THE FIFTEEN YEARS OF THE LIFE OF BARBARIANS

Governor Yu of Shansi Province Is Directly Responsible for Some of the Most Hideous Massacres Ever Perpetrated.

Ladies Stripped and Clubbed to Death, Others Flung Into Burning Buildings and Others Marched by the Mobs With Chains About Them—Slowly Tortured to Death.

Vancouver, B.C., Oct. 27.—The Hong Daily Press publishes a report of the massacres of the missionaries and native Christians in Shansi, which the paper declares, are well authenticated.

Governor Yu, who was admittedly responsible for the missionary massacres, is directly responsible for the most hideous massacres ever perpetrated. The story begins with the murder of Miss Whitechurch and Miss Sewell, whose houses were surrounded by the mob. Their appeals for protection to the magistrate were greeted with the statement that his soldiers were for the protection of the Chinese and not for such as they.

This statement was made in the presence of the mob. The crowd then broke into the house, looting it.

Stripped and Clubbed to Death. Miss Whitechurch and Miss Sewell were then seized, stripped and clubbed to death. Miss E. Coombs of the Baptist Mission was burned to death in her own house, the mob setting her on fire and attempting to escape, and flinging her back into the burning building.

All the other missionaries, numbering 23, were led to the mountains, where they were set and sent back, laden with chains and with iron collars around their necks. They were driven on foot to the Governor's Yamen, where the boxes were allowed to torture them until they slowly expired.

The Governor Looked On. Governor Yu and his soldiers looked on while the bodies were in progress, and the 23 heads were afterwards displayed outside the Yamen.

On the same date ten Roman Catholic priests and 40 native Christians were similarly slain.

At Yenchow eight missionaries were taken to pieces, and at Yenchow four American missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Price and their daughter, and Mr. and Mrs. Stewart and their two girls, were horribly mistreated before they were finally stabbed to death. The local magistrate, by Governor Yu's direction, is said to have personally directed the missionaries before him with a whip before they were finally stabbed with knives.

BULLER TO SUCCEED WOLSELEY.

This is the Report Which the London Daily Express Prints Under Reserve.

London, Oct. 27.—Under reserve the Daily Express publishes a report that Gen. Sir Buller has been summoned from South Africa to succeed Lord Wolseley as commander-in-chief. Lord Roberts is expected to accept the post without a free hand.

London, Oct. 27.—Mr. Kruger has postponed his departure for the Transvaal until Oct. 30. He will land at Marseilles.

Therms Both Surrender

London, Oct. 27.—A despatch received here today from Pretoria, says that the only incident of importance was the surrender of the Boers at Mafeking, a brother of the late General Buller.

WILLIAM LANE ARRESTED.

Secretary of the Emerald Beneficial Association Is Charged With Robbing the Society.

Armed with a warrant, Detective Davis last night went to 40 Sheridan avenue and arrested William Lane, a middle-aged man, on a charge of stealing \$125.25 from the assets of the Emerald Beneficial Association.

The arrest was made as the result of an investigation conducted during the past few days by the association's auditors. Lane's accounts, Lane has held the position of collector for the association since 1900. It was found that he had been nearly the whole of the period systematic in appropriating to his own use money received by him, and that he had also been guilty of embezzling the association's funds.

It is claimed, however, that the detection of the fraud was due to the fact that Lane had entered up a false account of the association's funds, and that the auditors had discovered the discrepancy.

London, Oct. 27.—The Chinese Minister asserts that peace negotiations have actually begun at Peking between the Chinese plenipotentiaries and the representatives of the powers, in the Tung Yi Yamen buildings, which have been given over to the Chinese for that purpose.

Chinese Peace Negotiations to Begin.

Washington, Oct. 27.—The Charge d'Affaires of the French Embassy, today presented a memorandum to the State Department from the French Government, asking that peace negotiations with China begin immediately, in accordance with the favorable action of the powers on the recent French note.

TRIED TO KILL THE EMPEROR.

Kuang Su's Assassin Felled and Was Caught and Forthwith Beheaded.

Moscow, Oct. 27.—According to news from the Chinese legation, an attempt to assassinate the Emperor, Kuang Su, en route to Sian Fu, failed. The would-be assassin was caught and at once beheaded.

First Forwarding Saturday.

Pekin, Oct. 26.—The Chinese Legation today announced that the forwarding of the Emperor's baggage to Sian Fu is to be completed on Saturday.

Major Beattie Again.

London, Oct. 27.—The Conservatives of London held a nominating convention here to-night, which was an enthusiastic one. Adam Beck, the Conservative candidate for the House of Commons, was nominated by a large majority.

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GEORGE A. PEARSON MUST DIE FOR KILLING ANNIE GRIFFIN

His Trial Took Place at Hamilton Yesterday Before Justice Rose—December 7 is the Fatal Day—Pearson Told His Story in the Box and Admitted the Crime.

Hamilton, Oct. 27.—(Special.)—The trial of George A. Pearson, the young butcher, on the awful charge of having murdered his sweetheart, Annie Griffin of Dundas, on the night of Sept. 23 last, began at the Assizes today, between 12 and 1 o'clock, before Justice Rose.

The Crown was led by interested people since a crowd had gathered to witness the attention of the judge and jury until past the noon hour. Then the young prisoner was brought up from the jail and placed in the dock. Pearson looked to be quite calm and took a seat in the corner of the dock.

The selection of a jury was proceeded with by Mr. Justice Rose. The jury was sworn, and the trial proceeded. The Crown prosecutor, S. C. Dicks, Q.C., challenged a few.

The Crown's Case.

Robert Shepherd of the fourth concession of East Flamboro gave important evidence. He testified that he saw the young man on the night in question, when he heard a man call, "Come over, my girl's shot!" It was very dark. The witness peered through the darkness and saw a man, a woman and a child. He could not see any blood on the man, who proved to be the prisoner.

The witness asked Pearson who shot the young woman, and the prisoner told him that two men shot.

Several persons testified, the evidence being about the same as that given at the preliminary trial at Hamilton. The trial continued a few weeks ago.

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THE STRIKE IS SETTLED AND THE MEN HAVE WON

Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company and Lehigh Valley Company Have Posted Notices of the Fact.

All the Demands Made by the Scranton Convention Have Been Conceded and Now the Strikers Await President Mitchell's Order to Go to Work.

Philadelphia, Oct. 27.—The great strike of the anthracite mine workers of Pennsylvania, which began Sept. 17, practically ended to-day, when the Philadelphia and Reading Coal and Iron Company and the Lehigh Valley Coal Company agreed to abolish the sliding scale in their respective regions, and to grant an advance in wages of 10 per cent. net, the advance to remain in operation until April 1, 1901, or thereafter. This action meets the demands of the Scranton miners' convention. The decision was arrived at after a conference between representatives of the individual coal operators and the large coal-carrying companies. The conference began yesterday.

It Was the Culmination.

To-day's action was the culmination of the recent meeting of the individual operators at Scranton, following the miners' conference in the same city. Nearly all of the collieries in the coal region had, previous to the miners' convention, posted notices granting an advance of 10 per cent. The nine workers, in considering this demand, that the sliding scale in the Lehigh and Schuylkill districts be abolished, the increase to be maintained until April 1, 1901, and all other differences to be submitted to arbitration. The individual operators agreed to everything, and the appointment of a committee to induce the Reading and Lehigh Companies to abolish the sliding scale and make the wage increase permanent.

Now It's Up to Mitchell.

Just how soon the effect of the notice of the men that the strike is ended, and to return to work, will be issued by President Mitchell, can only be conjectured. It is the belief here that no order to return will be issued until a notice stating that the strike is ended.

Joy at Wilkes-Barre.

Wilkes-Barre, Pa., Oct. 27.—The Associated Press bulletin posted here this morning announcing that the operators in connection with the strike have agreed to the demands of the strikers was received with great joy. The strikers gathered in hundreds before the newspaper offices and the news was cheered to the echo.

East York.

East York, Pa., Oct. 27.—The announcement of the action of the conference at Philadelphia was received here with demonstrations of joy, as all believed it meant a speedy return to work at better wages.
