A machine is not, in fact, because it is made of wheels or cylinders, employs the power of the steam or the lever, is driven by wind, or water, or steam; but because it bestows the labor of man, by calling into action some power which he does not possess in himself.

The chief distinction between man in a rude, and man in a civilized, state of society is, that the one makes his force, whether natural or acquired—the other exercises it.

Labor is worth nothing without results. Its value is only to be measured by what it produces. If a country goes on heaving grain between two stones, you would pronounce them fools, because they could obtain equal quantity of meal with a man's less expenditure of labor.

But if the system of grinding corn by hand were a very ancient system of society, and the introduction of so great a benefit as the water-mill had all at once displaced the spinning wheel, what must become, you say, of the one hundred and fifty men who earned £15 a-year, of which sum the consumer has now got £14 10 in his pocket?

He maintains that "the forms of Government, and the changes that take place in them, depend on the actual state of public information, and the consequent progress of public opinion. The effect of the point, but lately cited, is irresistible. More or less will be required, to produce the necessary results. They will depend, partly on the physical force at the command of the actual rulers of the country, and partly upon the quantum of knowledge and the faculty of

propagating it throughout a community. It will be found, by the examination of historical facts, in reference to the last observation, that, for a nation to be scientific, learned, wise, and even virtuous, is the highest and greatest blessing, not to be despised by the inhabitants, are absolutely necessary to the demand for science or learning, as for the results produced by men of science and learning—there are no facilities of communicating knowledge—no accurate observation of political events—no wise deductions of the consequences that flow from them to the legislator, where intellectual pursuits of every kind, being to classes of men, who attend to them as a business, and where the number of people furnish an adequate demand for the instruction, direction, useful truths, and literary publications, that flow from these classes of men, who thus make of these objects, an occupation of regular and incessant pursuit; and who receive, in consequence, an adequate reward, either in solid emolument, or in reputation and consideration among the classes of society with whom they live.
