### ENCKE'S COMET.

This little comet, the nearest to the Sun in average distance, and consequently the most frequent in its periodical appearances of all that have been observed by astronomers, has been on hand again. Professor Young, of Dartmouth, writes in the "Boston Journal of Chemistry" that its diameter is between forty and fifty thousand miles; that he saw it on December 1 pass centrally over a little star of the ninth magnitude, the brightness of which was not apparently dimmed in the least; showing, like other similar observations, that the substance of comets is inconceivably rare. The spectroscope shows it to be gaseous, and probably gaseous only. The spectrum indicates carbon. Like the most of the smaller comets, it carries its tail before it in approaching the Sun.

The doctrine of a resisting medium filling the interplanetary spaces was deduced by Encke, with much laborious calculation and able reasoning, from the observed gradual shortening of the periods of this comet, which he averred could not be accounted for by any known action of the planets. The frequency of its returns, which occur in a little less than three years and four months, makes the phenomena of retardation comparatively easy to determine; but the most moderate and the most accurate observations do not seem to have been discussed with reference to this point. Professor Young says the other comets show nothing similar as yet, and that the whole question needs investigation.

### The Connection Between Light and Magnetism.

When the Sun's atmosphere is violently agitated and its brilliancy undergoes sudden transitions, the motions of the magnetic needle show that the magnetic equilibrium of our world is at the same time disturbed. Thus the astronomers Hodgson and Carrington, one in Oxford, the other in London, were on September 1, 1859, at the same instant observing a large group of Sun spots, when, on a sudden, two intensely bright patches of light appeared in front of the cluster. At the very moment these brilliant patches appeared, the self-registering magnetic needle in the Kew observatory swung from its ordinary position, with sharp and sudden jerks; and it was subsequently found that, at the very same time, the whole globe was thrilled by a strange magnetic power; for the needle was observed to be powerfully agitated throughout North America, Europe, Northern Asia, and even in Australia. These phenomena did not immediately disappear. During the first five minutes the Sun spots extended over a space of thirty-four thousand miles; and hours passed away before the Earth regained its ordinary magnetic state.

There will be four Eclipses this year, as follows:—

I. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, May 12, in the morning, which will be partial in this Island; the Moon sets eclipsed.

II. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, May 26; the Sun rising partially eclipsed.

III. A Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 4; invisible in this Island.

IV. A Partial Eclipse of the Sun, November 19; visible in the Southern Ocean.

### THE HISTORY OF THE CONSTELLATIONS.

The most ancient references to groups of stars are found in the book of Job, 9; 9; 26; 13; 28; 31, 32. According to the best Greek authorities, Egypt and Assyria produced the earliest astronomers. Travellers in oriental deserts directed their course by northern constellations, and Sidonian mariners nightly steered their ships by the "Little Bear." Greece probably received the knowledge of Astronomy through Phœnicia. The Greek poets Homer and Hesiod refer to Arcturus, Sirius, the Pleiades, the Hyades, Orion, and the Bear. These poets lived between seven hundred and fifty and eight hundred and fifty years before Christ. Nearly four hundred years before Christ all the leading constellations had received their names; for about that time Eudoxus, of Cnidus, wrote an account of them.

### ANALYSIS OF SOLAR AND STELLAR LIGHT.

One of the most interesting branches of astronomical experiment of late years has been the observation by the telescope of the spectra of the light emitted by the Sun and stars, and the comparison of these spectra with those found by the spectroscope in observing the heated luminous vapors produced by the combustion of metals and gases.

THE work of another twelve months is before us. Let not the new year find us idle. No great work was ever accomplished, no grand success gained, no good character formed, either on the farm, in the workshop, or at the desk, by idle habits or hours misspent. Activity of mind or body is the way to happiness, contentment and prosperity. A busy man for me. Put a little more work on his shoulders, and he does not flinch. He can bear up under it when a lazy man would falter. Work is

no hardship, for it brings along its satisfactions and its conquests.—But what can we do now? Much! Lay out the work for the summer. There are the cattle to be taken care of. They won't come out well in spring if neglected now. There is the wood pile to be looked after. A few hours' smart chopping won't hurt anybody nowadays. There's the poultry-yard. Hens want a little care as well as cows, and sheep, and pigs. Give them a warm, sunny house, a little sand or gravel to roll in, a few potatoes and a few bones to pick, and if they don't begin to lay soon it's their own fault, and not yours. And then there's the newspaper and the farm-book. Get the best, and read it now that you have time. A good, well-selected farmer's library is a treasure at this season.

A CHEAP PAINT.—Some one gives the following. We cannot vouch for its value, but it may be worthy of trial:—Take eleven pounds of unslacked lime and one gallon of boiling water, and stir into a thick pudding; then add to it two gallons of boiled linseed oil and one quarter of a pound of white potash dissolved in one pint of boiling water. Mix thoroughly, and if the oil and water do not unite, add a little more potash water, there must be enough to cut the oil perfectly but no more. It will look thicker than common paint, but will spread easily with a common paint brush, and will wear excellently well, and has all the appearance of a superior paint, while its cost is less than half as much. For a paint for barns, outhouses, fences, &c., it is unequalled.

Cows in milk must have good feed, and plenty of it, this cold weather. We can't be too careful, indeed, in the management of all stock at this season of the year; but milch cows are most sensitive to exposure and hard fare. If feeding for quantity, give them moistened food at least once or twice a day. Hay cut short and mixed with Indian meal or shorts, with a little hot water poured upon it, is excellent for this purpose. If put into a tight vessel when the hot water is on, and covered up to stand a little while, the result is still better as it gets a partial steaming. For improvement in the quality of milk, we may feed Indian, linseed or cotton-seed meal. It pays to keep up the condition of the animal while she is giving a good supply of

milk, and she will pay from day to day in proportion to the richness and quantity of food given to her.

Don't try to keep more stock than can be kept well. If allowed to run down to low condition now, it will take a long and hard struggle to get up again after going out to grass. There is no profit in such management. It is the most shiftless practice, this half-starving of cattle or stock of any kind, and the farmer who tries to get on thus does not deserve to succeed.

**HOSERS.**—Avoid as far as possible exposing horses to storms. When on a journey aim to feed at the regular hour. If nothing more can be done, take along some corn-meal and put a quart in a pail of water, and stir it up while the horse is drinking. It will greatly refresh and strengthen him. Many horses suffer from dyspepsia, and one cause of it is irregularity in feeding and giving too much grain when the horse is fatigued. When a horse has been exposed to a storm, and comes home in an exhausted condition, give him a warm bran-mash. Put two or three quarts of bran in a pail, and pour on two or three quarts of boiling water and stir it up. Then add cold water sufficient to cool it to the temperature of new milk, and give it to the horse. Blanket the horse and rub his head, ears, and legs dry all over. Many an attack of colic would be avoided by these means. We think many farmers err in not feeding their horses more on grain. It would be better to work harder, or at least more constantly, and feed higher. Of one thing we are very sure; not one farmer in ten grooms his horse sufficiently. It is a shame to a man to leave a horse at night, after a hard day's work, until he has been rubbed clean, dry-bedded, and all his wants attended to.

MANY farmers in P. E. Island idle away a great part of this month. During the short and cold days of January and February, they have probably made little or no provision for the coming summer. If their grain is all threshed when the March sun first shines upon them, they will be prepared to complete their supply of firewood for the summer, and to provide such fencing material as may be needed. Cultivators of our soil, you should never neglect these

two important requisites. In this climate the season for tillage is short; it will, therefore, never do for you to be running to the woods for fence-poles when your grain is up, and you should be employed at sowing your turnips; nor for you to be gathering old sticks to cook your breakfast, when you should be mowing hay. Before the vernal equinox overtakes you, see that all your hauling is done, and everything procured from the forest which can save a moment's time in the busy season. Then turn your attention to cutting up and splitting your firewood for use, and getting your carts, ploughs, and small farming implements in order, so that when spring does really come you may be ready to dash into field work. An idle March frequently causes a scanty harvest.

TO TEST THE QUALITY OF WOOL.—A Texas paper gives the following directions: "Take a lock of wool from the sheep's back and place it upon an inch rule. If you can count from thirty to thirty-three of the spirals or folds in the space of an inch, it equals in quality the finest electoral or Saxony wool grown. Of course when the number of spirals to the inch diminishes, the quality of wool is relatively inferior. Many tests have been tried, but this is considered the simplest and best. Cotswold wool and some other inferior wools do not measure nine spirals to the inch. With this test, every farmer has in possession a knowledge which will enable him to form a correct judgment of all this kind of wool. There are some coarse wools which experienced wool growers do not rank as wool, but as hair, on account of the hardness and straightness of the fibre."

THE season for grafting is approaching. There is no kind of labor which brings a richer return than a few hours spent in grafting. There is no difficulty now in procuring scions of the most approved varieties, gratis, or at a rate merely nominal. The best scions for apple trees, are obtained within the last year's growth, on the points of bearing limbs. The scions may be cut any time during March, and placed in a cellar with the

butts upon the ground where the air will not strike them. Grafting wax may be made in the proportion of 2½ lbs. rosin, 1 lb tallow, and ¾ lb beeswax, melted together and poured into a tub of water. If it should be too sticky, more beeswax may be used. Probably the best time for grafting apple trees is from the 15th of April to the 10th of May. If the grafting is to be done in May, the scions should be cut earlier in the season. The best mode for preserving scions is to fill a large box with fine pulverized moss, or still better, with moist saw-dust, in which the grafts are simply immersed, and which are thus packed away or withdrawn with the greatest ease at any desired moment. A box of saw-dust, in a cool cellar, will remain moist without watering for many weeks.

**LIME AS A FERTILIZER.**—Dr. Lee writes the *Plantation*: "I have just been over some of the oldest-settled and best cultivated counties in Pennsylvania, and saw large fields white with lime. These fields have been limed every five or ten years for a century; not for the fun of working in caustic lime dust, but because it pays as a means of bringing potash and phosphoric acid out of insoluble minerals. The most home-staying, practical men in the world find by long experience that lime is a power in the soil. But right here let me ask how lime can extract potash from white pipe-clay, or any other clay that has no potash in it? How bring out phosphoric acid from dust or sand quite destitute of this acid? On some farms lime produces a good deal of prime wheat; but lime alone will no more produce wheat than it will make first-rate light bread."

WELL, here we are, with a prospect of spring at last. Sunshine and shower is the order of the day. Take it as it comes and make the most of it. But it's time to strip off jackets, and seize the handles of the plough. A straight furrow and a deep one,—that's the true doctrine; but go down by degrees, an inch

lower each year, and every time you plough, and not bring up too much of that yellow stuff at once. It needs an airing before it will give you good crops; but up with it a little at a time, and mix it with the richer surface soil, and you'll find it'll begin to pay. A loamy subsoil, that has never been exposed to the action of the atmosphere, when brought to the surface, absorbs many fertilizing gases, and becomes more and more valuable. But if you have ploughed but five or six inches deep, it is a mistake to go ten or twelve all at once. Take time for it, and you can work down easy, and not sacrifice your crops while you're about it.

It don't pay to stop and lean over the wall, talking hour after hour with neighbor Dolittle. It don't pay to waste time in May. Plant peas and potatoes, sow beets and carrots, as soon as you can in this month.

THE *Ohio Farmer* says more injury is done to carriages by greasing too plentifully than the reverse. Tallow is recommended as a better lubricator than lard for wood axletrees, and castor-oil for iron; lard is apt to penetrate to the hub, and work its way around the tenons of the spokes and spoil the wheel. Just enough grease should be applied to the spindle of a wagon to give it a light coating. To oil an iron axle, first wipe clean with a cloth wet with spirits of turpentine, and then apply a few drops of castor-oil near the shoulder and end. One teaspoonful is enough for the four.

A good harness blacking is made of four ounces of hog's lard, sixteen ounces of neat's foot oil, four ounces of yellow wax, twenty ounces of ivory black, sixteen ounces of brown sugar, and ten ounces of water. Heat the whole to boiling, and stir until it becomes cool enough to handle, then roll it into balls about two inches in diameter.

JUNE is the month of roses—and this reminds me of thorns; and if we don't want thorns in our sides, we must make head and hands work well this month. Fishing may be fun, but the hoe-handle must take the place of the fishing-pole, if we want to sing merry tunes in harvest-time. Who's afraid of work! Not you, my friend; but I want you just to step out, and walk about the farm, and see if what I told you is not true. Don't the things

grow better for the ploughing, the manure, and the care you have given them! and are not you richer for following the dictates of an industrious disposition, than if you had been droning about, swapping jack-knives and telling long yarns in the early spring? That garden of yours looks well; the time you have spent on it has been well spent. Keep the weeds down; keep it neat and in order. Order, you know, "is heaven's first law." From the middle of this month to the middle of next is said to be the best time to prune fruit-trees. Thin out your fruit, leaving the choicest, which will be the better for it. You can just as well raise flowers and vegetables as weeds in your garden; and as fruits and garden sauce now sell, it is an object to raise them.

**HOW TO CLEAN PAINT.**—A chemical journal gives the following advice: "Use but little water at a time; keep it warm and clean by changing often. A flannel cloth is better than cotton. Be careful of soap. Put but a little soap or skim-milk in the water; add soap to the cloth when needed. A sharp piece of soft wood is indispensable for the corners; the point will become like a paint brush. A saucer of sifted ashes, used where paint is badly smoked or fly specks are thick, is better than soap; wipe last with clean wet towel, and don't spill a drop of water. Never put soap on glass unless it can be well rinsed, which can never be the case with windows; wash off dirt in clean warm water and dry; then, with a paste of whitening and water, and with a little cloth, place a little on the centre of each pane. With another cloth rinse over the glass, next rub off with a dry cloth till the window shines like crystal.

UP early and down late!—a wide swath and a smooth one! I don't like to see bad work on the hay-field. Suppose you sink the big rocks, clear up the land, and roll the surface of your lots, after haying, and you will soon be able to mow with horses. Don't wait till your grass is dead ripe. It is little better than straw then. To feed out to cows

in milk, it ought to be cut just as it is coming into blossom, when it will be more nutritious, and make more milk, than at any later period of growth. For oxen and store cattle, it may be cut when in full blossom, and before the seed is fully formed. Nothing will make the milk flow like sweet, well cured rowen, and grass just before blossoming is most like it. Get your hay so as to have it as much like green grass as you can, if you want it for milk. If it stands too late, the nutriment in the stock and flower goes into the seed, and the stem becomes woody.

Don't dry your hay too long and too much. It is a great mistake to do so. You take the life and nutriment out of it. Think of this, and do not dry it to a crisp. If not quite dry enough to suit you, a little salt will save it from injury in the mow, and the stock like the seasoning.

**CHOW-CHOW RECIPE.**—A correspondent of the *Rural New Yorker* says: "I have one, taken from an old Godey's book, which I think very nice: To one peck of green tomatoes add three good-sized onions, six peppers (with the seeds taken out); chop together and boil three minutes in three quarts of good cider vinegar; throw the vinegar away after straining; then to three quarts of nice new vinegar, when scalding hot, add two cups of sugar, one teaspoonful of cloves, ground, one of allspice, two of cinnamon, three of table salt; pour over the tomatoes hot. You can omit part or the whole of the onions and peppers, and still have a very nice pickle."

The dog-star rages—and this puts me in mind of hydrophobia, mad dogs, and useless animals generally, of which a dog eating the food that would support a

child is one, and a lazy drone, boy or girl, is another. Don't have either about the house; give the dog a bullet, the boy a hoe, and the girl some knitting-kneedies, and let it be understood no work no food—that's flat. Nothing is so disagreeable, in going to a farm house, as to have a great or small dog following at your heels, smelling about and growling, to show his ill-manners, and indicating that his master has some of his own wolfishness in his disposition.

That hoe is getting to be rather rusty. Tom or James left it over beside the wall in the turnip-field. One of them had better go and get it, and work it well in the land, until it is bright, and the land mellow. By the way, those boys had better work in different parts of the farm. "One boy is a boy, two boys are half a boy," you know the proverb says. If your hay crop is short, you will know it by the first of this month, and can put in some flat turnip seed. If you are short of barn manure, super-phosphate of lime is the best dressing for them. I hope, though, you have enough swedes to make the feed hold out.

**LIFE AND DEATH.**—It is generally supposed that the rate of mortality is lower in the Old World than in the New. Statistics, however, show that in Europe the annual number of deaths is 1 in every 42 inhabitants, but in this country it is 1 in every 81. In the Gulf states the average yearly proportion of deaths is 1 to every 63; in New England, 1 to 68; in the Southern states, 1 to 70; in the Atlantic and Mississippi Valley states, 1 to 80; in the Western states, 1 to 81; in the Middle states, 1 to 88; in the Pacific states 1 to 115; in the Northwestern states, 1 to 120. The apparent advantage of the Western states over the Eastern, may be ascribed in part to its absorbing so much young and vigorous population from the East.

Well, now, I suppose it would be a good plan to top-dress the mowing lands after haying. It pays well, better than six per cent. stocks or notes, if it is done judiciously. Now is a good time to do it, and a good compost may be made of muck, road scrapings, loam, and what manure can be scraped from the yard. Top-

dressing will enable you to keep down longer to grass, with large paying crops, without drawing too hard on the land. Don't fear the loss of well-composted manure on the top. It is better than burying too deep, and the waste is less. Nature always top-dresses, and keeps the roots of most trees and plants near the surface.

You may top-dress later in the fall with the coarser manures. but a good dressing of loam and compost, after haying, preserves the roots. Besides, it acts as a kind of mulch for the ground. Shade acts something like manure. A surface deeply shaded or covered rots like a manure heap, and is fitted to sustain and feed plants. Darkness, moisture and air promote vegetable decomposition. Turn up a board that has lain a long time on the ground, and see if the soil is not mellow and richer than when it was put there. The effect of surface manure is similar.

**SMALLPOX SPREAD BY BANK BILLS.**—Never since the discovery of vaccination has the smallpox been so prevalent as it is at present. It is observed to spread most rapidly and widely in these nations of Europe and America where paper currency is the circulating medium, and where trade and travel facilitate the propagation of the disease through bills that are full of grease, sweat, and other kinds of dirt. As preventives, it is recommended, first, that old, foul, rugged bills, be redeemed by an officer at the Treasury; secondly, that all bills in circulation in hospitals where the smallpox, the measles, and scarlet fever are treated, be redeemed with new bills that can safely be passed outside those places; thirdly, that paper currency never be held between the lips while making change, and never be handled without washing the hands.

My friend, I want you to take a little bank stock—it pays well—and the bank I want you to invest in will be handy, and give you great accommodations. Just raise that barn of yours a few feet, and cart it from your swamps as many loads of the

black muck as you can, and a few loads of loam from the sub-soil of your uplands; get a few barrels of plaster of paris powdered; have your barn floors so arranged that all liquids therefrom may run down on the BANK or heap below; and each day, as the droppings of your creatures are put down the scuttles, throw a few shovelfuls of muck, loam and plaster upon the bank, and put a few pigs into the cellar, and throw a little corn around among the manure; and the pigs will mix it well for you, and imagine that they are amusing themselves all the time. The heap never ought to smell. When manure smells, it is the ammonia—the very part that makes the plants grow—that is escaping; but those other matters you have put in will take it up and hold it till your plants want it. You are president, directors and company of this bank, and hold all the stock yourself; and whenever you want a discount from it, just back up your cart, put in your shovel, and take one.

**THE UNSTABLE EXISTENCE OF THE COMETS.**—In January, 1846, Biela's Comet divided itself into two parts, almost under the eyes of the observers, and each part pursued its course separately. As this comet did not return at the time the computation for the year 1866 led astronomers to expect, they now conclude that it has totally disappeared.

Most of the comets pass through orbits that render probable a conjunction of two comets at one and the same point of the heavenly space, and even a collision of a comet with a planet at some time or other, is absolutely certain. Astronomers have, by very recent computations, demonstrated that a conjunction of three or even five comets at once, is possible; it is therefore easy to comprehend that their existence is exceedingly unstable.

It is time now to be getting ready for winter. The turnips and ruta-bagas must be harvested early in the month. Get them in clean and dry, and put them on wooden racks in the cellar, so that the air may have access to them. A good supply of roots is worth having to feed out in connection with the meadow hay and course fodder. Feed the English turnips first, then the swedes or ruta-bagas, and last the mangolds that keep through the winter well and till late into the spring. It

isa good time to top-dress both the winter grains and the grass-lands with that great heap of fine compost that has been thrown over and so carefully prepared. It serves to protect the roots against the cold, and on new seeded lands gives a fine surface for the clover-seed, which you will want to sow on in March or April. Use all the manure you can scrape up in the yard and about the premises. It will be worth about as much again on the grass now as it will if kept till spring. And if you have a piece that you are going to break up in spring for corn, a good top-dressing on the sod now will pay well. Do as much plowing as you can. Plow up and down a slope, instead of across, in order to promote good drainage. Set out your trees now and be sure they are good.

**CORROSIVE POISON.**—Western distillers are placing a new kind of Whi-key on the market, in which there is so much sulphuric acid that it eats up the inside of the barrels in which it is kept. If a small piece of iron or copper is placed in the barrel, it will be instantly blackened, and if left a short time, a large quantity of verdigris will be evolved. And this is made for their fellow men to consume!

Everywhere we see the farmer multiplying his hands a hundred-fold by cunning machines. In the last eight years before the war more than two hundred different patents for mowers and reapers alone, were granted in the United States, and the farmers can do twice as much work with the same number of teams and men as they could fifty years ago.

## STATISTICS, &c., RELATING TO P. E. ISLAND

Prince Edward Island contains an area of about 1,250,000 acres, nearly all of which is fit for cultivation. It is divided into three Counties, 67 Townships, and 15 Electoral Districts. The population, by the census of 1871, is 94,021, of whom about 42,651 are in Queen's County. The population of Prince County is 28,022; and of King's County, 23,068. Charlottetown, the Capital of the Island, is in Queen's County, and contains about 8807 inhabitants; Georgetown and Royalty, 1056; and Summerside and Township No. 17, 3562. The House of Assembly is composed of 30 members, and the Legislative Council of 13, all of whom are elected by the people. The Executive Council is limited to nine members. Responsible Government was granted in 1851. The number of Schools now in operation is 362, attended by about 15,000 children. In 1852, when the present Free Education Act was passed, the number was 160. There are besides the Prince of Wales College (public,) and St Dunstan's College (Roman Catholic,) the Wesleyan Day School (Denominational), a County Grammar School in Georgetown and Summerside, and thirteen similar Schools throughout other parts of the Island. The whole cost of public instruction, which is under the control of a Board of Education, consisting of nine Members and two Examiners, is defrayed out of the general revenue. There is a School Visitor for each County, who reports to the Board, and the latter to the Government. The Septennial growth of the population is as follows:—

**DOMINION NEWSPAPER POSTAGE.**

On Newspapers published in the Dominion, the postage is, if paid quarterly in advance, either by the publisher or by the party to whom it is delivered:—

Once per week,	5 cents	Three times a week,	15 cents.
Twice	10 "	Daily,	30 "

If not paid in advance, 1 cent each. The commuted rate applies not only to paper circulating within the Dominion, but also to subscribers in the United Kingdom, United States, Newfoundland and Prince Edward Island. All papers must be pre-paid before leaving Canada, if not at the commuted rate, 1 cent each, but all transient newspapers, *i. e.*, papers not from the publishers or British newspapers posted by news agents to regular subscribers, must be pre-paid 2 cents each by postage stamps. Exchange papers pass *free* between publishers in Canada, and also to and from those in the United States, Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. Papers coming from England *via* the United States are charged 2 cents each on delivery; by Canadian mails *free*. Postage on papers from the United States to regular subscribers in Canada, 1 cent; transient United States papers 2 cents. Papers from Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland may be delivered to regular subscribers at the ordinary commuted rate; transient papers, 2 cents each.

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### FOR TOURISTS, &c.

During the Summer months a good many persons visit Prince Edward Island, and nearly all of them have more or less time to spend among us. Some come for health, others for recreation; and a few on business simply make a hurried call. As strangers they are often deprived of many a sail and drive, just because they can procure no hand-book to guide them. To supply the want to some extent, we add the following notes:—

#### The Market House.

In Charlottetown we have a fine large Market House on Queen Square, with two market days in each week, namely: Tuesday and Friday. On these days, the market will repay a visit, and enable strangers to form a pretty fair estimate of the social condition of our rural population, as well as of the quality of the products of the farm and dairy.

#### The Colonial Building.

From the roof of this Building, commenced in 1843, as also from the roof of the New Post Office and Law Courts, an excellent view of the city can be obtained. Looking to the west, we see before us Government House and Farm; a portion of the Royalty; the North and West Rivers, and adjacent Settlements. North of us appear the Wesleyan Academy, St. Dunstan's College, and some very neat private residences; casting our eyes Eastward, we take in the Prince of Wales College, the two Convents, and the Hillsborough, with well cultivated farms, and fine cottages on either side; while Clifton, Southport, Rosebank and Rocky Point, in all their beauty, lie before us to the South, with Nova Scotia in the far distance. The House of Assembly and Council Rooms, in the Colonial Building, are always open to strangers, who can register their names in the Legislative Library, and examine the few curiosities it contains. The birds of the Island, arranged at the head of the main stairway, will give an idea of the number, and variety of the feathered tribe. The New Law Courts and Post Office, which are very tastefully finished, should also be visited by every tourist.

#### The Royalty

Is a belt of country stretching about three miles back of the town. It is highly cultivated, and in most cases, well laid off. It is well intersected with good roads, and a drive through it will show the nature of our Farming, and what the soil is capable of producing

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### Boating, &c.

Those who are fond of boating can, two or three times a-day, cross over from Pownal wharf to Rocky Point, where they will find good accommodation. The sail is about two miles long, and affords a splendid view of Government House, and the rivers flowing into and forming the harbor. Or if they wish they may go every Tuesday and Friday afternoon, by Steamer, to Mount Stewart, a village on the Hillsborough River, about 18 miles from Charlottetown, and return the same evening. Twice a week the tourists may also take Steamer for Orwell, outside the harbor, which will afford them a good view of Hillsborough Bay, with St. Peter's and Governor's Islands, South Shore and Nine Mile Creek Settlements; Bellvue, Pownal, Gallas Point, Point Prim, &c. Those who do not care for a short sea voyage, can cross over to Southport every half hour, and drive down to Tea Hill, (three miles distant) or Pownal Village, (six miles) or to the Half-way House, (fifteen miles from the City.) From the high land in rear of Pownal, the largest and finest landscape view on the Island may be obtained. Tourists fond of surf bathing, (and who are not?) can take a carriage for Stanhope or Rustico, which they may reach in three hours. The Ocean House, at the latter place, is especially suited for those who leave crowded cities for a few months' rest and quiet. The great fishing fleet is always in sight.

### Fishing.

Good trout fishing may be had at Bonshaw, 14 miles from Charlottetown; at Wheatley River Bridge, 13 miles out; at Thompson's Mills, six miles from the City, and several other localities, all accessible by land. Morell, Winter and Dunk Rivers are famous for their salmon. Mackerel abounds in the harbors as well as in the gulf.

### Game

Is rather scarce, and it requires a sportsman well acquainted with the country to bag many birds. In their season, however, wild geese, duck, brant, partridge, wood-cock, plover, snipe, &c., may be had.

### Ferries, &c.

**HILLSBOROUGH FERRY**, between Charlottetown and Southport. City landing at the foot of Prince Street. A steamer plies regularly every half hour from 6, a.m., and till 10, p.m., in summer. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

**ROCKY POINT FERRY**, between Charlottetown and Rocky Point, at the western entrance of the harbor, distance two miles. A nice, clean Sail-boat crosses every two hours, two and from Pownal Wharf. Fare, each way, 4 cents.

**MOUNT STEWART BRIDGE AND ORWELL** are brought into communication twice a week by Steamboat.

GEORGETOWN will have a passenger Steamer plying on that harbor next summer, bringing Murray Harbor, Little Sands, Brown's Creek, &c., into more direct contact with the capital of King's County.

#### Mail Coach Lines.

A Mail leaves Charlottetown every day, (Sunday excepted,) for Summerside and Georgetown; and one leaves each of those places daily for the capital. Mails go to Crapaud three times, and to Bedeque twice a week. From Summerside there is bi-weekly Stage to Port Hill, Bideford, Alberton, &c. Souris receives a mail on Tuesdays and Fridays, direct from Charlottetown, and Tuesdays and Fridays from Georgetown. Murray Harbor, Belfast, Fort Augustus, New London, Malpeque, and all the important settlements, have mail communication with the city twice a week.

#### Reading Rooms.

We have three Reading Rooms in the City, one kept by Mr A. McNeill, in Hyndman's Brick Building, on Water Street, and open to all strangers; one in the Lower Athenæum, for members of the Young Men's Christian Association; and the other in St. Dunstan's Hall, Sydney Street, for the members of the Catholic Young Men's Literary Association.

#### Billiard Rooms.

Charlottetown has no public Billiard Rooms. Two private Clubs have one each, in Hyndman's Brick Building, above the Telegraph Office.

#### Livery Stables.

Of these, the City possesses three. A buggy and pair can be had for \$5 a day, and a single team for \$3.

#### Churches.

There are nine places of Worship in Charlottetown. St Paul's, (Episcopal) is on Queen Square, near the Colonial Building. Rector, Rev David FitzGerald, A. M., T. C. D. St Peter's, (also Episcopal and Ritualistic,) is at the West end of the City. Rev George W. Hodgson, A. M.; Minister. St James' Kirk—the Rev Thomas Duncan's—is near the upper end of Pownal Street; and Zion Church—the Rev John McL. McLeod's—is on the South Side of Queen Square, nearly opposite the Colonial Building. The Wesleyan Chapel—the Rev James Taylor, Pastor—is the largest brick church in the City. It is situated on Prince Street, and nearly facing it stands the Bible Christian Chapel—Rev G. Webber. At the head of Prince Street is the Free Church, at present occupied by the Wesleyans. The Roman Catholic Chapel—Rev Dr McDonald and Rev W. Phelan—on Great George Street, is so large and conspicuous that it proclaims its own locality. The Baptist Chapel—Rev John Davis—is on the same street, adjoining the Bank of P. E. Island.

Printed Circulars, in unsealed envelopes, not exceeding  $\frac{1}{2}$  ounce, 1 cent each, which must be prepaid.

Newspapers to the United Kingdom, Newfoundland, Dominion and United States, free.

Newspapers for Bermuda and West Indies, 2 cents each, must be prepaid; for Australia, India, &c. 4 cents each, must be prepaid.

Parcels for the Dominion, Newfoundland and the Island, 24 cents per lb; must be prepaid in stamps, and have the words, "by parcel post," plainly written on them; no letters shall be enclosed.

#### Postage Stamps.

Can be had at the General Post Office, Ch'town, during office hours.

Letters to be registered must be posted at least *half an hour previous* to the closing of the mail by which they are to be sent; the postage as well as the registration fee, *must be prepaid*. The registration of a letter to any place in this Island, British North America, or United States is four cents; and United Kingdom eight cents.

☞ Attention to the following remarks, by those who are in the habit of sending money by mail, is strongly recommended:

Registration is applicable to all descriptions of letters and parcels, whether they contain articles of value or not. Registration is not an absolute guarantee against the miscarriage or loss of a letter; but a registered letter may be traced, when one unregistered can not, and the posting and delivery or non-delivery can be proven. A registered letter is thus secured against many of the casualties which, from incorrect address, forgetfulness of the receiver, or other error, may effect an unregistered letter against actual dishonesty on the part of the Post Office employees; a registered letter is incomparably more secure than an unregistered one—an unregistered letter leaves no trace behind it, whilst passing in the great stream of ordinary correspondence, though its presence as a money letter, and the nature of its contents, are to any person accustomed to handle letters, as manifest as though the letter had been singled out and marked by the registered stamp. If the consequences were limited to the mere risk of the loss of the money so sent, the senders of money in unregistered letters might reasonably urge, that if they choose to encounter the risk, they are free to do so; but higher considerations are involved, and the chance of loss to the careless remitter is really but the smallest part of the evil associated with the practice. The department has gone to a great deal of trouble and expence to ensure as far as is possible the sure and safe transmission of money by mail—the safest mode of remitting is by *money orders*,—where there are no money order offices, the *registration system* is available.

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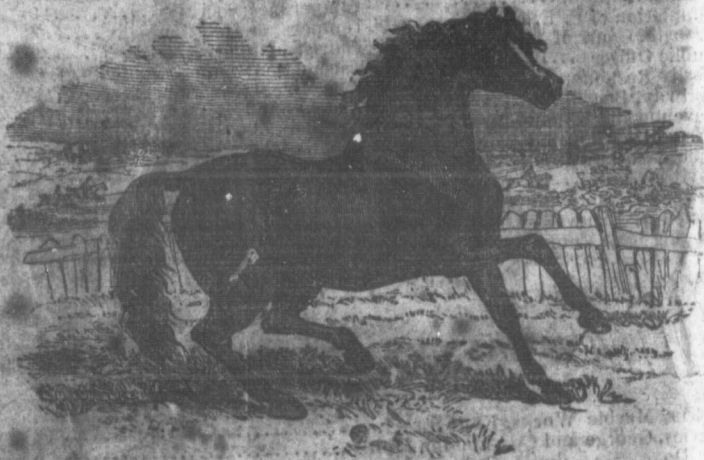
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
