SPRING EPIDEMIC OF STRIKES.

Following the Herron Trouble Comes That of the J. D. King Company - Mr. King's Statement. There seems to be a spring epidemic of strikes. Bertram's men, realizing that their employer will not advance their wages, have in a good many instances returned, although a dozen places have been filled with new men.

On being questioned as to the cause of the strike, Mr. J. D. King said: "This has been a long strike, and it has lasted twenty years. There was one three years ago, and one two years ago, and one last year. There is no trouble as to wages. Three months ago agitators from the city side stirred the men up and they got them into a union."

They are all talking about Superintending Brown being to blame, but it isn't his fault. It is the fault of the men, King, as he tapped himself. "Now, if this individual got along with Mr. Brown," he said, "because Mr. Brown won't work, he is rather tight and part-crazy and very liable to charge the men with doing wrong."

THE GAS COMPANY'S APPEAL

Mr. Johnston Got the Worst of It From the Law Lords.

The judgment of the Privy Council in the case of J. T. Johnston, against the Consumers' Gas Company, appears in full below:

The appeal was from the judgment of the Court of Appeal, reversing the decision of Mr. Justice Ferguson at the trial, which was in favor of Mr. Johnston upon all points. The decision of the law lords is practically upon the line of that of the Court of Appeal, and holds, as did the Ontario court, that Mr. Johnston, in himself and his company, had no right of action, and that the Gas Company was effective, and established for the purposes of the act, and that the Gas Company was not liable to Mr. Johnston for the cost of lighting the streets and other buildings there, rendered it desirable that more than one company should be established for the purpose of furnishing a further supply of gas for lighting the city. It also stated that the corporation of Toronto had signified their assent to the establishment of the company, and that they had the necessary powers connected with the establishment and construction of the necessary works.

The appellants, who were plaintiffs in the action, complained that they had been overcharged by the company for gas consumed in the houses of the appellants, and that the Gas Company had violated or neglected to observe the provisions of an act passed in 1887 and entitled "The Consumers' Gas Company Act, 1887." They alleged that if those obligations had been observed, a reduction would have been made in the price of the gas, and that the Gas Company had violated or neglected to observe the provisions of the act in relation to the price of gas.

The Gas Company demurred generally, but the demurrer was ordered to stand over to the trial. In the meantime the parties agreed upon a special case setting forth a number of facts, which, however, were not to be binding on either party in case the court should think fit to direct a reference. On the special case the pleadings of the case were asked to determine in the first place whether the plaintiffs or the Gas Company were entitled to relief. He thought the suit properly constituted. He pronounced a decree containing ten declarations on the points suggested. He directed the Gas Company to pay to the plaintiffs the sum of \$100,000, and directed no less than 10 separate accounts, with the view of ascertaining the true position of the company having regard to the requirements of the act of 1887. The accounts to be taken would be, "necessarily be accounts comprehending the whole business of the Gas Company done since the passing of that act, including the sums paid in the hands of the defendants at the time that act was passed."

The Gas Company's Appeal. The Gas Company appealed to the Court of Appeal for Ontario. The appeal was allowed and the action was dismissed with costs. On this decision the present appeal was brought. The Gas Company, at the bar, very properly, that the plain- tiffs were not entitled to sue on behalf of other consumers of gas furnished by the Gas Company, and that the action must be treated as brought for their individual capacity. The only question argued was whether the Court of Appeal for Ontario were right in holding that the plaintiffs had no cause of action. The answer to that question must depend on the act of 1887. It was not suggested.

CURE BILIOUSNESS

TO MANTOU AND LAC SEUL

Communication Between Wabigoon and Mining Districts

North and South of the C. P. R.—A Correspondent Who Thinks. There is Lots of Undiscovered Gold on the North Shore of Lake Superior West of Michipicoten—Mining News.

Wabigoon people evidently intend that their town shall this year enjoy an increased prominence in connection with the mining territories adjacent to it. A fourth boat is to be put on the route between Wabigoon Station and the great Manitowishongie River. The boat is to be put on to complete the direct communication between Wabigoon and Mine Centre, and Fort Frances. When the Government takes the southern end of the Lower Mantou to Lac Seul and winter a road has been built from Wabigoon to Lakes Maskinonge and Michipicoten, the advantages which are promising mineral deposits are said to exist.

ON THE NORTH SHORE OF LAKE SUPERIOR, MR. LAIRD THINKS GOLD DEPOSITS MAY BE FOUND.

Mr. W. H. Laird of New York and formerly of Toronto and Paris, Arthur, writes the World as follows: "I would like to call the attention of explorers and those who have been but little looked over and which, on account of its accessibility and the probability of finding gold, is a most interesting region. I refer to the north shore of Lake Superior. Until the Michigan settlement in 1847, there had been scarcely any exploring in this region for silver and copper. In the early days the district received some attention in the search for silver and copper. Gold was found in several places, but little attention was paid to it. There is no reason why the exertions of the explorer should not be rewarded here. 150 miles west of Michipicoten as well as in that neighborhood and as the steamship Tolepin makes the trip along the shore from the South twice a week, it can be reached at any point desired in comfort. There are fishing stations all along the shore, where provisions can be had at very reasonable rates. Very little land has been taken up, so here is an extensive field that offers as good a chance of finding gold as at comparatively little expense and in a comparatively short time. With few of the hardships that attend exploring in other parts of the province."

A SPANISH LEAD MINE WHOM EXAMPLED MANY CANADIAN MINES FELLOW.

The course of the lead market during the past few years is well reflected in the decline of the Linares, Spain, mine, which is situated in Cordoba, Spain, and is one of the richest in the world.
