominions of our Sovereign; and the labours of those Missionaries who are proclaiming the same in this Province. And may Thy Holy Spirit direct all our consultations to the advancement of Thy Glory, and the good of Thy Church, through Jesus Christ our Lord.—AMEN.

O MERCIFUL GOD, who hast made all men, and hatest nothing that Thou hast made, nor wouldst the death of a sinner, but that he should be converted and live: Have mercy upon all Jews, Turks, Infidels and Heretics, and take from them all ignorance, hardness of heart, and contempt of Thy Word; and so fetch them home, blessed Lord, to Thy flock, that they may be saved among the remnant of the true Israelites, and be made one fold under one Shepherd, Jesus Christ, our Lord, who liveth and reigneth with Thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, world without end.—AMEN.

PRAYERS OF THE SOCIETY.
CONSTITUTION OF THE SOCIETY.

The Society shall be called the **DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY**
or **NEW BRUNSWICK.**

II.

No alteration shall be made in the Constitution of this Society, nor shall any By-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society be repealed, annulled, or altered, except at a meeting of the General Committee, by the vote of at least two-thirds of the members present, nor until it shall have received the sanction of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese; which sanction must be given in writing, and delivered to the Secretary within six months of the said Meeting.

No alteration or amendment in the Constitution, nor any repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment of any By-Law, Rule or Regulation of the Society, shall be proposed or made at any Meeting, unless notice shall have been given in writing at the next previous Annual Meeting of the General Committee, or at the next previous Anniversary Meeting, of such proposed repeal or cancellation, nor unless the terms of such proposed alteration or amendment shall have been stated in writing at some previous meeting; from which, without the unanimous consent of the members present, no deviation, except of a mere formal nature, shall be permitted.

No repeal, cancellation, alteration or amendment shall be proposed except by a member qualified to vote, at the Anniversary Meeting, whose name shall be entered on the Minutes of the Secretary, together with the said proposition.

The payment at any one time of a sum not less than Ten Pounds shall constitute a Life Member; and the payment

annually of any sum, however small, shall constitute the person paying the same, a member of the Society. Provided that no member shall be qualified to vote at any General Meeting of the Society, unless of the full age of twenty-one years, nor unless he be a Life Member, or shall have subscribed and paid at least five shillings during the year preceding such Meeting.

VI.

Officers.

1. The Officers of the Society shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, one or more Secretaries, and two Auditors of Accounts.
2. The Lord Bishop of the Diocese shall be President of the Society, and the Archdeacon the Senior Vice-President; and any Life Member may, at any Anniversary Meeting, be elected a Vice-President of the Society.
3. The Treasurer, Secretary, or Secretaries, and the Auditors, shall be annually elected at the meetings of the General Committee; and in case of the death, resignation, or removal from the Province, of any such officer, the vacancy shall be filled up by the Executive Committee, at its next or any subsequent meeting within the year; and the Lord Bishop shall, if he see fit, call a Special Meeting of the Executive Committee for the purpose of filling any such vacancy.

Executive Committee.

1. There shall also be an Executive Committee, to be composed of the following Members, viz:

The officers of the Society as provided for in the next preceding Article.

All Clergymen resident in the Diocese, duly licensed by the Lord Bishop, and Subscribers to the Society.

And twenty-four Lay-Members of the Society, being Life Members, or Annual Subscribers of at least One Pound: to be annually elected at the Meetings of the General Committee, provided that no Annual Subscriber shall be qualified to be elected unless he shall, during the year preceding each meeting, have paid the subscription of at least One Pound.

2. Five Members of the Executive Committee, three of whom to be Laymen, shall form a quorum.

3. The Executive Committee shall meet either at Fredericton or Saint John, on the first Wednesday in January, on the day

next following the Annual Meeting; on the first Wednesday in March; on the first Wednesday in June; and on Wednesday after the first Tuesday in October; or on such day in the week of, or in the week following the afore-mentioned days, as may be approved by the President, or in his absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society.

4. Special Meetings of the Executive Committee may be summoned by the President, or in case of his death or absence, by any two Vice-Presidents of the Society, to meet at such time and place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting; but so far as may be, alternately at St. John and Fredericton.

5. The Executive Committee shall have all such right and power in and connected with the management, control, and disposal of all lands, real estate, and property whatsoever, which may now or may hereafter be vested in the Society, and with respect to the use of the Corporate Seal of the Society, as the General Committee or any General Meeting of the Society would have in Session, and shall further be authorised to depute all and any such powers to any sub-committee of such Executive Committee.

VIII.

Board of Home Missions.

There shall also be a Board of Home Missions, to be composed of the following Members, viz :

1. The President, Treasurer, and Secretary, or Secretaries of the Society, *ex officio*.

2. Five Clerical and seven Lay Members of the Society, qualified for election as members of the Executive Committee, who shall be chosen annually on the first day of meeting of the General Committee, by ballot, on nomination of each proposed member by two members of the General Committee.

3. The Board of Home Missions shall have all such power relative to the preparation of the Missionary Schedule, and carrying the same into operation and effect, and the appropriation or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society, as may from time to time be vested in them by or pursuant to any Resolution, Bye-Laws or Regulations of the General Committee.

4. Five Members of the Board, three of whom shall be Laymen, shall be a quorum.

5. The Board of Home Missions shall meet whenever summoned by the President, Treasurer or Secretary of the Society, and at such place as may be fixed by the notice of meeting.

IX.

Objects.

The Society shall embrace the following objects, and none other, viz :

1. Missionary visits to places where there is no settled Clergyman, and aid to new and poor Missions.
2. The establishment of Divinity Scholarships; and assistance, when necessary, to those who may be under preparation for the ministry, especially sons of Clergymen.
3. Aid to Sunday and other Schools in which Church principles are taught, and the training and encouraging of Schoolmasters and Catechists.
4. The supply of such Books and Tracts as are on the Catalogue of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, and none other.
5. Aid to the building and enlarging of Churches and Chapels.
6. Aid to the building of Parsonage Houses.
7. The creation of a fund towards making a provision for such Clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.
8. The creation of a Fund for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy.
9. Aid to the Endowment Fund in particular Parishes.
10. The formation of a Fund for receiving money or Securities as Special Trusts.
11. The creation of a Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy.

X.

The Society will employ no Clergyman on Missionary services without the Bishop's license and appointment, and will submit its choice of Divinity Scholars to his Lordship's approbation.

XI.

It shall be competent to any member of the Society to limit his subscription to any one or more of the objects above recited, which he may be most anxious to promote.

XII.

Local Committee.

1. The Members of the Society in each Parish, or in each Mission, consisting of two or more Parishes, shall, at the discretion

of the Missionary of such Mission, constitute a Local Committee ; and so also the members residing in any District of a Parish set off under the authority of the Lord Bishop, with the concurrence of the Rector and Church Corporation of such Parish (there being in such District a Church duly consecrated, and a resident Clergyman licensed thereto by the Lord Bishop), may, at the desire of such Clergyman, and with the approval of the Bishop and the Rector of the Parish, form a separate Local Committee ; and in that case the District shall, for the purpose of the Society, be considered as a separate Parish.

2. Each Local Committee shall hold an Annual Meeting on some convenient day previous to the Anniversary Meeting, when the recommendations to the General Committee of special objects shall be determined on.

3. Each Local Committee shall be empowered to depute two Lay Members of the Society, to be elected at the Annual Meetings of the Committee, to assist the Missionary in submitting the recommendations of the Committee to the consideration of the General Committee.

4. It shall be competent to each Committee to recommend any of the above recited objects to the special consideration of the General Committee, in the appropriation of the funds of the Society.

5. The members of the Society, attending the public services at the Cathedral in the City of Fredericton, shall have the right to elect two Lay delegates annually. The meeting for the election of the said delegates to be held annually at such time and place as the Lord Bishop of the Diocese may direct ; and the said delegates upon being so elected, and their election duly certified by the Lord Bishop or other person presiding at the said meeting, shall be taken to be, and shall be thereby qualified as members of the General Committee.

XIII.

1. The Society shall hold its Anniversary Meeting at Fredericton and Saint John alternately, on the first Thursday in July in each year.

2. A Special General Committee may be called at any time by the President, or in his absence by any two or more of the Vice-Presidents, four weeks notice being first given thereof by advertisement in one or more newspapers, published in Fredericton and Saint John respectively.

The General Committee.

1. The General Committee of the Society shall be composed of the following members, viz: The Lord Bishop of the Diocese who shall be the Chairman; the Vice-Presidents of the Society; in the absence of the Lord Bishop, the Committee may elect a Chairman from the Vice-Presidents present, and if none be present, from other members of the Committee; the Secretary or Secretaries who shall also serve in that capacity at the Meeting of the General Committee; the Treasurer and the Auditors, the Rector or Missionary of each Parish or of a Mission comprising two or more Parishes, and the Clergyman of any separate District of a Parish (provided that in the absence or sickness of the Rector of any Parish, the duly licensed Curate or Assistant Minister shall be considered *pro hac vice* a member of the General Committee), and the Lay Deputies elected by the Local Committees as before provided; all such persons being Subscribers to the Society.

Proof of the election of such Deputies by each Local Committee to be the certificate of the Chairman or Secretary thereof.

2. The Members of the Executive Committee shall be *ex officio* members of the General Committee.

3. The General Committee shall meet on the two days next previous to the Anniversary Meeting, to make the Annual appropriations of the funds of the Society, and a report of the proceedings of such meeting shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

4. The Order of Business in General Committee shall be as follows:—

Firstly.—Production of Certificates of Lay Delegates.

Secondly.—Secretary's report to be read, and also a report of the proceedings of the Executive Committee for the past year.

Thirdly.—Report of the Auditors to be read and laid before the General Committee.

Fourthly.—Such appropriations or disposition of the funds to the objects of the Society as a majority of those present may determine.

5. The General Committee shall have power to adjourn its meeting for any special purpose from day to day, or to any day subsequent to the Anniversary Meeting of the Society, by a vote of at least two-thirds of the members present; and to determine by like vote, the place where such adjourned meeting shall be held, provided that in every such case, a report of such adjournment, and the cause therefor, shall be made at the Anniversary Meeting.

1. The Clergy are requested to preach annually two Sermons in their respective Churches, with a collection on each occasion, for the general purposes of the Society:

2. The Clergy are further requested to take up, annually, in their respective Churches, a collection for the Special funds of the Society, which collection shall, unless otherwise provided for, be equally divided between—(1.) The Widows' and Orphans' Fund. (2.) The Aged and Incapacitated Clergy Fund. (3.) The Children of the Clergy Education Fund. (4.) The Divinity Scholarship Fund. Provided that any such Special collection may at the option of the Congregation from which the same shall be received, expressed through the Rector or Missionary at the time of forwarding the same, be limited to some one or more of the Special Funds or purposes of the Society, in such proportions as they may direct, and provided also that the yearly collection required by the rules of the W. and O. Fund, in the case of clergymen joining such fund, shall, in such cases, be considered as the Special collection hereby requested to be made, but shall be applied as such rules shall direct.

RULES AND REGULATIONS, AND RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

1.—RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

Whereas, it is desirable for the better provision for the ministrations of the Church in the Diocese of Fredericton, that there be a systematic and permanent plan for the payment of the stipends of Missionaries; therefore resolved,—

1. That in order to encourage the established Missions to become gradually self-supporting, all grants made by or through this Society in aid of Missions (not including stipends secured to any of the elder Clergy on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant during life) shall from henceforth be made conditional on the contribution by the Mission itself of a stated sum towards the Missionary's stipend.

2. That all grants made by the General Committee be made subject to these Resolutions, and be distributed under the direction of the Board of Home Missions, who shall have at all times all such and like powers and rights with respect to the same, or any of them, as the General Committee of the Society would have if in Session.

3. That the Board of Home Missions annually present to the General Committee of the Society, on the first day of their meeting, a full and detailed account of all business transacted during the expired year, and also a list of grants recommended for the ensuing year, with the conditions to be annexed to each, and shall also report to the Executive Committee at each quarterly meeting thereof.

4. That on the approval by the General Committee of the grants recommended for the year, the same shall forthwith pass into operation on the basis of the foregoing Resolutions, and subject to the following regulations:

(a.) The Board of Home Missions (acting in conjunction with the Lord Bishop) shall forthwith, after the annual meeting, communicate with the Wardens or other Lay Members of the Church, in each Mission, requiring them to enter into engagements (A) with the Society, to contribute the sum required of the Missions for the year.

(b.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 15th day of August then next, they shall communicate with the Missionary, requiring him to give each of his congregations notice (B) of withdrawal of all payments as a Missionary receiving stipend through this Society on 1st October then next, unless the engagement be meantime completed.

(c.) Should such engagement not be entered into to the satisfaction of the Board before the 1st of October then next, all payments to the Missionary's salary through the Society, shall be withdrawn, and no stipend shall thereafter be payable in respect thereof: Provided that should the Missionary see fit to resign his cure, he shall, if stationed

for the remainder of the year by the Lord Bishop in any vacant Mission which may be willing to comply with the terms required of the defaulting Mission, be entitled, in respect of the services to be rendered in such new Mission, to such stipend as may be agreed upon between such Missionary and the Board, not exceeding that provided for the continuation of his services in his former Mission; and upon the like terms and conditions: Provided, also, that any such Missionary, if not so appointed to any new Mission, may nevertheless be permitted by the Board, on special application, to draw on 1st of April for a sum in their discretion; but not exceeding his previous quarter's stipend from the Society.

(d.) Where such engagement is entered into, the Board shall forthwith notify the Missionary, who shall thereupon (unless the terms of such engagement shall not be fulfilled as hereinafter provided) be entitled to draw upon the Society for the full amount of his quarterly salary, including therein the sum required for the quarter of the Mission itself.

(e.) The sum required of the Mission shall in such case be remitted by the Wardens quarterly in advance to the Treasurer, and may consist either of money or written receipts of the Missionary, for produce furnished to him at the market rates: Provided, that two months' grace (but no more) may be allowed the Mission to make up such sum; that is to say, the sum required for the quarter of the ensuing year ending the 30th October, shall be remitted before the 1st September, and for the following quarter before the 1st December next.

(f.) Should the Missionary give any such written receipt for produce, he shall keep a record thereof, and shall make his next quarter's draft for such sum only as shall be due him, after he shall be debited with such receipts in the Treasurer's books.

(g.) Should the sum required from the parish not be remitted as aforesaid, the Treasurer shall forthwith, on the expiration of the two months' grace, give notice (C) to the Missionary requiring him to give notice (D) of withdrawal of stipend as such Missionary, and all such stipend shall be thereupon withdrawn pursuant to such notice; and unless the sum agreed to be paid for the quarter shall be forthwith remitted, no stipend shall be payable for such expired quarter beyond the amount agreed to be contributed on the part of the Society; and none whatsoever for the succeeding quarter: and the Board shall appoint a deputation to enquire into the causes of such default, and shall report thereon at the next meeting of the General Committee.

Provided that in any case, on a Mission ceasing to be in default, though after the period for withdrawal of the stipend shall have arrived, such Mission may be reinstated by the Board if they shall see fit so to do, under the regulations and conditions herein contained.

(A.) In case of the Missions where the Missionary's stipend is secured for life on the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel grant, the Board shall call on the Wardens to enter into the prescribed engagement only in case of the demise of the present Missionary; and those Missionaries shall continue to draw their stipends as heretofore accustomed, unless any shall voluntarily come within the general system adopted for other Missions.

(I.) It shall be optional with the Board to permit any Mission to make a quarterly, half-yearly, or yearly payment at any period in ad-

vance, and these regulations, *mutatis mutandis*, shall thereupon apply, generally, to any such Mission.

(7.) The Board shall have full power and authority to make all such further bye-laws, rules, and regulations as may in their opinion be required for their guidance, and from time to time to alter or amend the same as they shall see fit.

5. That in every case of a clergyman receiving a stipend through this Society, he shall be required to make to the Secretary of the Society, according to such form as the Board of Home Missions may from time to time require, half-yearly,* on or before the first days of December and June in each year, a return for the preceding half-year, shewing—

- (1.) The general limits of his Mission.
- (2.) The extent thereof in square miles.
- (3.) The estimate number of the members of Church of England living therein.
- (4.) The number of Churches, Chapels of Ease, and Missionary Stations respectively, within the Mission.
- (5.) Whether or not there is therein a parsonage house belonging to the Mission or provided by the people.
- (6.) The extent of the Church and Glebe Land connected therewith.
- (7.) The income from such Church or Glebe Land for the year ending 1st April last.
- (8.) The amount contributed therein towards the support of the Missionary, from sources other than the grant through this Society.
- (9.) The number of public services on Sunday and in the week respectively.
- (10.) The average Congregation in each place of worship.
- (11.) The number of Communicants.
- (12.) The number of Baptisms.
 - A. Infants.
 - B. Adults.
 - C. Total.
- (13.) The number of communicants.
 - A. Added.
 - B. Removed.
 - C. Deceased.
 - D. Present number.
- (14.) The number confirmed.
- (15.) Marriages.
- (16.) Burials.
- (17.) Names of Church Wardens.
- (18.) Names of Lay Delegates to Diocesan Church Society and Synod.
- (19.) The number of scholars and teachers in Sunday School.

Which returns shall be laid before the Board of Home Missions forthwith, and before the general Committee on the first day of their meeting; and no grant shall from henceforth be payable to any Missionary in default of rendering any such statement or return so long as such default shall continue.

6. That the Board of Home Missions shall, as soon as may be, after

*By a resolution of the General Committee, a yearly return only, made up to the 31st December, is required.

the first day of December in each year, make up from such returns, the printed returns and statement required annually by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, and forward the same, reporting specially to the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, any Missionary who may be in default.

7. That those of the Clergy within the Diocese, not receiving stipends through this Society, be requested to forward to the Secretary in like manner, on or before the first day of June in each year, the returns numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 9, 11, 12, 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18 and 19, in order that a complete return of the Diocese in these particulars, may each year be published with the Society's Report, as hath been heretofore in part only accustomed.

8. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, shall appoint deputations of Clergymen and Laymen for each Deanery, which each deputation shall visit, for the purpose of holding Missionary Meetings in the several Missions, and taking up collections thereat (not interfering, however, with the usual semi-annual collections and annual canvass of the Mission on behalf of the Society); and further, of making enquiries as to the power of the Mission to contribute towards the Clergyman's support; such deputations reporting to the Board, and through them to the General Committee of the Society.

9. That the Board of Home Missions, in conjunction with the Lord Bishop, may further appoint special deputations to inquire into the causes of any deficiency of contributions or other pecuniary difficulties in any Mission, and shall have power to call for any returns they may think proper from any of the Parishes receiving aid from or through the Society.

10. That the Lord Bishop be respectfully requested to transmit a copy of these Resolutions to the Venerable Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, requesting their concurrence therein.

11. The Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, to make any grant that the funds may allow in aid of any Mission not already receiving aid, upon such conditions as they may arrange; such grant to terminate, in every case, on the first July next ensuing.

12. That a certificate be added to the parochial agreements, which shall be signed by the representatives of the Mission, declaring that the amount given by the Mission is a *bona fide* contribution, and that no part is derived from the rent of glebes or the interest of investments—the property of the Mission.

13. That the Board of Home Missions shall have power, with the approval of the Lord Bishop, if there be available funds, to make a grant not exceeding \$100, to aid in the building of any Parsonage House, when it shall be certified that such grant will complete the building free of debt.

Memorandum of agreement between the Diocesan Church Society of New Brunswick, and the Church Wardens (as the case may be) of the Church, in the Parish [or Mission] of

These forms may be altered by the Board of Home Missions to suit the circumstances of the case.

2.—RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE DIVINITY

SCHOLARSHIPS' FUND.

1. The Divinity Scholarships' Fund shall consist of the amount already appropriated thereto, of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely for the purposes of the Second Object of the Society, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund in all other respects shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Board of Home Missions.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1500, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Every such grant shall be of a sum not exceeding \$200 per annum, and shall be tenable for such a period, upon such terms or conditions, and at such collegiate institutions, as the Board of Home Missions shall, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, determine.

6. The Choice of divinity scholars shall be made by the Board of Home Missions, subject to the Lord Bishop's approval.

7. The Secretary of the Board of Home Missions shall be the Secretary of this Fund, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith, as the Board may direct.

8. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society after a year's notice of the proposed change.

3.—RULES OF THE "FUND FOR A PROVISION FOR CLERGYMEN WHO MAY BE INCAPACITATED BY AGE OR INFIRMITY."

1. The Fund for the assistance of clergymen who are incapacitated by age or infirmity shall consist of the capital sum of \$5,000, being the amount now specially appropriated from the Fund belonging to the seventh object of the Church Society, of all accumulations of interest, of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions, given to the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall be applied solely to the relief of disabled clergymen of the present Diocese of Fredericton.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund and add the same to the Capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society.

4. Any clergyman duly appointed as rector, missionary, or assistant curate, in the Diocese of Fredericton, and being unable to discharge the duties of his office; through mental or bodily infirmity, and wishing to participate in the benefits of this Fund, shall make application in writing to the Executive Committee, who shall determine each case on its own merits, and shall have power to grant such amount of yearly pension, not exceeding \$400, as they shall see fit. The applicant shall also state the annual value of any private property, pension or income of which he may be possessed, or which is directly or indirectly available for his benefit; and in all cases an application for a pension shall be accompanied by a recommendation from the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

5. Should the Executive Committee refuse to entertain the application, an appeal may be made by the applicant to the General Committee.

6. In the event of any application being favourably considered, a pension shall be granted only on condition of the applicant first resigning his cure, with all its emoluments.

7. If at any time there should be more demands upon the Fund than its income will meet, the Executive Committee may revise the whole of the pensions according to their judgment.

8. If any pensioner shall be so far relieved from his disability as to resume any clerical duty for which he receives any settled stipend, the pension shall cease as long as he continues to discharge such duty.

9. No Clergyman shall receive any benefit from this Fund, unless he shall have served at least seven consecutive years in the Diocese of Fredericton.

10. If any pensioner reside out of this Diocese, sufficient proof of his identity and continued disability shall accompany each draft for his pension.

11. The pensions shall be paid half yearly in advance on the first day of January and the first day of July in each year; and shall commence on the first of those days which shall happen after the pension is granted, and terminate on the first of those days which shall happen after the death of the pensioner, or any other event by which such pension is to cease.

12. The above rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

4.—PROVISION FOR THE WIDOWS AND ORPHANS OF THE CLERGY.

RULES AND REGULATIONS.

The following plan for a provision for the Widows and Orphans of the Clergy, with the Rules and Regulations annexed, was adopted by the General Committee. (See 36th Report.)

1. The Church Society of the Diocese of Fredericton in the Province of New Brunswick, shall have a special Fund, to be called "The CLERGY WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND," which shall consist of the present capital held by the Society for this object (subject to its present liabilities) of all subscriptions, donations, legacies, devises, and bequests, and other contributions given and paid to the Society for this special purpose, and of all payments received under these Rules; and this Fund shall be applied to the assistance of the families of deceased Clergymen, in accordance with these Rules, and to no other object.

2. Every Clergyman in this Diocese, duly licensed; whose widow is not already entitled to a pension from the SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL, wishing to share in the benefits of this Fund, shall within six months from July 5, 1871, or within one year from receiving Holy Orders, or from his admission into the Diocese, apply to the Secretary of the Fund, for a certificate, and shall thenceforth pay annually the sum set opposite his age in the annexed scale. Any applicant after such period of time, shall only be permitted to receive a certificate at the option of the Executive Committee of the Church Society, and upon such terms as they shall direct.

3. Every Clergyman, being a member of this Fund, shall make and forward to the Secretary a yearly collection from every congregation

in his Parish or Mission. Assistant Curates, serving under a Rector, or other Assistant Clergymen, shall not, however, be required to make a collection, but shall forward only their own annual payment.

4. All payments shall become due on the first day of January, in each year, and must be paid within thirty days; and all congregational collections must be sent in before the first day of May. If this Rule is not complied with, the certificate shall be considered as forfeited, but may be regained at the option of the Committee, and the applicant shall pay for the new certificate at the rate payable at the age when the same is taken out, according to the annexed scale, together with such sum as the Executive Committee may require in lieu of payments and subscriptions in arrear.

5. Upon compliance with the above Rules, the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY undertakes to pay out of "The Clergy Widows' and Orphans' Fund," a yearly pension, of Two Hundred Dollars to the Widow of each Clergyman holding a certificate, during the widowhood.

6. If the widow die, or marry again, the pension shall be paid towards the support of such children of the deceased Clergyman as may be under the age of eighteen years. In this case, when the youngest child shall have attained this age, the pension shall cease.

7. The Trustees named in the Will of a Clergyman shall be recognized by the Committee, in the event of the death or marriage of his widow, and shall receive the pension, to be applied by them for the support of the child or children; but if the Trustees so named are unwilling or unable to act, or if Trustees should not have been named, then the Bishop of the Diocese shall himself act, or in writing appoint a Trustee to act, in the application for the pension.

8. If the wife die before the husband, his child or children shall at his death receive the pension, under the limitation as to age expressed in Rule 6.

9. No certificate shall be issued to any Clergyman over the age of sixty years, who is not already in the Diocese at the time of the formation of these Rules; but any Clergyman already in the Diocese, over the age of sixty years, and whose widow is not entitled to a pension from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, shall be admitted a member of this Fund, on making the annual payment for the age of sixty years, and otherwise complying with the Rules.

10. If a Clergyman removes, with the Bishop's consent, from the Diocese, after officiating in it not less than ten years, he shall be allowed his claim upon the fund, on continuing his yearly payment, and the amount of the average annual collection from the Parish or Mission, being a sum not exceeding Forty Dollars in all.

11. If a Clergyman is unable to continue his public ministrations, through sickness or accident, upon the production of a medical certificate testifying the same, he may continue his connection with the Fund, upon making his yearly payment.

12. Any Clergyman degraded or suspended from the ministry, or any widow or orphan who shall not be in communion with the Church of England, shall be entitled only to such payments as the Executive Committee shall prescribe.

13. The Treasurer of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY shall be Treasurer of this Fund, and shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Loan Committee, invest every hundred pounds of surplus money, and add the same to the capital of the Fund. A yearly detailed state-

ment of the income, payments, and invested money, shall be published in the Annual Report of the Diocesan Church Society.

14. The pension shall be payable half-yearly, on January 1, and July 1, in each year; the first payment to be calculated for the interval from the death of the insured to the day of payment.

15. The Secretary of this Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and it shall be his duty to issue certificates, receive payments, donations and collections, which he shall hand to the Treasurer every quarter, or oftener, if required by him.

16. None of the above Rules shall be altered, except at the Annual Meeting of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, after a full year's notice of the proposed change.

5.—RULES AND REGULATIONS OF THE FUND TO AID IN THE EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY.

1. The Fund to assist in the education of the children of the Clergy shall consist of the amount now specially appropriated thereto (being \$1425.79) of all accumulations of interest, and of all subscriptions, legacies, collections, and other contributions given to or applied by the Society for this special object; and the interest of this Fund shall

be applied solely to assist in the education of children of clergymen duly licensed in the present Diocese of Fredericton, or of children of those who may have died or retired, with the Bishop's approval, on the ground of age or infirmity.

2. The Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society shall, from time to time, under the direction of the Executive Committee, invest every \$500 of surplus money of this Fund, and add the same to the capital of the Fund.

3. The entire management of the Fund shall be, and hereby is, vested in the Executive Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, who, if they shall so think fit, may vest such management in a sub-Committee at their discretion.

4. No grant shall be made from such Fund until the capital thereof shall, by accumulation or otherwise, have reached the sum of \$1200, nor shall the grant or grants thereafter to be made exceed in any one year the interest on the capital of such Fund for the year.

5. Applications for grants from such Fund shall be made in writing through the parents or guardians of the applicant to the Secretary of the Fund, and every such application shall be accompanied by a statement of any and all private property, pension or income of the parent or parents, if living, or directly or indirectly available for the support and education of such applicant, if the parent shall be deceased. The Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee may, in any case require further statements, which shall thereupon be furnished for their information.

6. Each case shall be determined on its own merits by the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, subject to the approval of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese.

7. In the event of any application being favorably considered, the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, shall determine in each case the amount of the grant, which shall be made for a single year only, but may, at the option of the Committee be continued for one or more years, but not after the recipient shall have reached the age of eighteen years.

8. A Secretary of the Fund shall be appointed by the Executive Committee, and he shall conduct all correspondence, and perform such other duties in connection therewith as the Executive Committee, or its sub-Committee, may direct.

9. The above Rules may be altered only by the General Committee of the DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY, after a year's notice of the proposed change.

6.—RESOLUTIONS OF THE GENERAL COMMITTEE.

That in future, no application for grants shall be considered which is not made on the first day of the meeting of the General Committee, or previously.

That when a missionary is absent from his Mission on account of ill health, with leave from the Lord Bishop, his Lordship be authorized in his discretion, to pay to him the whole or any part of the sum granted for such Mission.

That all grants by this Committee for Missionary salaries, and all sums placed at the disposal of the Lord Bishop, shall be for the service of the fiscal year in which the grants are made, and shall expire with it.

That all vouchers for the payment of any sum of money whatever, must bear on the face of them the authority under which they are paid, and the period for which they are claimed, together with the services performed.

That for the future, the Clergy and other collectors of the funds of the Diocesan Church Society, be required, in their lists of subscribers handed to the Secretary for publication in the Report, to insert in such lists the names of such persons only as have paid the amounts subscribed.

Whereas, The grants made by the Diocesan Church Society from its annual income (exclusive of the grants received from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel), are made in aid of local contributions for the support of the several Missions.

Therefore Resolved, That in future, grants from this Committee will be made mainly with reference to the ability of the members of the Church in the several Parishes to support their own Clergymen—the amount of local contributions for Church objects in such Parishes, and the sum paid in aid of the general objects of the Society.

That all bequests made to the Society be funded, as heretofore, and the interest only applied to the general or special purposes for which they are bequeathed.

Whereas, In consequence of the limited means at the disposal of the Society, and the great necessity for new and extended work, it has become of great consequence that all local glebes and other endowments of Parishes should be fully utilized. Therefore

1. Resolved, That the Board of Home Missions be authorized to require from the Church Wardens of every Parish or Mission receiving aid from the Society, full details of all such glebes, church lands, and other investments, yearly or oftener, as they shall see fit.

2. That if it shall appear that any part of the income from the glebes or investments held for the Rector's use, is taken to make up the sum required by the Society from the Mission, the Board may forthwith increase the amount required in proportion thereto; and in case of neglect on the part of the Rector or Church Wardens to collect the interests or rents, the Board be authorized to enquire into the matter, and, if there be sufficient cause, suspend the grant to the Mission until the management be made satisfactory to the Board of Home Missions.

That the Secretary of the Diocesan Church Society be requested to furnish the Treasurer with a minute of contributions, reported from every Parish or Mission, specifying the amounts payable to general and special funds; that the amounts so returned be charged by the Treasurer to each Parish or Mission in a book to be kept for the purpose, and that a detailed statement of all contributions then remaining unpaid, be rendered by the Treasurer to the Executive Committee, for their action in the matter, at the October meeting and each meeting thereafter, so long as any amount shall continue in arrear.

That every Missionary be requested to furnish annually to the Treasurer of the Diocesan Church Society the name of the Secretary of each Local Committee.

That hereafter, one yearly return only be required from each Missionary in the place of two half yearly returns as at present; this return to embrace all the information required by the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel and the Diocesan Church Society.

That all Rules and Regulations made by the General Committee be printed in each Annual Report.

That the certificates of the day delegates be sent to the Secretary at least ten days before the meeting of the General Committee; to enable him to report to the meeting at its opening the names of those qualified, and that his report shall be accepted as *prima facie* evidence of qualification.

RESOLUTION OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE—(See 39th Report.)

GLEBE LAND COMMITTEE.

A Committee shall be appointed, to be called "The Glebe Land Committee," with full and absolute power and authority to demise and lease at public auction or by private agreement for any term or terms of years, with or without covenants for renewal, and upon such other covenants and conditions as may be deemed advisable; and to sell at public auction or by private sale, and convey in fee simple, subject to such limitations, conditions, and restrictions as may be deemed advisable by the Glebe Land Committee, all and every or any the lands, tenements and hereditaments, vested in the Society under Chapter 76, 84th Victoria, or any part thereof, not heretofore conveyed by this Society; and for such purposes, to advertise in any manner the said lands or any part thereof, for sale or to lease, and also to cause all or any leases, conveyances or deeds to be prepared, and to cause and direct the seal of the Society to be affixed to the same, also to receive the proceeds of all or any sales so made; all things to be done under this resolution, however, to be in accordance with the terms, conditions, provisoes and stipulations of Chapter 59, 87th Victoria; and all proceeds of all or any sales and rents of land leased under this resolution, to be handed over or paid to, and received by the Treasurer of this Society for the time being to and for the uses, trusts and purposes set forth in the last mentioned Act.

REPORT.

1880.

The Church in this Diocese had good reason to be startled and aroused by the deficiency announced in the Statement of the Treasurer, made up to the 1st May, 1880,—a deficiency in the account for the general purposes of the Society of nearly \$6,000. It is true that a large portion of this amount was due a year ago. Then an over-estimate was made of the annual contributions. Various circumstances rendered it undesirable, and, in many instances, impossible, to make any reduction in the appropriations, or to lay any greater charge upon the Parishes. Sufficient notice on this subject has now been afforded. By this time it is fully known, in every Parish and Mission in the Diocese, that the Society must necessarily reduce its annual expenditure, and that from local sources larger offerings must be required. Although it was found necessary to refuse all applications for additional Missions, those on the schedule fully occupied more than absorbed the means at the disposal of the Society for the past year.

This over-expenditure, however much to be deprecated, could, under all the circumstances, have hardly been avoided without inflicting a greater injury. It must go no further. The amount over-drawn must, as soon as possible, be restored. Funds devised or pledged for the maintenance of the Church in the future, as well as in the present, must be held sacred. Parishes, for many years, receiving largely from the central fund, with comparatively little return, must now be made to feel that this state of things cannot go on. At all hazards a considerable increase in the local contributions must be made. When the members of the Church, in any Parish, abundantly able to give increased support for the Clergyman, refuse to do so, the sad alternative of a closed Mission,

with all its attendant evils, will not justly be charged as a wrong done by this Society.

The present position of the Society may be overruled for good. It has brought out most prominently the great Missionary work in the Diocese. Leading laymen have found it worthy of their earnest attention. In important Parishes meetings have been held; the whole subject has been discussed in the fullest manner. Large offerings have, in many instances, been made towards meeting the deficiency, and a considerable increase made in the annual contributions. There can be no sufficient reason why this course should not have been adopted in every Parish in the Diocese.

It is most important and absolutely necessary to secure for the Society an increased and increasing annual income. The present expenditure may be cut down by increased local requirements. Still it must be borne in mind that over \$10,000 is received, every year, from the S. P. G. This must soon be greatly reduced and, before long, wholly withdrawn. Then is the Church to turn a deaf ear to all appeals for aid in many a largely extended Parish, and in many a distant settlement, from whence is heard the cry "come over and help us"?

ABERDEEN.—Rev. Leo. A. Hoyt reports contributions from this Mission to the amount of \$11. At a meeting of the Local Committee a resolution was passed respectfully requesting a continuance of the grant to the Mission.

Mr. Hoyt has inclosed the following Report:

"Your Society divided this Mission, last July, from the Mission of Andover. Immediately upon its establishment as a separate Mission the Rev. Arthur Hoadley was appointed Deacon-in-charge. During the ten months' ministrations of Mr. Hoadley the Mission was blessed with more than ordinary prosperity; but his health failed, and he was obliged to resign.

"Mr. Hoadley reports to me that he has served seven Stations. "At Peel, where he resided, he held services regularly every fortnight. Here the congregation increased constantly in numbers and in their interest in the Church. Average attendance 65. A Bible Class was established during Lent, with an average attendance of 35. A Sunday School has been commenced with fair prospects of success.

"During Advent Mr. Hoadley delivered a course of lectures on the 'History and Doctrines of the Church.'

"At the other Stations similar work was performed.

"Beaufort is a Station of peculiar interest, many of the settlers coming from St. John. There are about 14 Church families at this Station, the great majority are very poor. Until winter the services were held regularly every month. When winter set in the barn in which service had been held was found too cold, and there being no suitable house, the services were necessarily very irregular. The attendance at the service was always very good. This Station is indebted to the very great kindness of the Church people in St. John for much valuable aid. The ladies in connection with the Church of England Institute collected and sent to the settlement about \$100 worth of second-hand and new clothing, books, &c., for the settlers. Mr. W. M. Jarvis, and others, contributed to the same object. On the last evening of the old year the children of the Settlement were privileged to enjoy a large Christmas Tree, loaded with useful and beautiful articles, kindly sent by Mrs. Carr and Mrs. G. Matthew of St. John. The Settlement is also indebted to Mrs. Carr, Mrs. Matthew, Mrs. Walker, Mrs. Keator, and Mr. W. M. Jarvis, for their great kindness in giving Parlor Concerts towards a sum to put up a School Chapel in the Settlement. About \$100 has been realized, and is now on deposit in the Saving's Bank.

"This Station is much indebted to W. B. Mills, Esq., for his ready co-operation and valuable aid in all Church matters in this Settlement.

"On the Festival of the Circumcision 12 children were baptized at Beaufort, two of whom were shortly after called to their rest.

"It is gratifying to know that the Children and Teachers of St. John's Sunday School, of which Mr. C. F. Kinnear is Superintendent, have decided to aid the Mission of Aberdeen, instead of sending their contributions to distant Dioceses.

"I append to this Report the following note from Mr. Hoadley:

"The late Missionary-Curate begs to acknowledge most gratefully the uniform kindness of the people throughout the Mission. Never in his experience in life has he met with greater kindness than among the people in the Mission of Aberdeen, and the only thing he has to regret is, that, owing to ill health, he was obliged to resign."

ANDOVER.—Rev. Leo. A. Hoyt reports contributions to the amount of \$90, of which the sum of \$30 is for the Deficiency Fund.

"As I have so fully reported from Aberdeen, I must take up as

little space for my Andover Report as possible. At St. George's Church a new fence has been added to the Burial Ground. At Trinity Church the congregation have re-imbursed me all the money I paid for the parsonage. At a tributary of the Aroostook, after holding services at most inconvenient places, for some time we have had the loan of a store which has been fitted up in a comfortable, and so far as possible in a churchly manner. There are a number of settlers belonging to the Church at Trout Brook, Tilley and Sisson Ridge. I hope to establish a regular monthly Sunday service at these places. Indeed this is one of the most important parts of Mission work.

"I hope that the Society will not be obliged to relinquish any of this work on the Upper St. John."

ALBERT COUNTY.—Rev. G. Love writes as follows :

"The warm thanks of the Mission and of myself are due the good people of Fredericton, who, last July, 1879, responded liberally to the appeal made them on behalf of Albert.

"Of the \$81.05 subscribed and collected on that occasion, \$50 has been apportioned to Harvey Parish Church, and the remainder, \$31.05, has been given to St. John's Church, Hopewell Hill.

"Thanks are also due to Mr. Rourke, of St. Martins, for \$5; and to Mr. H. T. Stevens, proprietor of the *Weekly Times*, Moncton, for the remission of a printing account of \$5.75.

"His Lordship, the Metropolitan, after his confirmation visit, kindly and generously presented St. John's Church, at the Hill, with a handsome Altar Rail and a rich Chancel Carpet.

"Mr. Medley also generously refused payment for two embroidered Hassocks, one of which is now in use in Harvey Church, and the other in the Hill Church.

"The Rev. Joseph Rushton presented the Mission with a large Prayer Book for one of our Prayer Desks, and a handsomely bound Book of Offices for the Altar.

"The Rev. E. S. W. Pentieath presented the Mission with a large sized Bible for reading the Lessons.

"And last, though not least, the Mission has to thank Mrs. C. A. Peck and Miss Nichols for collecting the greater portion of a sum of \$20 for Altar Furniture, consisting of a Table and two Chairs of ecclesiastical pattern, which are now in position in St. John's Church at the Hill.

"I thought I had enumerated all our benefactions, but other names require honorable mention. Any list of acknowledgments must necessarily be incomplete which did not contain the names of Mr. Simon Stevens and Miss Violet Casey, both of whom are

indefatigable in the exercise of the disagreeable, but necessary, office of collectors of the Missionary Assessment for the Parishes of Hopewell and Harvey.

"One other name remains to be mentioned, it is that of W. H. A. Casey, who has given to the Church liberally of his time, labour and money. Mainly to his exertion and liberality the people of Harvey are indebted for the restoration of their Church, where services are now held. This Church has received two coats of whitewash; the underpinning has been attended to; the walls plastered and whitened; the windows re-glazed; the number of seats increased; a large quantity of stove pipe, and a new stove has been purchased and placed in position, together with a whole new set of oil lamps."

Contributions amount to \$12.

BATHURST.—Rev. W. Henry Street reports contributions to the amount of \$100 for general purposes.

BURTON AND LINCOLN.—Rev. William Greer reports contributions for the Deficiency Fund \$7.00, for General Purposes \$101.07; total, \$108.07.

BAY DU VIN.—Rev. E. P. Flewelling writes that his people depend largely on the salmon fishing, which is unusually late this year. Contributions will amount at least to \$30.

CAMBRIDGE.—Rev. B. Shaw reports contributions amounting to \$100.

CAMPORELLO.—Rev. C. P. Wilson reports contributions amounting to \$62.50. He writes as follows:

"There is scarcely anything which requires special mention in my quiet Parish. Since my last Report I have opened another Sunday School, for the convenience of those children who, on account of the distance and for other reasons, cannot attend the Church School. At present there are nineteen scholars, and there is every prospect of the number being largely, though gradually, increased. The new School is called St. Saviour's. The children in St. Anne's School have taken 20 Mission Boxes, and seem desirous of uniting their efforts with those of their elders in the task of relieving the Society from financial embarrassment. We have made every effort on behalf of the D. C. S., but because of

the state of the fisheries it has been found extremely difficult to raise money; it is, however, hoped that the subscriptions will approach nearly to the usual amount."

CANTERBURY.—Rev. F. Towers was appointed to the charge of this Mission in July last. He at first found the prospect discouraging in many ways. He reports contributions to the amount of \$186.17, and goes on to say:

"There was, however, one redeeming feature which struck me as being encouraging. A very good foundation to begin to build upon had already been laid. Two very commodious Churches in a good state of repair, about five miles apart, raised themselves as silent witnesses of the truth, and of Episcopal government in a region where chilling indifference and cold unconcern held undisputed sway. I felt that an arduous work was before me to endeavour, by God's help, to break up the fallow ground—to awaken a careless people to a sense of their duty—and to fill those Churches with devout and sincere worshippers.

"Such were the conditions in which I found this field of labor eleven months ago. Now, however, when I look back over the work which I have been enabled to do, I have every reason to feel deeply thankful to Almighty God. He has surely blessed my feeble efforts as a labourer in His vineyard. A change for the better has taken place. In the hitherto empty Churches there now appear, every Sunday, large and attentive congregations, and in every place where services are held a reaction is setting in, in every way favorable to the Church. Everywhere I go throughout the Parish the people receive me with the greatest kindness, and I am all the time receiving invitations to visit settlements further back, where the Church of England has hitherto been practically unknown. This Mission is certainly deserving of a great deal of notice on the part of the D. C. S. The field is large, and my work during the past year has been extremely arduous. This Mission lies along the line of the N. B. and C. Railway, about half way between McAdam Junction and Woodstock. There is chance for work as far West as the boundary line. I have at present four Sunday Stations, and two others which I can only visit at present on week days. I held services regularly for a time at McAdam Junction, but, owing to press of work in and around Canterbury, I was obliged to give them up. I was discouraged there also, as the people did not seem to take the interest in the work which I thought they should, and I found I could do more efficient work elsewhere. I hold regular fortnightly services at Benton, a Sta-

tion on the railway ten miles North from here. I have met with very fair success there, and when there is a carriage road opened through direct I hope to be able to give them a Sunday service occasionally. I have also held services, in conjunction with the Rector of Prince William, at Shogomoque, a point on the St. John River, ten miles South-east from here. My Sunday Stations in Canterbury are Canterbury Station, Skiff Lake Settlement, Hartin Settlement and Carroll Ridge. There is a Church in each of the former places. In the latter two I hold services in School Houses. These places are all within a radius of about six miles, so that my drives on Sunday are not to say very long. The population, except at Canterbury Station, is made up almost entirely of farmers. On the whole, I think, the Mission is a growing one, as the Settlements are increasing in size and wealth every year. As regards the amount of money raised during the past year, for Church purposes, I have every reason to feel very much gratified. Forty dollars extra was assessed by the B. H. M. last year, making the whole amount \$240. I would remind the D. C. S. that this shows a great advancement, as, to my knowledge, there was never an amount exceeding \$40 ever raised for the D. C. S. in this Parish before. In justice to the people I must say that they have given to me very cheerfully and liberally. Many of them, too, are hard working farmers, who do not possess very much ready money.

“Additional funds for Church purposes have also been raised. The Church at Canterbury Station had to be fitted up with lamps; a new carpet was laid down in the Chancel, and a large and powerful organ, valued at \$320, was purchased in January last, and this is paid for now, except about \$80, which is being raised as the payments fall due.

“I must also mention the fact, the Metropolitan (with his usual large hearted liberality) presented us at Easter with a handsome Altar Cloth, which has added very much to the appearance of the Church.

“This is a rude outline of the work I have been doing during the past year. Of course in a Mission like this, which had fallen into decay so much, the work of a year cannot be anything more than preparatory. The ground must first be ploughed up, and the seed sown, before any harvest can be gathered in. I hope, therefore, at the end of another year, if God continues to bless and prosper me in my labours, to show some more practical results from the work done—work of a spiritual nature, where souls are being won over from under the thralldom of sin and Satan to serve as true soldiers of Jesus Christ.

“I have baptized, during the year, 10, two of whom were adults.

Two more adults are now preparing for baptism. Marriages 5; deaths 6."

CARLETON.—Rev. Theodore E. Dowling reports increased contributions from St. George's Church and Lancaster. They have already reached \$150.

CHATHAM.—Rev. D. Forsyth has inclosed the following Report :

"In submitting another Annual Report to the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society, I am thankful to say that during the past year steady progress has been made in the performance of work which had been undertaken at the time of my last Report. The new Organ and Chancel of St. Mary's Chapel were opened and used for the first time on the 31st of September last, at which time we were favoured with the presence of the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, the Venerable Metropolitan of Canada, who administered the rite of Confirmation to 35 candidates. Within a few weeks previously about \$500 had been collected by subscription to complete the Organ Fund, and on Confirmation day the offerings amounted to \$81 for the same purpose. The cost of the Organ, and alterations in connection with the Chancel, amounted to about \$1500, which has been paid, excepting \$200, which will probably be provided for within a few months. A short time ago a handsome Brussels Carpet of ecclesiastical pattern was placed upon the Chancel floor. The carpet cost \$100, which amount has thus far, in part, been provided by those ever-ready promoters of good works, the ladies of the congregation.

These improvements have necessarily delayed the other contemplated work to which I referred in my last Annual Report, viz. : The re-seating of the Nave of St. Mary's Chapel. But before another year has passed I trust that the same zeal and liberality, and the same Divine blessing which have secured to us the improvements we now so much enjoy, may secure to us also the long desired and prayed for and incalculable advantage of a free and open seated Church.

"I have great pleasure in informing the General Committee that, notwithstanding the large demands which have been made upon my people on account of our local improvements, they have nobly responded to the calls which have been made in behalf of the General Purposes of the Society. Early in May a Parochial Meeting was held, at which the late Pastoral Letter of the Lord Bishop was considered, and certain resolutions recommending a prompt and liberal response to the appeal for help were passed unanimously. On Whitsunday, following the meeting, offerings to the amount of \$155 were made at the Public Services towards the Deficiency Fund. Subsequently this amount was increased to \$182, and this notwithstanding that the call came at a season most unfavourable to many who have been foremost in giving to the utmost of their ability.

On Sunday, the 20th of the present month, the old system of collecting the annual subscriptions from house to house having been abandoned, contributions to the amount of \$222.74 were made through the offertory by the envelope system. This sum has thus far been further increased to \$248.53, and will probably reach, say \$275, which, together with the first half-yearly collection last autumn, will amount to \$300, as the annual contribution from Chatham to the General Purposes Fund. Adding to this the previous contribution of \$182 to the Deficiency Fund, the Committee will observe that \$482 will be the sum contributed from this Parish to the Home Mission work of the Diocese. In regard to the present annual contributions it has, of course, been understood by contributors that should no grant be made this year to Chatham by the Board of Home Missions, the amount hitherto received is to be reserved for local purposes, and the balance paid to the Treasurer of the D. C. S. for the General Purposes Fund.

"The children of our Sunday School have again contributed to the support of the Indian Schools in the Diocese of Algoma.

"With great thankfulness for the divine blessings which have attended another year of unworthy endeavours, I report these evidences of a better recognition of the true principles of giving towards the advancement of our holy religion.

"The average attendance at the services has been kept up, and there has been an increase in the weekly offerings, and a greater reverence in the performance of Divine worship, notwithstanding the evils of the pew system, which, as before mentioned, I earnestly hope may soon be remedied.

"Trusting that the progress thus reported to the Society may be acceptable to the 'Lord of the Vineyard,' and thankful for many instances of kindness and assistance from the people committed to my charge, I rejoice in the hope that a good foundation is being laid against the time to come, that some are laying hold of eternal life, and endeavouring to enter into that rest which remaineth for the people of God!"

DERBY.—Rev. A. F. Hiltz has inclosed the following Report :

"I greatly fear that my present Report will exhibit more features of a discouraging than of an encouraging character. Having been troubled for some time with a hoarseness of the throat, which interfered very considerably with my ease in speaking, and must at times have made it very painful for my congregation to listen to me, I was at length compelled, though most reluctantly, to give up one of the three services which I had conducted each Lord's day since my entrance upon the duties of this Mission. The people of Blackville shewing some reluctance in contributing the sum required of them towards the stipend of the Missionary, I obtained permission from the Bishop to set before them the danger of their Church being closed, as an incentive to greater ex-

ertion. I need hardly say that the Church was not closed, but that an effort was immediately made to meet the demands for that quarter. The effort, however, was only a spasmodic one, as the real difficulty does not lie so much in the people's unwillingness as in their inability. Nor does this statement conflict with the fact that they have contributed this year nearly \$40 towards the D. C. S., as this was largely contributed by persons who neither belong to the Church nor attend its services.

"Notwithstanding these discouraging features of the work, I have not been left entirely without some fruit for my labors. The Church at Blackville has had a solid foundation of cut stone placed beneath it. The trench for the sub-foundation was dug gratuitously by the parishioners, who also placed the stone upon the ground and contributed some of the unskilled labor, in putting it under. The skilled labor cost something like \$45, of which a lady in Halifax gave \$20, and persons here interested in the undertaking the rest.

"In Derby several changes and additions have been made in the interior of the Church. The blinds, which for a quarter of a century draped the windows, excluding the light and disfiguring the walls, have been removed and the windows screened by frosting; a large orchestral stall near the entrance, which for many years held the choir and organ, has been removed, and the organ and choir placed in a more suitable position near the chancel; and two handsome additions have been made to the furniture, viz: a superfrontal for the altar of crimson cloth, the gift of the Most Rev. the Metropolitan, and a neat, tasteful lectern, the gift of Wm. T. Crocker, Esq.

"But while we have thus been caring for the material temple, I trust we have not been unmindful of the spiritual one; and while we have been beautifying the sanctuary of God, have not neglected altogether to worship him in the beauty of holiness. By no means the least important feature of our work, and that which is the most encouraging of all, is the pleasing fact that during the three years of my incumbency the number of *bona fide* communicants in the whole Mission has more than doubled, and at the last Easter celebration in Derby there were more present than at any one time for several years.

"We have not made any special effort on behalf of the Deficiency Fund except to canvas the Mission more thoroughly than in other years for subscriptions in the ordinary way. Our labors, though not meeting our expectations, have not been altogether fruitless. We are able to report \$122.50 towards the general purposes of the Society."

DORCHESTER.—Rev. R. Simonds writes:

"It will be gratifying to the Society to know that many of the Parishioners of Dorchester have taken a lively interest in the effort made this year to pay off the debt contracted through the zeal of the B. H. M. in extending, as widely as possible, the services of the Church. This lively interest has manifested itself in the practical form of *paid up* contributions to the "Deficiency Fund" of \$190.94. In addition to this amount, there have been contributed, in the annual list, \$141.56, making in all \$332.50. The annual list shows a slight falling off, but the total sum goes very far beyond the contributions of former years. And it should be noticed that even the reduced annual sum shows that the Parish is, this year, as it was last year, *self-supporting*,—it contributes to the D. C. S. *more than it receives*.

"Since my last Report there have been supplied to the Church, through the liberality of a few of our people, a Credence Bracket, a Lectern, a new Chancel Carpet, and a new and appropriate Holy Table.

"A large and much needed addition has also been made to the Sunday School House, which is now a commodious and comfortable building. This great improvement was hastened through the energy of the zealous superintendent.

"On the occasion of the "Intercession Service," May 9th, the offerings for the S. P. G. amounted to \$18.50.

"It will thus be seen that, during the past year, the Parish has not been unfruitful in good works.

"On 7th Sept., 1879, we had the advantage and pleasure of an official visit from the Bishop—the venerable Metropolitan—when fifteen young people were confirmed—eight males and seven females. On that day sixty-two partook of the Holy Communion.

"I must not omit to mention, in this Report, the great loss the Parish and Rector have sustained in the lamented death of the late Lieut. Governor, the Hon. E. B. Chandler, who was for nearly 40 years a Church Warden, and who, up to the time of his death, continued to attend to the financial affairs of the Parish, which, during so many years, he had managed with remarkable wisdom and success. He was a steadfast Churchman, and a regular communicant."

Since the above was received the Hon. D. Hanington has forwarded a further sum of \$58 towards the Deficiency Fund, raised by the exertions of the young members of his family.

DOUGLAS AND BRIGHT.—Rev. LeB. W. McKiel reports "contri-

butions for General Purposes \$42, for the Deficiency Fund \$13, total \$55. He also reports the amount for the previous year, not included in the last Report, as \$50.

FREDERICTON.—Rev. G. Goodridge Roberts reports contributions for General Purposes, \$879.05; W. and O. Fund, \$46.02; Deficiency Fund, including Missionary Boxes, \$965.40; total, \$1890.47.

GAGETOWN.—Rev. James Neales reports contributions to the amount of \$61.92. He writes as follows:

"My returns are made at the last moment, because our collections for the D. C. S. could not be got in till the last moment, and some subscriptions are yet unpaid, but still the sum total is larger than in 1879. Things are going on favorably in the Parish, our congregations are greater than ever I remember them since first I came here, and there seems a generous spirit of emulation in the efforts made for building our new Church.

"Our Church-women have formed a Sewing Circle, and meet every week at the Rectory. They expect to have a sale on Dominion Day, and to devote the proceeds to building up our 'House of Prayer for all people.' This is going on rapidly towards completion, under the able superintendence of Mr. Gilbert Williams, and we hope to have it ready for consecration this coming autumn."

GRAND MANAN.—Rev. W. S. Covert reports contributions amounting to \$21.85. His people, Mr. Covert writes, are giving liberally towards the erection of a new Church. There are indications of a renewed and vigorous life in this Mission. The growth has been slow, but possibly not on this account the less sound.

GREENWICH.—Rev. D. W. Pickett reports contributions to the amount of \$48.29.

HAMPTON.—Rev. Canon Walker reports contributions to the amount of \$93.77, of which the sums \$7.76 are for S. P. G. Missions and \$6 for Deficiency Fund, making for General Purposes \$80 01.

KINGSCLEAR.—Rev. R. M. Edwards writes as follows:

"The Parish has suffered greatly by removals. The Mill is not to run any more, and the Parish is duller than it has ever been.

Last winter a course of secular lectures was given for the benefit of St. Peter's Church. I am indebted to the Revs. H. H. Neales, S. A. C., J. Neales, M. A., Canon Partridge, M. A. B. D., and students of the University of N. B., for their kind assistance, also to many Frederictonians, especially to Dr. Brown, for their musical aid.

"The Parish has improved spiritually. Some have received the Holy Communion who had not for years; new communicants have been added by confirmation. By my plan of celebrating on the important festivals we averaged nearly once a fortnight at the Parish Church. During Lent there were celebrations every Sunday.

"There has been great improvement at Central Kingsclear. By announcing the page of the Prayer Book the people, who are mostly dissenters, have been taught to respond. In Upper Kingsclear, where nearly all are Baptists or Methodists, I received a donation of \$31. A snug little sum, since mine was the seventh held within a radius of ten miles, and attended by the same people.

"We have enclosed our graveyard with a fence.

"I am indebted to Col. Maunsell for lay reading, and to Mrs. Maunsell for playing the organ.

"We had a very successful Missionary meeting to do our share towards removing the deficit of the D. C. S., at which stirring addresses were made by the Rector of Fredericton, Messrs. E. L. Wetmore and G. R. Parkin.

"We have contributed \$5.05 to the S. P. G."

Contributions amount to \$133.65.

KINGSTON.—Rev. Hastings S. Wainwright reports contributions for General Purposes \$100, for the Deficiency Fund \$41.30—total \$141.30; and he writes as follows:

"It is enough to state that the services have been steadily kept up in the three Churches and two Stations, and are appreciated by the Church-goers. The attendance at the Parish Church is good; at Clifton steady; at St. James's rather on the increase; at St. Paul's irregular, and at Midland's (week evenings) very fair. St. Paul's is about 12 miles from the Parish Church, and services are held there every third Sunday. The people in that district have made application for more frequent Sunday services, but I cannot see my way clear to accede to their request; for to comply would be to deprive one of the other Churches of its regular and uninterrupted services, which thing I am unwilling to do, and the congregation to tolerate. It frequently happens that way below on the 'borders' of the Parish, when anything happens calling for the services of the clergy, rather than sending for me, they seek elsewhere, and have on more occasions than one committed their dead to the ground, one of their number reading the Burial Service the while. The reason given to me afterwards being, 'we had no way of getting word to you.' Can any wonder then, that the affections of such for the Church of their fathers should grow cold. Let it be remembered

that these are not prejudiced against the Church, but living so far away from the Church centres they have grown indifferent somewhat to her claims and privileges. The question then is, What can be done? I can see no other way than by uniting all that portion of Westfield Parish on this side of the River with Kingston, and making two Missions of the so united Parishes, or else sending a Missionary to work say for a year in that district. This arrangement would relieve the Missionary at Westfield of the charge and oversight of that part of his Mission on this side of the River, and enable him to open up work in more accessible places. The only real difficulty to any such scheme would be a financial one. Kingston is just able to meet its present responsibilities, and to divide it would not render it more solvent. Such a division, as contemplated, would necessarily be a venture of faith, the results of which we cannot estimate. Such a change as here proposed would not lessen my own work, nay rather it would increase it, because I would then be able to start new work in another direction. I have merely dropped this as a hint, for I do not suppose the Society will be in a position for grappling with any new work, at least for the coming year. If any interesting account of personal peril is looked for in these reports it would not be difficult for me to fill a column or two with a bare recital of mishaps, adventures, hair-breadth escapes of a broken neck, broken limbs, &c., which, though they find no place in the daily news, are none the less recorded in my every day book, and in the indestructible tablets of my memory; but I forbear, not through fear of exposing myself to the charge of exaggeration, but that I may not prove myself burdensome, or be thought too reckless, careless or unskilled in my chariotting.

"In August we purpose putting sundry repairs on our venerable Parish Church, and also painting it. It may not be out of place here to state that the frame of this Church was raised June 27th, 1789, and in the old vestry book, under the date of November 5th, 1789, I read, 'Having accomplished the covering and enclosing of the said Frame, or House, it was on this day dedicated to the service and worship of Almighty God, by the Reverend James Scovil, in the name of Trinity Church.' As I can find no record of the consecration of the same, although the visits of the Bishop of Nova Scotia are all recorded, I have since wondered whether there is any such record at Fredericton or Halifax. There is also some idea of finishing the repairs, so well commenced two years ago, on St. Paul's Church, (White's Point), but how this is to be done without outside help is an all important question."

MADAWASKA.—Rev. W. Shannon reports contributions to the amount of \$14.

MAUGERVILLE.—Rev. G. H. Sterling reports contributions in advance of the past year. They amount for General Purposes to

\$93. Besides, the sum of \$21.62 has been collected for the S. P. G., and \$4.80 for Algoma.

MONCTON.—Rev. Edwin S. W. Pentreath reports contributions to the amount of \$75, and he has inclosed the following Report :

"I am glad to be able to report a steady growth in numbers during the past year. The prospects of the Town have sensibly improved, and we are learning to depend more on the establishment of manufactures, and less on the railway for the future growth of the place. A Sugar Refinery and Brass Foundry have been erected since my last Report, and will shortly be in operation. This will bring an increased population, and we may expect to gain a fair share of Church people among those who move in. We have fortunately gained, by removal into the place, several families with grown up children, which has materially strengthened us. During the year I was enabled to purchase the Pipe Organ formerly in use in Christ Church, Amherst, N. S., at a cost of \$240. This is now paid for, and serves us well for the present. In this connexion I may say, that we were fortunate last year in securing the services of Mr. A. A. Rankin, late of St. John, as organist, who has devoted himself with much zeal to all Church work. On May 11th I presented for Confirmation a class of 23 persons, and there will be at least as many ready next year. The Society of 'Willing Workers' has undertaken to work for the completion of the Tower and Spire, which will cost about \$450, and I have good hope of seeing it soon finished. In addition to largely increased parochial duties, owing to our growth in numbers, I have devoted considerable time to literary and other work, as associate editor of the *Church Guardian* and *Church Work*. I believe this time has been well spent, and I possess abundant evidence that these publications are exercising a marked influence for good in the Diocese. The circulation of the papers is something unprecedented in the history of Church literature in the Dominion. The *Church Guardian* has reached a circulation of 3,500, and it is steadily increasing. As representing the interests of this Diocese, I have taken care that everything relating to those interests should have a prominent place in its columns. *Church Work* has an issue of 4,500. It is the organ (with local covers added) of the Diocese of Quebec, and has been localized in many Parishes in the Dominion.

Our financial condition is only fair. There are \$560 raised for the stipend, and about \$200 for expenses, making \$760. Our Church will not seat 300. There are about 75 families, and as we have no glebes or endowment of any kind, the current expenses alone require an average of over \$10 a family. Some of these families are very poor, and can give nothing. To raise this is a continual strain, as we have nothing but our weekly and monthly contributions.

MUSQUASH.—Rev. Henry M. Spike reports contributions for

General Purposes to the amount of \$60, and to Deficiency Fund \$11.16, total \$71.16.

NEW DENMARK.—Rev. N. M. Hansen, writes as follows:

"With great pleasure I report continued progress in my work in this Mission during the past year. I also wish to express the thankfulness of my people and myself to the D. C. Society, for the assistance by which this work can be continued. Although we are but a small community, something has been done here since my ordination, four years ago. Forty-four have been baptized, twenty have been presented to the Bishop for Confirmation, fourteen couples have been married, sixteen burials have taken place. The communicants have increased to 106. About 350 public services have been held, and 70 children instructed in Church principles.

"A number of young men left the Colony last winter for the far West, nevertheless our Settlement has increased considerably by accessions from Denmark, our population is now, I should judge, about 400 persons, all belonging to the Church. It is sometimes tiresome to repeat over and over again to the new arrivals the arguments for our joining the Church of England. I found it advisable this Spring, at a meeting at which a considerable number of new comers were present, to explain again the whole matter. Especially I called attention to the greatest advantage of our joining the English Church, with regard to the children and young people. When, after Confirmation, they go out into the cities and villages of New Brunswick and Maine, to earn their living, it will be impossible for them to find a Lutheran Church in these countries. The result will be either they will join one of the sects, or that they lose confidence in all religion in America, and become irreligious. But now they are educated in the English Church, they know to what Church they belong, and for what Church to ask in their new places. In this way they are saved to a Church with no difference of doctrine from that of our old Danish Church. I have requested a good friend of mine, a Bishop in Denmark, to take up a collection for our Church Building Fund, and I hope in this way to receive some assistance towards finishing and furnishing St. Ansgar's.

"It is impossible to raise much money here for the Church Society. I forwarded last month \$5 to the Foreign Mission Fund of S. P. G., and \$5 to the Church Guardian Deficiency Fund. I have worked hard to bring our contributions up to \$30, fifty per cent. more than that of last year. That is all I can do for the present year.

NEWCASTLE.—Rev. Herbert H. Barber writes as follows:

"In making my Report to the Diocesan Church Society for the past year I had little to speak of beyond the ordinary work common to every Parish Priest. During the year his Lordship the Bishop has held a Confirmation here, at which I had the happiness to present nineteen candidates, eight of whom were adults, for that Holy

Rite; of this number seven were converts from the denominations. The last year has also seen our 'communicants' list increased by twenty-six.

"Like our neighbours we have suffered much from the depression in trade, but I am thankful to say we have managed to meet our current expenses.

"I have not attempted to make any separate subscription for the Deficiency Fund, deeming it best to try to increase our usual amount than to make any extra effort outside of that. I trust we shall be able to send \$120 (one hundred and twenty dollars) more than last year."

The amount reported is \$205 for General Purposes.

NEW MARYLAND.—Rev. Finlow Alexander reports for General Purposes \$70, and for the Deficiency Fund \$10, and he enclosed the following Report:

"I am glad to be able to report the condition of the Mission of New Maryland as prosperous. All dues to D. C. S. in connection with this Mission have in the past year been punctually met. The Church has been newly painted outside, and after paying this, and all other expenses of the year, there remains to our credit a balance of fourteen dollars and some cents.

"Great praise is due to our Church Wardens, Messrs. Horncastle and Fisher, for the zeal and faithfulness with which their often onerous and troublesome duties have been discharged, and I take this opportunity of publicly thanking them for their kind assistance.

"Mr. Cowie is, as ever, my faithful and untiring helper, superintending the now largely attended Sunday School, and rendering, in addition, much and most valuable assistance in connection with the Sunday services and other Church work.

"To several ladies of Fredericton, well known as Church helpers, I tender my very grateful thanks for the beautiful present (hand-worked) of a Kneeling Cushion for communicants, extending the entire length of the Chancel rail. To Mrs. Dowling also, of Carleton, I am indebted for much kind interest shewn in the little Church's welfare, and for more than one kind present."

NORTON.—Rev. E. A. Warnford reports contributions to the amount of \$100.

PETERSVILLE.—Rev. Joseph Smith reports contributions to the amount of \$36.38 for General Purposes, and \$4.27 for Deficiency Fund.

POINT DU CHENE.—Rev. O. S. Newnham reports contributions amounting to \$40, and writes as follows:

"At the time of making this Report to the D. C. S. my subscrip-

tion list is not completed. I am afraid, owing to various circumstances, that the amount will not be very large. In the first place the members of the Church are neither many nor wealthy. Then again, we are feeling here, as elsewhere, the hard times, so much so that at one time I feared that (unless an increased grant could be obtained) the Mission would have to be closed, but, thanks to the Church spirit of the congregation, for the present this evil has been warded off.

"In January a deputation from the Board of H. M. visited us, the result of which has been an increase in the subscriptions towards the Parish assessment, so that the amount required is now nearly fully subscribed.

"The services of the Church have been regularly conducted during the year, with the exception of three Sundays, during which time the Church was closed for repairs. Upon these Sundays the Rev. Dr. Jarvis kindly allowed us the use of his Church for an afternoon service. In addition to my other Sunday services I have commenced a service in the School-house at Point du Chene, thus far with good success, the average number present having been about 35. On Sunday last I had four services, with sermon at each, and a walk of five miles, viz.: Morning Service in Church at 11, with Holy Communion; at 2.30, Monthly Children's Service (partly choral); at 4, Point du Chene Service, and at 7, the usual Evening Service in Church. This is my regular Sunday work, with the exception of Children's Service, in place of which I have, on the other Sundays, a Bible Class of 20 young persons. I may here say that the Sunday School is prospering, the number of scholars at present is 50.

"Since my last Report the interior of the Church has been thoroughly painted, and otherwise beautified; and a new Chancel Carpet, purchased at a cost of \$45. A neat Fence has also been placed in front of the Church ground. The money for these much needed improvements was provided by the Ladies of the Parish Sewing Society, to whom the thanks of the congregation are due.

"In September last his Lordship the Bishop visited us, when sixteen candidates were presented for the Apostolic Rite of Confirmation, amongst the number was a young person who was baptized on the day of Confirmation, and whose parents are Baptists. The Lord Bishop of Nova Scotia was present at the service, and, with the Metropolitan, expressed himself as pleased with the appearance of the Church, and especially at the heartiness of the singing and responding. This service will not soon be forgotten by the congregation. I ought to mention that a good number of those who were confirmed have been since admitted to the Holy Communion.

"Mrs. J. Bell, a former resident of this Parish, and who departed this life in the winter past, left us a legacy of \$200 for the Church, and \$100 for the Sunday School.

"The number of communicants is now 30.

"The total amount of contributions in the Mission, for all Church purposes, during the year, has been \$750.

PETITCODIAC.—Rev. Cuthbert Willis reports contributions, W. and O. Fund \$4.10, for General Purposes \$94.75, and for Deficiency Fund \$25, total \$123.85; also, for S. P. G. \$4.80, and for Algoma \$5. Mr. Willis writes as follows:

"Since sending my Report, in 1879, the little Church at Pollet River Siding has been painted, and is completely out of debt. I am also happy to add that it is generally filled to overflowing with an earnest band of worshippers. A Confirmation was held there last autumn, and also at Petitcodiac, by the Most Rev. the Metropolitan, when 37 candidates were confirmed. We are again under great obligation to his Lordship for a gift of two small side windows for the Chancel of Petitcodiac Church, which, with the handsome East window presented at an earlier date, adds much to the beauty of this the Parish Church of Salisbury. As I am yet unfit for much vocal work, the Rev. Mr. Wilkinson still remains with me; much to the satisfaction of myself and people.

"As our contributions last year exceeded, by a third, those of 1878, so will those of 1880 exceed the contributions of last year by almost the same amount. This excess in the amount towards the general funds of the D. C. S., with the sum of about \$15 contributed towards the Deficiency Fund, is, under the present circumstances of the Mission, a liberal contribution.

"I am sorry to say that, owing to business failures in this place, and the removal of several parishioners, it is now very difficult to raise the amount required by the Board for the Missionary's stipend. We have also to lament the very sudden death of W. S. Smith, Sr., Esq., a most earnest and faithful member of the Church, who two years ago came to us from Dalhousie.

"I would like to add, in conclusion, that we have commenced services at another point, seven miles from Petitcodiac, in a School-house in the neighbourhood of which are four Church families. Thus far we seem to have created a great interest among those outside the Church, with whom prayer books are in demand, and many enquiries made about the Church.

"We hope yet to add a little more to the General Purpose Fund."

PRINCE WILLIAM AND DUMFRIES.—Rev. LeB. W. Fowler reports contributions to the amount of \$85.

QUEENSBURY.—Rev. A. H. Weeks writes that the sum of \$40 or \$50 has been collected for the Society, to which he hopes more will be added.

RESTIGOUCHE.—Rev. J. H. S. Sweet reports contributions to the amount of \$42, and has forwarded the following Report:

"In presenting my Report this year to the Diocesan Church Sc-

ciety, it is very gratifying to be able to announce the completion of the two most important and necessary buildings which were briefly referred to in the Report of the Mission which appears in last year's Journal, and which were then but in their first stages of existence. I mean the Parsonage house and the Church in Campbellton. The former, situated in Dalhousie, had not been pushed on so far as to have rendered it possible for the Rector to have removed into it last October without a great deal of persevering and steady work on the part of those by whose energy it has been carried on towards a successful issue. The little mere handful of people here have been able to accomplish has been supplemented most generously by a second donation from our good Bishop, by the usual Society's grant, and by a liberal response from many of the clergy in the Dominion to a circular letter, explaining the need of a parsonage in the Mission, the peculiar circumstances of the case, and the urgent necessity for outside help. I would again, on behalf of my little flock, thank those who so kindly and promptly sent us the dollar we solicited. But we are still in much need of help, and unless the Society decides to place at our disposal the proceeds of the sale of the Addington Glebe, we are unable to see our way out of the difficulties in which, in that case, we should be involved. We have claims for which I myself, with others, have had to become responsible. Much also remains yet to be done to the house, and much that is absolutely necessary to keep it in proper order. The main body of the house is only primed, the roof is still untarred, and none of the inside is yet painted; no suitable outbuildings have, as yet, been built. When properly finished it will make a good and substantial house, and being situated near the Church, on a piece of ground which hereafter could be made very pretty by the planting of trees and shrubs, will be a valuable addition to the property of the Mission.

"The Church in Campbellton, of which I spoke in my last Report as being under way, has now, in part, been finished, and was formally opened on April 10th. On that occasion our zealous Rural Dean, the Rector of Chatham, was present, and preached for me twice on the day of opening. It is a pretty little Church, 54x23 ft. Gothic in architecture, with open timbered roof, the rafters of which are grained in imitation of oak, and with small lancet windows on either side, filled with stained glass, by J. C. Spruce, Montreal. The East as well as the West window is, as yet, in plain glass. The seats are open and unappropriated. The chancel is raised three steps above the rest of the flooring. There are many claims yet against the building, and had it not been for the great energy of Charles Murray, Esq., who has given much of his time and means to the building, it would yet be far from completion. He deserves great praise for all he has done. We have received a grant from the S. P. C. K., but, so far, have not been able to comply with the conditions necessary to draw it. Should we get the glebe money spoken of above (part of which it is proposed should be devoted to the Parsonage and part to the Church) we shall hope to be able to do so. The Church, however, is far from being completed. We have no

Font, no Communion Plate or Linen, no Organ or Bell, or Surplice. These we trust will come by and bye. For myself I cannot be too thankful to God, who has enabled me to see accomplished what I once felt would be almost a hopeless task to attempt. May the building be to His glory, to the conversion of the sinner, and to the edifying of the body of Christ.

"We have just started a Sunday School in Campbellton, which I think, in time, will make progress. I attempted it here once before, but, owing to having no building of our own, had to discontinue it. Since the opening of the Church we have also commenced the envelope system, which, I think, promises to be as great a success, obviating, as it does, so much of the inconvenience and delay consequent upon the old quarterly payments, as it has proved in Dalhousie.

"In the latter place we have again suffered from the removal of one of our Church families, and even the removal of one family is immediately felt where the congregation is so small. We have, however, gained one or two subscribers from those who, till lately, were 'not of us,' and for this we must be thankful, and work on steadily and perseveringly. The Bishop spent a day or two with us last August, on his Confirmation tour, when small classes were presented to him for the holy rite, both here and at Campbellton. Speaking on the whole, the past year has been one for which to be very thankful, for, with the material progress we have made, one would fain hope that something deeper and more important has been going on all the time in the hearts of the people, rather, may we not hope that all this outward progress has been but the outcome of real spiritual growth. This, however, we must leave to Him who knoweth all. Of course we have had many discouragements during the year, but these, we would fain believe, have been only such as were necessary and good for us; they help to draw us out of ourselves and teach us to depend more upon the blessing of God. In conclusion, I need only say that the services of the Church have been carried on regularly and with little intermission since my last Report was sent in. Mr. H. A. Johnson is a most efficient and valuable assistant as a lay reader, and the Church in Dalhousie owes very much to his energy and zeal.

"Since writing the above we have had to mourn the loss of our dear and staunch old friend, Mr. W. S. Smith, who died suddenly on the 6th of June. He was for many years the Church Warden of this Parish, and he ever took the deepest interest in all that affected the welfare of the Church in this community. He was a good and consistent Christian, and, as such, was beloved and respected by all who knew him. I feel it to be his due that I should make this slight allusion to him in this Report.

RICHIBUCTO.—Rev. J. Nelson Jones writes:

"Notwithstanding the great depression of business in this place, the Parish has not been lacking in progressive work. A new Chan-

cel has been added to the Parish Church at a cost of over \$500. In addition to this the sum of \$500 has been realized for the purpose of erecting a Mission Chapel at Kingston. The contributions to the D. C. S. are \$71.50; collections S. P. G. \$4.57; Alms \$6.46."

RICHMOND.—Rev. Henry H. Neales writes as follows:

"With the exception of those individual cases of worry and anxiety with which every Missionary has to contend, there is nothing but that which is encouraging to report from this Mission."

"The Parish Guild, formed at the close of the Parochial Mission in October, 1878, has passed through another winter of successful work. A special feature in its usefulness last winter was the dissemination of Church literature."

"The Sunday Schools are steadily progressing. That in connection with the Parish Church, under the superintendence of Mr. Kilburn, is doing an excellent work. Through the exertions of the children a new library has been added during the winter. Another Sunday School is also being carried on at Bellville, during the summer months, in charge of Mr. Edwin Kinney."

"The Most Reverend the Metropolitan visited this Parish on the 14th of June, and confirmed 22 candidates, and as many names were added to the roll of communicants, which has now reached 185."

"The Rectory and outbuildings have been repaired and painted this year, and a new well sunk at considerable cost, while a neat board fence has been placed around the Burial Ground at St. Paul's Church."

"No special contributions have been made towards the D. C. S. deficiency, but allow me to remind the Society that this Parish has steadily increased its ordinary contributions at the rate of \$85 in four years, or \$21.25 a year. This year we shall give \$190 for the General Purposes of the Society."

ROTHERSAY.—Rev. Canon Partridge writes that the weekly envelope system was adopted in this Parish at the beginning of the year, and with very good prospects of furnishing ample means for supplying the financial needs of the Parish. He would recommend its universal adoption.

Probable contributions \$250.

SACKVILLE.—Mr. J. F. Allison reports contributions to the amount of \$64.72.

ST. ANDREWS AND CHAMCOOK.—Mr. Geo. D. Street reports contributions, from St. Andrews \$263.16, from Chamcook \$77.92; total for General Purposes \$341.08.

ST. DAVID.—Rev. J. W. Millidge reports contributions to the amount of \$94.05, of which \$2 is limited to the W. and O. Fund. He writes as follows :

"We have had much to be thankful for during the past year in this Mission. A deeper interest taken in religion; larger congregations everywhere, except at the Parish Church of St. David, where, owing to its unfortunate position with regard to the residences of the Church people, large congregations can never be expected; increased contributions to the D. C. S., and a determination to maintain the Church in these Parishes, are some of the grounds we have for hoping that 'our labor is not in vain in the Lord.'

"A few of the more earnest Parishioners assembled one day this Spring and soon replaced the decayed and tumble-down fence about St. David's Church by a neat and permanent one.

"The people of St. Patrick's have been aroused to the necessity of repairing their Church, and the work is now proceeding. These repairs could no longer, with safety, be postponed; the roof of the Church was becoming quite leaky, and the plaster was falling from the ceiling. The exodus of the young still continues; employment, other than agricultural, is very scarce; but those who leave us would willingly return were there any prospect of earning a living. The past winter was exceptionally fine. The services at the Stations were well attended, and but one was missed, through impassable roads."

ST. GEORGE AND PENNFIELD.—Rev. Ranald E. Smith has sent the following Report :

"Hard times yet! Very little doing in lumber; granite not much better. People leaving the place for want of employment, fully fifty persons, mostly young men, have left within the last month. We hope that the darkest time has come; even now, we begin to see a little *day-light!* The Church has had a hard struggle, during the lengthened depression. If our numbers have decreased through emigration, the zeal of the Church people is on the increase. We have hearty services in both my Churches. Out of thirty baptisms, four were adults, who had hailed from another denomination. The increase of communicants is more than counterbalanced by removals and deaths."

"As a sample of my Sunday work, on the 6th Inst. I held three services, celebrated Holy Communion, also Communion of the Sick, and attended a funeral. On the 13th held three services, and paid two sick visits."

"I have not yet collected for our Society, as the time rather conflicts with that for the Rector's salary. We will do our best, as we always do, for the D. C. S., and hope to obtain from \$100 to \$150."

ST. JOHN (TRINITY).—Mr. Charles Campbell, as Secretary of this Committee, reports contributions to the amount of \$725.30.

ST. MARK.—Mr. Chas. A. McDonald, Secretary of this Local Committee, reports contributions for General Purposes \$400.90, \$116.20 to W. and O. Fund, and \$103 to the special W. and O. Fund, in all \$620.02.

ST. MARTINS.—Rev. J. Roy Campbell reports contributions to the W. and O. Fund \$2, for General Purposes \$62.80, total \$64.80. He writes as follows:

"I herewith send the list of the names of subscribers in this Parish to the General Purposes Fund of the Society, from which you will see that, in view of the Society's need, nearly every person has increased his or her subscription, the amount being almost double what it was last year; and we earnestly hope that we are only one of many Parishes which will gladden the heart of the new Treasurer in the same way. I may say that in addition to this, at a meeting held in Saint Martins, on behalf of the Deficiency Fund, the offertory amounted to upwards of \$18.

"The Parochial work for the year past shows a further clearing off of a second moiety of the debt on the Parsonage, amounting to \$266, leaving in our hands a manageable balance of indebtedness. I may here say that the money paid during the past year by the people of this Parish, towards Church objects of all kinds, amounts to upwards of seven hundred dollars.

"We are looking forward to a visitation from his Lordship after the meeting of Synod and Church Society, when we hope to present between thirty and forty persons for confirmation."

ST. MARY'S.—Rev. William Jaffrey has inclosed the following Report:

"The Missionary at St. Mary's writes cheerfully of the good and godly lives of his people, their unanimity and other signs of having profited by the Church's teaching; yet, he writes, 'I cannot make much show in financial matters, owing to the inability of my Parishioners to do much in the way of giving.'

"His people are still engaged in fitting up their Church, trying to render it, and everything therein, worthy their great Master.

"During the year they have been enabled to thank the Metropolitan for a very handsome stained glass window. They are also indebted to Miss E. Scovill's exertions for a large amount of donations collected, also a donation from herself of over \$25, all of which have been judiciously expended in rendering the building comfortable for divine worship.

"The Missionary is, however, sorry to say that these many calls upon his Parishioners have prevented their coming quite up to the requirements of the Society in raising their portion of his salary.

"The donations and limitations towards the general funds of the

Society will be at least twenty-five per cent. more than last year, say \$50, besides nearly \$50 towards the Deficiency Fund."

ST. STEPHEN.—Rev. Joseph Rushton reports \$50 for General Purposes, and hopes to receive further contributions.

ST. JAMES.—Rev. W. Armstrong writes:

"I much regret that the enclosed statement should not be more than \$75. It is one half more than the amount for last year. The depression of business is still such that it is very difficult to collect money, and but few of my Parishioners are able to give beyond a small amount."

ST. PAUL.—Rev. Canon DeVeber reports contributions for General Purposes \$567.71, Deficiency Fund \$186.50, W. and O. Fund \$67.40—\$821.61. Collection at Anniversary Services at St. Paul's Church \$37.66.

SHEDIAC.—Rev. G. S. Jarvis, D. D., reports contributions to the amount of \$68.42.

SIMONDS.—Rev. G. Schofield reports contributions as follows: B. H. Missions \$200, D. C. S. \$50.43, S. P. G. \$3, Deficiency Fund \$34—total \$287.43.

SPRINGFIELD.—Rev. J. H. Talbot reports contributions to the amount of \$125.50.

STANLEY.—Rev. W. O. Raymond writes as follows:

"In making this, my second Report from the recently established Mission of Stanley and Tay Creek, I am happy to say that, with some few exceptions, the progress of the Church during the past year has been highly satisfactory.

"The new Church, commenced in May, 1879, was completed in November following, at a cost of \$2,200. Much interest, amounting at times to enthusiasm, was manifested by our good people during its erection. I may here remark that we have received a considerable amount of kindly assistance from our brethren of other denominations, for which they have our sincere thanks. Owing to various causes, notably the unfavourable state of the roads, the Church was not consecrated by the Bishop till January 7th, of the present year. A full account of the consecration service, which was most hearty, and gave delight to us all, has appeared in the columns of the press, and consequently it is scarcely necessary to make more than a passing allusion to the event in this Report. We are, all very thankful to have succeeded so well in the building of the Church, and trust

shortly to see it provided with a bell and some chancel furniture, which are the only things wanting to render it complete. To all our friends who have helped us we tender our hearty thanks; to the Lord Bishop for the very beautiful East window, and a generous subscription of \$50 additional; to the S. P. C. K. for a grant of £50 stg.; to the Ladies of the Cathedral Choir, and their friends, for some beautiful kneeling mats, provided through the kindness of Mrs. Medley; and last, but not least, to Colonel Raymond, of Woodstock, for his kindly direction and supervision of the work from beginning to end.

"We are now busily engaged in the erection of a Parsonage, which will, in all probability, be completed and occupied the present autumn. It will be a very neat and comfortable building, situated in the immediate neighbourhood of the Church, and finished in a style to correspond with it. The people seem to be quite as much in earnest as ever, and I confidently hope that the Parish will, in the next twelve months, be furnished with all the necessary externals for good and satisfactory work.

"Considering the special efforts which are being put forth at the present time, the financial state of the Mission is encouraging, and I trust we shall be able to assume our fair portion of the burden placed upon the Diocese by the deficiency in the funds of the Church Society. The field of labour here is so wide I can only wonder how the Church managed to exist under the old arrangement, when the Mission was served by the clergymen of the Parishes of Douglas and St. Mary's. My own health has sufficiently improved to admit of a fair amount of labour, though my duties cannot, of course, compare with some of our 'iron clad' missionaries. Besides services at St. Thomas Church, Stanley, and St. James Church, Tay Creek, I hold services at Maple Grove, Williamsburg, Ward Settlement, Semple Settlement, and Woodlands; my Sunday duty consisting of three services and a drive of about twenty miles.

"In winter the arrangement of services will be somewhat different, owing to the fact that three-fourths of the men are then absent in the woods lumbering. If my own health admits I intend spending quite a portion of my time, the coming winter, visiting the many camps that dot the Nashwaak and South West Miramichi.

"I have recently established a Bible Class which has thus far been very well attended. I am glad to say the Sunday Schools are in quite an efficient state, and the attendance is increasing.

"Contributions for General Purposes \$40; Deficiency Fund \$7."

SUSSEX.—Rev. Canon Medley writes as follows:

"Last year I regret to say my list of subscriptions arrived too late for the Report, the reason for which was my anxiety to make the total as large as possible. Despite my hopes the returns from the Mission shewed a great falling off. There were many reasons for this, which I need not mention; but I trust the D. C. S. will not attribute it to laziness on the part of the Missionary, or want of interest on the part of the people. This year I trust our returns in

money will come up again, and perhaps overrun the efforts of former years. The Society will bear in mind the fact that although Sussex is every year becoming a more busy place, and more fitted as a centre of work, nearly all the new-comers are sectarians. That whereas thirteen years ago I was the only resident preacher-man, there are now six besides myself, and there is another, a tailor by trade, who makes it his special business to ply the Plymouth tracts, with a view to counteract the errors of my teaching. This squadron of opposition to the work of the Church necessarily makes my burden heavier, but I am thankful to say that the average attendance at the services is steadily increasing, and the communicants' roll has reached 150. *Laus Deo.*

"The Metropolitan, our Bishop, lately confirmed 36 in the Mission, four of whom by request came from the Mission of Waterford; and all of these, with the exception of four, whom I hope soon to receive, have become communicants. There is a marked interest shown by the lambs of the flock. Our Sunday Schools have more life in them. Teachers and scholars seem to like their Sunday work better every week, and a new class of young men has sprung up under the able guidance and training of Mr. O. B. Arnold, for whose help I am very grateful. Last Sunday two little girls brought me one dollar each for D. C. S. Deficiency, the proceeds of the sale of flowers on the trains, and I hear there is a little lad who is driving passengers from the trains for the same object. These little things plainly show a growing desire to work for the Church, and the sheep will not, I am sure, be behind the lambs. Our list of subscriptions to D. C. S. is being made up by volunteers among the ladies; a special Committee of whom take charge of the envelope system for our home wants. You shall hear, as soon as possible, what Sussex can do this year."

UPHAM.—Rev. S. Jones Hanford reports that the contributions amount to \$135.40, of which \$12.50 are for the Deficiency Fund.

WATERFORD.—Rev. John Lockward has remitted to the Treasurer the sum of \$29.55, and he incloses the following Report:

"I have not omitted a Sunday service during the year in the Parish of Waterford, which is the most important part of the Mission. I find that an average of 50 has been attained in 26 Sunday services, which is an increase of three on the average of last year. During last Lent I had a service on Wednesday evenings, when the attendance varied from 45 to 60, perhaps not too small an attendance for a purely country Parish at that time of the year. The behaviour of the congregation is certainly of the most orderly kind, and has repeatedly been remarked upon by strangers. On the 27th of July last I started a Sunday School in the Parish of Waterford, which only lasted till a late time in the Fall, and was of a very un-

pretending character. We are now about to repeat the attempt. On St. Matthew's Day last, the Bishop of the Diocese held a Confirmation in the Parish Church, when 12 were confirmed, 11 of whom received the Holy Communion on the same day. On account of fatal cases of diphtheria having taken place in their family four of the candidates were not present, these have since been confirmed at Sussex. Last year I returned the number of communicants as 30 in the whole Mission, I find the number on the roll now to be 45, whilst one has died and one withdrawn.

I can report but little in the way of Church building or repairing. The shell of the Church at Mechanics remains as Mr. Talbot left it, save and except the injury done by the weather. The people of Waterford have re-shingled one side of the roof of their Church, and have collected material to put a new fence around the graveyard.

I have had the required semi-annual collections in each Church and Station in my Mission, the sum total of such collections amounting to \$675, as against \$11.41 of last year. Last year, however, I did not comply with the rule requiring a general collection to be made for the General Purposes Fund of the Society, which omission I have corrected this year, and am able to report the sum of \$22.80 as the amount of said collection. This will make the amount raised in the Mission for the D. C. S. during the past year, \$29.55, as against \$18.91 returned last year.

In conclusion I must report that the future of the Mission of Waterford, as at present arranged, is not of a very hopeful character, whilst the work of the Church grows perceptibly in the Parish of Waterford. Under the present arrangement of the Mission I cannot have Sunday services oftener than once every alternate Sunday in the Parish Church of Waterford. A strong desire is now expressed to have a service there every Sunday, and, as far as I know to the contrary, the congregation worshipping there are prepared to raise \$150 of any amount assessed on the Mission of Waterford, however arranged, if so be they can have a service in their Church every Sunday. I may say that \$80 was held to be their proportion of the amount assessed on the Mission as now arranged. I have great hope that the Board of Home Missions will be able to meet this desire of the Parishioners of Waterford, and for this purpose I will report to them at an early date.

WELDFORD.—Rev. W. B. Armstrong writes as follows.

"During the past year I have removed from Richibucto to Weldford Station, on the Intercolonial, which is at one extreme end of the Parish. A considerable distance in the driving is thus effected, as the distance to the centre of the Parish is nine miles instead of twenty-one as formerly. The move was made in the early part of the present year. Nearly all my effects were taken up by my Parishioners, a distance of 27 miles, which was a great saving of expense, and, as an expression of their kindly interest, was duly appreciated by myself.

"As the Parish Church, which is now more than 40 years old, is very much in want of repairs, we have been at work all winter in preparation for a Bazaar, or Church Sale, to be held in July next. Two Sewing Circles have been at work since last autumn, and a good deal of interest has been awakened in the cause. The spirit and determination of the lady workers of the congregation is especially to be commended. After the Church has been thoroughly restored, the question of a Parsonage has to be taken up, as a clergyman should live in and amongst his flock, and not in one extreme end of his Parish. He can thus take that active and personal interest in their affairs, both temporal and spiritual, which is essential to the true relationship of pastor and people.

"As the Parish of Kingston is no longer united with Weldford, but is joined to that of Richibucto as formerly, our subscriptions to the Society will suffer to that amount. On this account, as well as of the extra exertions for the restoring of the Parish Church, our collections will not amount to more than \$36.

WESTFIELD.—Rev. A. V. Wiggins reports contributions amounting to \$95.32. Fifty mission boxes have been taken by the children in the Parish.

WICKLOW.—Rev. J. E. Flewelling writes as follows :

"I have much pleasure in reporting an increased interest in Church work in this Mission during the past year.

"Thanks to Mr. Shaw, 48 copies of the *Guardian* are given by my people. Thanks to the ladies, the amount contributed towards funds of D. C. S. has increased from \$30 to \$84; \$40 of this amount are for Deficiency Fund.

"The Bishop visited this Mission on St. Barnabas' Day and confirmed ten persons, two being from the Mission of Aberdeen.

"A piece of ground, presented to the Church for a burying ground for the Parish of Simonds, was consecrated on p. m. of same day."

WESTMORELAND.—Rev. D. M. Bliss regrets his inability to forward, at present, any contributions to the Society. The erection of a new Church, which he desires to finish without asking aid outside the Parish, absorbs all the means of his Parishioners. Mr. Bliss is happy to say, the Sunday School is large, and the congregations are good at both the Churches.

WOODSROCK.—Rev. Thomas Neales reports contributions to General Purposes \$84.13, Deficiency Fund \$111.83, and he writes as follows:

"The year past in our Parish has been one of special interest.

Our attempt at self-support has proved most successful, owing to the zealous efforts and liberality of many members of the Church. Financially the Parish is in a better condition than it was a year ago. In addition to the many other calls for Church support, the Parishioners have subscribed about \$3000 towards the erection of a new Church to replace St. Luke's. This is a work which will tax all our self-denial and zeal before it is finally accomplished. The congregation at Jacksonville, by no means numerous, have been doing nobly. The new St. Peter's Church is framed and boarded in, standing on a good stone foundation. The work has been done and the expense borne almost entirely by the people themselves.

"The Rev. A. V. Wiggins, now in charge of Westfield, rendered much valuable assistance in the Parish from August until Trinity Sunday last, during which time he was preparing for Holy Orders. His work was especially effective at Jacksonville.

"On June 18th, a Confirmation was held in the Parish by the Most Reverend the Metropolitan, when thirty-nine candidates were presented for the Apostolic Rite. The day was one of great interest and joy to us.

"In September last a Parochial Mission, lasting through eight days, was held, conducted by the Rev. Canon Partridge. It was a work which absorbed the interest of not only all Church people, but of numbers outside our communion. The results have been such as to afford great encouragement to all associated in the special effort to awaken new life in the Church. It has tended to a more real appreciation of their privileges on the part of the members of the Church, more definiteness of purpose in their use, and a more hearty willingness to perform each his own duty. Since my last Report to the Society not less than forty names have been added to the list of communicants."

From the foregoing abstracts the members of the Society may rest assured that, at no previous period, has the great work they have undertaken been more fully carried on than during the past year. In addition to the constant and often excessive labor on the part of many of the clergy, there must have been added much anxiety regarding their means of support. This the Society, as far as possible, should relieve. Churchmen in the various Parishes must do their part, mindful of that which on the subject the Lord Himself hath ordained.

An especial blessing from above must be acknowledged. In a year of continued financial depression, large additional

offerings have been made for the maintenance and extension of the Kingdom of God. With renewed prosperity, many more of the Parishes now on the Society's list may cease to require its aid, others will readily agree to a reduction in their allowance, and earnest work will result in increased annual subscriptions. Members of the Church, to whom God has given ample means, will find it a joy to devote a good portion, during life or after death, to the Missionary fund. In years to come those who have entered into our labors may look back to the present period, as a time marked, indeed, at first, by depression and anxiety, but, after all, a turning point, directing to a brighter future.

From previous statements in the Annual Reports of this Society there will be found brief notices with reference to those of the clergy who have finished their course. The Church would not consign to forgetfulness those who have taken part in her work. Good reason has the Society and the Church in this Diocese to regret the early death of two of the clergy during the past year. The Rev. Charles G. Coster, Ph. D., though not engaged in parochial work, held, for many years, a prominent and more useful position in connection with the higher class of education. Whenever other engagements permitted, Dr. Coster was ever ready to afford valuable assistance to his brethren, and to do all he could for the Church he loved. Possessed naturally of high gifts, he was a diligent student and an accomplished scholar, while his undeviating courtesy and kindness of heart endeared him to his pupils, and to those with whom he came officially in contact, and more especially to his most intimate friends.

After a brief illness, our Heavenly Father has been pleased to call away, also, in comparatively early years, the Rev. E. S. Woodman, late Rector of Westfield. Mr. Woodman

passed his time and did his work mostly in the important duties of a country Parish, beyond the notice of the world. In that work he was most sincere and earnestly devoted—firm and zealous, yet most humble-minded. His was a course of life of which more note is taken in heaven than on earth, and yet it was a life which endeared him much to those to whom he was called to minister.

From previous statements in the Annual Reports of this Society there will be found brief notices with reference to those of the clergy who have finished their course. The Church would not consign to forgetfulness those who have tak a part in her work. Good reason has the Society and the Church in this Diocese to regret the early death of two of the clergy during the past year. The Rev. Charles G. Coater, B. D., though not engaged in practical work, held for many years a prominent and more useful position in connection with the higher class of education. Whenever other engagements permitted, Dr. Coater was ever ready to afford valuable assistance to his brethren, and to do all he could for the Church he loved. Possessed naturally of high gifts, he was a diligent student and an accomplished scholar, while his unobtrusive courtesy and kindness of heart endeared him to his pupils, and to those with whom he came officially in contact, and more especially to his most intimate friends.

Mr. Fairweather read the report of the Auditors, and, on motion of Mr. G. A. Schofield, it was resolved that the reports now read be received, and that of the Auditors be entered upon the Minutes.

AUDITOR'S REPORT.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Fredericton and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Auditors of the Society beg to report that the Treasurer for the past year has submitted to them the following accounts, all made up to the 1st May last:

No. 1. *General Purposes*—Shewing a balance against the Society of \$5,787.43. This debt, which seems to have arisen principally from the falling off of the voluntary subscriptions to the Society, and the increased demands upon its funds from all the Missions in the Diocese being filled during the year, is chiefly due to the other funds held by the Society, as will be seen by the accounts.

No. 2. *Missions*.—Shewing balance at the credit of the account of of \$30. The receipts in this account exceed those of last year by nearly \$2000.

No. 3. *Interest*.—The receipts in this account were \$2,276.80, being \$527 more than last year. The apparent increase arises from the Douglas mortgage, which was foreclosed during the year, the property bought in by the Society, and the arrears of interest capitalized.

No. 4. *Miss Hazen Trust*.—The balance of this account—respects income and rents—\$399.56, is carried to General Purposes Account. The balance of \$200, carried down, is an amount received on account of a sale of real estate belonging to the Trust. The arrears of rent due this Trust are still very large, and, if they can be got in, will considerably reduce the balance against General Purposes Account.

No. 5. *Chipman Trust*.—The full amount of interest due this Trust has been got in, and carried to General Purposes Account.

No. 6. *O. Morris Trust*.—This is a new account. For want of suitable investments the funds lay for a great part of the year at five per cent. interest at the Bank of New Brunswick, and were not fully invested until late in the year. The amount carried to General Purposes Account was \$22.54. Next year this fund should yield \$234.

No. 7. *S. Sewell Trust*.—Last year there was a small balance against this Trust. This year it is the other way and the sum of \$180.21 has been carried to General Purposes Account.

No. 8. *Deficiency Fund*.—This fund has arisen out of the deficiency of the present year, and the sum of \$202 was received by the Treasurer before closing his account, and carried to General Purposes Account.

No. 9. *Widows' and Orphans' Fund*.—Out of the receipts for the year \$1100 has been added to principal, making the principal of the Fund \$13,600, the balance at credit of the Fund is \$13.58.

No. 10. *Widows' and Orphans' Special*.—The amount at the credit of this fund is \$162.10, which was subscribed for a special purpose, and has not been disposed of.

No. 11. *Education and Aged Clergy Fund*.—\$100 has been added to principal, leaving a balance of \$9.19 at the credit of the fund.

No. 12. *Divinity Scholarship Fund*.—There is a balance at the credit of this fund of \$63.84, after an appropriation paid of \$60.

No. 13. *Incapacitated and Aged Clergy*.—The balance at the credit of this fund is \$533.75.

No. 14. *Glebe Lands Trust*.—There is a balance at the credit of this fund of \$63.25, which should be carried to General Purposes Account, if it may be so appropriated.

No. 15. *Richbuckto Trust*.—The whole of the proceeds of this Trust, \$135.80, have been paid over to the Rector of the Parish.

No. 16. *St. Peter's Derby Trust*.—The proceeds of this Trust, \$36, have also been paid over to the Rector of that Parish.

No. 17. *Investments' Account*.—This account being moneys held for investment shews that, during the year, the sum of \$7,367 was invested; the balance, \$4,866.65, has been temporarily used by the General Purposes Account.

No. 18. *The Treasurer's General Account* shews a balance in his favor of \$344.47. This amount was due to the Bank of New Brunswick at the close of the late Treasurer's account, but has since been paid off, as the Auditors understand, from funds received by the new Treasurer, Mr. Schofield.

No. 19. *Assets*.—This account shows the aggregate of the several Funds and Trusts held by the Society amounting, in the whole, to the sum of \$106,766.68.

The Auditors have carefully examined all these Accounts in detail, with the several schedules attached, and the vouchers for payments, and have found the same entirely satisfactory and correct. They have also examined all the Debentures and Securities held by the Society, and found them correct; and the same have been all handed over to the new Treasurer, Mr. Samuel Schofield, who is now, the Auditors believe, in full charge of all the assets of the Society.

Mr. G. A. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, presented a Report, which he read, and on his motion it was resolved that the same be received and referred to the Board to be elected at this meeting.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HOME MISSIONS.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Board of Home Missions submit the following Report:

During the past year the following alterations have been made in the grants adopted by the General Committee last July:

WELDFORD.—The grant has been increased \$40, and the amount required has been reduced \$100. This change was necessitated by the re-arrangement of the Mission whereby Kingston was separated from Weldford and united to Richibucto. The Mission of Weldford is now in charge of a resident Missionary, and includes Weldford Station, where regular services are given which are much valued.

SPRINGFIELD.—The Parish of Johnston has been separated from Springfield chiefly on account of its having fallen largely in arrears. Norton Station is now included in this Mission; regular services are held there, and a small Church will be built this summer. The amount required from the Mission has been reduced \$40, and the grant continued as before.

NEW DENMARK.—The greatly increased work required from the Missionary here seemed to make it necessary that he should be enabled to give his whole time to the work of the ministry. In order that this might be done the grant was increased \$200. The total stipend now is \$600.

WATERFORD.—The grant to this Mission has been increased \$20, in order to secure the residence of the Missionary within the Mission, and regular services every week at Dutch Valley.

DIVINITY SCHOLARSHIP FUND.—A grant of \$60 from the income of this Fund has been paid to Mr. James Cowie, subject to the rules which govern the Fund.

PARSONAGE HOUSES.—A grant of \$100 upon the usual conditions has been made to the Rector and Church Wardens of St. Mary's Church, Dalhousie, for the Parsonage House in the Mission of Restigouche.

DEPUTATION VISITS.—During the year a deputation from the Board visited Shediak, at the request of the Rector of St. Andrews Church, in consequence of the Mission not having made up the contribution required by the Society. The Board are glad to report that the amount has since been paid.

APPLICATIONS FOR NEW GRANTS.—An application has been made to the Board for a grant in aid of a new Mission at Bay Verte. This application was recommended by the Rector of Westmoreland and the Rev. Canon Townshend, Rector of Amherst. It had the approval of the Bishop and the Board, but in the present state of the funds of the Society it was not deemed advisable to undertake the work this year. For the same reason the Board were unable to entertain an application for a grant to a new Mission in the Parish of Wakefield.

WEEKLY OFFERINGS.—In order to carry out the recommendation made last year that "wherever practicable weekly offerings should be substituted for the yearly subscription list," the Board have issued a circular upon the subject, and had the same printed in the Society's Report for last year. They are glad to report that several Missions have adopted the plan with most satisfactory results, and they would again recommend it to those Missions where it is not yet in use.

GLEBE LANDS.—The Board regret to find that in several cases where Glebe Lands have been sold the proceeds have not been invested as the law requires, either in public securities or mortgage on real estate. In some instances these funds have been loaned on personal security only. The Board feel it a duty to direct attention to this, as they believe it to be a very unwise proceeding. It should be remembered that Church Wardens and Vestrymen being in the position of Trustees of these funds are personally liable for any loss arising from neglect or mismanagement.

ESTIMATE OF INCOME AND EXPENDITURE FOR NEXT YEAR.—Reference to the Report of 1879 will shew that last July there was a deficiency of \$2,088. This has been increased during the past year to \$5,800. This arises from three causes—the large reduction in the amount of voluntary subscriptions, which were \$1,300 less than the estimate; the reduction in the S. P. G. grant; and the fact that, for the first time in many years, every grant made by the Society has been used; every Mission being supplied. In making up the schedule for the next year the Board have worked upon two principles. First, to deal with the present deficiency as a matter separate from the regular work of the year; second, to bring the expenditure for the year within the income. With respect to the deficiency, the Lord Bishop issued a Pastoral Letter some weeks ago, at the request of the Board, stating the position of the funds, and asking that united and hearty effort be made to raise the sum required. The Board believe that this appeal will not be unavailing, and they hope that the whole amount will be paid during the present year. With respect to the expenditure for next year, the Board trust that whatever alterations the General Committee may deem it wise to make they

will not depart from the principle upon which the schedule has been framed, but will insist that the total of grants shall not exceed the estimate of income.

The estimate of income and expenditure, with the schedule of grants recommended for next year, and the returns, correspondence and minutes of business transacted by the Board during the past year, accompany this report.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE TO INTEREST SUNDAY SCHOOLS IN WORK OF HOME MISSIONS.

To the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop and the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society:

The Committee appointed to interest Sunday Schools in the work of Home Missions, beg to report that soon after their appointment they issued a circular to all the Clergy of the Diocese, stating the methods that had been suggested in order to attain the object for which they had been appointed, and asking, if these were approved, that all would co-operate in the work.

Having procured the sanction of the Executive Committee your Committee then ordered 700 Mission Boxes for distribution in the Diocese. A label with suitable texts was procured for the front of the boxes, and a plain label for the back, with number and place for name; a label for the cover has since been procured, and is now

ready for distribution. 726 of these Boxes are now distributed in the Diocese, and a list is attached to this report shewing how many and what particular numbers are in each Mission. The cost of these Boxes is \$38.20 for 700. The cost of labels, &c., is \$12 for 3000. These charges will be deducted from the first returns, and the balance credited to the General Purposes of the Society.

The Committee have not printed any Leaflets as yet, but they have two papers on hand ready for use, one written by the Missionary in Restigouche, and one by the Missionary in New Denmark. The Committee recommend that the first Leaflet be issued in August, so that it may contain an acknowledgment of all monies received to that time.

Now that the project is fairly started, the Committee recommend that its management be entrusted to a Committee, not exceeding five, to be appointed annually by the General Committee.

Great interest has already been manifested by the children in the work, and, if well looked after, the Committee believe much permanent good will result, not only from the monies that will be collected, but from the interest that will be awakened in the affairs of the Diocesan Church Society and the Home Mission work of the Church.

SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE GOSPEL IN
FOREIGN PARTS, 19 DELAHAY ST., WESTMINSTER,
29th May, 1880.

MY LORD:

1. I have the honour to inform you that at the meeting of the Society, held on May 21st, the sum of £2,020 (two thousand and twenty pounds) being a reduction of £100, was made to the Diocese of Fredericton for the year 1881. The terms under which this grant is made are, that it be administered by the Bishop, in conjunction with the Diocesan Synod or Committee, in accordance with the Society's Bye-Laws and Regulations; and be also charged with any claims for pensions which may arise in the year and be admitted by the Society; and with any expense for the passage of Missionaries from this country to your Diocese, which may be incurred here, in accordance with the Regulations; and with any other expense strictly appropriate to the Diocese and sanctioned by the Society. A copy of the Society's Regulations is sent herewith, for the guidance of your Lordship and Diocesan Synod or Committee in administering the grant.

In the above grant, £2,020, is included the sum of £120 (one hundred and twenty pounds) for six Divinity Exhibitions at King's College (three of £25 each and three of £15 each).

Resolutions.—(1). "That some of the Colonial Missions, which have for a long period received, and still receive, support from the Society, should be required to depend on local resources; and where a Mission of many years' standing is still inadequate to the support of a resident clergyman, it should be annexed to a neighbouring Mission, and receive periodical visits from a neighbouring clergyman. In adopting this plan the difficulty arises of fixing a definite term of years which, without unfairness, shall be applicable to various Missions whose circumstances are not identical. Twelve years ago the Society (Regulation 46) laid down nine years as the time, during which it might contribute towards the support of a clergyman in a Colonial Mission; and if this rule were to be strictly enforced it would doubtless have the effect of setting at liberty a considerable sum annually to meet the new wants of like Foreign Churches. It is, therefore, submitted that the Colonial Bishops, in whose Dioceses such Missions exist, should be requested to relieve the funds of the Society from further charge in respect of such Missions."

It is the earnest wish of the Society to exercise whatever influence it possesses in fostering a missionary spirit among all our brethren, and in engaging their sympathy specially with that world-wide work among the heathen, to which our branch of the Church seems to be

providentially called. The Committee, therefore, hope that "in every Christian congregation which derives help from the Society an annual sermon will be preached on the work of the Society, and a collection be made in its aid." In the larger Colonial towns I would venture to suggest that a public meeting, held in the interests of the Society under your Lordship's Presidency, would be a gratifying acknowledgment of help rendered by the Society, and would benefit those who were induced to attend it. I would further ask you to let me hear, before the end of this year, of any contributions from your Diocese which should be printed in the Society's Annual List.

I would call your Lordship's attention to the provisions of the Colonial Clergy Act of 1874 (37 and 38 Viet., c. 77). Many clergymen have come home in entire ignorance of the necessity of complying with the provisions of this Act before they can be at liberty to officiate, even once, in this country. Some have even come unprovided with their Letters of Orders. They should, in all cases, bring these documents with them, together with letters commendatory from their Diocese, and produce them to the Archbishop's Secretary on their arrival.

On motion of Mr. G. A. Schofield the following change was made in the rules for the management of the incapacitated and aged clergy fund, substituting the words "four hundred" in place of the words "two hundred" in Sec. 4. This alteration has received the approval of the Lord Bishop.

On motion of Mr. Schofield, it was resolved that the Treasurer be authorized to pay to the Rev. Thomas Hartin a pension of \$400 for the present year—\$300 of that sum to be paid out of the income of the fund for a "provision for clergymen who may be incapacitated by age or infirmity"—subject to the rules of that fund, and the \$100 to be paid out of the fund for General Purposes.

On motion of Mr. Jarvis the following amendment was made in the Constitution of the Society, which has been approved by the Lord Bishop:

The present Sec. 7, of Art. 3, is cancelled, and the following substituted therefor, such cancelling and substitutions not to interfere with the present incapacitated clergy fund, which is henceforth to be held under Sec. 7, as now adopted.

7. The creation of a fund towards making a provision for such clergymen as may be incapacitated by age or infirmity.

Mr. I. Allen Jack moved the following resolution, which was allowed to stand over for future consideration:

That the proceeds of sale of the Glebe or Tract in the Parish of Addington, in the County of Restigouche, be loaned, under direction of the Executive Committee, to the Restigouche Mission, for a period not exceeding five years, at — per centum per annum, upon such security, real or personal, or both combined, as the Mission can reasonably furnish; the loan to be repaid in the event of a Church Corporation being established in the Parish of Addington.

Moved by Mr. T. B. Robinson, seconded by the Rev. J. H. Talbot:

That, in the present financial condition of the Society, it is desirable that the office of Secretary be an honorary one, and that all necessary expenses incurred by him in the discharge of his duties be paid out of the contingent fund.

This motion was decided in the negative.

On motion of the Rev. Canon Partridge, it was resolved :

That this Committee wish to place on record an expression of the obligation which it owes to H. W. Frith, Esq., the late Treasurer of the Society, for his services during the last twelve years; and, at the same time, to express the hope that he may be long spared to give the Church, in other spheres of duty, the advantage of his ripe and varied knowledge of the work of the Church in this Diocese.

On motion of the Secretary, seconded by the Rev. Canon Partridge, it was resolved that the best thanks of this Committee be tendered to the Rector and Church Wardens of Trinity Church for the use of their School-room for the late meetings; to Mr. R. T. Clinch for providing a Telephone for the use of the members, and to the gentlemen of the Press, and especially to the proprietor of the *Globe*, for the reports of the proceedings of this Committee.

**REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF
THE DIOCESAN CHURCH SOCIETY,
For the Year ending July, 1880.**

An abstract of the proceedings of this Committee, at a meeting held at Fredericton, on the 4th July, 1879, will be found in the 44th Report, p. 80—81.

The Committee met at St. John on the 1st October. Mr. T. Barclay Robinson, having resigned the office of Secretary of the W. and O. Fund, Mr. H. L. Sturdee was appointed in his place.

At the request of the Rev. Canon Brigstocke his name was withdrawn from the Committee on "Occasional Papers."

The report on the Special W. and O. Fund was considered, and it was resolved that a Committee be appointed to consult with the Lord Bishop with regard to the said fund, and to consider the same, to report at the next meeting of this Committee, and that the following gentlemen do compose the said Committee:

Mr. G. A. Schofield, Rev. G. M. Armstrong,
T. W. Daniel, " T. E. Dowling,
H. W. Frith.

It was moved by Mr. Sturdee that the amount of capital belonging to the W. and O. Fund now invested, or hereafter to be invested, be set apart from the general investments of the Society, to be held specially as trust money for the fund; this motion was decided in the negative.

Mr. Schofield, from the Finance Committee, submitted a report referring to the death of one of the Treasurer's bondsmen, and recommending certain security in place of that at present required; it was resolved that the security required from the Treasurer be fixed at \$4,000; the bond of the Treasurer to be given for that sum, and a like amount to be guaranteed either by some public Guarantee Company, or by Board of Sureties, or partly by each, as

may be approved by the Finance Committee, who shall have full power to deal with the matter.

A report, submitted by Mr. Schofield, from the Board of Home Missions, stating changes in the grants to certain Missions, and the renewal of the grant to the Divinity Scholar, was received.

An application of the Rev. H. N. Hansen, for aid in the education of his son, was referred to a special Committee, with power to deal with the case, the Committee consisting of Mr. G. A. Schofield, Rev. T. E. Dowling, Mr. W. M. Jarvis and Mr. T. B. Robinson.

Mr. T. Barclay Robinson was appointed Secretary of the Fund to aid in the Education of the Children of Clergymen.

The Treasurer submitted a statement of his account from 1st May to Sept. 30, showing a balance on hand of \$1,812.43.

An account of Messrs. McMillan, for printing the Annual Report, amounting to \$216, and of the Secretary for incidental expenses, amounting to \$10.45, were ordered to be paid.

The next meeting of this Committee was held at Fredericton on the 6th January, 1880.

A report of the sub-Committee on the Special W. and O. Fund was submitted, and it was resolved that it stand over for consideration at the next meeting of this Committee.

It was resolved that the Secretary of the W. and O. Fund be instructed to receive, within three months from this date, premiums and collections from those of the Clergy who have neglected to pay the same for the past two years, and on payment of the same to issue the usual receipt therefor, provided always, that this is not to be considered as a precedent.

It was also resolved that the Rev. W. S. Neales be permitted to continue his connection with the W. and O. Fund for the current year, on the usual conditions. It was further resolved that the Secretary of the W. and O. Fund be ordered to issue to the Rev. Canon DeVeber a certificate or policy in the W. and O. Fund, dating from the time when he first paid the premium, at the rate required for his age at that time, on condition that the annual collection of last year be made.

Read a quarterly statement of the account of the Treasurer.

Mr. I. Allen Jack, from the Glebe Lands Committee, submitted a report, which was received, and it was resolved that the suggestion contained therein be carried out.

Read a petition of the Rector and Church Wardens of the Parish of Dalhousie, with reference to the payment of the proceeds of sale of Glebe Lands in that vicinity. It was resolved that the prayer of the said petition be complied with, and that the amount referred to be paid to the Restigouche Mission, to the satisfaction of the Glebe Land Committee.

The Committee met in St. John on the 3rd of March, 1880.

The report of the Committee on the Special W. and O. Fund was considered, and it was resolved that the following Committee be appointed to receive subscriptions to be used in the payment of such premiums, as cannot be paid in any other way, and to report at each meeting of this Committee:—Messrs. J. F. Robertson, G. A. Schofield, H. W. Frith, R. T. Clinch, and W. M. Jarvis.

Mr. I. Allen Jack, from the Glebe Lands' Committee, reported the inability to dispose of the proceeds of certain Glebe Lands in the way proposed at the last meeting, which report was received and adopted.

A report from the Board of Home Missions was received.

The following Committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements for the next meetings of the Society in St. John :

The Treasurer submitted a Statement of his Account up to the 28th February.

An account of the Secretary for incidental expenses, amounting to \$9.77, was ordered to be paid, also an account of Messrs. McMillan, amounting to \$71.35, on the certificate of those by whom the orders were made, and that the Treasurer be requested to debit to the W. and O. Fund the charges made on account of that object.

The following motion was made by Mr. I. Allen Jack : That this

Committee recommend the Society to loan to the Restigouche Mission the proceeds of the sale of the Glebe or Tract in the Parish of Addington, upon the Mission giving a mortgage on the Church lands and property therein, or upon other security being given to the satisfaction of the Finance Committee, conditioned for the repayment of the amount loaned at the expiration of five years, and for the payment of interest thereon annually, with liberty to the Executive Committee, from time to time, to extend the term of repayment of the principal money until the establishment of a Church Corporation in the said Parish of Addington, and to remit to the Mission the annual payment of interest. This motion was decided in the negative by a division of 9 to 8.

The following resolution was adopted: That the Committee appointed to interest Sunday Schools in the work of Home Missions be authorized to procure 500 Missionary Boxes for distribution in the Schools throughout the Diocese.

The Lord Bishop read a note from Mr. H. W. Frith, tendering his resignation of the office of Treasurer; to take effect from the first of May next; whereupon it was resolved unanimously, that while this Committee accepts Mr. Frith's resignation with great regret, they cannot fail to express their high appreciation of the uniform kind attention and courtesy which have always marked the intercourse of Mr. Frith with the members of the Society, and of the care and strict integrity with which he has discharged the arduous duties of his office.

It was resolved unanimously that Mr. Samuel Schofield be the Treasurer of the Society from the 1st May next, and that before entering upon the duties of the office he shall furnish the securities required by this Committee, in conformity with a resolution of October, 1879.

The Committee met at Fredericton on the 2nd June, when the Secretary presented a report of its proceedings for the past year, which was received and ordered to be laid before the General Committee.

A statement of the Treasurer's account, up to the 1st May, was presented, shewing a balance over due of \$5,727.43.

Mr. Schofield presented the following report from the Book Depository Committee, and a statement of account to be submitted to the Auditors and published with the Treasurer's accounts :

REPORT OF THE BOOK DEPOSITORY COMMITTEE.

The Committee, to whom was entrusted the management of the Depository of the Society for Promoting Christian Knowledge, beg to submit their Annual Report and Accounts.

The sale of Books during 1879 was unusually large, amounting to \$1,490.34. There has been a marked reduction within the last twelve months. This year the sales only reach \$814.69. The discounts allowed to members and Sunday Schools were \$19.13. The net assets of 1880 amount to \$1,173.84, against \$1,065.55 in 1879.

The Stock is in excellent condition, the character, print and binding of books have improved, and the falling off in orders for Sunday School Library Books is owing to the general depression of business.

Owing to the increased duties on imported books an alteration in the prices of two classes of works has been made as follows:

Miscellaneous Publications at the rate of thirty cents on 1s. books.
Supplemental Catalogue Books at the rate of thirty-five cents on 1s. books.

All copies of the Holy Bible, Book of Common Prayer, and Church Services, remain unaltered in price.

Several copies of single volumes of the Society's New Commentary on the Holy Bible have been sold. The work is now completed in four Old Testament volumes, and two volumes of the New Testament. The price in cloth boards, red edges, to non-subscribers, is \$1.20 for each volume.

In presenting the Sixth Annual Report the attention of the General Committee of the Diocesan Church Society is drawn to the fact that the loan of eight hundred dollars in July, 1874, has not been allowed to remain idle. Among the "List of Foreign Committees" the following amounts are shown to have been remitted to the Parent Society in the Annual Reports from 1875 to 1878; no Report for the past year having been, as yet, received:

to be paid from the Glebe Land Fund, \$13.75. Messrs. J. & A. McMillan, printing and blank forms, \$57.30.

The following resolutions were adopted :

That 3,000 copies of the Annual Report be printed, and the Rev. G. G. Roberts, Messrs G. Sidney Smith, W. M. Jarvis, G. E. Fenety, T. Barclay Robinson, and the Secretary, be a Committee to attend to that duty.

That Messrs. W. M. Jarvis, H. W. Frith, G. A. Schofield, R. T. Clinch, W. Carman, G. E. Fenety, T. W. Daniel, H. L. Sturdee, and the Treasurer, do form the Finance Committee for the ensuing year.

That Mr. H. L. Sturdee be the Secretary for the Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the ensuing year.

That Messrs. I. Allen Jack, G. A. Schofield, Hurd Peters, G. Sidney Smith, W. M. Jarvis, H. L. Sturdee, and O. R. Arnold be the Glebe Lands Committee for the ensuing year, and that the condition of the Glebe Lands in Douglas Harbour be especially referred to this Committee.

That a Committee be appointed to prepare, at their discretion, through the ensuing year, an "occasional paper," containing a statement of such facts and information as may be deemed likely to further the interests of the Society, and report the same for the approval of the Executive Committee, and that the Revs. Canon Brigstocke, Canon Medley, T. E. Dowling, E. S. W. Pentreath, and Messrs. G. A. Schofield, and H. W. Frith, do compose the said Committee.

It was moved by Mr. I. Allen Jack, that the proceeds of the Addington Tract be paid to the Rev. J. S. H. Sweet for the use of the Restigouche Mission, upon his giving the joint and several bond of himself and Messrs. H. C. Barbarie, H. A. Johnston, Charles Murray and Frederick Loasby, for the return of the same, with interest, on the first day of June next, to which it was moved in amendment by Mr. Frith, and resolved that this matter be referred to the Finance Committee, with power to loan the fund to the Mission of Restigouche, if security can be furnished to the satisfaction of the Committee, and in compliance with the law.

Rev. H. H. Barber was, on motion, permitted to join the W. and O. Fund on payment of the proper premium and the further sum of \$1 in lieu of payment and collections in arrears.

The Secretary made a statement of the sum total of the contributions for the current year, amounting, as at present reported, in all to \$9,926.75.

At the suggestion of the Lord Bishop, and by a standing vote, the warmest thanks of the Committee were tendered to the different sub-Committees, who during the past year have so ably and so kindly attended to the various duties imposed upon them.

The item due Investments Account by General Purposes Account is merely a nominal asset. Inclusive of all this item, however, the assets of the Society fall short by \$1,504.17 of the whole amount of its Capital Liability and Indebtedness.

On adding these sums together there appears on 1st May, 1880 a Capital Deficiency and Indebtedness of \$5,870.82. This is a very considerable increase over the Capital Deficiency on 1st May, 1879.

The Society also holds the following Life Insurance Policies, presented in each case by the parties insured, who still pay the yearly premiums.

1. The Hon. Sir S. Leonard Tilley; Policy in Phoenix Mutual Life Insurance Company of Hartford, Connecticut, \$1,000.

APPENDIX C.

THE ENVELOPE SYSTEM.

"As one means of increasing the Contributions and lessening the difficulties of collection, the Board recommend that Weekly Offerings be substituted for yearly subscription, wherever practicable.

"The weekly offering, upon the Envelope System, has been found to work well in many parts of the Diocese where it has been tried during the past year."—*Extract from the Annual Report of the Board of Home Missions, 1879.*

The first step towards the adoption of this system in a Parish is to ascertain from all the members of the Congregation what sum they are willing to contribute at the weekly Offertory; and this being done—

1. Pledges will be received from the Parishioners for a fixed weekly sum, from one cent to one dollar and upwards, to be given in an envelope at the Service on each Sunday.

2. A package of envelopes will be given to each contributor, printed with blanks for name and amount of offering.

3. The Treasurer will enter the amount thus received each week, to the credit of each contributor, in a book to be kept exclusively for this purpose.

4. A stated meeting of the Vestry or Parishioners will be held quarterly; at which meeting the Treasurer will report all subscriptions in arrears, and at the close of the Parish year will also present all the last year's accounts of the Parish, which will then be audited and settled.

By the above plan, the following objects are sought to be accomplished:

1. That not only heads of families, but *all in the Parish*, old and young, who have any means and earnings of their own, may contribute, *according to their ability*, to the support of the Church.

2. That they may, as regularly as possible at the appointed time

bring their pledged weekly offering to Church, instead of paying it at the call of the Collector.

[NOTE.—The principle of the Envelope System is not interfered with when, as in exceptional cases, it may be convenient to contribute ONCE A fortnight, or at any other stated period within the quarter.]

3. That the Parish revenue may not fall into arrear, and Debt be incurred.

4. That the income of the Parish may be materially increased, so that, mainly from this source, sufficient provision may be made for the support of the Clergyman.

All these objects may be easily attained if the Church Wardens be willingly and efficiently sustained in their effort by those whose representatives they are.

The above plan is adopted, with some variations, in a number of Parishes in several Dioceses, and has been successful.

It is hoped that it may receive serious consideration in every Mission in the Diocese, and that it may be more generally adopted.
