Proclamation

By His Excellency Sir WALTER EDWARD DAVINSON, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. Michael and St. George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Island of Newfoundland and its Dependencies.

WHEREAS it has been represented to me that a large number of persons in this Colony are desirous of observing a Public Bank Holiday to be observed as a Day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God for the many mercies He has been pleased to bestow upon this Colony during the past year.

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that MONDAY, the TWENTY FOURTH day of JANUARY instant, be set apart for the purpose aforesaid, to be observed as a Public and Bank Holiday throughout this Colony, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.

Given under my Hand and Seal at the Government House St. John's, this 11th day of January, A. D. 1916.

You were elected by the people to look after their interests. And do you who the people are looking to get their rights in this matter. Surely they are entitled to a nightly mail as well as Harbord, Grace, Carbonar, and other places along the line.

The Coal Situation

The St. John's Daily Star in its Tuesday's issue took up the question of the shortage of coal in Conception Bay, basing its remarks on articles published in last week's issues of the Hr. Grace Standard and the Guardian. It urges the Government and Opposition to give the Cutports their attention as well as St. John's. The Mail and Advocate in its Wednesday's issue also refers to the matter, and speaking of the large quantities of coal expected to arrive at St. John's, says "that if Conception Bay remains ice free a load may be sent to the Bay and landed at Harbor Grace and Bay Roberts, or where required most urgently."

The agitation started by the Mail and Advocate is bearing fruit. If you want to get anything in this country there is nothing that will succeed as quickly and as surely as an agitation. The authorities are very often as "stubborn as a mule" or as hard to move as a jaw tooth. Meanwhile, the people are still wanting coal.

From Mrs. Walter Crosbie of Bay Roberts, we have received the following letter.—"Please find enclosed \$30.50, being the proceeds of a pork and cabbage supper at my house. Will you kindly pass it to the Soldiers' Cot Fund? We shall very gladly do so. From other sources we learn that the Supper was held on Jan. 6th, and that the names and fuller particulars will appear in the Bay Roberts Guardian. It is also whispered that another of those enjoyable events will follow next week.—Daily News.

The Fenian Attitude

The Fenian attitude toward Britain and her allies is presented most obtrusively every week in the Irish World, of New York. A score of articles appear in each issue, cursing England, and glorifying those who hate her. The enlistment of the Irish Nationalist makes the editor furious. It carries him the length of denouncing John Redmond, because the Irish leader has urged his followers to do their bit. The following is a fair sample of the work of this infatuated editor:

"The incomparable leader," John E. Redmond, has promised General French "the competent military authority," 1,100 recruits a week to make up "wastage." Mark this Irishman and Irishwomen. Those 1,100 sons of Ireland are not even to increase the army, they are merely to repair "wastage." Eleven hundred young Irishmen are killed or hopelessly crippled every week. The wastage in the Irish regiments is 100 per cent a year. So that Ireland may expect none to return from the war but the permanently crippled.

A year ago Mr. Redmond was protesting that his object in getting recruits for the English army was that they might obtain military training and become able to defend Ireland against all her enemies. None came back but hopeless cripples, a burden on Ireland and not a defense for her. And her enemies are safeguarded with Mr. Redmond's approval. He knows he is sending his countrymen to die for England, he knows that England is an ever the oppressor tyrant of Ireland, he knows at the end of this war, his country will be a poorer one than before he started.

Assolin's Influence is Marked

As a matter of fact, it is stated that there has been a great increase in recruiting amongst the French-Canadians since Major Assolin entered the arena as a real citizen and patriot. Not only have the older battalions felt the impulse of this last move, but the work of preparing other battalions has been rendered considerably easier. More than this, a still more potent influence has been exerted of late. For a long time after the war started it was well known that in many districts, especially the rural sections, the French-Canadian priests were preaching openly the Bourassa brand of sedition, and advising their young men against recruiting. Some time ago, in the mysteriously effective manner peculiar to that great religious organization, the word went around that this must stop. No more words were needed. The opposition to recruiting not only ceased with amazing suddenness, but the French-Catholic priests appeared as supporters of the cause of Allies, and influenced many men who were wavering to see that their duty lay in khaki.—Beck's Weekly.

Why Sir John French?

Strain Proved to Be Too Heavy for Commander of British Forces on Continent

New York, Dec. 17.—The London Herald, which Field Marshal Sir John French, who has succumbed temporarily to the strain of his command, is reported to have returned to his home in England, has recommended him for the post of Field Marshal in command of the home forces, a promotion which the King heartily approved, has given only a deserved recognition to one of the finest soldiers of England, a man who has made no mistakes since he assumed command of the main British forces, and who retires now at his own request.

"The arduous duties since the war began have impaired his health and made it impossible to do full justice to his country in this tremendous campaign. Sir John, who had a long conference with the premier, Mr. Asquith, last night, expressed pride in the elevation of Sir Douglas Haig, Sir Horace Smith-Dorrien, and General Sir Charles C. Monro, all of whom owe their advancement to his recognition of their valor and ability, and Britain expects that co-operating with Generals Joffre and Castelnau, the new British commander-in-chief speedily will force the 'great push' forward which will drive the Germans from Belgium and back over the Rhine."

Letter From Rev. Jas. Bell

To Mr. Moses Earle

Dear Mr. Earle,—As Christmas draws near—once more, I take this opportunity of sending you a word of greeting. I call to remembrance with great joy the many friends we made in Newfoundland and you are certainly among those who will not be easily forgotten.

This year has been one of sorrow and sacrifice. Sadness has come to many a home through the losses sustained in the greatest War the world has ever seen; yet the War brought to all parts of our glorious Empire a feeling of pride in that all were not only able, but were ready and perfectly willing to offer their very best, if needs be, to die on the Field of Honour. His Majesty the King proudly said—"From every part of my Empire there has been a spontaneous and enthusiastic rally to our common flag." And it is gratifying to know that Newfoundland was among the first of the Overseas Dominions to give her sons to the Army and Navy.

As a member of the Newfoundland War Contingent Association I have been able to attend meetings in London to consider how best to help the Regiment. I spent a week-end with the "Boys" at Fort George last January, and in July I visited them at St. John's Camp. On each occasion I had an opportunity of addressing them. On the 22nd of November I paid my first visit to the Third London General Hospital at Wandsworth to see the sick and wounded belonging to the Newfoundland Regiment. They looked very comfortable and were quite cheerful. I shall go as often as I can, but Leeds is about 200 miles from London.

I cannot say without congratulating you upon the recent victory. Every credit is due to the noble band of Temperance soldiers, particularly the Newfoundlanders, who throughout the Island, who worked so strenuously and bravely for the power and away of the British Empire. Well done! My very regards to your family.

Of the Nfld. Regiment

Gailes Camps, Scotland, Dec. 4th, 1915.

My Dear Mother—Just a few lines to let you know I am in good health. We arrived O. K. after a splendid trip. I wrote to you before I left St. John's, but I don't know if you received it or not. I am having a good time over here.

I was talking to Stephen and Will in North Sydney. They are well. I was sorry I did not get home to see you while we were at St. John's. I will send you my photograph later on, sometime before we go to the front.

I can never say what time I will be home. It may be in 2 or 3 years, and it may be never. I think of you often. This is a nice place. There are no people living around here where we are stationed, but we go to a town about 2 1/2 miles away every evening. Tell father I will write to him again the next mail. Tell him not to work too hard and take care of himself. Give my love to all my sisters and brothers. Wishing you all a Happy Christmas. Hoping to hear from you as soon as you get my letter. No Frenchman will Hear Peace Talk at Present

Paris, Dec. 19.—"Eighteen months ago France wanted peace. To-day she wants war most energetically and to that end will use all her resources," said General Gallieni, Minister of War, asking in the Senate to-day to approve the action of the Chamber of Deputies giving him the class of 1917 recruits for January 5th.

M. Gallieni's remarks were greeted with prolonged applause. "Whoever says the word 'peace' on the streets is considered a bad citizen," continued the Minister of War. "Mothers are not mourning for lost sons, they want them avenged. The 1917 class will leave with the assent of the nation. I demand those charged with the duty to receive and instruct these young men and prepare them for the great contest which will not end before France, in accord with her Allies says: 'I stop; I have obtained what I wanted; I recommend peace.'" Redoubled applause, interspersed with shouts of "excellent" came from the entire Senate, which arose as a mark of honor. Returning to his Ministerial seat, General Gallieni received the congratulations of his colleagues. The Upper House immediately passed the bill and authorized the public posting of the Minister's address.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. The Trip of the "Swallow"

(Editor the Guardian). Dear Sir,—As there has been a lot of strange statements rumored, and also a note or two which appeared in last week's issue concerning our hard experience seemed so ridiculous, I feel prompted to give you my statement so near to the thing as I can go, and I hope it will be effectual in ending a lot of talk that is going around.

We were then under single-reefed mainsail, whole foresail, jib and jumbo. We then hauled down the foresail and single-reefed it. We tacked and reached toward the Cabot Island, the wind being enough eastern to go around, but within two or three miles of getting around, the lead rope of the foresail burst and caused it to burst all along by the single reef. We then lowered the foresail and set to work to double-reef it, but after the foresail was lowered we found she could not make so much headway and that she would not go around the island.

We ran from east to east by south until about noon that day when we tried to hold our own a little by heaving her up, but we found she would not heave to very good, so we kept her before it again. The wind was then blowing at hurricane force.

At the same time, with such a heavy lurching of the vessel and heavy beating of the canvas with no rigging fast on the starboard side, the "step" of the forecast began to move and we knew not what time it would almost break up the deck or ever do something worse. At the same time a heavy sea swept over and smashed up a small boat on deck, a puncheon of molasses which was lashed on deck broke loose and went over the rail. About four eases codoil was lashed on the quarter deck broke loose and one rolled aft and struck the wheel and knocked it away, and for a few moments while the wheel was out of its place, she not being steered very good, a continual sea was sweeping over her.

Women's Health Club

It will be a great pity if the women whom Dr. Geisel organized here the past fall fail to get together to consider and discuss matters in reference to general health. In our opinion there are very few things which interest us that are more important to the people of this country than Health.

The women of our homes play a most important part in this matter as mothers, housewives and nurses.

In several places throughout Newfoundland Women's Health Clubs have been formed. Greenpond, for instance, has a Health Club with a membership of 112. Regular weekly meetings are held in the Courthouse, and a large class in Home Nursing, under the leadership of Dr. Jamieson, has been formed.

What the women of Greenpond and other places have done, the women of Bay Roberts can do. Will it be worth while? someone asks. We answer, look around you and see the misery and suffering and loss caused by sickness in various forms.

See the numbers of little children who are weak and sick. Consider the number of boys and girls who are suffering from one form of disease or another. Consider the high death rate in this district alone. Ponder over these things and the question is answered.

Disraeli once said, "Public Health is the foundation upon which rests the happiness of the people and the welfare of the state." Disraeli was right.

We will have as much health as we are willing to pay for. This does not mean that we are to pay for it in hard cash, but pay for it in studying the best way to live—to eat, to dress, to sleep, to cook, and the selection of foods that will best nourish and sustain our bodies.

How true it is that nations and people have been spending hundreds of thousands of dollars in curing, and endeavoring to cure, diseases that should never have occurred.

It is a well known fact that in some countries more money is spent and more attention is bestowed in caring for and preventing diseases in animals than is given to human beings.

A story is told of a delegation who went from a certain state to Washington to secure financial aid to help control the ravages of tuberculosis in their state. They were informed there were no funds available for that purpose. Soon after an epidemic of hog cholera broke out in the same state. As

soon as the authorities heard this a special car and agricultural experts were dispatched forthwith regardless of expense. This was done because hogs were considered to be valuable.

The mortality amongst infants is very large, due largely to lack of knowledge on the mother's part as to what is best and necessary to safeguard and develop her offspring.

While we are helpless to save the lives of those who are fighting our battles today, we are responsible for those who are dying amongst us every year from preventable diseases. It doesn't matter whether the life is crushed out by an automobile or train, drowned in the sea or poisoned by the germ of some contagious disease, or killed at the battle front. It is a human life just the same.

And because of these things, and many more which could be mentioned, the women of Bay Roberts would be doing a splendid thing for themselves and humanity by carrying out the objects for which the Health Club was organized some months ago.

Throw self and self-interest to the winds and broaden the scope of your vision, and act to-day so that those who are not blessed as you are, and those who come after you will honor and cherish your memory.

Men between 19 and 41, available for military service in the four provinces of Ireland on Aug. 15th last were approximately as follows: Leinster, 174,597; Ulster, 169,486; Munster, 136,637; Connaught 81,392.

Up to Dec. 15th returns show enlistments approximately in Leinster as 27,458; Ulster, 49,760; Munster 14,190; Connaught, 4,589.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH SERVICE.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICES are operated throughout the Colony at all the principal places. Messages of ten words, not including address or signature, are forwarded for twenty cents, and two cents for each additional word. A Government cable to Cause, Cape Breton, connects with the Commercial Cable Co.'s system to all parts of the world. There is no more efficient Telegraphic Service in existence.

A ten word message to Canada, exclusive of signature and address, costs from 35 cents to \$1.00.

A ten word message to the United States, exclusive of signature and address, costs from \$1.10 to \$1.50

To Great Britain, France or Germany—25 cents per word.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round to Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass within the radius of the wireless stations in Cape Race and Cape Bay. Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Clerks on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegraph Office free of postage.

Rates of Commission on Money Orders.

The rates of commission on Money Orders issued by any Money Order Office in Newfoundland to the United States of America, the Dominion of Canada and any part of Newfoundland, are as follows:

For sums not exceeding \$10	5 cts
Over \$10 but not exceeding \$20	10 cts
Over \$20 but not exceeding \$50	15 cts
Over \$50 but not exceeding \$100	20 cts
Over \$100 but not exceeding \$200	25 cts
Over \$200 but not exceeding \$500	30 cts
Over \$500 but not exceeding \$1000	35 cts
Over \$1000 but not exceeding \$2000	40 cts
Over \$2000 but not exceeding \$5000	45 cts
Over \$5000 but not exceeding \$10000	50 cts

Maximum amount of a single Order is any of the above countries and offices in Newfoundland, \$100, but as many may be obtained as the remitter requires.
