"It has now been definitely decided that the ministry will not purchase the new season's Canadian cheese. The maximum importers selling press. (32 cents) new season's Canadian cheese. 



TREAT WITH THE SOVIET AT ONCE

This Is Advice of British M.P. Says Russia Has Plenty of

Paris, April 30—"Soviet Russia has plenty of grain, and is willing to consider the question of fulfilling the obligations to France contracted by the Czarist regime," said Colonel Malone, M. P., an authority on Russia, who has just returned after a tour of that country.

"The French imperialists may imagine they can get more from a reactionary government, but they are making a mistake. They should treat with the Soviets immediately in order at least to settle conditions in Europe.

"It is in the interest of all allied governments to follow the example of Premier Nitti, who is far-sighted and is doing his utmost to arrive at peace and trade relations with Russia."

ICE CAUSES A BAD FIRE

Spontaneous Combustion at Farm House Responsible for \$10,000 Loss.

Peterboro, April 30—A report made public here and prepared by Deputy Fire Marshal H. Cowan of Toronto, blames spontaneous combustion for the fire that destroyed the barn and contents on the farm of Hugh Fife, Otonabee township. The net loss was \$10,000. According to the report, the fire originated under the gangway of the barn, where eighty blocks of ice had been stored and covered with sawdust. The action of the sun and the moisture generated sufficient heat to cause a combustion fire. Deputy Fire Marshal Cowan condemnse the practice of building ice houses close to barns or buildings of any kind.

WHOLESALE AT 32 Chicago, April 30—Sugar reached the highest price on record in Chicago yesterday, according to commission men, when a 1,000 pound lot sold for thirty-two cents wholesale. Buyers attempted to obtain more by offering thirty-two cents but there was none for sale.

## MURDER CASE

Doctor's Evidence at Trial of Romeo Remillard in Que-

(Canadian Press.)

Quebec, April 30-"It was a lover of mother's, and I shot him. I am not afraid. I will not be hanged for this. Father told me to fire, and I fired." Such was the statement made by Romeo Remillard, aged twenty years, whose trial for the murder of Lieutenant Lucien Morrissette began at the criminal assizes here yesterday.

Following the shooting both Romeq Remillard and his father, Joseph Remil-lard, were placed under arrest and were later held on the charge of murder. The father will stand trial immediately after

In outlining the case to the jury, Arthur Lachance, K. C., crown prosecutor, said that on the night of Jan. 27 and 28, three men employed as train despatchers for the Canadian National Railways at Levis decided at midnight to call at the house of a friend named Baker, who lived in Bienville.

The three men left about midnight to go to Baker's. Remillard lived just at the other corner of the street from Baker's. There was no light in Baker's house window, while the windows of Remillard's house were lighted up. In doubt as to the right house, Morrissette, the victim, knocked at the door of the Remillard home and a woman came to the door. Morrissette was heard to mention the name of Baker; he then turned away from the house. Two shots were fired. Morrissette was seen to fall and he died soon afterwards.







CANADA AT WASHINGTON.

An Ottawa despatch to the Boston Globe says:

### **MILLIONS SPENT** IN RECREATION

\$6,500,000 Expended in 384 Cities of United States Last Year, Association's Report Shows.

(New York Times.)

If money talks, the fact that \$6,500,000 was spent in 384 of the cities of the United States for recreation activities during the year 1919 would seem to clinch the statement that recreation is beginning to win its proper place in the modern scheme of things.

Progress in the recreation movement is shown by the number of bond issues voted for this purpose during the year in various cities. The following figures are given out by the Playgrounds and Recreation Association of America in a summary of its 1919 year book, recently made public:

Seventeen cities report a total of \$13,000. Pittsburg has issued \$831,000 worth of bonds. Detroit's campaign for

maintained in 1919 under paid leadership.

More than 8,000 men and women were employed by municipalities to direct these activities, and more are studying to develop the needed requirements along this line. Additional cities are constantly taking up the work. The extra hour of daylight was spent by 1,500,000 people in recreation centres, as shown by the records kept in 146 cities, and more playgrounds remained open at night for the use of communities.

For this evening recreational work there has been a market increase in the use made of school buildings, 135,000 people using these buildings in 57 of the cities whose statistics are used in the report. Thousands of persons have availed themselves of the opportunity offered by publicly maintained swimming

ered by publicly maintained swimming

cities alone and additional land and equipment in many others throughout the country. In California one of Red Bluff's citizens has given his community a \$20,000 playground. Fall River, Mass., has just acquired a recreation centre valued at \$25,000. East Orange, N. J., has undertaken a \$100,000 contract for improvement in a local park playground. This latter is an East Orange citizen's memorial to his father.

The association points with pride to the increased interest in community affairs exhibited during the last year, "despite unsettled conditions," and emphasizes the greater willingness exhibited


