FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS COLLECTED TO ASSIST RECRUITING IN TORONTO

Scarcely a Person Who Did Not Wear a Tag, and Thousands Were Out To See the Overseas Men Parade, As Well As To Hear Sir Sam Hughes Speak on Recruiting at Massey Hall.

TEN THOUSAND TROOPS MARCH IN BIG PARADE

Greatest Line-Up of Soldiers Ever Seen on Toronto Streets.

CIVILIANS PAY TRIBUTE Record-Breaking Crowds Applaud Overseas Forces on Line of March.

Bushiness was practically suspended in Toronto yesterday afternoon, because everybody was out to see the troops pass by. Fifty per cent. of Toronto's civilian population lined the eight miles of streets which composed the route and witnessed nearly all of Toronto's military population on the march.

Approximately 10,000 troops, swinging daily thru avenues of patriotic humanity, presented one of the greatest and most enthusiastic spectacles that have ever been seen in Toronto.

Even the schools were closed, and among that great assembly none exchanged a heartier welcome than did the boys and girls.

FEDS TO PLAY NEXT SEASON IN NEW YORK

Kansas City and Buffalo Forfeit Franchises—Federal League Officers.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 9.—Directors of the Federal League at their annual meeting here today definitely decided to invade New York in 1916. The Kansas City Club, whose franchise was declared forfeited, will be sent to New York and strengthened so that it "will merit the support of the New York fans."

After the meeting the majority of the club owners departed for French Lick, Ind., where it was reported they would meet representatives of organized baseball with view to settling the war between the Federals and organized baseball.

Those who attended the meeting and went to French Lick were: President Gilmore, Phil Ball, St. Louis; Edward Switzer, Pittsburgh; W. B. Robertson, Buffalo; and Carroll Rasm, Baltimore.

Ward and Charles Wesselman, Chicago, said they would go to Chicago tonight and Wesselman stated that he would join the other directors of the league at French Lick tomorrow.

Harry Sinclair, New York, was called to New York and there was much speculation as to whether the trip had something to do with the sale of one of the New York baseball clubs.

The Federals have "lost out" in their fight with organized baseball. In the opinion of Charles H. Ebbets, president of the Brooklyn National League team, as expressed on his arrival at French Lick, the only organized baseball club in the country is the Chicago Cubs.

"I can't see any reason why the National and American Leagues should consider peace talk with the Federals," said Ebbets.

"So far as I can see there is no chance of the Federals tying up with the minors, so I have reached the conclusion that eventually the Federals will have to go out of business."

A Detroit despatch says: Announcement was made today that George Moriarty, captain of the Detroit American League baseball team, had been given his unconditional release by F. J. Ryan, president of the local club.

Moriarty is now at his home in Woodstock, Ill. It is rumored he has received several offers to manage minor league clubs.

INDIANAPOLIS, Nov. 9.—Federal League franchises in Kansas City and Buffalo were declared forfeited at the annual meeting of the league directors held here today.

The Kansas City franchise will be taken to New York, according to a statement issued by James A. Gilmore, president of the league, at the close of the meeting.

What will be done with the Buffalo franchise was not indicated.

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KOCHER ONLY LEAF BY DRAFT ROUTE

National Association Announces the Annual Crop of Prospects Picked Up.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 9.—Many interesting details in connection with the professional baseball season of 1915 which, for many reasons, was non-productive of financial benefit to those most closely identified with the national game, were included in the annual report of Secretary John H. Farrell, which he presented at the annual meeting of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues here today.

A resume of the business transacted by the National Association during the year showed that forty minor league organizations, embracing 282 cities and towns in the United States and Canada, qualified for membership in 1915, as compared with forty-four leagues, representing 300 towns and cities in 1914.

Of these leagues did not begin the season of 1915, and five of the thirty which started failed to complete their season's schedules. One of these was disqualified because of failure to meet the requirements of the association.

Five thousand four hundred and seventy-two players' contracts were received, recorded and promulgated by the association during the year. One thousand and three players were released by purchase out of two thousand eight hundred and forty reported to the office of the association for release.

Ninety-nine optional agreements were approved by National Association clubs, and thirty-nine optional agreements were approved by National Association clubs.

Six hundred and seventy players were reported for reinstatement. Seven draft players were drafted by the American League, and 738 disputed cases were adjusted by the association during the year.

Out of \$72,500 received by the association for drafted players, the American League contributed \$25,400 and the National League \$21,850. In all \$125,357 were paid to the office of the National Association during the current year for drafted players, optional agreement players and minor league players.

RAILWAYS OF PALESTINE EXTENDED DURING WAR

New Line Has Reached Gaza and Jerusalem is Connected With Hedhas.

BERLIN (via wireless to Sayville), Nov. 9.—Among the items given out for publication today by the Overseas News Agency was the following: "Correspondence of The Frankfurter Zeitung from Jerusalem says there has been a perfect union of all the confessions of faith in Palestine. Twenty thousand Jews requested Turkish citizenship, which was granted them by the government without the payment of the ordinary taxes. All the colleges, with the exception of the French, are open, and all the hospitals and churches remain unharmed."

"Dymel Pasha, chief commander of the Syrian-Egyptian army, visited the Jewish colonies at Raschmeies and Poashikwah and remained for two days. He expressed satisfaction concerning the progress there."

"The railroad system has been greatly enlarged during the war. The new line has reached Gaza and the line from Jaffa to Jerusalem has been united with the Hedhas railway."

Gaza is in southern Palestine, on the south of Jaffa. It is on the Mediterranean Sea some 115 miles east of Port Said.


