NEW YORK, Jan. 25 .- Within con

NEW YORK. Jan. 25.—Within considerably less than 72 hours after the crash between the ocean liners Republic and Florida, off the Nantucket shoals, which eventually sent the one to the bottom and reduced the other to an almost helpless state, the survivors of the thrilling accident have found a haven at last.

At nightfall to-night 1650 passengers from the two vessels were safe in this port, brought here by the Baltic. Frenzied cheers from the thousands at the pier when she docked greeted her arrival. Tears of thankfulness were shed, affectionate greetings were exchanged and only here and there was there a note of sadness heard.

On the Republic's side little was to be learned. Her passengers told graphic tales of the crash, of the excitement on board, of the bravery of the officers, the good behavior of the crew and the efficient work of rescue.

Little could be learned from Capt. Rospini of the Florida to-night, but according to others who had been on board the Florida and were brought into port by the Baltic, something wentewrong with the Florida's steering wheel when the collision was imminent.



HOW TO STAKE A CLAIM IN ONTARIO'S SILVER LAND

Well Known Prospector Who Has Made His Pile Gives Some Advice to Beginners

There is probably not one man in ten thousand outside the mining regions of Canada who knows how to stake a mining claim. How many explorers of the world to-day, who decide to start upon a prospecting tour into the great silver belt, the northern part of this province, would know just how to go about staking a claim should they stumble over a rich discovery of mineral?

It would be a great pity if men who happened to face the hardships incidental to exploration in the north and make a find, were to realize the ynever knew how to stake their discovery, and then to find, perhaps, if they had some idea how to strike their claim that they were not in possession of qualifications which the government supply in return for certain consideration.

Mr. F. A. MacIntosh, one of the discoverers of the Bartlett Mines at Gow Ganda, was in the city yesterday, and this well-known Woodstock old boy, son of Mr. A. J. MacIntosh of that city, undertook to explain to The World reporter how the prospector should go about his work in the north country.





Ample evidence substantiating their responsibility for the breaches of public trust that have occurred has been disclosed in the numerous investigations that have been made and in the reports of the proceedfinanciers who sought to enrich themselves at the public expense.

A joint committee of the senate and house of representatives of the state legislature of Kansas has prepared a bill dealing with lobbies, and it is now under consideration. It provides that lobbyists shall register with the secretary of state, giving the names of the persons or corporations they are working for, the amount of compensation received and briefly the legislation worked for. No lobbyist is to be hired with pay depending on the passage of the bill in support of which he is employed, nor is he to be allowed to accept a contingent fee for success. Lobbyists are further barred from either house while in session and within 30 days after adjournment lobbyists must file a complete list of expenses with the secretary of state. Any infringement of these provisions it is proposed to punish by a fine of \$5000, a year in a county jail and debarment from acting as legislative agent for a term of three years. This is a salutary measure which ought to pass in Kansas. and be reproduced wherever public rights are assailed or need protection.

ONTARIO AND HER RIVALS.

Ontario's big sister on the Pacific Coast has just declared a surplus in her budget of \$1,388,380. This is for the fiscal year ending last June, and is the largest surplus Hon. Mr. Tatlow has announced in his five years' dealing with the treasury.
