On Wednesday evening in pursuance of the recommendation of the Business Committee a missionary meeting was held in St. Andrew's Church at 7.30 which was well attended.

After devotional exercises, the minutes were read and approved. ,
Dr. Pollock of Halifax then delivered an address on the Work and Claims of the anent the Theological College of Halifax. The Rev. gentleman stated that an endowment heme of \$100,000 had been provided for the support of the college, though he believed it would amount to \$102,000, and the people had contributed more than half. ought this was an encouraging feature, and though the amount was not large, it was a great achievement. Both bore a high character, and at their last annual meeting they were greatly ensive in its nature, and the attendance of friends at their annual meeting strengthened them. Though the College was at size and endowment larger institutions had had a similar origin and, after all, there were some advantages ected with small numbers, as students could receive more attention. There was, however, a difficulty of competing with other institutions, especially those of the Upper Provinces, which were not slack making their advantages known. In Halifax, they also assisted their students, and none need want assistance who re quired it, and last year \$1,000 were dis tributed for this object. The Rev. Mr. McNeil's congregation, which had given them \$200 a year, had thus rendered them material service. They had also received much encouragement from the people gen The College was not a new institution. Some of the students devoted themselves to the ministry and others to foreign missions, and its reputation was ond to none. In this Dominion there was a union of three Presbyterian bodies each of which contained elements of strength which had been developed in Scotland, and they had every reason to think that they were building up a great Presbyterian Church and to be thankful for their privileges. Sometimes in connection with the college, they were told that the people were doing other work, ald remind them of the ne cecessity of supporting such an instituttion, and the congregation that neglected this duty injured itself. He believed in leaving the matter to the people themselves, and they might ren mber that one effect of the outpouring at Pentecost, was a great liberality, and this was one of the evidences of a love of Christ. The communion roll amounted to 260, and on one of the islands there were over 20 schools. The Scriptures had been translated into the Native language, and by the labors of Geddes and Inglis, had recently been completed in two handsome volumes, which he exhibited, and the cost of which had been defrayed by the natives. This was the first bible published in West Polynesia. Another mission was established among the Coolies of the island of Trinidad. There were schools in different localities which had together 766 coolies on the roll. The coolies gave liberally, setting aside for the cause one tenth of what they earned, and they had now a large band of native workers. The mission had the confidence of the proprietors of the island, and also of the different nations, and during last year, \$250 had been given to the different schools, by the Government, which although insisting that Hindustanee should be taught, had released them from other conditions, and placed them under the control of the But there was one large district called for occupancy, and the proprietors had promised £150; there was also another £200 of reduced expenditure and against this there was the debt of the Mission Board amounting to \$2300. Another missionary would be expensive, but should they stand still, both ministers and laymen were ready to contribute, and one gentleman of small means who had formerly contributed £25 sterling to missions had promised £50 this year.

A collection was now taken up. The Rev. James Sinclair, who was appointed to address the meeting on Home Missions, said he had been called on un expectedly, and as the collection had been taken up, there might be said to be no need of further addresses. He admitted that there could be no retrenchment on Foreign Missions, though he thought the salaries of the missionaries were large, but on the other hand they were told that the expenses of living were high. Nor could retrenchment be made in the Home Mission or Supplementing Funds. Of the congregations which asked help from this Fund last year only 20 out of 50 contribut. ed to the Schemes of the Church. In College expenditure he admitted there could be no retrenchment, and as to French Evangelization, they had no precise information, though the assembly always found a balance against it. Perhaps, the printing might be done more cheaply by competition. He thought also the salary paid to the agents of the church might be reduced, as \$2000 was a large sum, though as regarded Dr. McGregor, his services were entitled to the warmest approbation, extending as they did over 14 years, but he thought the last increase of \$500 to his salary unnecessary, and he thought that salaries of Professors ought to be on a par, with those of agents. He then adverted to the expense of publishing the Record, and thought that something could be saved, and that Mr. Croil's salary as editor was too large, although it was said the Record was self sustaining. 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
