NAVIES WILL FORCE GREECE TO BEHAVE

DEMONSTRATION BEFORE ATHENS IS POSSIBLE

League Council In Session Over Balkan Crisis

REPORT ACCORD Bulgarian Envoy Declares 48 Casualties Inflicted By Greek Invasion

ATHENS, Oct. 27.—The Greek government today ordered the prompt execution of Bulgarian territory by its forces. The movement to withdraw the Greek frontier guards to their former posts has been begun.

PARIS, Oct. 27.—A naval demonstration before Athens is a possible League of Nations move, should the government of Premier Pangalos decline to bow to the League Council's decision that must cease all hostilities and remove all Greek forces from Bulgarian soil.

The council hopes and believes that Greek government will accept the decision, but it was learned in authoritative circles today, that the advisability of a naval blockade has already been discussed privately by the council.

AGREEMENT REPORTED Although M. Carapanos, the Greek minister told the council today that both Greece and Bulgaria had reached a direct accord, through the good offices of Rumania to suspended hostilities and retire behind their frontiers, the Bulgarian representatives declared they had no confirmation of this report.

Indeed M. Morloff, speaking for Sofia government, informed the council that a direct entente with Greece was utterly impossible because of Greece's persistent refusal to listen to Bulgaria's repeated offers to appoint a joint commission to inquire into the border trouble.

M. Morloff said the latest despatch from Sofia, showed that up to yesterday the Bulgarian losses were 46 killed or wounded. Of these, 26 were soldiers, and 20 civilians, men and women. There was the probability of other unknown victims.

The conditions of the agreement, he said, were that Bulgarian and Greek officers should proceed this afternoon to the frontier to arrange for the return of the Greek border guards to their original posts.

WITHDRAW IMMEDIATELY The Greek troops in Bulgaria would begin their withdrawal immediately, and the Bulgarian forces would not advance in a manner to hinder the Greeks until the latter had crossed the frontier.

An Athens despatch last night said the Greco-Bulgarian agreement, at the suggestion of Rumania, had been reached prior to yesterday's action of the League of Nations Council in Paris, which ordered Greece and Bulgaria to withdraw their troops behind their respective frontiers.

Whether Rumania acted independently of the League or not, the effect of the agreement is to carry out the conditions laid down by the League Council, which stipulated that the disputing states should issue orders for retirement of their troops within 24 hours, and be in a position within 60 hours to report that the evacuation was complete.

PREMIER KING SIES HATCH FOR SLANDER

1,000 To 7,000 Lives Reported Lost In Cyclone Which Swept Bahrein Islands; Boats Sunk

BAHRA, Iraq, Oct. 27.—Conflicting reports are being brought in concerning the cyclone which swept the Bahrein Islands, in the Persian Gulf. The first account of the storm brought in by the Indian merchant ship Lawrence, stated that 7,000 lives were lost, and that 200 pearl fishing vessels were missing. A later report says that 1,000 lives were lost and 70 boats destroyed.

C. G. M. M. VESSELS FOR CUBA ROUTE

Eight From Lake Service Sold, Six For Canada-Cuba Line.

MONTREAL, Oct. 27.—Eight steamers belonging to the Canadian Government Merchant Marine, formerly employed in the Great Lakes trade, have been sold, it was officially learned today.

GERMAN CABINET TO REMAIN IN OFFICE

Scorns Aid of Nationalist Party—Vacant Portfolios Are Filled.

BERLIN, Oct. 27.—The Luther-Stresemann cabinet will continue to function without the assistance of the Nationalist party, and furthermore, promises rigid adherence to the foreign policy and treaties at Locarno.

Took Double Time To Make Voyage

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 27.—Out over 66 hours from St. John's, Nfld., or practically double the usual time between that port and Halifax, the Red Cross liner Roseland, arrived here this morning, out-riding the week-end storm that swept the North Atlantic without injury, but reporting one of the roughest trips ever experienced between the two places.

FORMER REGISTRAR DEAD.

TORONTO, Oct. 27.—Peter Ryan, former Toronto registrar of deeds and long prominent in real estate circles, died last night at his home here, after a long illness. He was 83 years of age.

Would Use Canadian Ports More For Flour Shipments

TORONTO, Oct. 26.—Charles La Ferle, traffic manager for the Maple Leaf Milling Co., Ltd., could have his way, Canadian ports would have more business, and also, there would be less Canadian grain milled in Buffalo, Mr. La Ferle showed me a file of correspondence which included representations to the Railway Commission, the Governor General and the Colonial Secretary, relative to rates on flour to Newfoundland. He would have all the business done through our own ports, cutting out Boston, and also cutting out American milled flour, which has been getting an entry into the market of the Ancient Colony. He insists that Canadian flour for that market should get the export rate. If a shipment of flour is to be made from Goderich to Hamburg, Germany, the rail rate to Saint John or Halifax is 18 1/2 cents per hundred pounds. If it is for St. John's, Newfoundland, the rate to our ports is 33 1/2 cents. In both cases the flour is handled under the same conditions, but the element of competition does not enter into the Newfoundland business, and so the export rate is denied by the transportation companies. Mr. La Ferle insists that our own ports, including Saint John and Halifax, should get all of this business, and that Canada should command the market, instead of permitting the Americans to strengthen their foothold.

HE insists that it is a short-sighted policy the railways are pursuing, and that it will result in loss of business, whereas they should be increasing their hold on the traffic. He is still carrying on correspondence, and should be deeply interested in this matter. Buffalo can ship flour to Boston for Newfoundland at a rail rate of 16 cents, compared with 33 1/2 cents from Goderich to Maritime ports. And this led Mr. La Ferle to talk of Buffalo. Because it enjoys cheaper rail rates Buffalo is not only eclipsing Minneapolis as a milling center, but it is milling Canadian wheat and closing up Canadian mills. Minneapolis ad-

LONDON, Oct. 27.—Darrall Figgis, Irish journalist, and a member of the Free State parliament, was found dead today in a lodging house. Gas was escaping from a jet. Last week, he was a witness at a coroner's inquest into the death of Mrs. Nora, a young dancing teacher. She died in a hospital from an operation. The coroner's inquiry had been continued until November fifth.

Sherbrooke Contest Narrowed To Two

SHERBROOKE, Que., Oct. 27.—Sherbrooke will see the scene of a three-cornered fight. F. N. McCrea, Independent-Liberal-Protectivist candidate, who has represented Sherbrooke in the House of Commons for several years, this morning announced that he had retired from the contest, which leaves Colonel E. B. Worthington, Conservative and C. B. Howard, Liberal, to fight it out on straight party lines.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Oct. 27.—Several persons were reported killed and scores injured, when the Sunnysland, Freco train No. 108, Northbound from Birmingham, Ala., to Kansas City, Mo., was wrecked at Victoria, Miss., a few miles north of Holly Springs, Tenn. There were that several cars left the tracks.

DARROW MEETS PRELATE IN A JOINT DEBATE

Thousands Hear Mechanist Theory Discussed in Chicago

BISHOP OPPONENT

Necessity of Faith Is Stressed by Rt. Rev. F. J. McConnell In Talk

CHICAGO, Oct. 27.—Bishop Francis J. McConnell, of Pittsburg, and Clarence Darrow, Chicago attorney and writer, last night debated the question, "Does the mechanist theory explain man?" before several thousand persons at Emile G. Hirsch center.

Dr. Darrow compared man to an engine; by itself it created nothing, the body returned to the 25 or 30 chemical elements from which it was made, and the individual had gone.

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OPEN SHOP GAINING

Report Claims Only 10 Per Cent. of U. S. Labor Enrolled in Closed Shops.

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 27.—Open shops has gained until it prevails generally in United States industry, with the exception of a few key industries. It was reported at the annual convention of the National Association of Manufacturers here last night. It was estimated that only 10 per cent. of United States labor now is enrolled in closed shops.

Yukon Gold Camp Is Being Closed Out

DAWSON, Oct. 27.—Transfer of men and equipment of the Yukon Gold Company under which name the Guggenheims interests of New York have been operating near Dawson, to the Malay Peninsula, where the firm has large tin mines, is now proceeding, and will be completed shortly, it is expected.

Drug Sale Reduced Except In Ontario

OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 27.—As a result of drastic laws which have been enforced, the illicit sale of narcotic drugs in Canada during the last few weeks had rapidly decreased, declared F. W. Cowan, chief of the narcotic division of the Department of Health, to the members of the Rotary Club here yesterday. This decrease, he said, was noticeable, practically in all provinces except in Ontario, where there had been an increase, despite all the activities of the authorities.

Asquith's Son To Enter Movie Trade

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—En route from London to Hollywood, where he is going into the movie business, Anthony Asquith, son of our Margot Asquith and former Premier of England, is in New York.

Three Fires Start In Quick Succession At Newcastle; Incendiarism Is Suspected

NEWCASTLE, Oct. 27.—Early this morning fire broke out in a barn at the rear of a house tenanted by Miss Breau, milliner, and spread rapidly to the main house, thence to the home of Dr. J. A. M. Bell, and for a time threatened the houses of the nearby residents. Prompt and efficient work by the fire department prevented any great loss. QUIT TO PREVENT SPLIT IN JEW VOTE

Popliger Retires in Cartier Leaving Battle to Jacobs and Bernier.

MONTREAL, Oct. 27.—The retirement is announced of Jidore Popliger, Patenaude candidate, from the election fight in the Cartier division of Montreal, leaving the battle to S. W. Jacobs, late member, straight liberal, and J. A. Bernier, Independent Liberal. Mr. Popliger, in announcing his retirement, said that if he ran he would split the Jewish vote, which would mean that the 250,000 Hebrews in Canada would be without a representative in the House of Commons.

FIVE FAMILIES FLEE SMOKE-FILLED HOME

Dalhousie Apartment, Ottawa, Damaged—Occupants Escape in Night Clothes.

OTTAWA, Oct. 27.—Five families were almost overcome by dense smoke which filled the Dalhousie Apartment early this morning, when fire, breaking out in a rubbish heap at the rear of the building, burned through the ground floor door and quickly filled the entire building with the fumes.

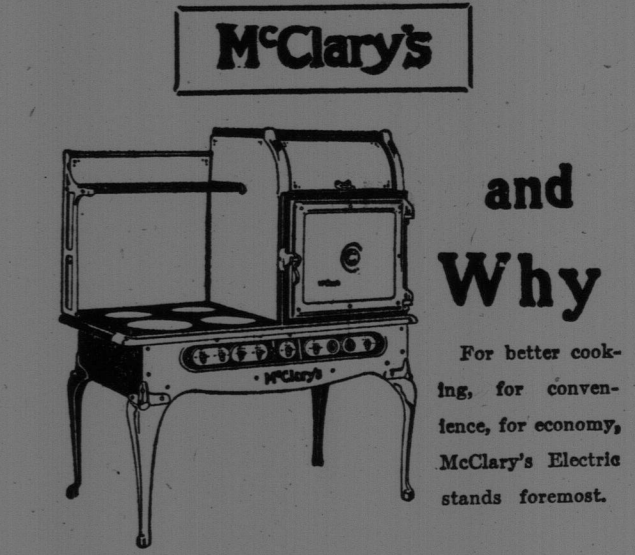

EAT MORE FISH; HELP COUNTRY

National Fish Day to be Observed in Canada Tomorrow

Increase Will Lower Price and Retain Capital in The Dominion.

Tomorrow will be National Fish Day, a day upon which the people are asked to aid the fishing industry by having fish at their meals.

Consumption of fish per head per annum in Canada is only 22 to 24 lbs., while in Britain it is between 45 and 80 lbs., and in Japan over 200 lbs., stated Daniel J. Byrne in an address to the Montreal Lions' Club.

IMPORTANT INDUSTRY.

The fish industry of this country is only second to that of agriculture, he stated. The greatest fishing waters in the world are about the 40th degree of latitude and in the great Canada is fortunate because the coast on both sides is above that degree.

Referring to the annual fish day, Mr. Byrne said that its inception took place during the war when it was necessary to encourage the consumption of fish in order that a good supply of concentrated foods might be sent over to the boys fighting in France and Flanders.

HEALTHFUL ASPECTS.

He pointed out the health-giving qualities of fish, as has been told by medical men, particularly sea fish having a small quantity of iodine, which helps to prevent goitre. Also in the case of diabetes, doctors advised patients to eat meat but allowed them to eat fish.

Canada's best customer for fish is the United States, Mr. Byrne said, but he thought there ought to be a much greater consumption in Canada.

Mr. Byrne said there was invested in the fish industry in Canada some \$48,000,000 or \$46,000,000. With an increase in consumption that figure could easily be doubled or trebled and that would mean the retaining of capital in this country, more employment and more work for the railways.

ices are that Minnesota wheat can be taken to Buffalo and ground and marketed much cheaper than it can be done by mills in Minneapolis.

The Buffalo Sunday Express recently printed two pages of pictures of the harbor and grain elevators, with this announcement: "Buffalo is the greatest grain centre on the North American continent."

THE Express goes on to show that the present storage capacity of Buffalo's grain elevators is 31,450,000 bushels, with 5,500,000 being added this year and 5,000,000 more contemplated, making a grand total of 41,950,000 bushels storage capacity.

"Like mighty magnets the Buffalo grain elevators attract to themselves the grain shipments from all parts of the nation, and from the great Canadian Northwest. Especially heavy is the latter, and a fact connected with it is tending to make Buffalo the country's greatest milling centre as well as the greatest grain centre."

THIS is confirmed by the fact that in two years Buffalo has increased its milling capacity by 11,000 barrels per day, while the output of Ontario mills has been reduced over 9,000 barrels per day in the same period.

When Both Husband and Wife are Wage-Earners, Both Should Contribute Toward Home Expenses in Proportion to Their Earnings, but Each Should Have a Separate and Personal Bank Account.

UNDOUBTEDLY, matrimony has many more complications in these perilous, equal-rights-of-the-sexes times than in the obsolete old days when a wife was a chattel who stayed put wherever her husband set her own.

And among the greatest of these complications is the problem of how the woman who continues to work after she is married and her husband should adjust their finances and their individual rights and privileges. For curiously enough, while meeting modern conditions in one way, in the other way they have been unable to free themselves from the thrall of old traditions.

BY THIS I mean that while the man is willing for his wife to be a money earner, he feels that, as a husband, he has entire right to carry the pocketbook and that she should give him all she makes. And the woman, while desiring to follow a gainful occupation outside of her home, still feels that, as a wife, her husband should support her.

In a word, both want to have their cake and eat it, too. And the attempt to accomplish this gastronomic feat gives rise to endless bickerings and quarrels.

This difficulty is going to increase, rather than decrease, because, for one thing, the high cost of living has made it virtually impossible for the average young man to get married, unless he marries a girl who has a dowry or who continues to be a money-earner after marriage. And, for another thing, nearly every girl nowadays has been trained to some profession or trade and has made her own living before she was married, and very few women who have known the joy of having their own pocketbooks are ever satisfied to give them up and become financially dependent again.

WE HAVE, then, thousands of young couples in which the wife keeps on with her job after marriage and who superimposes upon that the labor of the housewife, for she makes a home for her husband just as much as does the purely domestic woman.

Ofhand, an outsider would say that any man who had got that sort of paragon as a wife—one who could help provide the dinner and cook it, too—should be only too happy to make good on his marriage vow, "With all my worldly goods I thee endow," but such seems to be far from the case.

In innumerable instances the men who have married these go-getter wives turn slackers and let Sally do it. In many other cases, the husbands demand that their wives turn over their entire pay envelopes to them, and they dole out to the women who have earned them such pennies as they see fit. In other cases, the wives are the grafters, and feel that they should not be called upon to contribute to the upkeep of the home, but have a right to use all the money they make in gratifying their extravagant personal tastes.

When the husband and wife are both money-earners, I think that the fair way to settle the matter is for them both to contribute toward running the home in proportion to their earnings.

THE idea that a man should support his home and his wife entirely was based on the theory that she gave all of her time and labor to her family, and when she goes outside of the home to work she forfeits the right to be supported. On the other hand, the woman who does her housework, in addition to her other work, contributes at least the wages of a maid and housekeeper to the communal good, and that should be taken into consideration in adjusting the household financial budget.

Such a couple might well establish a joint bank account, a savings account preferably, for the common good, but beyond that I think it makes for happiness and peace in a family for both the husband and wife to have some money that they can do with as they please and without any interference from the other.

OF COURSE, it is a noble gesture for each to say, "All that I have is yours," but somehow this seldom works out satisfactorily in actual practice. At least, so far as women are concerned. For a wife finds out that while she has a technical claim on her husband's purse, it is one that she cannot enforce and that she only gets out of it what he chooses to give her.

That is why women are wise, in the great majority of cases, in hanging on to their own money with a death grip, whether they inherit it or whether they earn it. Their husbands don't often mean to cheat them out of it, but once a man gets possession of his wife's money, he regards it as absolutely his own, and he feels that he is being just as generous in giving her a few dollars of it as if it had come out of his own pocket.

CERTAINLY, it is going to be difficult for the husband of the future to reconcile himself to the thought of a wife being financially independent of him and having a right to the money she earns, and it is going to be difficult for a woman to realize that she can't be both a parasite and a wage-earner. But all that is needed to smooth out the situation is a little common sense and justice.

Sentimentalists might say that there should be no question about money between a husband and wife who love each other, but there always has been and always will be. It is at the bottom of nine-tenths of the friction in every household, and it will be lessened, not increased, when it is settled as a frankly business proposition, instead of by chicanery, and jangling, and pandering, and petty larceny, as wives have mostly had to settle it in the past.

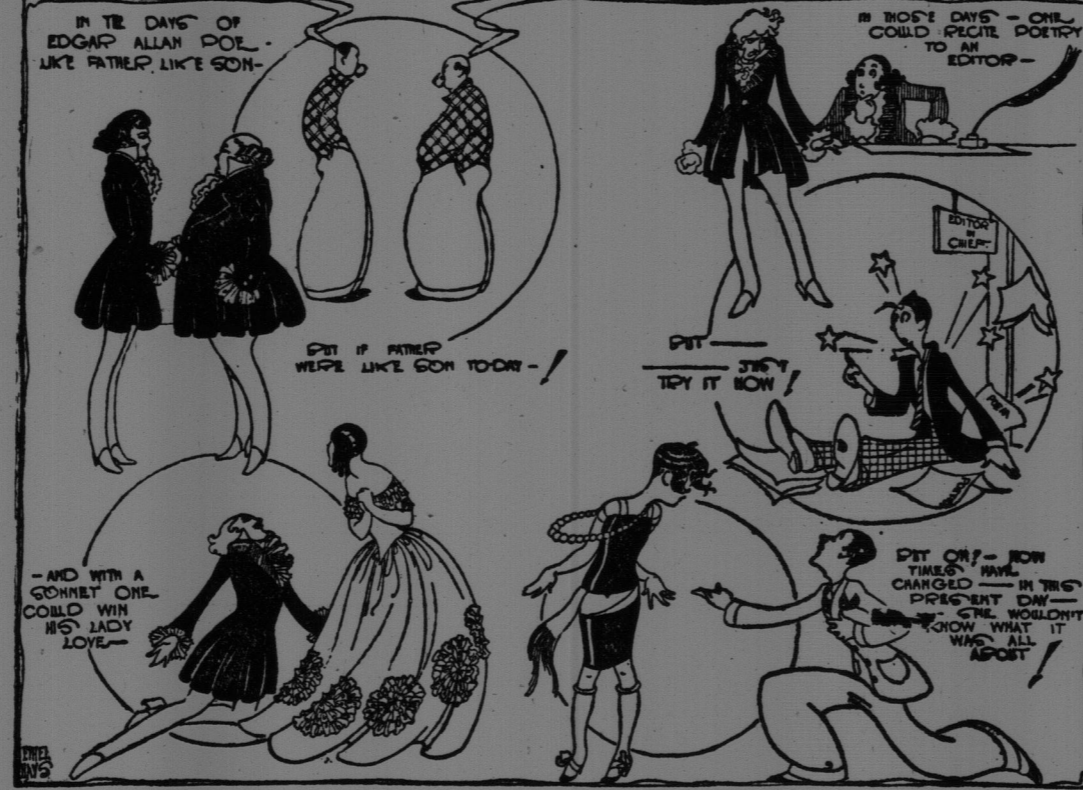

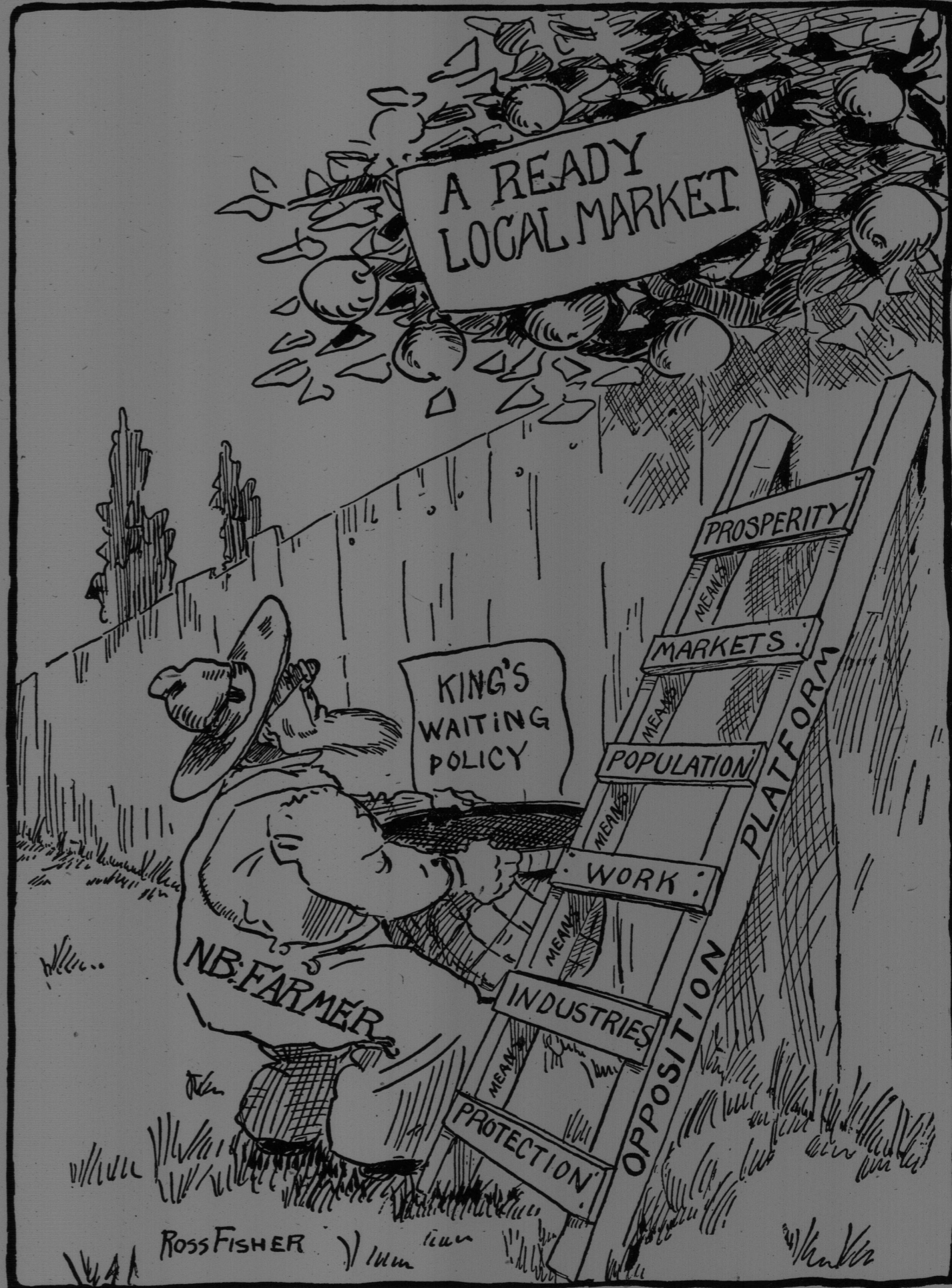

She was found in the attic of a partially constructed house in Kenmore, just outside the city limits, by a workman. Under the name of Annie Archer, "Cat-eye" Annie was sentenced to 10 years in Auburn prison for the theft of jewelry worth \$15,000 from a Buffalo home where she was employed as a maid. She was arrested in Milwaukee recently where she was using the name of Lillian McDowell. She was wanted for robberies in at least seven cities.

AT BLACK RIVER

Meetings in the interests of Hon. Dr. W. E. Foster and R. T. Hayes, Liberal candidates in Saint John-Albert were held last evening at Black River and Fairfield. At the former the speakers were A. F. Seven Trans-Atlantic Liners Delayed; Other Crafts Are Damaged.

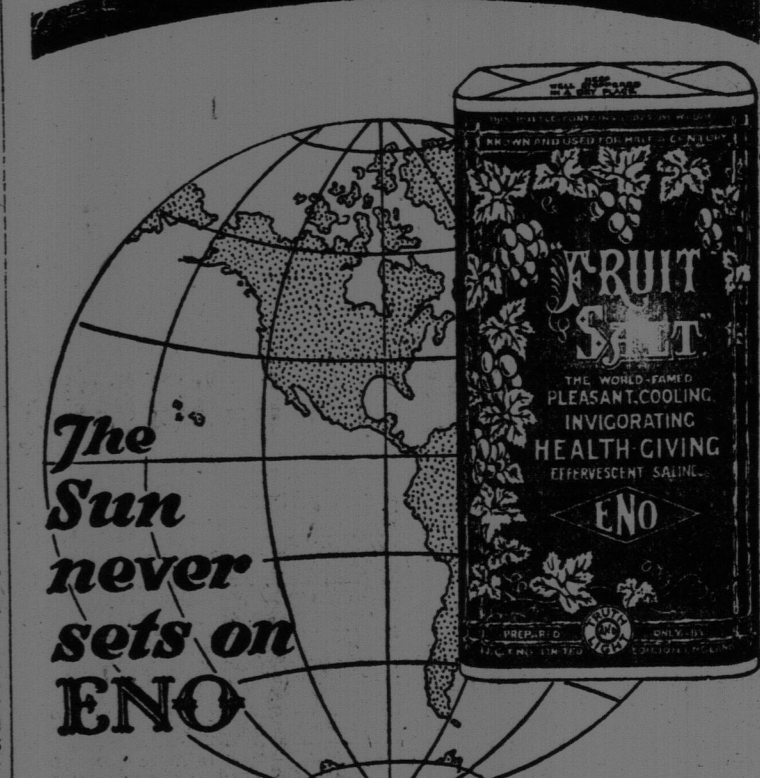

Fires Send Shellac Prices Upward

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—Fire aboard the Stockwell and the City of Lahore, two ships with cargoes of shellac bound for this country, caused sharp advances in the prices of this product in the New York, London and Calcutta markets last week, says The Oil, Paint and Drug Reporter.

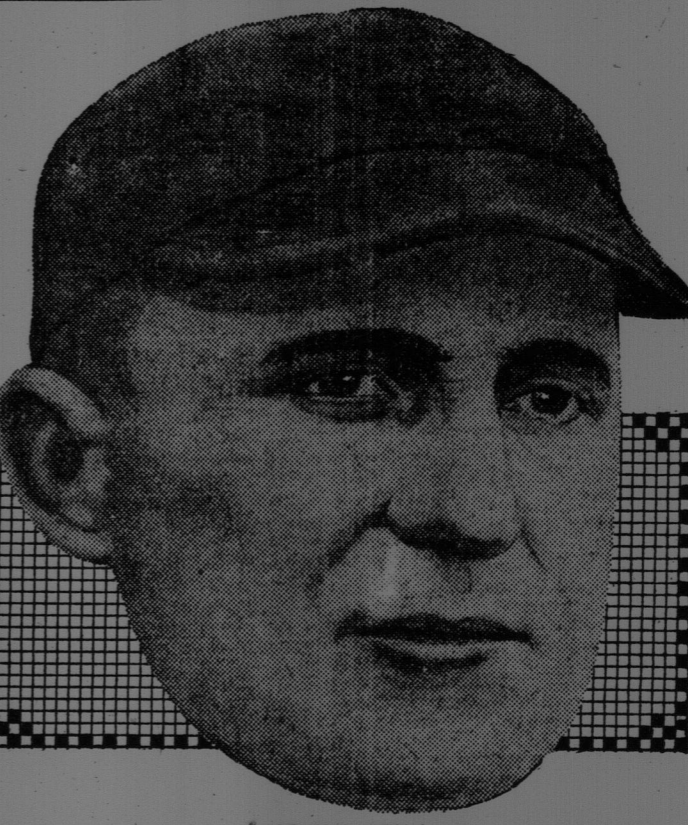
