ANNUAL REPORT.

TO THE SUBSCRIBERS AND FRIENDS OF

THE PROTESTANT HOME FOR THE AGED.

THE Directors herewith beg to present their Report of the Home for the year ending the 30th of September, 1888.

At the regular monthly meeting of the Directors, held on the 3rd of November last, it was decided by resolution of the Board, to change the name of the institution from that under which the declaration for a Charter had been filed with the Clerk of the Peace, viz: "The Protestant House of Refuge" to "The Protestant Home for the Aged," and under the new name, application was made to the Provincial Government through the Inspector of Prisons and Public Charities for recognition and assistance under the "Charity Aid Act" of the Revised Statutes of Ontario.

In July last, the Inspector, Mr. Christie, visited and inspected the institution, and having expressed himself as well satisfied with the equipment and management of the "Hsme," intimated his intention of reporting favourable upon it to the Government.

In correspondence with your Secretary some time ago, he stated that his report had been forwarded to the proper authorities.

Your Directors have therefore every reason to feel assured that in due time the "Home" will be placed on the list of Charities to be aided in accordance with the Act referred to.

During the year, valuable improvements in the premises were made by the owner, who without asking any increase of rent, placed steam-heating apparatus in the building; while in the early spring, greater accommodation having been found necessary, at an additional rental of \$5.00 per month, the attic story of the adjoining house was secured, and several bed rooms were thus added; convenient access being provided by opening a door through the partition wall.

About a year ago, the Directors determined to ask the co-operation and assistance of the ladies in the community, interested in the welfare and success of the Home. With readiness and kindness worthy of their sex, a large number of ladies immediately formed themselves into a committee, for the purpose of aiding the Directors in the good work, and a goodly supply of many things much needed, such as food, clothing, furniture, etc., has been the result of their united action. The Directors desire to tender their sincere thanks to the ladies composing this committee, and at the same time to express the earnest hope that their valuable assistance may be continued in the future.

As the lease of the present premises will expire on the first of May next, it will be a matter of urgent necessity for the incoming directorate, to consider whether, if practicable, a further term should be secured or not. For the "Home" to have a place of its own, must be the earnest desire of every one interested in its welfare, and it is in the highest degree important that steps should be taken without delay, to accomplish this purpose.

The total expenditure per day for each inmate amounted to $33\frac{1}{4}$ cents

The actual average cost per day for sustentation, for each inmate was about 10 1-7 cents.

This very small average expenditure is due mainly to the fact that not only was all necessary clothing supplied gratuitously, but provisions of all kinds have been from time to time furnished by many kind and generous friends of the Institution.

The Directors desire to offer on behalf of the Charity, their most earnest and heart felt thanks to the many liberal and kind-hearted citizens who have, with such cheerful alacrity, aided them to establish an Institution so much needed and so worthy of support. And in this connection, thanks are tendered to the City Press for many acts of kindness in giving free of charge, information, from time to time, of the progress and operations of the Institution.

Their thanks are in an especial manner, due to the Corporation of the County of Carleton through its Council, for grants generously made to assist in establishing and maintaining the "Home."

They wish also to thank Doctor Cousens for gratuitous medical attendance to the inmates, and Mr. Henry Watters for drugs and medicines furnished free of charge.

Mr. and Mrs. Devitt, the Steward and Matron of the "Home," have so far discharged their duties to the entire satisfaction of the Board, and the Directors feel that they are entitled to special commendation for the comfort, neatness, order and regularity, which characterize the Institution.

Since their election a year ago, the Directors have with deep regret to record the death of one of their number,—the late Mr. William Kerr. In the midst of a busy and useful life—and many can testify how useful that life was—he was suddenly stricken down. By his death the Home has lost a wise and ready counsellor; a generous contributor and a faithful friend.

All of which is respectfully submitted.

The total number of days residence in the Home by inmates, was, for the year, 8,250; and the average cost of maintenance for each inmate, per day, was 21-6 cents.

The generous disposition to aid in supporting this much needed Institution, which manifested itself in the community when it was established, still continues, and mainly through the efforts of the Ladies Auxiliary, in addition to pecuniary assistance, valuable contributions in kind have constantly been made, thus reducing the daily expenditure for maintenance to the unusually low rate just stated.

In this connection, the Directors feel that they cannot express in too high terms their appreciation of the assistance rendered by the Ladies of the Auxiliary Committee, and now that increased responsibilities have been assumed, they look forward with cheerful confidence to the continuance of this assistance.

The advisability of procuring permanent premises for the Home, which was suggested in last year's Report, and which has been the aim and ambition of its warmest friends, has recently found fulfilment in the purchase of a property which is considered in every way most suitable for the purpose.

For this property, valued at \$8,000.00, its late owner, Mr. C. H. Mackintosh, in view of the purpose for which it is intended, has generously accepted \$7,000. This amount, together with about \$2,000 for necessary repairs and furnishing, the Directors rely upon the assistance of the many liberal and kind-hearted friends and supporters of the Institution to enable them to raise, and they trust when they go to them for this purpose their appeal will meet with a response worthy of so good an object.

In conclusion, the Directors feel that the Home has already won the confidence and approbation of the general community, that the circle of its friends in the city and county is already large, and is daily growing larger, and that if its management continues to exercise the same care and economy in its future conduct that they have in the past, the Institution is destined to be not only a credit to its promoters, but a great blessing to many old people, who from necessity—and some perhaps from choice—may seek its shelter.
