The Court of Berlin has just been deprived of one of its most decorative and impressive figures by the death of Prince Carolath-Beuthen, who held high office in the Imperial Household during the reign of Emperor William I. 

The quantity of wood pulp exported in 1911 was 259,514 tons, valued at \$4,902,862, in average value of \$18.89 per ton. In 1910 the quantity exported was 328,977 tons, valued at \$5,694,896, or an average of \$17.31 per ton. There was thus an intrease in price of \$1.58 per ton in 1911. The lecline in shipments last year was to transtatlantic ports, as the American market took a little more than in the previous year.
