KERENSKY IN MANIFESTO PROCLAIMS RUSSIA A REPUBLIC BRITISH FUTURE IMPORTANT POSITION NORTH OF INVERNESS IN BELGIUM

RUSSIA MAKES FORMAL ENTRY AS A REPUBLIC

Rebellion Is Quelled, But Danger Great. Says Keren- sky's Manifesto.

DISCIPLINE ENFORCED

Political Disputes in Army and Fleet Not to Be Tolerated.

Petrograd, Sept. 16.—The Provisional Government on Saturday issued a manifesto proclaiming Russia to be a republican state. The proclamation follows: "General Korniloff's rebellion has been quelled. But great is the confusion caused thereby and again is the danger threatening the fate of the fatherland and its freedom.

"Holding it necessary to put an end to the external ineffectiveness of the state's organization, remembering the unanimous and rapturous approval of the republicanism idea expressed at the Moscow state conference, the provisional government declares that the constitutional organization according to which the Russian state is ruled, is a republican organization and it hereby proclaims the Russian republic. (Signed) "Minister and president, Keren- sky. Minister of justice, Yaru- omul."

"In Hands of Five The title 'minister and president' affixed to Keren- sky's signature, probably refers to his position as president of the ministry, rather than as president of the republic. The provisional government today announced that all the affairs of state had been entrusted to five members of the cabinet. The following official communication was issued: "Pending the definite constitution of a cabinet, and in view of the extraordinary circumstances, all affairs of state have been entrusted to Keren- sky, premier; M. Terestchenko, minister of foreign affairs; General Verkhovskiy, minister of war; Admiral Verdevskiy, minister of marine, and M. Nikitin, minister of posts and tele- graphs."

"Election of the constituent assembly again has been postponed because the work of organization throughout the country has not been completed. Elections to the assembly now are fixed for Nov. 12, and the members are to convene Nov. 28 (Russian calendar)."

TORPEDO NARROWLY MISSES BIG LINER

Mechanism Goes Wrong When Missile Is About to Hit Ship.

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 16.—The Associated Press says: A submarine attack on an American steamship, one of the largest liners, in transatlantic service, was reported by several of the 400 passengers, which included United States army officers, on the vessel's arrival here today. The mechanism of the torpedo fired by a U-boat went wrong just before the missile seemed about to hit the ship. The torpedo leaped into the air, was deflected from its course and passed to the stern of the steamship. The attack took place two days after the liner had left a European port.

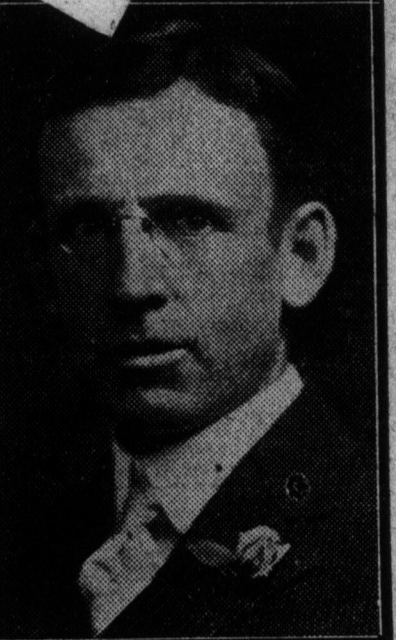

CANADIANS REPEL GERMAN ATTACK

Attempt to Capture St. Laurent Outpost Completely Fails.

LENS AGAIN GASSED

Enemy Reduces Garrison in Town Owing to Intolerable Conditions.

By Stewart Lyon. Canadian Headquarters in France, Sept. 16.—Early this morning, Sunday, after a heavy preliminary bombardment with trench mortars and artill- ery, the Germans attempted to cap- ture one of our outposts in the St. Laurent sector, but were driven off. A considerable quantity of gas was projected shortly before dawn into the enemy's lines in Lens. The Ger- mans came back like angry wasps. A few days ago a prisoner said that as a result of the gas attacks and heavy casualties sustained the German troops in Lens had been reduced. The renewed activity of the enemy reveals a desire to regain the higher ground on the west front of the city so as to alleviate conditions that are well-nigh intolerable.

SWEDEN SEEKING TO MAKE AMENDS

Seriousness of Situation Realized, Says Foreign Minister Lindman.

STOPPAGE OF LEAKS

Germany Asked for Explanation of Abuse of Privileges Extended.

London, Sept. 16.—A Stockholm despatch says: Sweden realizes the seriousness of the situation created by the recent disclosures at Wash- ington regarding the transmission of German despatches, and expects to take all steps possible to put mat- ters right. Foreign Minister Lind- man told the Associated Press during an informal talk. All transmission of German despatches had been stopped, he said, and Germany had been asked for an explanation of the abuse of the privilege formerly extended.

GERMANY ASKED FOR EXPLANATION OF ABUSE OF PRIVILEGES EXTENDED

An Atlantic Port, Sept. 16.—The Associated Press says: William Snell, a member of the crew of the steam- ship Belgian Prince, which was sunk Sept. 31, with a loss of 38 of her crew, also arrived. He confirmed cable reports that he and other survivors were ordered to leave the U-boat, their lifeboats destroyed and their cork jackets tak- en away, after which the submarine submerged, leaving them to drown. Snell escaped because he managed to hide his life-belt under his coat. The steamer on which Snell arriv- ed, the British steamer Mary Baird, of 1830 tons, sunk near the British coast early in May, and of the Am- erican schooner Laura C. Anderson, sunk on August 29th, 30 miles from Havre.

WAR CREDITS BILL PASSES U. S. SENATE

Largest Measure of Its Kind in History of the World.

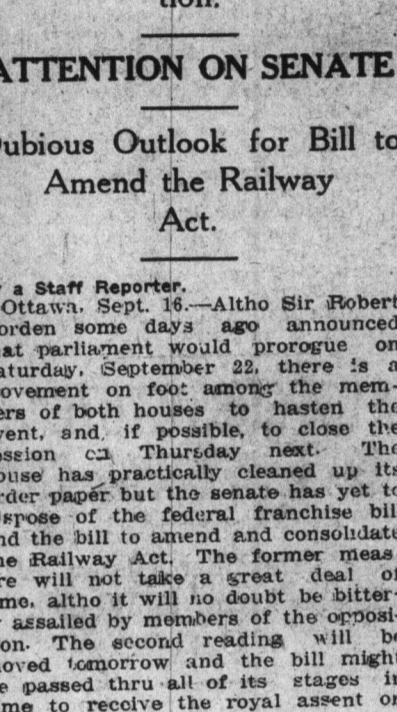
Washington, Sept. 15.—The war credits bill, authorizing new bonds, and certificates aggregating \$11,533,000,000 and the largest measure of its kind in the world's history, was passed by the senate late today without a roll call or dissenting vote. It has already passed the house.

ENEMY EVACUATES BELGIANS FROM ROULERS BEHIND FRONT

Amsterdam, Sept. 16.—According to The Handelsblad, the population of the Belgian City of Roulers, behind the German front, has been removed, and the transportation of the inhabi- tants of Ostedt and the population of the Belgian front, has been begun. The newspaper says 2000 persons have departed from Courtrai, and that many Belgians have been forced to work on the defences of Tournout.

RUSSIANS JOIN FIERCE BATTLE IN RIGA DRIVE

Petrograd Says Army Shows Great Firmness and Stability.

TAKE GALICIA WOOD

Ally's Forces Also Repel Hostile Attacks on Rumanian Front.

Petrograd, Sept. 16.—Stubborn fighting is in progress on the north- ern end of the front in Russia. To- day's official statement says the Rus- sian troops are fighting with deter- mination, repelling German assaults. Attacks on the Rumanian front were beaten back. The communication follows: "Western front: In the direction of Riga and on the Pskoff road, in the region of the Zverovo Ranna, a stub- born battle is proceeding. Our troops are showing great firmness and sta- bility, repelling attacks. In the re- gion north of Lake Petchor, our scouts found the burned remains of a German airplane which our fire had brought down. On the remainder of the front there were no incidents. Fos Active in Rumania. "Rumanian front: In the direction of Fokshani, in the region of Pitlon- eschi and Maresech, a counter-attack by parties attempted at several places, under cover of artillery fire, to approach Rumanian trenches, but were repulsed by our troops. An en-emy attack northwest of Maresech was repelled. "Caucasian front: Nothing of im- portance occurred. "Aviation: One of our airplanes dropped several bombs on Tveretski (south of Dvinsk). Successful hits were obtained. "The war office yesterday issued the following official statement: "In the direction of Riga, in the re- gion of the Pskoff high road, our troops, after engagements, captured important sectors of the enemy's po- sitions near the Kronberg Farm, but were repulsed by a counter-attack in the region of Kovel (Vohlynia) there were lively fusillades, the en-emy directing his fire of chemical shells against the Terensk-Rudka re- gion. "Wood Captured. "Northwest of Husiatyn (Galicia) our troops carried out a wood near Baerzisk repelling the enemy ad- vance guard. The enemy has with- drawn to the heights on the Tselch- kmvtze-Vasilkovt-Vasilovtze line. "Rumanian front: There were fusil- lades. "Caucasian front: During Thursday night the Turks carried out an of- fensive against our troops, occupying the ridge positions on the Turkish- Persian frontier heights along the line formed by the mountains. Shil- varochkut and Boudarech, fifty veras- cast of Rvdanvada. Despite the resis- tance of our troops, the Turks pressed us back behind the line for- med by these mountains. "Aviation: In a series of aerial en- gagements on Thursday an enemy airplane brought down in the re- gion of Husiatyn, the occupants be- ing made prisoner, and another was forced down between the enemy lines. On the same day our pilots success- fully dropped 12 tons of bombs, caus- ing a conflagration in the region of Chorostok, between Husiatyn-Trem- bowla."

ENEMY OFFERS REWARD FOR TAKING AMERICANS

German Commander Promises Four Hundred Marks for First United States Soldier Brought In, Dead or Alive.

By the Associated Press. British Headquarters in France and Belgium, Sept. 16.—German military authorities on the western front have shown concern about the imminence of the American army's entry into the fighting by offering rewards for the production of the first American pris- oner. The general commanding the 11th reserve division recently put the price of 400 marks on the first Ameri- can soldier brought, dead or alive, into his lines. "This information has been disclosed by the diary of a Prussian sergeant of the 23rd reserve infantry regiment. He wrote at the end of July: "We are supposed to have had Amer- icans opposite us for some time now, and two divisions of Portuguese on our right. The man who brings in the first American, dead or alive, to head- quarters has been promised the iron cross of the first class, 400 marks and fourteen days' leave."

ARGENTINA PROHIBITS HUN WIRELESS PLANT

Attempt to Receive Messages From Station at Nauert Is Balked.

Buenos Aires, Sept. 15.—The govern- ment has withdrawn permission grant- ed to a German wireless company to attempt to receive wireless messages from the German station at Nauert. "The German wireless service, con- sisting largely of messages from the semi-official overseas news agency, which was sent to this country thru the Sayville station before the en- trance of the United States into the war, is distributed from Nauert. It has been reported on several occasions since the United States and Germany severed relations that information was being sent from Nauert by wireless from South America.

REGENCY COUNCIL HAS AUTHORITY IN POLAND

Amsterdam, Sept. 15.—A decree pub- lished at Lublin on Sept. 15, transfers the supreme authority in Poland to a regency council of three members appointed by the monarchs of the occupying powers, says a Vienna message today. All the decrees of the council must be countersigned by a responsible premier. The legislative power is to be exercised by the council.

SWEDISH PAPER TAKES BELLIGERENT ATTITUDE

Resolute "No" Should Be Given to Entente Says Afton Blad.

Stockholm, Sept. 16.—The losses of the Conservatives in the election apparently are not affecting the Con- servative press. The Afton Blad asks if it is impossible to unite the Swed- ish people so as to give a resolute "No" to the entente which, it says, seeks to interfere in Swedish affairs. The newspaper proposes no change in the ministry, saying that in such an event Sweden would soon become, like Greece, "a mere messenger boy in the service of the entente."

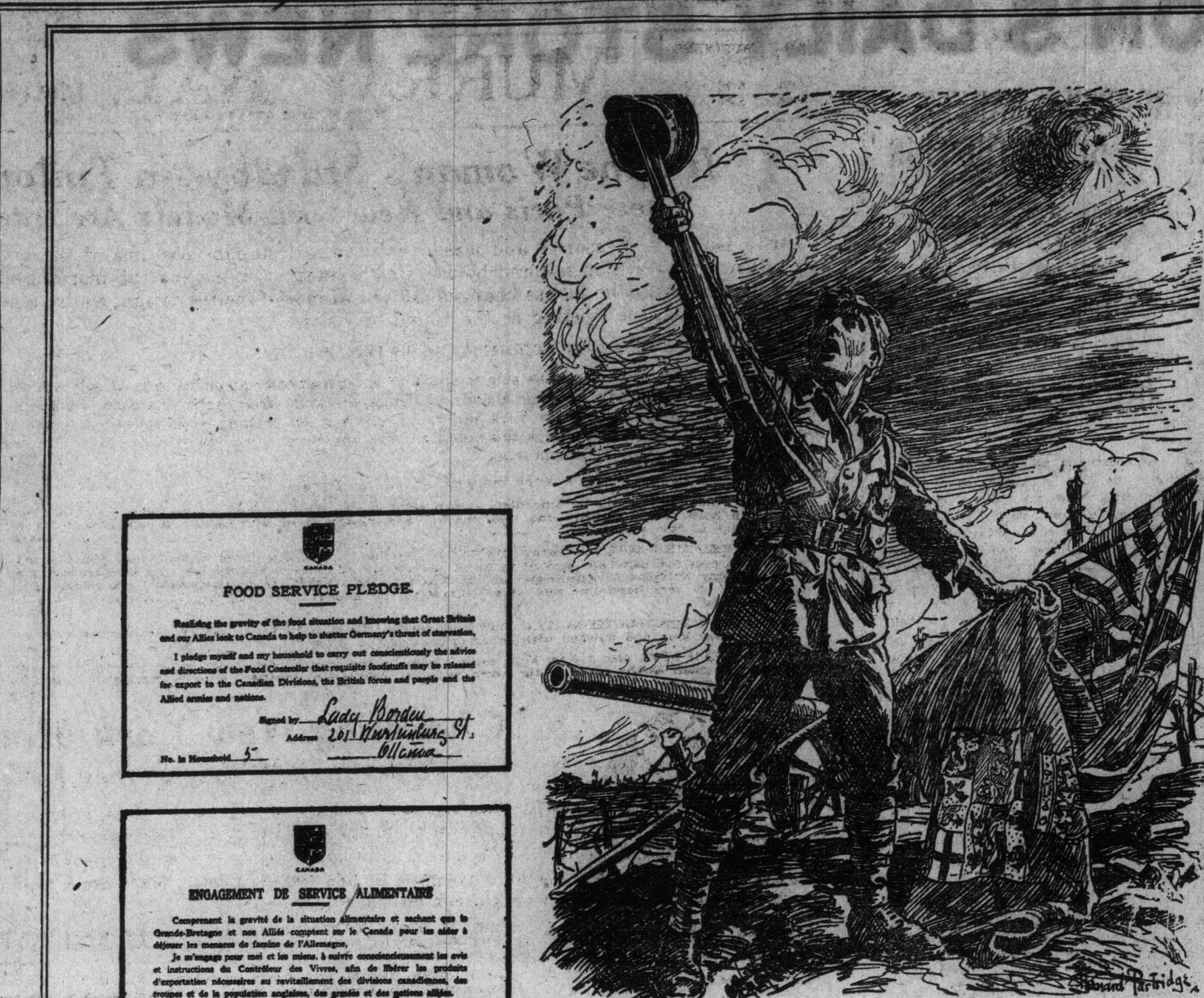

Paris, Sept. 15.—Some of the statements made by Emperor William in a telegram to Emperor Nicholas of Russia, one of a series of recently published messages explained by the two Reutens in 1904-05, brought forward by the challenge to fight Germany, reached between them to attempt an alignment of Germany, Russia and France against England, was challenged in an interview in the Temps by Alexander H. Iswolsky, former Russian ambassador to France. Quite incidentally, apparently, M. Iswolsky made the declaration that this secret agreement was cancelled in the fall of 1905 and was not renewed. He stated also that Emperor William had been during the interview that he considered the question of Alsace-Lorraine a dead issue, France failing to take up the challenge to fight Germany when Germany threw down the gauntlet during the Moroccan crisis, early in 1905.

MORE ON GRIPS—USE ONLY ONE

The golfer should grasp his club in the most comfortable way as long as the general idea of the finger grip is kept—little details are individual. The thumbs should rest on the side of the shaft. At the thumb of the left hand, lying straight on the right-hand side of the shaft, but one soon gets accustomed to it. In practice, the left hand is placed on the right side of the shaft, as explained in a previous article. I do not use either grip as my present method seems adapted to me. My grip is just the plain finger grip—that is, I have all fingers on the shaft. I try always to be conscious of a sense of touch a certain feeling that comes only thru the tips of one's fingers.

Perhaps a little history of my own struggle with the problem of the proper grip may prove instructive, for my own method evolved gradually from the plain finger grip.

Uses Plain Grip First.
When I first began to play I palmed the club with my thumb over and around the shaft. It is only fair to add that I played rather successfully with this grip, but it was a long time and I had a great deal of time for practice.

One day Mr. F. C. Sellers, splendid iron player, suggested that I put my thumb down the shaft for iron shots. This act of itself put the grip in the fingers, and for the first time the relation of the thumb to the fingers was revealed to me. I threw away the labor of years and began to cultivate the new method.

Thereafter my iron shots became the best part of my game. My thumbs down the shaft, however, checked my swing whenever it passed the halfway mark and made it impossible to play a full shot with that grip. This resulted in my playing the palm grip for the full shot and the finger grip for the half shot. This was fairly satisfactory, but it took altogether too much time to keep the working order. I felt that I would even then while I was in school and had the necessary time.

Uses Palm Grip Change.
In 1911 I was in Europe and happened to meet Harry Vardon, at La Soule, just before the French open championship. He noticed my differing grip and

THE BLOOR STREET VIADUCT Could Be Railed, Paved and Put in Commission Forthwith for \$50,000.

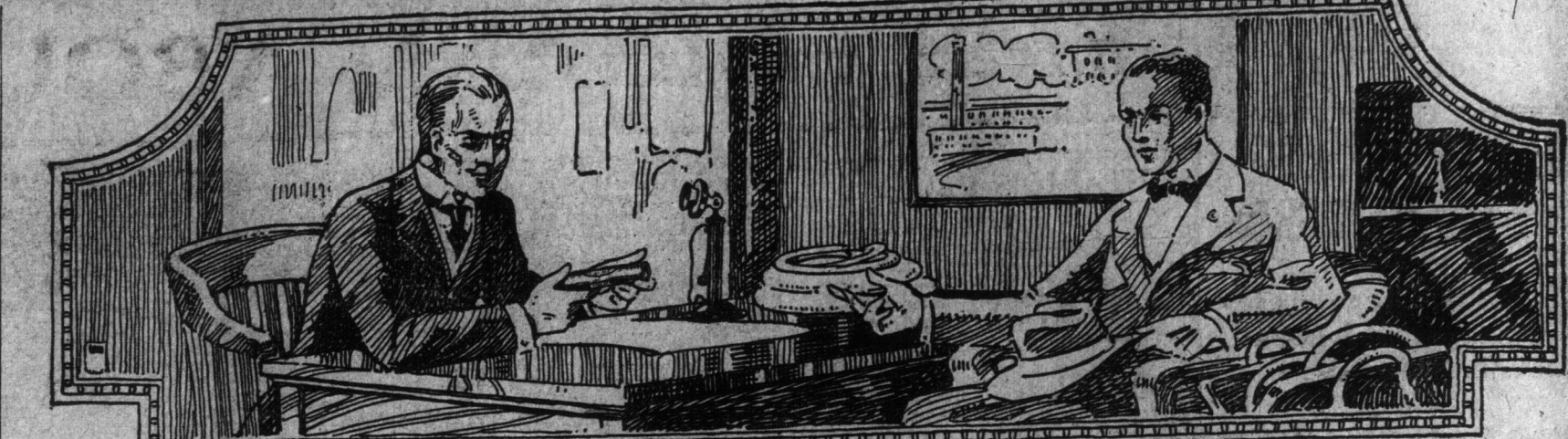
On Saturday afternoon W. F. Maclean, accompanied by Mr. Black, engineer in charge of the contractors, motored across the Bloor street viaduct on the concrete floor that is to carry the wooden block pavement.

The bridge has been practically cleared of all obstructions, and the wooden towers used to elevate and distribute the concrete from the movers are being taken down, also the plant connected with it off the structure.

The World has been informed that they would no difficulty in putting down the ties for the street car rails, bedding them in and then placing the wooden blocks on the roadways and between the rails in less than eight weeks.

There are ties and rails and blocks sufficient there now in the city. The World believes that the outfit for rails, ties, block paving, concrete for the bridge for almost immediate public use would be less than \$50,000, and as said above, the work could be done in less than eight weeks.

The big expenditure that is to come in connection with the viaduct—some of the opponents to the early use of the bridge say half a million dollars—will be for the approach to the bridge at Danforth avenue; for the new street pavement and rails in Rosedale between the two viaducts; for the new roadway from the west end of the Rosedale viaduct to Sherbourne street, north of Howard street, and for the new Glen road bridge that has to be built from Howard street over this new road and over the Rosedale ravine.
