RUSSIANS LOSE SUNDAY BATTLE. Japs Repulse Attack on Mao Tien Pass. Russians Fought Desperately, But Were Hurled Back and Pursued by Valorous Japs.

TOKYO, July 11.—A p. m.—General Kuraki reports that two divisions of the Russian army made a desperate assault on Mao Tien Pass at dawn July 11th, but were repulsed. Casualties were not stated. At three o'clock Sunday morning, a heavy fog veiling their movements, two divisions of Russians commanded by Lieut.-General Keller, made an assault on the Japanese positions at Mao Tien Pass and were repulsed. The Japanese repulsed the Russians and pursued them for a considerable distance westward. Gen. Kuraki in his report praises the valor of his men.

JAP VICTORY DENIED. ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—Lieut. General Sakharoff in view of the Japanese official version of the fight at Kai Chou has sent in another report retreating that only one Russian battalion entered into serious conflict with the Japanese who had four divisions. He denies that it was a Japanese victory, the Russians having previously determined to withdraw their rear guard detachments in other positions.

LET 'EM COME. NEW YORK, July 11.—A despatch to the Times from Tokyo, which the correspondent says that a leading Japanese journal declares the advent of the Baltic fleet will be welcomed by Japan, as Port Arthur will certainly fall before its arrival and the fleet will therefore have no mass except the ice-bound port of Vladivostok.

GERMANY PROTESTS. BERLIN, July 11.—The German government has taken a prompt and firm stand in regard to the seizure of the mails of the North German Lloyd steamer Prince Heinrich, by the volunteer Russian steamer Smolensk, July 11, and are now sending a dispatch to the Russian government, protesting against the seizure of the mails.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 11, 2.35 p. m.—Since the receipt from Tokyo of an official denial of the report of a Japanese repulse at Port Arthur, the loss of about 30,000 men, skepticism as to the truth of the report from Victoria, Alaska, has been widespread. The general staff decline to accept the denial unreservedly, but are not insisting on the accuracy of the figures, they claim there is good reason to believe that a severe check was inflicted on the Japanese in front of Port Arthur and it is considered possible that General Stoenkel may have made a report on the subject to the emperor, who will not return here until tonight.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 11.—The news that the Russian volunteer steamships Smolensk and St. Petersburg, now cruising in the Red Sea, are stopping ships of neutral nations and searching them for contraband of war is causing the liveliest interest in all circles. Russia has evidently weighed the question, believes herself to be anticipating international complications.

MONCTON, July 15.—The Grand Lodge of the Independent Order of Good Templars met in 34th annual session at Hopewell Cape on the 13th and 14th. Grand Counsellor J. V.
