Kidd from those of the Lay Representatives of the parish of Ashton, a Court to consider these objections and to adjudicate thereon was constituted by His Grace the Archbishop, under the provisions of Canon V, composed of the Chancellor, Rev. Rural Bogert, Rev. Rural Dean Nesbitt, His Honour Judge Senkler, and Col. Matheson, before whom the trial of the two cases proceeded forthwith in the Clerical Secretary's office.

The Chancellor presented and read the Report of the Special Committee appointed yesterday on the Clergy Trust Fund overdraft, and moved its adoption, seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Bogert.

Moved in amendment by Mr. T. Macfarlane, seconded by Mr. W. H. Bowie,

That having learned that since the year 1877 additional names have been placed on the list of beneficiaries from the Clergy Trust Fund although its accounts showed it to be in arrear, this Synod regards this action as a violation of Canon XV, and hereby instructs the Clerical Secretary, the Clergy Trust Fund Committee, and the Treasurer, in accordance with section 6 of said Canon, to withhold all payments to the beneficiaries until such time as a surplus of four hundred dollars shall have arisen out of the income of the Fund over and above the annual sum required for the payment of the commuting clergymen and other annuitants on the Fund appointed previous to the year 1877.

The amendment was ruled out of order by His Grace the Archbishop on the ground that the payments had been legally made.

Moved in amendment by the Rev. Rural Dean Carey,

That no clergyman be put on the Fund until the overdraft be paid off, and that the present annuitants of the Fund other than the original commutants have their quarterly cheques diminished to the extent of \$12 50 until the overdraft be paid off.

The proposed amendment was ruled out of order as it was in conflict with Canon XV.

Moved in amendment by Rev. Rural Dean Carey, seconded by Mr. T. Macfarlane,

That no clergyman be put on the Fund until the overdraft be paid off.—*Lost.*

Moved by the Rev. Arthur Phillips, seconded by Mr. T. Macfarlane,

That an appeal be made to the annuitants to assist in the liquidation of the overdraft by voluntarily relinquishing part of their income during the ensuing year.

This resolution, not being an amendment, was ruled out of order, and the motion for the adoption of the special Committee was then put and *carried*.

A motion to take up the Report clause by clause having been put and *lost*, it was moved by Rev. Rural Dean Carey, seconded by Rev. Stearne Tighe,

That the Clergy Trust Fund be divided on the principle that a *pro rata* amount be given to each part of the divided Diocese in proportion to the commuted clergy who are now resident in each section.

At 5:30 P.M. the Synod adjourned till 10 A.M. to-morrow.

DIVINE SERVICE.

The Holy Communion was celebrated in the Cathedral and other city Churches at 7:30 A.M.

BUSINESS MEETING.

The Synod met at 10 A.M. and was opened with prayer.

The minutes of the second day's proceedings were read and confirmed.

SUSPENSION OF RULES OF ORDER.

Under a suspension of the rules of order, it was moved by Judge McDonald, seconded by Rev. Canon Spencer, and resolved unanimously by a standing vote,

That this Synod does respectfully and sincerely offer to His Grace the Archbishop its cordial congratulations on this his birthday, and earnestly prays that he may be spared for many more years of useful life and work for our Lord and His Church.

The Archbishop in reply said he noted that the Synod would not allow him to forget how old he was getting. These reminders were doubtless good considering that he had now reached the age of three score years and ten. He felt deeply the kindly spirit which had prompted the vote they had given, and prayed that God would ever bless them.

That the second clause be amended by adding thereto the following words: "at the date of the Separation (including the then annuitants of the Clergy Trust Fund) under provisions and details to be arranged by a committee to be appointed by His Grace the Archbishop; provided always that the Watkins bequest to the Mission Fund shall remain in the Diocese of Ontario."

After considerable discussion the rules of order were suspended, and it was moved by Mr. Pense, seconded by Col. Matheson, and resolved,

That when this Synod rises, it be an adjournment at the call of His Grace the Archbishop, and that in the meantime the details of the division of Funds be considered by a special Committee to be appointed by the Archbishop to report to Synod.

A motion by the Rev. C. J. Hutton, seconded by the Rev. W. A. Read, to amend Dr. Smythe's motion so as to include every ordained man in the Diocese as a claimant on the Clergy Trust Fund, having been lost, Dr. Smythe's amendment was carried; and the second clause as then amended was adopted.

The third and fourth clauses were adopted without amendment, and the fifth clause was withdrawn.

The Report as a whole was then on motion adopted as amended (Appendix C—1).

The Archbishop thereupon re-appointed the Committee, adding thereto the name of Dr. E. H. Smythe, Q.C., and Mr. J. P. Whitney, Q.C.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN SCHOOLS.

Moved by the Rev. Stearne Tighe, seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Baker,

Whereas the principle of Separate Schools has been admitted in the Province of Ontario, and the right to have Separate Schools has been granted to the Church of Rome; this Synod claims that the same rights should be allowed to the Church of England, and such other religious bodies as may so desire, to establish such schools wherever they may wish within the Province of Ontario.

Moved in amendment by the Archdeacon of Kingston, seconded by the Rev. Professor Worrell,

Acts of Synod.

I.—NEW CANONS.

CANON XL.—*Providing for the Election of Delegates to the General Synod of the Church of England in Canada, hereinafter called the General Synod.*

1. An election of Delegates to the General Synod shall be held at the annual session of the Synod preceding each session of the General Synod at the time of the election of Delegates to the Provincial Synod.
2. In the election of Delegates to the General Synod, two Clergymen and one Lay representative shall act as scrutineers of the votes of the Clergy, and two Lay representatives and one Clergyman as scrutineers of the votes of the Laity; the scrutineers for each order shall be previously appointed on motion by the members of each order respectively.
3. The election shall be ballot on nomination, in such manner as may be determined from time to time by resolution of Synod. Two ballot boxes shall be provided to receive the votes of the Clergy and Laity respectively. Upon each member of the Synod depositing his vote, a mark shall be placed opposite his name on the roll by one of the scrutineers of the order to which he belongs, and upon the requisition of any three members of the Synod the number of votes deposited shall be compared with the number of those who have voted. The scrutineers shall prepare and hand in to the secretaries lists of the persons voted for in the order of the number of votes received by each, beginning with the person having the highest number of votes, and bracketing those who receive an equal number of votes, and they shall hand over the ballots to the Secretaries of the Synod, whose duty it shall be to preserve them until the election of Delegates shall be completed, and to destroy them at the end of the Session.
4. The number of Delegates of each order to be elected shall be in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution of the General Synod. Those having the highest number of votes shall be the Delegates, and an equal number of those having the next highest number of votes shall be Substitutes to attend the General Synod when from sickness or other cause the Delegates are unable to be present. In the event of the scrutineers reporting that two

or more persons have an equal number of votes, either as Delegates or Substitutes, the Bishop shall determine his or their priority. Delegates and Substitutes shall continue in office until the election of their successors.

5. Whenever any Delegate is unable to attend the General Synod, it shall be his duty to give the Clerical Secretary of the Diocesan Synod immediate notice of his inability, and the Clerical Secretary shall notify one of the Substitutes in the order in which he stands on the list, that he is required to attend the said meeting instead of such Delegate.

6. The election of the Clerical and Lay Delegates shall be certified, under the hand and seal of the Bishop, or in his absence by the Clerical Secretary; and the certificate shall be forwarded by the Clerical Secretary to the Secretaries of the Lower House of the General Synod within fourteen days after such election; and in case any of the said Delegates mentioned in such certificate is unable to attend, a certificate signed by the Bishop, or in his absence by the Clerical Secretary, "That A. B., being a Clerical (or Lay) Delegate from the Diocese of Ontario, is unable to attend, and C. D. is authorized by vote of the Synod to fill his place as Delegate," shall be sent to the Secretaries of the Lower House of the General Synod.

I.—AMENDMENTS CONFIRMED.

CANON XVIII.—*The Divinity Students' Fund.*

1. The Divinity Students' Fund shall be managed by a Committee consisting of four Clergymen and four Lay representatives.

2. The said Fund shall consist of the existing Divinity Students' Fund and of all collections, subscriptions, donations and legacies given for assisting students in Divinity.

3. The Committee shall, in its discretion, when provided with the necessary funds, make a grant not exceeding the annual sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, to any student in Divinity on the following conditions:

(a) That the applicant shall declare in writing that he is actually in need of assistance, and shall produce a certificate from a physician in good standing in the Province of Ontario that he is in good health and free from organic disease.

(b) That he shall furnish a bond with proper security, approved by the Chancellor, that he will offer himself for duty as a lay reader during the long vacation each year of his Divinity course, and that he will serve as a Clergyman for five years in the Diocese of Ontario, and that in case of failure to offer himself for ordination or to procure the necessary testimonials within

three years from the date of the said bond, or if the cause satisfactory to the Bishop, which he has received from the Diocese before the expiration of the said term, the fund with interest and a balance filled.

4. The Committee shall determine the grants to Divinity students on the results of such examinations.

5. The Committee shall determine the mode of making loans to Divinity students.

6. Offerings during the year for the Divinity Students' Fund.

7. The words "studying for the Ministry" shall be interpreted as referring to those preparing to take either the Clerical or Lay Examinations, and the Bishop of the Diocese shall determine the same.

three years from the date of the bond, unless delayed from illness or other cause satisfactory to the Bishop, he will refund with interest the full amount which he has received from the Fund, and that in case of his removal from the Diocese before the expiration of five years of service therein, he will refund with interest an amount proportionate to the time of service left unfulfilled.

4. The Committee may use its discretion so far as to make part or all of the grants to Divinity students by scholarships awarded according to the results of such examinations as they may determine.

5. The Committee may use part of the income of the Fund for the purpose of making loans to Divinity students on such terms as the Committee may determine.

6. Offerings during Lent shall be asked for in aid of the Divinity Students' Fund.

7. The words "students in divinity" shall mean all persons who are preparing to take either Deacon's or Priest's orders, and have been accepted by the Bishop of the Diocese as candidates for the same.

Mr. Alexander Scott claims seat as against James Proctor.

By the certificate given in 1894 Mr. Scott appears to have been entitled to the seat for two years, and as he represents to the Court that he communicated more than three times during the year preceding last Easter, and is otherwise qualified, the Court is unable to understand why he was not certified as being entitled to the seat, and therefore decides that he is rightfully entitled to sit as the representative of the parish at the present Synod.

Ashton.

Mr. John W. Shore complains that Mr. James G. Kidd is not on the Synod list for the parish of Ashton, claiming that the vestry of the Church at Prospect elected him for three years.

The Court finds no certificate from the clergyman, and is informed by the complainant that Mr. Kidd had not communicated three times during the preceding year, as required by the Canon.

The Court therefore finds that he is not entitled to the seat.

By Mr. Matthew Wilson, Q.C.:

That as one of the objects of the Provincial Synod of Canada was, from its formation, declared to be to promote the further consolidation and united action of the whole of the Dioceses of British North America;

And as a General Synod has now been formed, with jurisdiction extending over the whole Dominion of Canada upon the following fundamental principles:

"We declare that the General Synod, when formed, does not intend to, and shall not, take away from or interfere with any rights, powers or jurisdiction of any Diocesan Synod within its own territorial limits as now held or exercised by such Diocesan Synod.

"We declare that the constitution of a General Synod involves no change in the existing system of Provincial Synods, but the retention or abolition of the Provincial Synods is left to be dealt with according to the requirements of the various Provinces as to such Provinces and the Dioceses therein may seem proper."

And as such General Synod may exercise jurisdiction over almost (if not quite) all the subjects and matters which might come under the consideration of and lead to action on the part of the Provincial Synod of Canada ;

And as all the Dioceses represented in the Provincial Synod of Canada are and will be represented in the General Synod of the Dominion, and as in matters affecting the general welfare of the Church it is desirable to secure full representation, free deliberation, and united action, without the burden of over-legislation ;

And as provision is now made by the constitutions for the holding of the Provincial Synod of Canada in September in every third year, or oftener, and for the holding of the General Synod in September, 1896 ;

And as no alteration of the Constitution or Canons of the Provincial Synod shall come into operation until it has been confirmed at a second session of the Provincial Synod ;

And as the cost of a session of the General Synod (which is borne by the various Dioceses in the whole Dominion) amounts to about \$3,000, and the cost of a Session of the Provincial Synod (which is borne, as an additional expense, by the Dioceses in the Province only) amounts to over \$3,000 ; and as, in addition thereto, considerable incidental expenses are necessarily borne by individual members of the Church in connection with such Sessions ;

(a) Be it therefore resolved, that in the opinion of this Synod it is desirable that, so far as practicable, the General Synod should supersede the Provincial Synod of Canada, and the latter should meet (if at all) only when the necessity of any particular case may require a session thereof, and that the Constitution of the Provincial Synod should be amended at the two next concurrent sessions thereof ;

(b) That the various Diocesan Synods in this Province be respectfully requested to unite in the endeavor to procure such amendments to the Constitution and By-laws of the Provincial Synod as will abolish or materially reduce the number of sessions and expense of the Provincial Synod, and as will conduce to the strength, usefulness, and efficiency of the General Synod.—
Carried unanimously.

Report of a Committee of the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto on a Provincial Synod for the Civil Province of Ontario; adopted by that Synod on the 13th of June, 1895.

The Committee to which was referred the consideration of the steps to be taken to resolve the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada into Ecclesiastical Provinces co-terminous with each Civil Province of the Dominion, and

of the resolutions of the last session of the Synod bearing on this subject, and of the report made to the Synod by the Special Committee on the Union of the Church in British North America, adopted at the session of 1889, beg to report as follows:

1. That this Synod should affirm its adhesion to the following recommendations contained in the report of the said Special Committee :

"(1) That the Dioceses existing within any Civil Province should have power to organize themselves into an Ecclesiastical Province. That in such Ecclesiastical Province a Provincial Council or Synod should be formed by representation, as may be agreed upon, from the several Diocesan Synods in the Province, and that the Bishops of the Province should constitute the Upper House of such Provincial Council or Synod, and that the head of such Provincial Council or Synod should be an Archbishop, to be elected by the Bishops of the Province. That, where necessary, two or more Civil Provinces may be grouped together, so as to form a Joint Provincial Synod under the presidency of an Archbishop as before provided, and that such Joint Provincial Synod should have the power of framing internal enactments for the needs of the several Provinces.

"(2) That such Provincial Council or Synod should meet regularly once in three years, and that special sessions may be held as often as the interests of the Church may require.

"(3) That the Provincial Synod should have power to act for the Church in reference to all matters of Provincial legislation affecting the Church, and should be charged generally with the oversight of all matters, educational or otherwise, affecting the welfare of the Church in such Province, and that the Synod should have power to enact Canons for the Church in that Province in reference to all questions arising out of the Church Temporalities or Religious Institutions Acts, duties of Church officers, etc., etc. That the House of Bishops in each Ecclesiastical Province should exercise the same powers with regard to the Dioceses within that Province as are now exercised by the House of Bishops of the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada."

2. That the memorial appended to this report, and which is submitted for approval, be presented to the Provincial Synod at its ensuing session in 1895, asking for such action to be taken as may be necessary to give effect to the said recommendations.

3. That it be an instruction to the Delegates from this Diocese to the Provincial Synod to support the prayer of the said memorial.

4. That a copy of the said memorial and of this report be transmitted to the Bishops of the other Dioceses in the Ecclesiastical Province of Canada, and to the Lay and Clerical Secretaries of the several Synods, asking for their co-operation in the matter.

MEMORIAL TO THE PROVINCIAL SYNOD OF CANADA OF THE SYNOD OF THE
DIOCESE OF TORONTO.

*To the Bishops, Clergy, and Laity of the Church of England in Canada, in
the Provincial Synod assembled :*

1. That in the year 1889, on the invitation of the Provincial Synod, your memorialists considered the question of the Union of the Church in British North America, and presented the memorial printed at page 83 of the Journal of the Provincial Synod of 1889.

2. That so much of the said memorial as related to the formation of a General Synod having been effectuated, your memorialists would respectfully crave the attention of the Provincial Synod to the following clauses of their said former memorial, which have not been dealt with :

"(1) That the Dioceses existing within any Civil Province should have power to organize themselves into an Ecclesiastical Province. That in such Ecclesiastical Province a Provincial Council or Synod should be formed by representation, as may be agreed upon, from the several Diocesan Synods in the Province, and that the Bishops of the Province should constitute the Upper House of such Provincial Council or Synod, and that the head of such Provincial Council or Synod should be an Archbishop to be elected by the Bishops of the Province. That, where necessary, two or more Civil Provinces may be grouped together, so as to form a Joint Provincial Synod under the presidency of an Archbishop as before provided, and that such Joint Provincial Synod shall have the power of framing internal enactments for the needs of the several Provinces.

"(2) That such Provincial Council or Synod should meet regularly once in three years, and that special sessions may be held as often as the interests of the Church may require.

"(3) That the Provincial Synod should have power to act for the Church in reference to all matters of Provincial legislation affecting the Church, and should be charged generally with the oversight of all matters, educational or otherwise, affecting the welfare of the Church in such Province, and that the Synod should have power to enact Canons for the Church in that Province in reference to all questions arising out of the Church Temporalities or Religious Institutions Acts, duties of Church officers, etc., etc. That the House of

Bishops in each Ecclesiastical Province should exercise the same powers with regard to the Dioceses within that Province as are now exercised by the House of Bishops of the present Ecclesiastical Province of Canada."

3. Your memorialists would briefly mention the following, among other reasons, for adopting the said recommendations :

(a) The General Synod of the Church in Canada being particularly charged with the oversight of matters relating to worship and discipline, the remaining functions of the Provincial Synod would have to do chiefly with the temporalities, which could be more naturally dealt with by groups of Dioceses subject to the same civil jurisdiction.

(b) That such grouping of Dioceses is in consonance with the principles of the Church of England in regard to its relation to the civil power.

(c) That greater uniformity would be attained in the legislation affecting the Church if all the Dioceses in the Civil Province were combined to obtain the passage of one Act relating to any matter of common interest instead of, as is now the case, each Diocese obtaining a separate Act for such matters, as for instance, the status of Churchwardens, the constitution of free Vestries etc., etc.

(d) That the United Dioceses of the Civil Province would be enabled to form joint schemes for the support of the widows and orphans and for the superannuation of the clergy, which would be more effective, easier to work, and more economical than the separate management of a number of small Diocesan schemes.

RELIGIOUS INSTRUCTION IN THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS OF ONTARIO.

On motion of the Reverend John Langtry, seconded by the Reverend C. L. Ingles, the following resolution was adopted by the Synod of the Diocese of Toronto on the 14th June, 1895 :

"Whereas the ultimate object of education is not the mere imparting of knowledge, but the formation of character ; and

"Whereas it is admitted that high character and an enduring civilization can only be secured by the due exercise and development of the moral and religious element of our human nature ; and

"Whereas such exercise and development can only be secured by the constant and careful instruction of our children in the Faith of the Gospel, and by keeping before them, as the only true ideal of life, the character of the perfect and pattern Man, our Lord Jesus Christ ; and

"Whereas there is no sufficient provision made in the Public School system of this Province for such systematic instruction being given during school hours ; therefore be it

"Resolved, That it be referred to a Committee of this Synod to act with Committees of the other Diocesan Synods, and of other religious bodies of this Province ; and that this Synod do petition the Legislature of Ontario so to amend the school law as to make provision for such instruction being given for one-half hour daily during school hours by the ministers of the various Christian communities, or their representatives, to the children of their own communion ;

"Provided, always, that no child shall be required to attend such religious instruction in any case where parents or guardians object, such children as are now exempt during the time allotted for religious teaching, shall be instructed in morals."

The Synod also resolved, on motion to that effect :

"That a copy of this resolution be transmitted by the Honorary Secretaries to the other Diocesan Synods in this Province, and to the heads of the several religious bodies in Ontario, asking them to appoint Committees to co-operate together, as set forth in the resolution."

2.—REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON THE MEMORIAL OF THE KINGSTON WORKINGMEN'S MEETING.

Your Committee on the Workingmen's Memorial beg to report as follows:

I. We are in entire accord with the principles of the CHURCH SOCIAL UNION, presided over by Rt. Rev. F. D. Huntington, and of which the Rt. Rev. H. C. Potter is a Vice-President, viz.:

i. In JESUS CHRIST, GOD is the Father of all men, and all men are brothers.

ii. GOD is the sole possessor of the earth and its fulness; men are but the stewards of GOD's bounties.

iii. Labour being the exercise of body, mind and spirit in the broadening and elevating of human life, it is the duty of every man to labour diligently.

iv. Labour, as thus defined, should be the standard of social worth.

v. When the divinely-intended opportunity to labour is given to all men, one great cause of the present widespread suffering and destitution will be removed.

II. We feel, therefore, that the existence of two great classes of workless men—viz., those who desire work and cannot get it, and those who, being removed from the necessity of work by the possession of wealth in a form which entails no necessary responsibility or labour, do not work—is a serious fault in the existing social organization.

III. While recognizing that the earth is the source whence, primarily, all the needs of life must be supplied, and that consequently the laws of land tenure are probably closely connected with the existence of this blot, we are not prepared to affirm that they are the only, or even the chief, cause of it.

IV. While we find it beyond our power to determine the exact causes of this difficulty, and are therefore unable to suggest any remedy, we wish to urge upon all the faithful :

i. The fuller recognition of the inter-dependence of all men, as being members of the family of God, and the consequent duty of studying in the spirit of love and sympathy the causes which lead to so much hopeless poverty.

ii. That true charity consists not in the mere giving of alms, but in a loving regard for the well-being of others in body, soul, and spirit.

iii. That money given or collected for the relief of poverty should be distributed where possible as a reward for services rendered, and not as charity falsely so called.

iv. That, in our opinion, to provide opportunity to labour, especially in times of distress, is a work not merely of charity, but of social and Christian duty.

seems to flag, if one may judge by the full attendance of members which on every occasion characterizes this Committee of Synod. When busy laymen from all parts of the Diocese—men occupying some of the highest positions in this country—are found willing to devote a portion of their time, so constantly and regularly, to this work, at great loss to their own professional and other callings, it is an evident sign that the Church's welfare has a firm hold on their affections, while their experience and knowledge of business have proved a great safeguard when difficulties have arisen.

The receipts for the past year were as follows: (1) From voluntary sources—Trinity and Advent Sunday offerings, missionary meetings, and parochial collections, \$9,498.77; (2) from interest on Sustentation Fund, \$1,640.12; (3) interest on Watkins bequest, \$190.00; (4) interest on Gainford bequest, \$329.74—making a total of \$11,958.63, being an increase of about \$36 over the previous year's receipts from the same sources. And if any person will take the trouble to examine the report of that year, it will be found that the receipts were then the largest since the formation of the Diocese, and though the increase on this year's contributions may appear small, still it is gratifying to be able to state that there has been no falling off, although there has been great depression in trade and other causes which might have lessened this fund. For all this the Board desires to express its thankfulness to God, and that this department of the Church's work has not been crippled for want of funds. The Board is glad also to be able to state that every organized Mission in the Diocese is at present filled up by clergymen, and it will now be its duty to spread out its work further by opening new fields as occasion may require.

Some three years ago the Board was obliged to state that the Mission Fund was in debt to the extent of about \$4,000, caused by an anxious desire to meet pressing demands for extension, which led the Board to make a venture in the hope that increased work would bring in increased contributions. This hope was not realized at the time. An appeal was made to the members of the Church on behalf of this debt, which proved most successful, reducing it, at the present time, to \$817.46; and if the interest on the Gainford bequest had been paid in, as usual, before the end of the fiscal year, the debt would have stood to-day at about \$500.

The expenditure, which includes grants to Missions, management, rent, expenses of deputations, etc., amounted to \$12,469.74. Forty-eight Missions were recommended by the Classification Committee for grants, and seven others received special grants to be used at the discretion of the Archbishop, making a total of fifty-five Missions assisted by this fund. The Board is glad to report that another Mission—Eganville—has become self-sustaining, and it would earnestly impress upon other Missions the necessity of following the good example set by this Mission.

4.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON DOMESTIC AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your Committee have much satisfaction in reporting that, taken as a whole, the contributions of the Diocese to Extra-Diocesan Missions have increased this year by \$671.35. It is true that in four of the Rural Deaneries there has been a slight falling off of \$184.03, but in the other seven there has been a gratifying augmentation. The Deanery of Carleton heads the list with \$1,464.12, a substantial advance on the \$901.32 of last year, while the additional contributions from Grenville, Hastings, Leeds, Prince Edward, Prescott and Russell, and Stormont, make up the total receipts of \$4,313.00, as compared with \$3,641.65, of the previous year.

In view of the triennial meeting of the Provincial Synod this autumn, it may be interesting to sum up the receipts from the Diocese for the Domestic and Foreign Missions during the three years past. These all include the money collected by the Woman's Auxiliary, and are as follows:—

Deducting \$404.65, collected as a special gift to the Widows and Orphans' Fund of our Diocese last year by the Woman's Auxiliary, and for which the Diocese owes to this organization a very cordial vote of thanks; also a sum of \$104.65 contributed to Diocesan Missions, it would appear that the Diocese of Ontario contributed for EXTRA-DIOCESAN Mission work during the last three years a sum of \$16,957.16. If to this be added the amounts of the same period collected for our Diocesan Missions, viz., \$32,167.27, through the Mission Board, the total receipts for the Church's missionary work, as far as reported to our Treasurers and accounted for in their books, amount for the 3 years to \$59,124.43, a result of which we need not be ashamed.

Full and interesting reports of their progressing work from the Japan missionaries, and especially from Miss Smith, our own medical missionary at Kobé, having been printed in the *Missionary News*, it is not necessary to do more than refer to them in this Report. Your Committee rejoices to know that all the missionaries of the Canadian Church in that great country are zealously prosecuting their labours with the hearty commendation of the Bishop—Dr. Bickersteth.

Most gratefully would your Committee acknowledge the work done by the Woman's Auxiliary during the year, and a statement of its receipts and expenditure is herewith appended. This shows that besides the sums already specified as given to the Widows and Orphans' Fund and Home Missions (\$509.30), no less than \$1,025.66 have been through the W. A. contributed to Missions abroad or in the North-West, of which amount, however, only \$64.27 was not appropriated by the donors to specified objects.

This latter fact suggests that your Committee must again impress on all friends of Domestic and Foreign Missions the great advantage of sending their money unappropriated to the Treasurers (Treasurers either of the Domestic and Foreign Missions Committee or of the Woman's Auxiliary) as in fact is done in the case of our Diocesan Missions. To the General Board come the applications from the Missionary Bishops and others fully stating their necessities and the grounds of their respective claims. A very little consideration will show that the General Board is, and always must be, in the best position to do justice all round and divide the money entrusted to it impartially without respect of persons. Unfortunately by the appropriations of the donors it finds its hands tied; and its members, including the Bishops and all the clerical and lay representatives, brought from great distances to the semi-annual meetings, find themselves unable to deal with aught but a bare fraction of the contributions, all the rest having been specifically designated to one favourite object or another. At the meeting of the Board in April last, the Secretary-Treasurer reported for the six months the total receipts of \$13,674.09 already appropriated, and only \$2,528.41 for the Board to deal with in making their grants to both Domestic and Foreign Missions everywhere. There are, we know, certain definite objects for which the Board has appealed to the members of the Woman's Auxiliary, and for the ready response given to these appeals the Board feels deeply grateful. But apart from such special objects it is obviously the duty of our Church members to have

At the same time, as loyal members of the Church, we are bound to place confidence in the wisdom of the General Board as acting in the best interests of our missionary operations.

5.—REPORT OF THE EPISCOPAL FUND COMMITTEE.

The Episcopal Fund Committee begs leave to report:

That the capital of the Fund remains unchanged, viz., \$59,208.48.

The income of the Fund during the past year was \$3,882.13, a large amount of the arrears of interest having been received, reducing the over-drawn balance from \$1,159.12 to \$344.99.

The Archbishop's stipend was paid in full, viz., \$3,000.00, and the expenses of re-investment came to \$68.00.

The following resolution was adopted by the Committee:

"That this Committee recommends that the life insurance policy in the Life Association of Scotland, which is now held by the Synod on the life of His Grace the Archbishop, be taken over absolutely so soon as His Grace shall have consented thereto, and he and the beneficiaries shall have executed the necessary transfers—the necessary funds to procure the transfer to be advanced from the Sustentation Fund, and the sum of \$3,540 of the proceeds to be paid to the Episcopal Fund in satisfaction of the present permanent overdraft. The premiums on the policy shall be paid from the Sustentation Fund annually, and the policy itself shall become an asset of that Fund."

Low to be placed on the list of annuitants, having been laid before your Committee, it was referred back to the Chancellor in order that he might report at a subsequent meeting the course which, in his judgment, should be taken in the matter.

At a meeting of your Committee held on June 17th the Chancellor reported that he did not think it possible to put any new names on the list in the face of the construction placed on the word income in the Canon by the sub-committee appointed in May, 1894, whose report appears on page 647, and in the face of the opinion of that committee that the overdraft in the bank could not be justified, and that steps should be taken to cancel the overdraft as soon as possible.

REPORT OF SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON THE OVERDRAFT.

(See pp. 18-20).

The Committee appointed to consider and suggest some scheme or mode of action which will serve to meet the difficulty connected with the overdraft on the Clergy Trust Fund have the honour to report that they have carefully considered the matter referred to them, and have come to the following conclusions:

1. That the overdraft of the interest account is really a draft on the capital. The bank keeps no separate account of principal or interest, which exists only in the Secretary's books, and the money withdrawn from the bank is so much withdrawn from investment.

2. The Committee therefore consider it necessary that the money overdrawn should be replaced as rapidly as can fairly or conveniently be done. It would, in the opinion of the Committee, be very unjust to visit the expectants with the consequences of the change in the mode of administering the Fund caused by the construction recently put upon the word income, and they would therefore suggest that in addition to what can be made available from the arrears of interest the sum of \$500 per year of the actual annual income be applied to the overdraft, and the balance of the actual income applied and used in the usual way.

3. The adoption of this suggestion might still permit of one man being put upon the Fund, say from the 1st of October next, subject, of course, to the contingency of the interest falling short of the amount which would ordinarily be payable to him.

4. The Committee would further suggest that on the falling in of any annuities now payable the annual sum to be set aside for the payment of the

debt should be increased by \$100 for each annuity so ceasing.

5. The Committee hope that in this way the debt will be paid within a reasonable time and without undue hardship on the expectants.

9.—REPORT OF THE DIVINITY STUDENTS' FUND COMMITTEE.

The Divinity Students' Fund Committee reports as follows :

The Fund shows a balance on hand of \$757.23, after paying to students \$513.62 in free grants and loans. The amount of each grant has been uniformly \$65 per annum.

It is hoped that circumstances may warrant an increase of this to \$100 for the next year.

The Committee is now able to say that a regular supply of candidates for Holy Orders may be looked for from among the students of Trinity University. The need, however, for more general offerings is urgent if the fund is to be maintained. The Lenten offerings this year were \$265.37, which is a larger amount than last year, but a greater number of parishes have given nothing, viz., 64.

16.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday School Committee beg to report that during the past year they have had under consideration the following subjects of importance to the success of Sunday School work, as recommended by the Provincial Synod Committee on Sunday Schools:

I. They are strongly in favor of the more general observance of the Days of Intercession for Sunday Schools, recommended by the Church of England Sunday School Institute, with the sanction of the Archbishops and Bishops of the Mother Country, and trust that His Grace the Archbishop of Ontario and other Bishops of the Province will recommend the same in their respective Dioceses. Sunday and Monday, October 20th and 21st, are the days selected for 1895,

II. They cordially agree with the endeavor to promote the use of the same lesson on the same Sundays in the Church of England throughout the world, and in the hope that the Protestant Episcopal Church of the United States may be able to adopt the same lessons. As a step towards this unity they recommend the Lesson Scheme issued under the authority of the Provincial Synod Committee taken from the five-years' course of the Church Sunday School Institute, hoping that at the end of the term arrangements may be made for the issue of the Lessons simultaneously for the whole Church.

III. The subject of giving more prominence to the office of Sunday School teacher by the use of an authorized form of admission has been discussed by your Committee, but they are not prepared as yet to recommend its adoption.

IV. Examinations for Sunday School teachers and scholars were held last December at various centres, and the results published in the Teacher's Assistant. They were conducted by the delegates from the Diocese of Niagara, and although a very few entered from this Diocese, it is believed that as the advantages of such examinations are more fully realized, and the feasibility of the scheme adopted more generally known, a larger number will avail themselves of the opportunity of increasing their usefulness as Sunday School teachers.

17.—REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCH.

The Committee on the State of the Church have pleasure in reporting that for the year ended April 25th, 1895, returns have been received from all the parishes and missions of the Diocese except three, viz., Combermere (vacant), Gananoque, whose rector is temporarily absent, and Stirling, where a new incumbent entered upon his duties a few weeks since. The net result of these returns is in the main satisfactory. Their 25 columns show an increase in all particulars save four. The total Church population reported is in excess of last year's returns by 1,631. This increase is distributed over the majority of the deaneries and indicates a real aggression upon the "outplaces." The mid-day celebrations have increased by 64, the early by 627; the latter advance being attributable mainly to the establishment of a daily Eucharist in St. Thomas', Belleville, and All Saints', Kingston. In the Sunday services there is a gain of 1,356, in those upon week days of 666, resulting from the very satisfactory circumstance that nearly every congregation in the Diocese has been supplied with the means of grace. The baptisms number 2,045 against 1,889 of last year. Six Sunday Schools have been added with 153 pupils, and the male teachers reported exceed those of last year by 4, the female by 20. The contributions of the people also exceed those reported in 1894 in every item except that of erection and purchase, which last year was swelled by the large amount of \$23,000 raised in the Deanery of Stormont, \$10,000 having been donated by Rev. J. J. S. Mountain for the erection of a church in Cornwall, \$12,000 raised in Morrisburg for the enlargement of the sacred edifice originally erected there, and \$1,000 for the erection of a new church in the parish of Iroquois. Setting aside these exceptional efforts, and the large amount raised in the Archdeaconry of Ottawa for the endowment of the new Diocese there, it would still appear that the sum contributed by the people during the year just closed exceeds the annual average by, say \$7,000. Four new churches have been erected, and several others either materially beautified and enlarged or, as in the case of New Dublin, replaced by an entirely new structure. No new parsonages are reported, but the total value of property is said to exceed that in possession of the Church last year by \$10,343.

There is an apparent decrease in the number of households, but this is to be explained partly by an unaccountable error, for which the Chairman of the Committee is solely responsible, the parish of Newboro having last year been credited with 100 families more than the clergyman reported, and partly by varying methods of enumeration, the outgoing incumbent perhaps including in this column both families and fractions of families, his successor preferring to include entire households only in the first column, and enumerating the fractional element in the second. But for the mistake in the parish of Newboro, and the disparity between earlier and later reports in Christ Church, Belleville, we should have been able to report a gain in this particular also.

A similar explanation of the decrease in the number of communicants is given carefully and reckoning from the single parish a previous year. In the present reports, and we must not forget the slight reduction, however, in the Rural Deanery, in which the Rural Dean reports a decline in population from 1894, *vide* communicants, Ontario, except Toronto, and in the very front rank among all

A similar explanation may be given of the fact that there is a slight decrease in the number of communicants. The clergy are enumerating more carefully and reckoning only those who are communicants indeed. In a single parish a previous incumbent reported 160 more than the present occupant reports, and we must accept the later figures. Notwithstanding the slight reduction, however (which is to be found mainly in a single Deanery, in which the Rural Dean affirms that the municipal census shows an absolute decline in population from year to year), our returns still give us 16,384 *bona fide* communicants, Ontario thus leading every Diocese in the Dominion except Toronto, and in the matter of proportion to the population holding the very front rank among all Canadian Dioceses.

In the hope that some light and encouragement might be thrown upon our path by mutual consultation and exchange of observation, your Committee this year addressed a few questions to all the dignitaries of the Diocese, the Canons engaged in parochial work, the Rural Deans and a few others whose experience from length of service or the occupation of large and distinctive fields might be expected to be valuable. These questions had reference to the difficulties to be met with from within and without the Church, and the best methods of counteracting them, to the existence of a possible leakage, the causes of it and to the weakest points in the present work of the Church. Very warm thanks are returned by the Committee to those who have taken pains to reply at length to these questions, and we wish we were able to reproduce many of them *in extenso*. Few, however, will be surprised to learn that the replies, though varying characteristically, yet vary within moderate limits. We can but compress without omitting, as we trust, any point of general importance.

1. Lying at the root of all seems to be the difficulty of conveying to the masses of the people a knowledge of the distinctive principles of the Church. This is said to arise in part from the fact that no religious teaching is possible in our Public Schools, and that so many of our Sunday Schools are, to say the least, unsatisfactory, only 10 or 15 minutes in the week perhaps being devoted to the impartation of truths concerning the Church, and that by teachers who are sincere and self-denying, no doubt, but imperfectly qualified. It is further affirmed that in our clerical teaching we possibly aim at teaching the average parishioner too much, and that better and more substantial work would be accomplished did we attempt not much more than to enable them to grasp the Church's true historical position, her teaching concerning the efficacy of the sacraments, and the few other vital truths embodied in the Creeds. It is represented that a considerable number positively hunger for such teaching, and only a few dislike it. The fact that we fail in uniting upon a single Church newspaper, and that so few subscribe to any, is deplored, and the remedies suggested for the general evil are, a steady effort to improve our Sunday schools, the restoration of public and periodical catechizing, patient and faithful teaching of the young before Confirmation and in Bible class, the

circulation of popular tracts and Church literature, which would be read at least during the winter season, and private teaching in the course of our daily parish work.

2. Another serious difficulty in cities and towns, but not in rural parishes, is said to be our class distinctions combined with the pew system which still prevails in most of our cities. This difficulty is old as the days of St. James, and presses with special hardness upon the Church of England to-day. Our social distinctions are said to pervade all classes and grades of society. They sever the domestic from the seamstress, the artisan from the man of business, the man of wealth from the man who believes himself to be of superior blood and parentage. Instances so shocking as to be almost inconceivable are reported in which strangers are cold-shouldered out of the seats they have casually occupied, and probably out of the Church forever after. These instances, it is true, are becoming rare, but our social reserve, and failing to entertain and welcome strangers are said to be a standing source of loss. The methods suggested for the overcoming of this failing are the establishment of associations of women, meeting periodically for parish or mission work, district visiting, and periodical (at least annual) parish reunions, to which everyone without distinction should be cordially invited. One of our most successful city rectors testifies that by the constant use of such means the social difficulty has practically ceased to exist in his parish.

3. Frequent allusion is made to the hardness of holding young men, and one clergyman of abundant diligence and tact affirms that he would substitute for the word "hardness" impossibility. This also is a special difficulty of our towns, although it is noticed that everywhere the average young man is more apathetic in religious matters than those of a corresponding age of the opposite sex. Young women labor hard and zealously for the Church's advancement, while many young men attend public worship irregularly, are deplorably in the minority at our Communion, and in many cases absolutely refuse to treat the subject of personal religion seriously. It is well that clergymen and laymen who accuse themselves painfully of failure in retaining the interest of young men, should know that this difficulty is felt everywhere. Decidedly the most successful effort to awaken the concern of young men in religious matters in the present day has been the Brotherhood of St. Andrew, just as similar associations were formed with good results in the days of Charles II., and later in the time of the Wesleys. A multitude of clergymen testify to the effectiveness of this society with its simple plan of prayer and service. The attempt to do a little work for the Church is said to react favorably upon personal religious character, and young men are everywhere declared to be most successful in winning others of a similar age. From one source, a member of the Brotherhood reports that through the work of that organization it was not unusual in his parish to see 60 men at an early celebration.

many of our missions are seriously under-manned, at least by comparison with the communions about us. It is well known that the Diocese began its work 33 years ago at a disadvantage. We had but 45 laborers over a district where the most progressive religious communion in Ontario had 80. And to-day where we have 234 Churches, they (the Communion just mentioned) have at least 470. The result is that by them every hamlet, every (even the smallest), centre of population is reached. From their missionary report of last year it is observed that, in a few instances, services are maintained at points where their communicants number no more than 11, 8, 7, 6, 4, and in a single instance only one. Under such circumstances there can be no losses from non-supply. By contrast, one of our clergymen reports that he labors alone in a district where there are 3 Methodist ministers, a second says 4, a third 7. There must inevitably be a constant trickling away of those uninformed churchmen who care for one form of worship no more than another, and invariably attend the nearest; and it is almost miraculous that we should maintain our position as effectively as we do. The remedy, all agree, is more men and a more generous support of the mission fund.

Individual difficulties are alluded to in great number and variety. These, however, must be omitted.

It is surely a token of spiritual health to find a consensus of witnesses testifying to the great and general need of more personal religion in clergy and laity, more love to Christ, a growing appreciation of the blessing of worship, more frequent and devouter Eucharists, an endeavor on the part of the Clergy to make parish visiting a real means of spiritual improvement and not a few moments spent in harmless but useless pleasantries, and a constant aiming to realize in themselves the description of good old Geoffrey Chaucer—

“Christes lore and his apostles twelve
He taughte, but first he folwede it hemselve.”

MILITARY REGISTERS.

I had never any definite information concerning the registers of the military while Kingston was occupied as a British Garrison, and early in the present year a woman in England applied to the Dean for a certificate of her marriage with a soldier named "Gilfillan." Upon searching St. George's Registers I was unable to find any Military Register, and having heard that the Very Reverend Dean Lyster had forwarded such Register to the War Office, I applied to the Secretary of War, London, for information on the subject, and was informed by the Registrar General, Somerset House, that the records I had referred to were in that office, covering a period from 1793 to 1870, and that copies could only be obtained on payment of 3/7, for search and certificate.

19.—REPORT OF THE BOARD OF RURAL DEANS, 1895.

To the Incorporated Synod of the Diocese of Ontario :

The Board of Rural Deans, in presenting this their fifth annual report to the Synod of the Diocese, cannot refrain from giving expression to their unfeigned gratitude to the great Head of the Church for the large measure of success which through His blessing has attended, notwithstanding the extremely hard times, the work of the labourers in the vineyard during the past year. To mention all the many evidences of this success will not comport with the brevity which they deem it desirable to observe; therefore only instances of important improvements and marked indications of growth will be touched upon.

ARCHDEACONRY OF KINGSTON.

1.—FRONTENAC DEANERY—REV. W. B. CAREY, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

The Rural Dean of Frontenac reports :

That there has been no change in the personnel of the clergy in the Deanery except at Ompah, where Rev. E. M. Rowland succeeded the much-lamented Mr. Plant; at Sharbot Lake, where Rev. T. Austin Smith succeeded the Rev. C. J. Hutton, who removed to Belleville, after between five and six years' most faithful and efficient labor in the Deanery; and the succession at Parham of the Rev. R. Coleman to the Rev. J. B. Pyke. The church at Murvale was rebuilt and restored at the cost of some \$500 or \$600, contributed mainly by that generous and faithful Churchman, Mr. James Murton. The contributions to the Mission Fund were, on the whole, larger in all parishes except one as compared with the previous year, and from only one mission was there a complaint of the stipend of the missionary having been in arrears. The Rural Dean must again bear testimony to the zealous and faithful work done by the clergy over whom he has the honor to preside.

2.—GRENVILLE DEANERY—REV. R. LEWIS, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

No report.

3.—HASTINGS DEANERY—REV. T. STANTON, B.A., RURAL DEAN.

The condition of the Deanery is, on the whole, satisfactory. All the missions are filled. A new church has been built in Faraday, a site procured for one at Coe Hill, and the prospect of another at Ormsby, all in "The Associate Mission of North Hastings," under the Rev. Thomas Leech. A new church has been opened at Moneymore, in the Mission of Thomasburg, the Orange Society contributing directly or indirectly \$400 of the cost. A new bell calls the people of Thomasburg to church. A new fence has been erected around the church and burial ground at Roblin. St. Mark's Church, Deseronto, has been beautified by a west-end window in memory of Cornelius Oliver, a faithful Churchman. Mr. Egar's Bible class put in a window in memory of its own existence. The confirmees of '94 gave another. Mr. and Mrs. Ffokes gave two more. A memorial window was put in the chancel, adding to the beauty of a handsome church, the external structure being chiefly due to the exertions of our venerable Chairman. The old church of the Mohawk Reserve has been greatly improved by a new altar in memory of the first Rector, Mr. Givens. During the past year we have had some changes in the personnel of the clergy. The old difficulty of Millbridge and Queensborough is removed by the appointment of Rev. E. Costigan. The Mission of North Hastings has still its Priest and two Lay Readers, who are doing good work, but there should be an additional mission grant. Mr. Leech is doing the work of two large missions on a grant of \$500. What is needed at once is a Priest, with the assistance of a Deacon, at Coe Hill, and another at Maynooth with similar help. The Mission of Tweed is also in need of help, and should have an extra \$100. Tweed and Roslin should be placed in Class III and receive a grant of \$200 per annum each.

4.—LEEDS DEANERY—REV. G. W. G. GROUT, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

Much progress and improvement is reported all along the line. St. Peter's Church, Brockville, reports amount raised for all parochial objects to be \$2,926.00, and for extra-parochial \$530.00. Trinity Church, Brockville, reports most favorably of its financial condition. St. Paul's, Brockville, reports a prosperous year. Two oak chairs have been given for the chancel; also a splendid missionary map of the world has been purchased by the Sunday School pupils, who also raised the sum of \$46.00 for Indian Missions.

At Lyn money has been subscribed for shingling and repointing the church, and the "Women's Guild" have raised means to erect a bell-cote and purchase a bell. The new church at Dublin, thoroughly equipped, was opened for service on December 12th, 1894.

At Gananoque the first mortgage on the Rectory has been paid off, and a Sunday School Library of 200 volumes purchased.

Lansdowne Front has paid \$200 on the Parsonage debt, \$200 on St. Luke's Church, \$80 on the Warburton Church, and renovated the church at Escott.

Lansdowne Rear has had a new fence built. The church has been ceiled and itself ceiled with matting.

At Newboro the old unsightly pulpit replaced by a new one, also a new "Bell" organ from Munich, representative of Winnipeg, one of the churches for Christ.

At Portland "the Lutheran Church."

5.—LENOX AND ADDINGTON

At Bath there has been regards communicants to commemorate the opening.

In Camden Mission Dean, which raised the porting next year.

Lansdowne Rear has made many needed improvements. At Delta a new fence has been built. At Athens \$700 has been spent. The basement of the church has been ceiled and fitted for Sunday School purposes, the church itself ceiled with matched lumber, and the walls kalsomined and renovated.

At Newboro the old Parish church has undergone a thorough cleansing, the unsightly pulpit removed, and handsome choir seats placed in position, also a new "Bell" organ provided. A beautiful east window of stained glass from Munich, representing the Resurrection, and presented by Miss Chaffey, of Winnipeg, one of the handsomest windows in the Diocese, was placed in the church for Christmas.

At Portland "the Ladies' Aid" presented a handsome stone font to Emmanuel Church.

The whole of the interior of St. Peter's, New Boyne, has been decorated with alabastine, the exterior re-pointed, and a font costing \$70 placed in the church.

At Frankville, Mission of Kitley, arrangements have been made for the purchase of a new organ, and the church at Easton's Corners re-shingled.

5.- LENNOX AND ADDINGTON DEANERY—REV. E. H. M. BAKER, RURAL DEAN.

The condition of the Church in this Deanery, on the whole, is prosperous. Two meetings of the Chapter took place during the year, one at Napanee and the other at Adolphustown. In connection with the former a conference of the clergy and other Church workers was held. At all of these meetings much useful discussion took place, particularly at the conference.

The Rev. Mr. Lewis, although burdened with work at home, kindly on two occasions visited North Addington and did much good work there.

Adolphustown reports the debt on St. Alban's reduced. William Evans re-pointed St. Alban's gratis. Miss Harding added a commodious vestry room to St. Paul's, Sandhurst, in memory of her parents, and Robert Neilson presented a handsome silver Communion Service to the same church.

At Bath there has been an increase of seven families, also an increase as regards communicants and stipend. A festival is to be held in the autumn to commemorate the opening of the church in 1795.

Ernestown reports the work going on steadily. The contract has been let for the total renovation of St. Alban's Church.

Napanee reports the various funds to be in a healthy condition, Parochial collections 50 per cent. in advance of last year, and a considerable increase in the number of communicants.

In Camden Mission a very successful canvass was made by the Rural Dean, which raised the stipend to \$650. The mission may become self-supporting next year.

At Napanee Mills a substantial church has been commenced, to cost about \$1,400.00. Holy Trinity, Yarker, is to be removed to a more central site.

Hinch and Centreville have Sunday services through the assistance of a Lay Reader, who also holds service at Enterprise, in the Tamworth Parish. The formation of a new mission out of these two parishes has become a necessity.

The Mission Priest of Selby reports the offerings in behalf of Diocesan Funds as greater than last year.

In Tamworth \$250.00 have been raised by the "Woman's Guild" towards the erection of a new vestry. At Marlbank the Church is progressing. The Methodists have withdrawn their preacher and made the place an outstation of another circuit. At Enterprise the old Methodist Chapel has been purchased, repaired, and made suitable for Divine service, and \$425.00 subscribed to defray the cost. The congregation have also bought a new organ.

The old stain upon the Church for her neglect of the district of North Addington is about to be wiped away, the Mission Board having felt justified in appropriating \$500.00 for new work there at its last meeting.

It may be well to add that the Rural Deanery Sunday School Picnic, inaugurated by the Rector of Napanee, was an event of no small importance. The Church of St. Mary Magdalene was filled with children—700 in all were present—and an imposing procession to the picnic grounds after an inspiring service was a marked feature.

6.—PRINCE EDWARD DEANERY—REV. E. LOUCKS, RURAL DEAN.

The various parishes in this Deanery are filled. Rev. W. H. Smythe has resigned the Mission of Stirling, and Rev. S. Daw has succeeded him. The Rural Dean advises the re-uniting of the Parishes of Hillier and Wellington, thereby making a strong self-supporting parish. As regards the parishes in this Deanery, a readjustment is desirable in the interests of economy and efficiency.

ARCHDEACONRY OF OTTAWA.

I.—CARLETON DEANERY—REV. J. J. BOGERT, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

Not much change in the condition of things in this Deanery. Most of the clergy report their stipends as about the same. The Rector of St. Luke's, Ottawa, reports a large increase of about 300 per cent. The new Incumbent of Manotick a new subscription list of nearly \$900.00, or about double that of last year. In most of the parishes there was a fair increase in the parochial collections, a result, in part at least, of the adoption of the "card and pencil" system.

Improvements in the Church property are reported from Ashton, Carp, Bell's Corners, Fitzroy, St. Luke's, Ottawa, and St. Stephen's, Britannia.

The building of a new Church at Duarobin, in the Parish of March, has been commenced.

2.—LANARK DEANERY—REV. A. C. NESBITT, RURAL DEAN.

The condition of the Church in this Deanery is very much as reported last year; steady progress on sure and certain lines is observable.

All the parishes and missions are occupied.

The Deanery of Lanark does not draw heavily on the Mission Fund, only \$450.00, and contributes \$1,100.00.

3.—PRESCOTT AND RUSSELL DEANERY—REV. H. POLLARD, RURAL DEAN.

During the past year the Rev. T. H. Lloyd, M.A., of Bishop's College, Lennoxville, has been appointed to the Mission of Vankleek Hill, and Rev. F. W. Ritchie, B. A., also of Bishop's College, to Plantagenet. Preparations for building a new Church at Bearbrook were commenced, but the great failure of the crops in this district made money very scarce, and operations have been suspended until after next harvest.

In Osgoode a new station has been opened and the congregations are good and increasing.

4.—RENFREW DEANERY—REV. C. V. F. BLISS, RURAL DEAN.

The Rector of Arnprior reports the outlook as being full of promise. The Missionary at Beachburg reports that from 52 families he received an income of \$413.00. At Calabogie, the Missionary Deacon is zealously performing his arduous labors. The Missionary of Cobden makes a very encouraging report though here as at Beachburg there are still some arrears of stipend.

Combermere has had to regret the removal of its zealous Missionary, a successor to whom has not yet been found. Eganville has advanced in several respects, an evidence of which is their having voluntarily relinquished the grant from the Mission Fund, and tendered the Board their grateful acknowledgments for past aid during so many years.

The Church property has been completely renovated and new stabling erected, at an outlay of \$631.00. The communicants' list for the year was increased nearly four-fold.

At Mattawa the Missionary is an untiring worker, but confesses his inability to cope with the situation, and has invited the assistance of the Rural Dean.

Of Pembroke it should be said "well done." In the past year the Parish raised the large sum of \$3,446.00 and paid its Rector \$1,000.00.

Petawawa was for a portion of the year under the charge of a divinity student. A priest was appointed in January and is now working single-handed, though greatly desirous of some aid to enable him to keep a Lay Reader.

Renfrew reports favorably.

In Stafford Parish the new Church will be a handsome edifice, creditable alike to the generosity of the congregation and the zeal of the Rector.

The deepest sympathies of the parish, and indeed of the Church throughout the Deanery, have been evoked by the great sorrow and trial the Rector of Stafford has been called upon to undergo for some months past.

The Deanery has contributed liberally to the Ottawa Episcopal Endowment Fund, and generally speaking is in a prosperous condition.

5.—STORMONT DEANERY—REV. R. L. M. HOUSTON, M.A., RURAL DEAN.

The work of the Church in this Deanery has been carried on during the past year with gratifying success. During the first week of October last a very successful Deanery Conference was held at Wales, in connection with the half-yearly meeting of the Deanery Chapter. Improvements of various kinds have been the order of the day in most of the parishes.

Commodious driving sheds have been provided at Wales, and a burial ground purchased. St. David's Church was consecrated by the Lord Bishop of Niagara and over 100 persons confirmed. The S. S. pupils have provided a handsome font; altar frontals have also been provided. At Iroquois a new wood shed has been erected, and pulpit and altar frontals provided.

At Crysler and Winchester several improvements have been made to the Church property. The Parish of Trinity (Memorial) Church, Cornwall, although carrying a heavy burden, has made some permanent improvements to the extent of about \$200.00.

The united Missions of Crysler and Newington are in need of separation.

The County of Glengarry calls for attention—no services of the Church held within its borders.

The crying needs of the Deanery of Stormont are (1) the division of Crysler and Newington, and (2) the organization of a Mission in the County of Glengarry, with headquarters at Alexandria or Lancaster.

To conclude: In view of the gratifying progress which the foregoing summary shews has marked the work of the Church during the past year, the Rural Deans indulge the earnest hope that it is a pledge of the accomplishment, under the Divine Blessing, of still greater things in the near future, for the glory of God and the extension of his Kingdom.

20.—REPORT OF THE TREASURER.

For two years in succession the Treasurer has given unusual details of securities to retain for the financial managers the generous confidence of Synod, in the face of reports not unreasonably alarming, but yet inconsiderate and uncalled for, as regards integrity of capital and plans of investment. This year abstracts from the accounts attest more clearly than ever, and as figures alone can, the safety of the important trust. Losses through the universal depreciation of real estate values were not unnaturally expected, yet they have been so trifling as to be a mere fraction of the income. The permanent trust funds present these returns:

The Consolidated Fund was diminished by \$12,408.20, withdrawn by Kingston rectory for advantageous investment on its own account in an office building. The consolidated capital, with this amount added, would show a total of \$558,510.53, or a gain of \$2,265.55, arising from sales of land at Perth, \$1,087.90; McLaren Trust (non-interest bearing for the present), \$500; increase in clergy superannuation capital, \$500; sales of Belleville lands, \$160; increase of North Gower capital, \$6.65; and of Plantagenet capital, \$11. The undesirable feature this year is the increase in foreclosed real estate, but hitherto Synod has not been unsuccessful in relieving itself of this class of property. Incidentally it is proper here to report that the Brown farm, unfavorably regarded by speakers at the last Synod, has been sold at a price which covers the loan and all expenses. The proceedings against the valuator for the Chauncey Seeley mortgage ended in a judgment for the Synod for \$1,800 and costs, including those of the foreclosure suit, which judgment has been protected by collateral mortgage on the defendant's property.

The actual interest received on deposit receipts and daily balances was \$919.38, but there was paid out for overdrafts \$191, making the net amount of \$728.38 received. Some of the money borrowed upon overdrafts was for temporary accommodation, to avoid cashing of deposit receipts, therefore a corresponding amount was being concurrently earned as interest, and no actual outlay occurred.

In consequence of resuming normal collections the falling dividend on income has been checked. The gross earnings in 1891-2 were 5¾ per cent., a large proportion of 6 per cent. debentures and 7 per cent. mortgages being still on hand; in 1892-3 they were 5 2-5 per cent.; in 1893-4 a trifle over 5 per cent.; in 1894-5 they have been 6½ per cent., or an average for the four years of about 5½ per cent. One year ago a dividend of 4¾ per cent. was distributed after deducting expenses, involving \$1,015.85 of an over draft; this year 5½ per cent was paid, with a credit balance of \$219.76 carried over.

On April 30th, 1894, the interest due on mortgages to Consolidated and Episcopal Funds was \$12,227. This year at the same date only \$7,227.58 was owing, with few large amounts to collect.

It is safe to assume that income under the existing mixed system of investment will not average below 5 per cent. The latest debentures purchased under competition (Lennox and Addington) will realize 4½ per cent., and rarely can any large number of approved bonds be secured to yield a greater

Therefore had the Investment Committee yielded two years since to the preference of some members of Synod for debenture investments and made the exchange, the revenue for the past year for the Consolidated Fund would not have exceeded \$24,000, including proceeds of the 6 per cent. bonds in hand; at 4½ p.c. it would have been \$22,526.72, instead of \$27,305 at lowest expectations under present system. The difference upon Clergy Trust Fund alone would mean the cutting off of six annuitants of \$400 a year each. The losses on capital and interest of less than \$300 per year for six years are insignificant when compared with the falling off of income to be expected from restricting investments to debentures.

I.—Auditors' Report.

I.—REPORT OF THE AUDIT AND ACCOUNTS COMMITTEE.

The Audit and Accounts Committee beg leave to report as follows :—

That Messrs. J. S. R. McCann and J. H. Birkett, the official Auditors, have made a full and complete examination of all the accounts up to and inclusive of the 30th April, 1895, and that their report is herewith submitted.

Your Committee, assisted by the Treasurer, have made a careful examination of all the securities, and compared the same with the statements submitted to them by the Accountants, and found them correct.

The securities were all in the hands of the proper custodians.

Your Committee have great pleasure in congratulating the Synod on the very much improved state of the funds generally.

Whereas at the time of making the last annual report the arrears of interest on securities belonging to the Consolidated Fund were \$10,938.34; the arrears are now reduced to \$6,543.98, and a very large portion of those arrears have accrued within the past six months.

Within the same period the arrears of interest on the Episcopal Fund securities have been reduced from \$1,289.00 to \$359.60. As the result of such reduction of arrears the overdrawn balance on the Clergy Trust Fund has been reduced since last audit from \$5,693.20 to \$3,476.62. The Mission Fund debt has been reduced to \$817.46.
