There were 364,130 casualties among horses in the British army, while dogs listed for various purposes died by the thousands. Camels, reindeer, elephants and oxen perished in transport service; cats were killed in research work; pigeons were shot down while carrying messages, and mice and small birds were sacrificed in the detection of poison gases. Goldfish were used to test water in gas helmets.

London, Feb. 12.—Edmund Plummer, 92 years of age, is probably the only survivor of the boys who were under the notorious "Mr. Squeers," at Dotheboys Hall, immortalized in Charles Dickens' "Nicholas Nickleby."

Dotheboys Hall, with 150 boys, was at Bowes, Yorkshire. Mr. Plummer related to a newspaper man some of his recollections of it about 1840—84 years ago—when he had the ill-luck to be one of the suffering boarders.

COULD BE GIVEN

Philadelphian is Named in Twenty-six Indictments in Liquor Cases.

Philadelphia, Feb. 12.—Twenty-six indictments against alleged purchasers and venders of liquor in a "mail order" distribution scheme said to have been devised by Isaac Bulifant of this city have been returned by the Federal Grand Jury. Twenty-seven men were named in the indictments, each of which charged conspiracy to violate the prohibition law.

named in the indictments, each of which charged conspiracy to violate the prohibition law.

The indictments are believed to be the first ever returned naming persons as buyers of illegal beverages since passage of the prohibition laws. Each alleged purchaser was indicted on two counts, conviction for which would carry a maximum penalty of four years' imprisonment and \$20,000 fine.

According to Federal officials, the scheme comprised a distribution of liquor in four states through mail orders sent here, the liquor being shipped by railway express by Bulifant and his agents, in some instances being billed as "rubber goods."

Bulifant, who is proprietor of the Novelty Glass Company, this city, is named in each of the 26 indictments and the 52 counts. Should he be convicted, prohibition authorities say, he would be liable to a maximum penalty of 104 years in prison and \$540,000 fine.

The meeting, which was attended by President Ban Johnson and seven members of the league, was the so-called schedule session held each year, and was the first of its kind in this city by either league. Aside from adopting the playing schedule for 1924, which was released for publication tomorrow, the magnates devoted their time and attention to, informal discussions of what was best for the league. No deals were made public. The Chicago club was not represented, owing to the legal tangle growing out of the Joe Jackson incident.

The call for the meeting in Boston this year was a tribute to the new owner of the Red Sox, Robert Quinn. It marked the continuance of a policy previously adopted to have the American League magnates visit each of the cities in the organization in turn.

Babe proposed a diploma setting forth the work of the player, and signed either by President Johnson or the Chairman of the Trophy Committee. The proposal was adopted unanimously, and in a few weeks Ruth will have something to hang on the walls of his Sudbury home, setting forth his prowess in the 1923 season. Sisler, who was selected in 1922 as the most valuable player in the league, also will receive a diploma.

The members of the league voted that more time be given the visiting clubs in their batting practice. It was decided that the visitors should be given thirty minutes of such practice from the opening of the season until June, and twenty minutes from June 1 to the close of the season.


