

RAILWAY NEWS.

In accordance with an established custom the trainmen of the Grand Trunk Railway will, sometime during this month, send representative committee to confer with the general superintendent of the road and lay representative committee to confer with the general superintendent of the road and lay before him any complaints they may have against the management. This committee does not present itself on the occasion of a grievance only, but goes yearly to Montreal, no matter what are the relations between the management and the employes. This year, however, the Trainmen's Association appears to have a number of grievances against the management. The telegraph operators have formed a union and are seeking recognition as such. The operators in the large offices complain that their day's work is too long, nearly 12 hours, and the operators at country stations object to being compelled to do other work besides telegraphing, such as performing the duties of baggageman or switchman.

The engineers, firemen and conductors all appear to have a joint grievance against the trainmasters and mechanical superintendents over the different divisions of the road. The men are perfectly willing to assist the management in getting all the work out of a locomotive that it is capable of, and do their best to make the same time with a train of 20 cars as they do with a train of 16 cars, but, in the event of a failure, they do not expect to be harshly dealt with by the officials. Some of the officials in the mechanical department have been rather severe in their dealings with the employes under them and the enginemen will formally complain of the treatment they have received at the hands of one particular official, appointed by the new management, and will make a determined effort to have him removed from his position.

Canada's Unlimited Resources.

The manufacturing industry of our country is probably the most important factor in the development and opening up of the vest resources that are stored in abundance throughout this Canada of ours, and I will venture the assertion that there is no country in the world to-day, that has the unlimited resources that Canada has to supply materials of every description and kind for its manufacturing industries. If this be a fact it is most important that the manufacturing interests be carefully watched and jealously guarded by wise legislation, aided by the combined and united efforts of such an organization as the Canadian Manufacturers' Association.

We have reason to believe that manufactures, as well as all other classes of business, have entered upon more progressive and prosperous times, which we are pleased to recognize. The abundant blessing of Divine Providence has been present in a marked manner—the bountiful harvest surpassing all former years, with increased prices, has been one of the chief factors in restoring confidence. This has caused an increased demand for manufactured goods, thereby making it possible for manufacturing industries to largely increase their output.

The Political Aspect.

We are pleased to note that, so far as the political aspect of the case presents itself, regarding a reasonable amount of protection to the industries of the country, this has been fully recognized and conceded by both political parties, so that practically there is union where there had been strife and conflict, and but few radical changes have so far been made in our tariff to disturb trade. Long Credits.

One of the greatest drawbacks the manufacturer has to contend with to-day, under the present condition of things, is the system of long credits. An Insolvency Law.

At the present time there are efforts being made to place upon our statute books an insolvency law. It is not my intention to discuss at any length the merits of demerits of such a law. The arguments that may be advanced in its favor may be strong, but to my mind the arguments against it are equally as strong.

In conclusion, permit me to say that the outlook for the future of our country is bright with hope for its manufacturing industries, and may the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, by their mutual efforts and zeal, ever be one of the chief elements contributing to the successful future of our country. In the meantime the parties agreed upon a special case setting forth a number of figures, which, however, were not to be binding on either party in case the court should think fit to direct a reference. On the special case and the pleadings the court was asked to determine in the first place whether the plaintiffs or either of them had a right to maintain the action. In the event of that question being answered in the affirmative a variety of points were suggested for the consideration of the court in relation to the company's accounts and the conduct of its affairs.

The trial judge held the plaintiffs entitled to relief. He thought the suit properly constituted He pronounced an elaborate decree containing ten declarations on the points suggested by the special case, and directing no less than 15 separate accounts, with the view of ascertaining the true position of the company having regard to the requirements of the act of 1887. The accounts to be taken would, he said, "necessarily be accounts comprehending the whole business of the defendants done since the passing of that act, including the surplus profits in the hands of the defendants at the time that act was passed."






