MR. D. G. SMITH AND THE GAZETTE.

The Chatham Advance publishes the following paragraph in its last issue:—

The St. John Gazette has advocated a good many absurd things in the course of its short existence, but none more so than the removal of the seat of local government from Fredericton to St. John, which it put forward as a serious proposition on Friday last. There is so much of lunacy in this idea that no sane person would seriously discuss it.

The meaning of this we presume is that according to Mr. D. G. Smith any one who proposes to remove the capital from Fredericton to St. John is a lunatic. Mr. David George Smith is well known to be a very sane person, but he is hardly entitled to call every one else insane who chooses to differ from him. We would think him to point out to the other "many absurd things" the Gazette has advocated in the course of its short existence, in order that the public may have an opportunity of judging whether they are really so very absurd as what Mr. Smith himself has said. It is needless to say, does not love Mr. D. G. Smith, and the reason is not creditable to the North Shore man. We had occasion to point out some time ago that the Public Works report, for the year 1887 was the worst specimen of printing that ever was bound up among the Legislative Journals of this Province, and was a disgrace to the office that issued it. The paper was of the very poorest quality, the press work was atrociously bad, and the whole affair was a cheap and dirty job, for which Mr. Smith received a large price. The hostility of the Advance and Mr. Smith to the Gazette has since then been unceasing. He commented on remarks on his report as a reflection on his job office and commenced to boast of the excellent work that establishment could turn out. Mr. Smith did not seem to perceive that the fact of his office being able to do good work was not his office the greater, because it showed that the exceeding badness of the report he printed was not due to lack of ability to do better work but arose from mere greed and a desire to cheat the government and consequently the public.

NEW BRUNSWICK'S ENERGY.

The Toronto Mail's report of Mr. Ellis' attack on the subsidy to the Tobique Valley Railway is as follows:—

Mr. Ellis (St. John) protested against the grant of \$80,000 to the Tobique Valley railway, contending that there were not more than 3,000 persons in the two parishes through which the railway was to pass.

Mr. Ouellet defended the grant, claiming that the road would pass through a fertile country. It was proved by him to be the most unlimited deposits of pyrites on the continent.

The resolutions were reported and read a second time.

EUROPE'S BUSIEST MAN.

THE PRINCE OF WALES AND HIS MANIFESTO.

He is Always on the Go, Seidesen Wastes Time and Never Makes a Mistake.

As is well known, England is the home of constitutional despots and he may include in the interesting catalogue the fact that the Prince of Wales has no public work, the Government of the day does not give it to him, and there are persons of sane mind who, firmly believing in the Constitution and the Government, and abating their eyes from the possibility that he must be unscrupulous, languid and highly private.

It is making of the kind. It was never intended to be anything of the kind. Even if the Constitution had forgotten the fact of the Prince of Wales, the more extensive acquaintance that has been made of it. He is an accomplished linguist. He has stored his mind with the most varied information. Few men have a more extensive acquaintance with the various countries of the world and their public characters. As a young man he wrote home letters to the Queen describing his travels.

The Prince's public work commenced with his visit to Canada in 1859, when he was within six months of his eighteenth year. He opened his eyes to the bridges and parks, laid foundations, and received and replied to addresses by the way. His public work has since been interrupted only at that, except by his illness in 1871.

In the matter of form, blending public and social and private functions, the Prince has done, and continues to do, an amount of work that has never been exceeded, much less excelled. No living man has received more public addresses, or congratulatory messages from all the countries, or had better opportunities of acquiring the most opportunist information.

The Prince of Wales collected addresses run from 1863 to 1882 and are 124 in number. Even his private life lived at Royal Academy banquets, six at Trinity House and four in connection with the Royal College of Surgeons. The more numerous address touch such diversified subjects as commerce, agriculture, education, public works, and charities and general philanthropy. They are short, kindly and appreciative, they show a deep knowledge of the subject of the Prince of Wales' individuality.
