SEVERAL ACCLAMATION IS A GOOD BEGINNING FOR NEXT GOVERNMENT

There Would Have Been Several More Were Not Conservatives Competing Among Themselves-- In One Middlesex Two Liberals Fight it Out.

INDEPENDENT SIZE UP GIVES A PROBABLE 28.

BY ACCLAMATION. ADDINGTON — W. J. Paul (Conservative), last majority 85. DUFFERIN — C. R. McKeown (Conservative), majority in by-election 108. DURHAM, East—Conservative, last majority 792. LANARK, South—Hon. Col. Matheson (Conservative), last majority 891. MUSKOGA — A. A. Mahaffy (Conservative), last majority 900. SIMCOE, SOUTH — Alexander Ferguson (Conservative)—acclamation in Cardwell. VICTORIA, EAST — J. H. Carnegie (Conservative), last majority 1081.

There were seven seats given the Whitney government yesterday by acclamation, a truly good beginning. At Welland, George W. Sutherland, the Liberal candidate, may try to claim the seat by acclamation from Evan Fraser, the recent member. According to the Election Act, nominations are received from 12 to 2, but according to another provision of an hour elapses between nominations, they shall be declared closed.

It seems that about 12.20 no official time was kept—Sutherland was nominated verbally, with a seconder; about 20 minutes later Col. Raymond was named Fraser, but without a seconder; and then, about 1.20, or 1.25, Fraser was nominated in writing, with a seconder.

Disension among themselves prevented more Conservative wins by acclamation. In North Hastings, two Conservatives are in the field as the result of internal trading in the riding association. They are J. W. Pearce of Marmora and A. E. Riddell of Bancroft.

In Prince Edward there are also two Cons.—R. A. Norman of Picton, choice of the convention, and W. P. Niles of Wellington, a filibuster. The same dissension is observed in Grenville, where the Conservative convention nominee, Howard G. Ferguson, is checked by McNee, who is the candidate of R. L. Joynt, ex-M.L.A., and a Conservative. George Pattinson (Cons.) is opposed only by Wm. Wagner, labor candidate.

No Conservative is entered in West Middlesex where the Liberal and independent Liberal candidates will fight it out. Joe A. Akitt, who is opposing Jas. Duff in West Simcoe, calls himself a temperance Liberal. Nominations at Sandwich revealed three candidates for North Essex: Hon. Dr. Reaume, Adolph Gignac, independent Conservative, and Archibald McNeen. Rather than let the contest go by default, McNee entered without waiting for the endorsement of a regular convention. Gignac endorses the Whitney government, but objects on personal grounds to Dr. Reaume. His grievance is that the minister of public works failed to appoint him to the position of surveyor. The applause at the meeting was all for Reaume.

Looking Forward. Most of the so-called independent papers give the government a surety of 72 seats in next Monday's elections, leaving 24 for the opposition. The majority of 88. Murdoch and Walker are graduates of the school and the last two are to be employed by the Yukon Consolidated Gold Fields Company, Limited, that is, the Guggenheims, and the event is a notable one, as this is the first party of Canadian engineers sent out there by this company.

OPPOSITION MAINTAINS BLOCKADE ALL NIGHT

Handful of Conservatives Hold Fort While Colleagues Are Out Campaigning.

OTTAWA, June 2.—(Special.)—At 1.30 this (Tuesday) morning a handful of Conservative members are keeping up a stream of talk on the customs estimates. Nearly all the oppositionists are away, either in Ontario or Quebec for the elections, but there are enough left to prevent the government making much headway. Chief Conservative Whip Taylor said after midnight he did not know whether the government intended to keep the house in session all night or not. Morning sessions are due to-day.

PROPOSES TO EXTEND BOUNTY ON PIG LEAD

Finance Minister Will Move for Another Term of Five Years for Existing Schedule.

OTTAWA, June 1.—(Special.)—The finance minister will introduce a resolution extending for a further term of five years—until June 30, 1913—the bounty on the lead mined in Canada. Under the act, which expires at the end of this month, the bounty was payable for five years at a rate not to exceed \$500,000 in any one year, or in all \$2,500,000. It was also provided that the bounty should cease when the price of pig lead in London, England, reached \$10, when the bounty should cease altogether. Under this arrangement owing to the light price in England, only \$117,000 in bounty was paid to Canadian producers in the whole five years. The new resolution provides that the full bounty shall be payable until the standard price in England reached \$10, the disappearing point remaining as before. Another concession to the lead mining interests is that the limitation to \$500,000 in any one year is removed, the only provision being that the total bounty payable for the five years shall not exceed \$2,500,000.

BECK WAS THEIR HERO.

Audience at London Nominations Couldn't Hear Enough From Him.

LONDON, June 1.—(Special.)—Hon. Adam Beck was the idol of the nomination meeting to-day. He was the first speaker and for an hour he dilated on the government record and on the power policy. John M. McEvoy, his Liberal opponent, spoke for one hour and twenty minutes, and then, by agreement, Mr. Beck had twenty minutes to reply. At the end of that time there were such insistent recalls that he proceeded, McEvoy and about 200 benchmen leaving the hall.

SHOCK KILLS ACTOR.

CLEVELAND, O., June 1.—Eugene Jepson, aged 50, of New York, leading man in a vaudeville sketch at Kell's Theatre, dropped dead of heart disease in his dressing-room this afternoon, when an alarm of fire was sounded.

LETHBRIDGE, Alta., June 1.—At supreme court this morning Justice Scott sentenced Maxime Tourville, better known as French Joe, to seven years for committing an assault upon a young girl.

PUGILIST RUNS AMUCK.

Drunken Fighter Shoots Up Express Train.

MONCTON, June 1.—Enraged by drink and flourishing a revolver of western type a foot long, Chester Thomas, a Prince Edward Island pugilist, entered a car on the C. P. R. express to-day and began firing right and left. In a moment he had cleared the entire car, most of them being women and children and a number of men, while those who remained dropped under the seats. Thomas shot several windows out before he was overpowered by the train crew. He is now in jail. When taken before a magistrate he said he wanted to get to his mother, who is dying at home.

HEARST STEADILY GAINING.

New York Mayorality Recount Still in His Favor.

NEW YORK, June 1.—The contents of twenty-six ballot-boxes had been recounted to-day when the work of counting the ballots cast for W. R. Hearst and Geo. B. McClellan, in the last mayoralty election, ended for the day. The net result was a gain of 89 votes for Mr. Hearst. In the presence of a court ten boxes of the ballots were counted, giving Mr. Hearst a gain of four votes for the day. More than 1900 boxes remain to be counted.

NO CASH FOR CANAL EMPLOYEES.

ST. CATHARINES, June 1.—(Special.)—Employees of the Welland Canal to-day received notice from Superintendent Weller to the effect that they remain in the government's service at their own option, and if they continue in their present positions they will have to be content to await the passing of supplies at Ottawa before any further wages will be paid.

SUBURBAN CAR OFF TO GOOD START

First Trips of the C. P. R. Motor Car Between Brampton and Toronto Are Well Patronized.

It will at least be encouraging to the residents of Brampton, Churchville and Meadowdale who have been dubious as to whether commuters' rates would be extended to them as well as to the inhabitants of Streetsville and villages east, to hear a statement made by C. B. Foster, district passenger agent for the C.P.R., yesterday afternoon. "That will be adjusted in a very short time," he said, "if she pans out alright." "She," meant the new motor car which made her first regular trip according to schedule, yesterday. Mr. Foster further admitted that it is rather an excessive price for people who wanted to ride into the city daily, to give up over a distance of 20 miles. Mr. Foster is now as enthusiastic over the possibilities of a special suburban service as the 50 coaches which came into the city on yesterday. He felt convinced that if the general nominations had not been on, the Brampton, the car would have been taxed beyond its seating capacity, and already the order has gone out for a trailer to be put in shape for commission on this line at a moment's notice. The motor can draw two coaches in necessary.

At 1.30 p.m. the car made a trip to the Lambton Golf Club carrying between 15 and 20 passengers, and so delighted were they with the service that President A. W. Austin called Mr. Foster up in the afternoon to congratulate him. The run was made in 16 minutes. Mr. Austin felt sure that as soon as all the members become acquainted with the innovation it will be necessary to run a 3-coach train to the links. He advised Mr. Foster to inaugurate another motor car once. He thought the present need demanded it and the demonstration of the motor warranted it.

Railway Will Do What's Right.

Mr. Hossack has not done this. He has done differently—he has sidetracked it by raising the irrelevant and futile cry "Abolish the Bars."

This complacency is not conducive to progress, and, besides, it is scarcely warranted, at least so far as Scotland is concerned.

Will Organize Canada. BOSTON, Mass., June 1.—(Special).—A great gathering of Hebrews from all parts of the United States have voted to organize Canada.

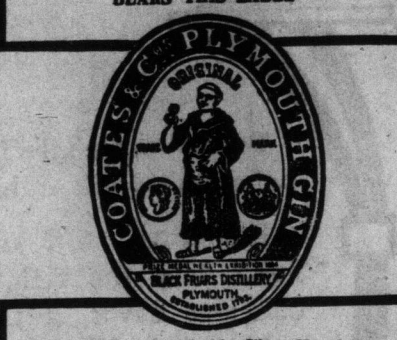

Detective Had a Lot of Jockeying to Do to Evade Habeas Corpus Service.

### A SOCIALISTIC FLARE-UP FEATURE AT N. TORONTO

Messrs. McNaught and Simpson  
Clash—D. C. Hossack and John  
Shaw on Abolishing the Bar.

The rumor that W. K. McNaught  
would exchange places with John  
Shaw and would contest election for  
North Toronto with D. C. Hossack in  
class "B," proved at yesterday's nomi-  
nation proceedings to be without  
foundation.

Frank Arnold, K.C., acted as re-  
turning officer, and Simpson's Hall was  
well filled by 2 p.m., the hour of the  
closing of nominations. The mingling  
of a large temperance element was  
shown in the repeated demands that  
speakers give their views on the three-  
fifths clause and the abolition of the  
bar.

Mr. Hossack, who evidently had many  
supporters in the hall, based his claim  
for support on the ground that a  
stronger opposition and a larger meet-  
ing of temperance reform were need-  
ed. He proved his independence by  
opposing the Ross government.

Referring to the charge that he had  
been a paid worker in opposing the  
Duncan Act, he said that a statement  
to that effect had been made in a  
Northumberland paper fifteen years  
ago, but that it had been fully with-  
drawn a week later. He admitted hav-  
ing spoken twenty-four years ago in  
opposition to the Scott Act, explaining  
he had done so because the measure  
was only a half-way one and could not  
be enforced.

John Rubs It In.  
John Shaw, who was given a cordial  
reception, did not escape the attacks  
of the interrupter. Mr. Shaw satirical-  
ly termed Mr. Hossack an Independent  
Liberal, with Conservative tendencies,  
and a political temperance reformer,  
as well as a great drag-net for the catching  
of votes. The speaker had never found  
it necessary to refer to the reformer  
to the other. Mr. Hossack, after join-  
ing the Conservative party, had, per-  
haps, not got the recognition to which  
he considered himself entitled.

In response to queries as to how he  
stood on abolition of the bar, Mr. Shaw  
said he would prefer allowing reformers  
to test their good sense  
rather than hearken to the blatherings  
of the political temperance reformer.

Mr. Hossack came forward and shook  
hands cordially with Mr. Shaw on the  
latter's concluding his address.

**Socialist and Labor.**  
Socialist Simpson enunciated the  
principles of the doctrine with his cus-  
tomary fluency.  
W. J. Hevey spoke of the public  
ownership plank in the platform of the  
Labor party. He attacked the present  
labor contract, and declared that a ma-  
jority vote should rule in local option  
and in all other matters. As to aboli-  
tion of the bar, he had gone to the  
support of it when the temperance people  
could substitute a better method of  
handling the trade schools. Hon.  
McNaught bread bill did not pre-  
vent underweight bread being sold in  
the city, that the use of labels on such  
bread was not made compulsory, and  
that the inspection at the factories was  
impracticable.

Mr. McNaught, who was received en-  
thusiastically, showed resentment at  
the remarks of Mr. Simpson, which he  
termed nonsensical.

Amid clamor from the back of the  
hall, he asserted that if the socialistic  
movement had as much strength in To-  
ronto as in Chicago some years ago  
there would be a repetition of bomb-  
throwing and riotous outrages.

"It's a lie, gross misrepresentation,"  
shouted Mr. Simpson in the midst of  
general hubbub.

Mr. McNaught maintained that the  
bread bill absolutely prevented the sale  
of lightweight bread, and that inspec-  
tion at the factories was as rational  
way. Every journeyman baker was  
for the bill.

The speaker reviewed the govern-  
ment's legislation, and was dealing  
with the grant to the LaRoe Com-  
pany when his time limit expired. Mr.  
Simpson vigorously opposed his being  
allowed to continue, but encouraged by  
a majority Mr. McNaught concluded  
his argument.

James Lindala, Socialist, disclaimed  
any sanguinary leanings among breth-  
ren of the order. A peaceful revolution  
was under way, he said.

Hon. Mr. Foy Says He Has Been a  
Hard Worker Himself—Pro-  
ceedings Not Exciting.

Wm. Lee presided at the South To-  
ronto nominations, afternoon meeting,  
succeeding Returning Officer Brandon.  
All the candidates exceeded the 15-  
minutes time limit, except Leon Tred-  
ler, who simply said that if elected he  
would "work for the working people  
all the time, and only for the working  
people."

Hon. J. J. Foy, attorney-general, said  
that he had had the honor of being in  
the Whitney administration since its  
inception and the pride was something  
to be deprecated, he was proud he was  
a member of that government.

"I do not think there is any need for  
me to go into details," he said, "as  
parliament is right in our midst and  
we also have the advantage of having  
a lot of newspapers who give us all  
the facts from day to day. Our pri-  
de is not surpassed in any city in Amer-  
ica."

He was pleased to note that the Re-  
form party had not sent a candidate  
into the field against him, and in-  
formed Mr. Kennedy, the Labor man,  
that an attorney-general was not  
necessary for every administration,  
and that that man had to be a lawyer.  
"I have been a laboring man all my  
life," he said, "but I have never taken  
much time for pleasure; the labor men  
are satisfied, I think, there were mat-  
ters of dissent from the fact of the  
hall at this, and Mr. Foy went on—"If  
not, why have they not come to me as  
a candidate? I am a hard worker, and  
I mentioned the fact that the govern-  
ment had done away with the num-  
bered ballot and commented upon the  
present opposition or government ad-  
ministration. "Mr. Whitney has fulfilled  
his pledges and ought to have a big ma-  
jority of June 3 next," he said.

George H. Gooderham said he was  
pleased to contest a seat for such an  
honest government. He commented in  
glowing terms on the work of the  
hydro commission, and expressed him-

game in the province.

G. E. Cleland, Liberal, said he was

mary of the power policy was grandmoth-  
erly. He, too, was supported by The

principles of public ownership. He was  
a Conservative, independent, but in-  
dependent only of the machine. When  
the meeting was well attended and  
very orderly for the most part. The  
speeches continued until after five  
o'clock.

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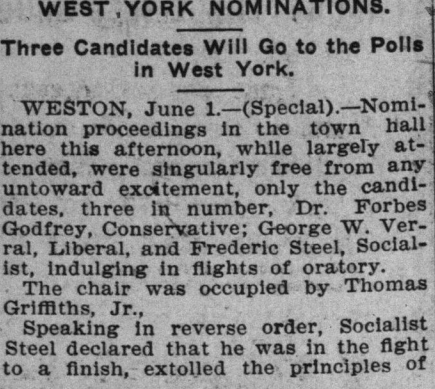
