DEBATE WILL BE A LONG ONE

George W. Beebe of Agassiz Took the Oath Before Governor McInnes on Saturday. WILL BE PROVINCIAL TREASURER

Premier Martin's Cabinet Will Be Straight Liberal and It Will Be a Party Fight.

Victoria, B. C., March 24.—(Special.)—Premier Joe Martin has got another Minister. George W. Beebe of Agassiz was sworn in this morning as Minister of Finance, and introduced to the Lieutenant-Governor. He has been a prominent Liberal in the upper country for some years. He stands well with the people, and persons acquainted in his section say he will have a good chance of election. He is a business man, and engineered some very successful mining deals. Martin has another strong Liberal in view for Chief Commissioner of Lands and Works, the other recent portfolio, and will announce him probably on Monday. This leaves the course clear for an early election, after the revision of the voters' lists on May 6. Martin's Cabinet will be straight Liberal, which Conservatives accept as a challenge to party lines, and are acting accordingly.

RED CROSS WORK IN AFRICA

Dr. Ryerson Cables the Canadian Branch That \$5000 is Needed at the Cape.

SUPPLY OF SWEATERS ALSO ASKED.

First Official Letter From the Red Cross Commissioner—More Donations.

The Hon. Sec., Dr. Charles A. Hodggets of the Red Cross Society, is in receipt of a cable from Dr. Ryerson, asking for \$5000 to assist in carrying on the work at the Cape, and also for a supply of sweaters for the regiment, as they are required now the cold season is on.

A meeting of the Council has been called for to-day, when reports will be presented of local branches and other important business discussed.

Dr. Ryerson's Letter. The following is the first official letter from Dr. Ryerson, Canadian Red Cross Commissioner in South Africa, received by Lieut.-Col. Mason, acting chairman of the executive: Cape Town, Feb. 20, 1900.

Dear Colonel Mason—I visited the No. 1 hospital at Wynberg yesterday, and saw Mr. Willis, Halifax, who is convalescing from typhoid fever. He is doing well. It is my duty to report to you that an order has been issued that no typhoid cases are to return to the front. Captain Almond is there, suffering from mild fever. He will resume duty soon. Temple repairs regiment to-day.

I am leaving to-day for Modder River with 2500 worth of Red Cross supplies. I have handed to the chief commissary, this includes large quantities of clothing and bedding, and surgical dressings from Montreal, St. John, N.B., and other points.

I can say that everything which could be done is done for the sick and wounded by the officers of the Army Medical Staff and Nursing Sisters. I will give you a more detailed account of the wonderful and humane work of the Red Cross Society in a later letter. It is sufficient to say now that its labors are materially lessening the sufferings of the sick and wounded, and is fully equal to its indispensable work of the military authorities.

The Red Cross hospital trains have already carried over 2000 men. I hope to return by Tuesday, so as to catch the next mail. Yours faithfully, G. Sterling Ryerson Canadian R. C. Commissioner in S. Africa.
