CONSTITUTION AND RULES OF ORDER

OF THE

ASSOCIATION. WESTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST

ARTICLE 1.—This Association, composed only of Ministers and Belegates, who shall be members of the Churches which they represent, shall be styled "The

W. N. B. Baptist Association."

ARTICLE 2.—The Association shall meet annually, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on the third Thursday of September, at such place as they shall appeint; notice of which shall be given in the Minutes. The meeting shall be opened with Social Conference; after which, the Officers and Committees shall be appointed. Every meeting held by adjournment from time to time during the session of the Association, shall be opened and concluded by prayer.

ABTICLE 3.—Each Church shall have the privilege of sending one Delegate, or more; but no Church, however numerous, shall be entitled to a greater number than five, in addition to their Pastor.

ARTICLE 4.—At each meeting of the Association, the Delegates shall deliver to the Clerk of the preceding year immediately on their arrival, the letters from the Churches; a list of the Delegates having been prepared by the Clerk, their names shall be called, and they shall take their places. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preside in all the transactions of the meeting, nominate Committees, and maintain due order among the members. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair and impartial record of all the doings of the Association during the session, and furnish a correct copy of the same for the press.

ARTICLE 5.—It shall be the duty of each Church to send by its Messengers a letter to the Association, giving an account of its state, particularly of the additions and diminution withins the last year; and generally, of whatever relates to its peace and prosperity, together with the whole number of members in communion. It shall also forward money for the printing of the Minutes.

ARTICLE 6.—When any Church shall desire admittance into this body, applies to shall and order: this being done, and a vote of acceptance taken, the Moderator shall, in behalf of the Association, give to one of their Messengers (if any be present) the right hand of fellowship.

ARTICLE 7.—When a Church shall neglect to make any communication to the Association.

Committee on Baptist Seminary, Fredericton, submitted the following report :-

Your Committee are pleased to refer to the progress of the Seminary during the past year, and its present cheering prospects for the future in its literary department. We would beg to bring before the Association the important fact that an urgent demand is now made for the payment of the debt on the premises, which must be paid, or legal measures will be taken to collect it. This to us is an important matter, and should receive our immediate attention. And further, the sum of \$1000 is required at once to pay for the repairs of last year, and to make further repairs on the building. This sum includes balance of salary due Dr. Spurden—thus making in all the sum of \$8000 to be raised by us at once. Your Committee have not lost sight of the desirability of establishing a Female Seminary, and raising an Endowment Fund; but pressing demands for the former will delay exertion in this respect for

Committee on Home Missions submitted the following report :-

Your Committee, with the limited time assigned them for the service before them, and under the pressure of other engagements, can only give a general, hurried, and inadequate statement for the consideration of the Association. We would especially direct the attention of our brethren to the condensed exhibition of facts and figures contained in the annual report of the Missionary Union, to be published in the Minutes of this Association. Surely no one, with any genuine interest in the cause of God, can rise from the perusal of that exhibit of our labors in this important branch of Christian Missions, without deep grief for the past and grave apprehensions for the future. Your Committee, if the time devoted to this Report would allow, could sketch a dark picure of neglects, and of consequent evils, in our Home Mission operalons. If we, as God's servants, do not more faithfully occupy the selds which He is opening, and unto which He is manifestly inviting us oenter, He may providentially dismiss us as unprofitable and unworseld the sacred trust, while He calls others to fill our places, and to cap the harvest by us neglected and slighted W. FRIDAY EVENING SESSION, 72 o'clock.

Opened by singing, "When I can read my title clear."
By special request prayer was offered for the conversion

The President of the Home Missionary Board not being able, on account of ill health, to read the Missionary and Union Report, the Moderator of the Association directed the attention of the audience to the various mission fields occupied by our denomination. Brief but deeply interesting, and we trust very suitable and profitable, addresses were then delivered by Revs. J. Rowe and J. Tozer.

Report on Home Missions adopted.

Committee on Foreign Missions submitted their report:

Your Committee regret to see, by the Treasurer's report, that the Churches of our two Associations only contributed last year to the Foreign Missionary Fund \$284.43, a fraction over three cents per member as the average. Is this right? Ought not the average to be at least 50 cents per member? Is that too much to expect of a disciple of Jesus, for the conversion of seven or eight hundred millions of perishing heathen to the knowledge of Christ? The whole amount contributed last year by the Churches of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and P. E. Island, for this important object was a little over \$2,000. Might not the 25,000 church members in these Provinces give six times this sum? Is it not time to inquire if some new arrangements are not necessary for the purpose of making our churches feel more deeply the irresponsibility in this matter? The sum now contributed is appropriated mainly to the support of native preachers in Burmah, under the supervision of Rev. A. R. Crawley, a missionary of the American Board. Some twenty native preachers are sustained by this means and in this connection. At our last Convention a young sister, a Miss DeWolfe, was

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present, who had been accepted by the Board as a candidate for the Foreign field; but she too must be placed under the supervision of the missionaries of the American Board. Our brethren in the Provinces of Ontario and Quebec are sending out a devoted, earnest young man, but as they have no independent mission, he goes out as the missionary of the American Board. In view of these facts, your Committee are deeply impressed with the idea that the Baptists of all the Provinces, now politically united in one Dominion, should combine in one inde-now politically united in one Dominion, should combine in one inde-pendent Foreign Missionary organization. In doing so they would se-fect their own field, in Burmah, or China, or among the islands of the sea, as Providence might direct-send out their own missionaries, and direct their labours. Each Province of the Dominion could provide for the support, say of one missionary, as a commencement. Therefore Resolved, That a Committee consisting of Revs. I. E. Bill and G. M. W. Carey, be appointed to correspond with the Board in Nova Scotia, and with the Board of the Canadian Baptist Convention, on this subject, and to make such preparatory arrangements as may be necessary for the pur-

Committee on Sabbath Schools reported-

Your Committee, in examining the Letters sent to this Association, find that from thirty-five churches there are thirty-seven schools, 286 teachers, 2,126 scholars, and 6,828 volumes in the libraries, and that

there are fifteen churches which report no schools.

We regard the Sabbath Schools as indicating, more or less, the prosperity of the churches, and it is most pleasing to observe that the great majority of those churches in this Association which report schools, all appear to possess good libraries, and we would earnestly recommend to those churches which at present have no schools, to lose no time in forming them; for we regard it of the utmost importance that all our churches should engage in this noble Christian enterprise. It is from our Sabbath Schools we look for the future members of our churches. And we would further recommend to the churches to report from year to year the number of conversions that take place among the scholars. W. M. EDWARDS.

Committee on Temperance reported-

As Temperance is inseparably connected with all the virtues of the Christian, the prospects and happiness of man, the unity and prosperity of the Church, the glory and honor of God, your Committee deem it the imperative duty of all Christians to aid by every possible means the cause of temperance, as a healthy check to the terrible influences of intemperance that have swept our world like a deluge of misery, blighting and ruining the souls and bodies of men, for time and eternity, leaving in its track the wreck of the blighted forms that have fallen beneath its burning curse, and who await the awful sentence of that just God who has said the drunkard shall not inherit the kingdom of God. Your Committee therefore feel it an honorable duty to sympathize with and aid by every honorable and legitimate means in our power the cause of temperance, and would especially recommend the formation of auxiliaries to the "New Brunswick Ministerial Temperance Alliance," wherever it is found practicable to do so.

CIRCULAR LETTER.

FROM THE WESTERN NEW BRUNSWICK BAPTIST ASSOCIATION TO THE CHURCHES OF WHICH IT IS COMPOSED.

Dear Brethren-The subject of this annual circular letter is faith. Although an apostle said that love is greater, yet faith is spoken of in Scripture as "precious" and indispensable; for without it we cannot

please God.

To you this is not a new theme. The object is to stir up your pure minds by way of remembrance. As christian churches you believe the Word of God: you have professed faith in Jesus Christ, and have avowed your trust in Him. Of none other but Baptist churches can this be said, that "ye are all the children of God by faith in Jesus Christ." Faith, as a prerequisite to church membership, is disregarded by all pedobaptist churches, and in this particular they have departed from the primitive apostolic example. Let us then, as the household of faith, attend to this distinguishing characteriatic.

The following definition of the term we find in the Epistle to the

Hebrews.

"Now faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen;" or in other words, it is the assurance of things hoped

for, the conviction of things not seen.

Those sublime spiritual verities, which neither come within the sphere of the senses, nor could be discovered by a process of reasoning, have been viewed by faith; and an abiding conviction of their reality and preciousness, influences the believer's heart and life. "Faith is the medium of contact between the benefit and the subject of that benefit; between eternal life provided, and the spirit for which it is provided." "It is the link of union between the salvation as prepared and perfect without ourselves, and our own personal being." "It is the mysterious link in the chain of moral causes and effects, which connects the weakness of the creature with the almightiness of God."

Faith is supernatural. When Christ reveals himself graciously to the sinner, an assurance of the divine favor and faithfulness accompanies that revelation, and a conviction is produced in his enlightened soul that he shall experience all the blessings of redemption. "Eye hath not seen nor ear heard, neither have entered into the heart of man, the things which God hath prepared for them that love him. But God hath revealed them unto us by his spirit." And of the Holy Spirit Christ says, "He shall take of mine and shall show it unto you." "All mea have not faith." "It is the gift of God." Christ is its "author and finisher." The Holy Spirit imparts it. "And faith," said the Apostle

Paul, "by the same Spirit."

The preaching of the Gospel is designed to produce it. God, being the object of faith, and the author of the truth, and having declared that His Word shall not return unto Him void, but it shall accomplish that which he please and prosper in the thing whereunto he sent it accompanies the proclamation of the truth with his benediction. "How shall they believe," said the apostle, "in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? Who then is Paul and who is Apollos, but ministers by whom ye believed, even as the Lord gave to every man? I have planted, Apollos watered, but God gave the increase.'

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It admits of degrees. large the sphere of faith's action; but an increase of faith respects the development of the principle itself, and is a greater force of persuasion, a more unshaken confidence in revealed truth, and is opposed to "staggering through unbelief." The doctrines of the gospel impress some so that they can venture their salvation on Christ with trembling hope; with others these doctrines produce full assurance of faith, accompanied with joy unspeakable and full of glory. Rev. Robert Hall, in his address to the Rev. Eustace Corey, said, "Faith, considered as a mere speculative assent to the truth of a divine testimony, may be looked npon as uniform or stationary; but when we consider it as a practical principle, as one of the graces of the Spirit, we perceive it to be, in common with others, susceptible of continual enlargement and increase. In the degree of power, which future and invisible realities exert over the mind, in the practical energy of what men profess to believe, in the promptitude and certainty with which it determines them to a correspondent conduct, there is the utmost diversity, even among those who believe with the heart. The faith to which the Scriptures attach such momentous consequences, and ascribe such glorious exploits, is a pracmomentous consequences, and accorded to the strengthened and increased by tical habit, which, like every other, is strengthened and increased by continual exercise. It is nourished by meditation, by prayer, and the devout perusal of the Scriptures, and the light which it diffuses becomes stronger and clearer by an uninterrupted converse with its object, and a faithful compliance with its dictates; as, on the contrary, it is weakened and obscured by whatever wounds the conscience or impairs the purity and spirituality of the mind." Of the Corinthians, pairs the purity and spirituality of the mind." Of the Corinthians, Paul said, "But having hope when your faith is increased;" and of the Thessalonians he said, "Your faith groweth exceedingly." And the Apostles said, "Lord, increase our faith!" God has assigned it a place in the economy of grace. Its office is to receive the truth at his trials of this life. Through each dispensation we discover its existence. trials of this life. Through each dispensation we discover its existence. By faith Abel offered unto God a more excellent sacrifice than Cain, by which he received testimony that he was righteous, God testifying of his gifts." Enoch was not a stranger to the doctrine of faith, when he walked with God, and was not, for God took him. In the offering up of Isaac, Abraham exercised it, and proved its power. At the dawn eren of the legal dispensation, it shone clearly in Moses, who chose rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season, esteeming the reproach of Christ greater liches than the treasures of Egypt. The children of Israel were taught the doctrine of faith, for God having promised them the land of Canaan for an inheritance, led them forth from Egypt through the wilderness, working miracles by the way, that they might believe and trust in him. And to whom did he swear that they should not enter into his rest, but to them that believed not? The prophets taught the same doctrine when they spake of the sufferings of Christ, and of the glory that thould follow. The voice of the Baptist in the wilderness was, repent Our Saviour himself inculcated the same truth when he aid, "He that hears my word, and believes on him that sent me, hath therefasting life." "Ye believe in God, believe also in me." "He that elieveth and is baptized shall be saved; and he that believeth not hall be damned." "Have faith in God." In preaching the Gospel of be grace of God, the Apostles taught particularly the nature, necessity, power of faith. And their doctrine and labors give evidence that

they believed God, trusted in Christ, and looked for their rest and reward in that city whose builder and maker is God.

The Apostles ascribe a mighty power and influence to faith. By it spiritual light and life are imparted. It gives evidence of the new birth. By it Christ dwells in the heart. Pardon, justification, sanctification, and salvation are its effects. Adoption, preservation, and access to God are ascribed to it. It produces peace, confidence, and joy. It is necessary in the Christian warfare, and all difficulties are overcome by it. Whatsoever is not of faith, is sin. It manifests itself in obedience to the divine commands, and is exhibited in works and labors of love. Here we are taught that faith is a divine gift, communicated in the reception of the truth; that it has distinguished the servants of God in all generations, imparting to them supernatural power, which has been exercised in various degrees, but always enabling the possessor to overcome the world, resist the devil, and lay hold of eternal life; and that it ascribes to God all the glory of man's salvation through Christ, over looking to him as its author and finisher.

Brethren and sisters in the Lord, you are the successors of those who through faith and patience now inherit the promises. To you are committed the lively oracles. The promises are yours. The celestial inheritance is yours. The present aid and comfort of the Spirit—the future eternal weight of glory—all things are yours, and you are Christ's, and Christ is God's. It is enough to animate believers in the Master's service to hear him say, "Ask, and ye shall receive." "Whatsoever ye shall ask in my name, that will I do."—"Where two or three are assembled together in my name, there am I in the midst of them." "I will never leave you nor forsake you." "Lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world."

Relying, then, on the word of God, on the aid of the Spirit, on the continued presence of Christ, the Church is prepared for her mission. The treasures of earth and the treasures of heaven are at her command. Freely she has received, and freely she gives. She has a store of divine wisdom, knowledge, and power. The gates of hell cannot prevail against her. Under the power of her faith, Antichrist shall fall. By faith all the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord Jesus Christ.

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MISSIONARY AND UNION REPORT FOR 1866-67.

In the winter of 1853, more than fourteen years ago, the N. B. B. Home Missionary Society was called into existence. Rev. Samuel Robinson, of precious memory, was unanimously elected its first President; and by the choice of his brethren, as expressed at our anniversaries from year to year, he continued to fill this important office until the 16th of September, 1866, when his Divine Master called him to a higher sphere of action in his heavenly kingdom. Faithfully did he discharge the duties of his position while on these lower grounds. He loved the missionary enterprise in its varied departments. His pastoral life, from the beginning, partook largely of the missionary element. His plans, his tons, his ministrations, and his success, all tended in this direction; and he was therefore all the more eminently qualified to fill the Presidential Chair of this Society: but his seat is now vacant; and we have to mourn that we shall no more look upon his smiling face, or listen to his atterances of wise counsel, in this militant state. It only remains for us to be stimulated, by his brilliant example, to increasing earnestness and devotion in the cause of Christian missions, until we, like him, shall be called to lay our armour by, and to enter upon the rewards of Christian fidelity in the better land.

In relation to the missionary labors of the past year, your Board can only say that they have expended the funds placed at their disposal in such a way as in their judgment seemed most conducive to the glory of God and to the salvation of immertal souls.

The monthly reports of the Missionaries in the field, for the most part, have been encouraging; but the conversions and baptisms have not been equal to some previous years.

REV. T. W. CRAWLEY

continued his labors in St. Andrews and St. Stephen until April of the present year, when he accepted a call from the Baptist Church in Reading, Mass., to become their pastor. With the divine blessing, he accomplished a good work for the Master in St. Andrews during his residence there; and there is reason to hope that the good seed of the kingdom sown by him in St. Stephen will in due time produce precious fruit. We are informed that Rev. B. Franklin Rattray has accepted a call to the pastorate of the St. Andrews Church; and we pray God to make his ministry eminently successful. St. Stephen as yet is not supplied; but the brethren there have purchased a site for a chapel in a prominent part of the town, and intend, as soon as the state of the funds will satify, to proceed with the erection of a house for God. They are now looking out for a minister of the Gospel to break to them the bread of lie. This field especially claims the fostering care of the Board.

THE WOODSTOCK AND RICHMOND STATIONS,

supplied by Rev. J. C. Bleakney until the 7th of April last, are both without a Baptist ministry. Our Bro. Bleakney felt that his salary was is undicient to meet the growing demands of his family; and he therefore exepted a call to Princeton, State of Maine. The stations rendered heant by his removal should be immediately supplied.

THE GRAND FALLS

matinues to enjoy the ministrations of Rev. W. A. J. Bleakney a poran of his time; and the time not occupied there he devotes to the bique instead of St. Frances. Your Board regretted to leave St. Paces destitute, but this arrangement in regard to the Tobique

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seemed absolutely necessary, in order to secure a suitable support for the Missionary. But in adopting this plan St. Frances is left without pastoral labor. Who will carry to them the messages of mercy?

REV. DAVID CRANDAL

was employed for some months, during last summer and autumn, to preach at Musquash, Dipper Harbour, and vicinity, South Bay and Grand Bay, and Loch Lomond. He not only taught the people publicly, but from house to house; and, we doubt not, much good was done in the name of the Lord Jesus. Feeling that the field was too laborious during the winter months, he resigned his trust, and Rev. A. Washburn was appointed in his place. He was much encouraged in his first visit to the different stations, and was expecting an immediate increase; but circumstances over which he had no control interrupted the regularity of his appointments, and thereby, to some extent, interfered with his success. The stations occupied by this Brother are all interesting and important, and ought not to be neglected.

SUSSEX VALE

is efficiently supplied a portion of the time by Rev. W. A. Corey; and the prospect of a speedy enlargement of the cause is very hopeful. A new chapel is in course of erection, towards which has called forth liberal contributions from several brethren who are deeply interested in the establishment of a permanent and self-sustaining Baptist interest in that place. Success to their laudable efforts.

NORTH RIVER CHURCH

has received a small contribution from your Board to aid in the support of the Rev. James Herritt, whose labors for the spiritual welfare of that people are highly appreciated by them.

SEEDIA

was supplied last summer by Bro. Manzer, licentiate, for nearly three months. His ministry was highly acceptable to the people. He was partly sustained by the Board.

REV. W. A. CRANDAL

succeeded Bro. John Currey in the Hampton Mission, and received the small balance due on the appropriation of the Board to that station.

THE CHURCH AT LUDLOW

made application for assistance towards the support of their pastor, Rev. A. Estabrooks, which your Board granted to the extent of \$50 per annum. Our Brother labors with zeal and diligence, but as yet with no very marked encouragement. He hopes for brighter days.

REV. W. M. EDWARDS

is still engaged in Blissfield, Doaktown, and adjacent districts, with some degree of success. The past year has been less productive of fruit than some of its predecessors; but he anticipates a rich harvest in the future. May his most sanguine expectations be fully realized.

REV. E. HICKSON

as usual, lifts the standard of truth with a steady hand at Newcasile, North Esk, Little South West, and neighboring stations. Some have bowed to its heaven appointed claims during the year, and others are seeking for guidance from above. Our Brother's quarterly reports have indicated occasional clouds, as well as the bright sunshine of hope and promise.

Having surveyed the field, he decided to make Chatham his seat of operation, and to extend his labors, as far as possible, to Richibucto and intervening places on the one hand, and taking in Bathurst and adjacent stations on the other. To this mission the Board contributes at the rate of \$100 per annum. Our Brother has labored indefatigably—has preached the Gospel to crowded congregations, and scattered the seed of inspired Christianity broadly over that There have been no signal tokens of saving mercy given; but the word proclaimed with sacred fidelity, and accompanied with such earnest prayers, will not return void.

"Though seed lie buried long in dust, It shan't deceive the hope; The precious grain can ne'er be lost, For grace insures the crop."

Bro. McKenzie having accepted a call to the pastorate from the Leinster Street Church, St. John, he will leave the North early in August. Some one should be sent with the least possible delay to take his place, and to carry forward, with the Divine blessing, the work so auspiciously

May others be stimulated by her noble example to do likewise.

REPORT.

Your Committee have much pleasure, on presenting this their thirty-first Annual Report, in stating that the attendance at the Seminary during the year, has been one hundred and fourteen; which must be gratifying to every one connected with the denomination, and proves the wisdom of an increase in our staff of instructors. The indications are, that the next academic year will witness a still greater increase. We aim at placing the Seminary in the position of one of the first literary institutions in the country; and we hope there will be found enthusiasm and liberality enough to give effect to such measures as will tend to place it above all difficulties, and ensure still greater success. Shall we have such support?

Two public examinations have been held during the academic year—at both of which His Excellency General Doyle attended; also Dr. Jack and Professor Campbell, of the New Brunswick University, and Rev. Dr. Brooke, the esteemed pastor of St. Paul's Presbyterian Church, who expressed themselves much pleased with the general proficiency of the Students. Many other gentlemen of our own and other denominations were present. The attendance of so many friends at these examinations, is most gratifying, and worthy of note.

During the past year, previous to the opening of the school, extensive repairs were made, which were necessary for the comfort of the Students, and the respectable appearance of the place. Your Committee did not go as far as necessity required, but thought it best not to incur additional outlay the present year, until an expression of opinion was had from the Association. While there has been so much during the past year to cheer your Committee, it is to us a matter for regret that the appeal to the Churches for money to pay off our indebtedness for repairs, met with such a poor response. We do most sincerely hope that the stain of past indifference and apathy will be wiped out by energetic action and liberal giving in the future.

The cost of repairs, &c. amounted to \$688.45; of which sum, \$455.24 has been met—leaving a balance of \$233.21. We need for repairs the present year (to put new floors in the school rooms; to paper the walls and varnish them, to paint the buildings, and also to enlarge two of the rooms, by removing partitions and throwing the hall into them; also to make an additional room for the Steward in the basement) \$600. Additional desks will also be needed, which will require an additional outlay. If the repairs and alteractions are made, and more desks placed in the building, we can then accommodate one hundred and fifty Students. This is an important matter, and we hope that it will receive that consideration at your hands which the necessity demands.

We would again draw the attention of your hands which the necessity demands. The debt upon the Institution, and hope that some decision may be arrived at, whereby we may be freed from this as well as other financial burdens. While our aim is to have an Institution second to none, so long as we are content to go along year after year doing so very little for it, we can never accomplish it. Is it too much to expect of the nearly ten thousand Church members (to say nothing of adherents) of this Province, that they wipe out this and all her debts, and place at our disposal funds for repairs the present year? We think not. Let

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The endowment of \$20,000 ought to be commenced immediately. The endowment raised, our debts paid, we at once have a strong and healthy Institution. One gentleman has offered to give \$1,000 when \$10,000 is raised. several others have promised in aid of this fund. Over \$2,000 are pledged now, provided an effort is made to raise the amount. If we are to advance, it is absolutely necessary that this fund be raised. Our denomination must and should look for its ministry among the young men of the Province, and to our Seminary and College for their preparation. The general diffusion of knowledge demands that the Baptist ministry be educated; and we believe if the matter is placed before our people now, that they will readily respond. The benefits accruing from a well endowed and vigorous educational Institution, are too apparent to require further comment,

During last spring, God, in his mercy, was pleased to visit the Seminary with a revival; and nearly all boarding there, were, we trust, savingly brought to a knowledge of Christ. Parents must rejoice that good religious influences surround their children; and we doubt not, that in answer to prayers offered up in many a home throughout the Province, these blessed results have followed.

At Committee meetings held previous to and at the close of the Institution, when the subject was under discussion, it was resolved that Rev. Dr. Spurden's time be given wholly (instead of one-half, as under last year's arrangement) to the Theological department, and that the whole of his salary be raised by the denomination. To carry out this plan, \$300 were pledged in Fredericton, and Rev. Dr. Hurd invited to visit the Churches with special reference to raising the balance (\$500); and also to excite a more general interest in favor of secular and ministerial education. Dr. Hurd has expressed his willingness to comply with such invitation. Your attention is drawn to the Treasurer's account, which shows a balance due Theological Professor,

Mr. Calvin Goodspeed, B. A., and Mr. Wilbur, have resigned. Their places will be filled by other competent tutors. These gentlemen carry away with them from the Institution the good wishes of all for their future success in life, and are highly esteemed for their abilities as thorough and able instructors.

An Alumni Society was formed on the 17th May last, which promises to do good service. Its object is the awarding of prizes, and the fostering of the general welfare of the Institution. Although so recently organized, they gave a prize of \$10 to the best in Classics. In addition, six other prizes were given by the following gentlemen:—Dr. M. C. McDonald, Rev. P. McLeod, Rev. B. F. Rattray, J. E. Hopper, C. Goodspeed, and S. C. Wilbur.

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DECLARATION

Of the Faith, Practice, and Covenant of the Church of Christ, composing the Eastern New Brunswick Baptist Association.

ARTICLE 1. We believe that there is but one only living and true God, who is a Spirit, infinite, eternal, and unchangeable in his being, wisdom; power, holiness, justice, goodness and truth: Deut. vi. 4; John iv. 24. Ps. xc. 2, cxlvii. 5; James i. 17; 1 Tim. i. 17; Mark x. 27; Isaiah vi. 3; Deut. xxxii. 4; Ex. xv. 11, xxxiv. 6, 7.

2. That there are three persons in the Godhead—the Father, the Son,

and the Holy Ghost-who are but one God, the same in substance, equal in power and glory: Matt. xxviii. 19; John xv. 26; 1 Cor. xii. 4-6; 2

Cor. xiii. 14; Eph. ii. 18.

3. That the Holy Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the Word of God, in which He hath given us our only rule of faith and practice: Luke xvi. 29-31; 2 Tim. iii. 15-17; 1 Thess. ii. 13; 2 Peter

i. 21, iii. 2; Rom. iii. 2; Isa. viii. 16, 19, 20.

4. That God, who is infinite in knowledge, and perfectly views all things from the beginning to the end, has foreordained that whatsoever comes to pass, either by his order or permission, shall work for the eternal glory of his great name: Acts xv. 18, ii. 23; Ps. lxxvi. 10, xxxiii. 11; Rom. ix. 17-23, xi. 36.

5. That in the beginning God created the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that in them are; and he upholds and governs all things by the word of his power: Gen. i.; Ex. xx. 11; Dan. iv. 35;

6. That God made man in his own image, in knowledge, righteousness, and true holiness; and made with him a covenant of life, the condition of which was perfect obedience: Gen. i. 26, 27; ii. 16, 17; Ecc. vii. 29;

7. That man being left to himself soon fell from that happy and glorious estate in which he was made, by eating the forbidden fruit, by which he brought himself and all his posterity into a state of death: Gen. iii. 6; Rom. v. 12-9.

8. That man being thus dead, his help and recovery are wholly in and

from God: John vi. 44; Eph. ii. 4, 5, 7-10; 1 John iv. 10.

9. That God the Father has chosen a great multitude of the human family, whom no man can number, of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues, and given them to his Son in the covenant of his grace, that he might redeem them from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works, which is the only foundation of salvation for lost and helpless sinners; and thereby the Ministers of the Lord are encouraged to preach the Gospel to every rational creature, because the purposes of God, and the intinite value of Christ's atonement, secure the increase and establishment of Christ's kingdom, so that the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and of his Christ; and He shall reign for ever and every Rom. viii. 29, 30; Eph. i. 4, 5, 11; John vi. 37-39; Rev. vii. 9; Titus

 11. 14; Mark xvi. 15; 2 Tim. ii. 19; Isa. ix. 7; Rev. xi. 15.
 10. That Jesus, the eternal Son of God, hath come, and taken on him. our nature, and in that nature hath yielded a perfect obedience to the law which we have transgressed, and suffered death for our sins, and

12. That the Spirit of God applies the benefits of this atonement, by convincing us of our sinful, lost and miserable condition; and then discovering the glorious Saviour, as he is exhibited in the gospel, in his suitableness and sufficiency, and enabling us to embrace him with our whole souls, by which he is made unto us wisdom, righteousness, sanctification and redemption: John xvi., 8-11 13-15; Gal. v. 22, 23;

13. That the life of religion consists in the knowledge of God, and conformity with him in the inward man, which necessarily produceth an external conformity to his commands, and brings us to live in obedience to his holy will in all our ways, and in our several places and relatious: John xvii. 3; 1 Cor. x, 31; Eph. ii. 10; Col. iii. 2, 3; Gal. ii.

14. That true believers being united to Jesus Christ, shall never perish, but live and reign with him for ever. They have communion with God, and by his Spirit they are united with each other, and have communion one with another, whereby they are made partakers of each other's gifts and graces: John vi. 39, x. 28; Rev. iii. 21; John xvii. 7, 11, 21; xiv. 3; Rom. viii. 38, 39; 1 John i. 8.

15. That the first day of the week, commonly called the Lord's day, is the Christian Sabbath: John xx. 19; Acts xx. 7; 1 Cor. xvi. 2;

16. That God hath appointed the ordinance of civil government for defending the poor as well as the rich, in their civil rights, without infinging upon the consciences of any, or attempting to dictate or govern in the worship of the eternal God, which belongs only to Jesus Christ, the great lawgiver and head of his church: Mark xii. 17; Rom xiii. 1-

6; 1 Peter ii. 13-15; Matt. xxiii. 10; Rom xiv. 4.

17. That there will be a general resurrection both of the just and the unjust; and that God hath appointed a day in which he will judge the world in righteousness, by Jesus Christ, and will reward every man according to his works; when the wicked shall be sent away into everlasting punishment, and the righteous received into life eternal: John v. 28, 29 ; Acts xvii. 31, xxiv. 15 ; Rom. ii. 16 ; Matt. xvi. 29, and

I. We believe that a particular visible Church of Christ is a number Saints and panels the mutual acquaintance and communion volume. Saints and people, by mutual acquaintance and communion voluntrily and understandingly covenanting and embodying together, for Pholding and pomoting the worship and service of God, to shew forth

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his glory, and for their own edification: 1 Peter ii. 5; Acts. ii. 42,

ix. 31; Heb. x. 25; Eph. iv. 15, 16.

2. That Baptism and the Lord's Supper are Ordinances of Christ to be continued until his second coming, and that the former is requisite to the latter, that is to say, that those are to be admitted into the communion of the Church, and to partake of all its ordinances and privileges, who upon profession of their faith have been baptized by Immersion, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Matt. xxviii. 19, 20; 1 Cor. xi. 23-26; Acts ii. 41, 42, and ix. 18-26; and viii. 12, 36-39: Matt. iii. 6-16; Rom. vi. 4; Col. ii. 12; Gal. iii. 27; Matt xxvi. 26-28; Acts xx. 11; 1 Cor. x. 16.

3. That since none but true believers can rightly partake of the Ordinances, therefore the door of the church should be carefully kept against all such who cannot give scriptural evidence of their union with Christ:

1 Cor. xi. 27-29; Matt. vii. 6, 15-20; 1 Peter ii. 5.

That a Church thus gathered hath power to choose, and by Elders to ordain those officers that Christ hath appointed in his Church, viz.: Bishops or Elders, and Deacons; and also to depose such officers who walk contrary to the rules of the Gospel; and to discipline their members, though in some cases it may be convenient and profitable to request the advice of the neighbouring Churches of Christ: Acts i. 21-26, vi. 3-6, xiv. 23, and xv. 6-31; 1 Cor. v. 13: 2 Thess. iii. 6, 14, 15; Titus iii. 10.

5. That a Bishop or Elder hath no more power to decide any case or controversy in the Church than any private brother, yet they, having superior gifts for teaching and ruling, ought to exercise and improve the same for the benefit of the Church; and the Church ought to be subjected to the gifts bestowed on the Minister from the Lord, while he is rightly administering in his place; whose place it is to lead in the actings of the Church, and to administer the ordinances of the Gospel, and devote himself to the work of teaching, warning, rebuking, and exhorting the people publicly, and from house to house: Matt. xx. 25-29; 1 Peter v. 3; Acts xx. 20-28, 31; Heb. xiii. 17; 1 Thes. v. 12, 13.

6. That the Deacon's office or work is to take care of the poor, and to have the oversight of the temporal affairs of the Church, and to minis-

ter at the Lord's Table: Acts vi. 1-5; 1 Tim. iii. 8-14.

7. That every believer is commanded to be faithful, to improve every gift and talent which is bestowed on him, in order to which, there ought to be such a Gospel freedom that the Church may know where every particular gift is, that it may be improved in its proper place, and to its right end, viz., the glory of God and the good of his people; and the Church ought to be subject to such improvements: 1 Peter iv. 10, 11, and v. 5; 1 Tim. iv. 14; 1 Cor. 12th and 14th chapters; Rom. xii. 3-8.

8. That there is a mutual obligation between Minister and peopleone to administer in things religious and spiritual, according to the gifts God has given. The Church to communicate of their temporal or worldly substance for his comfort and support, and that by an equality, as nearly as can be ascertained, that one may not be burthened and another eased. But this is not to be effected by force or compulsion, or by the sword of civil power; but it is to be a free-will offering, agreeably to the Scriptures of truth; and every member deficient in this matter ought to be disciplined by Gospel rule, as for any other breach of covenant, or neglect of performing Christian duty: Luke z. 7; Rom. xv. 27; 1 Cor. ix.; Gal. vi. 6.

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COVENANT.

We do now, in the presence of the great, all-seeing and most glorious God, and before angels and men, give up ourselves to the Lord Jeho-God, our Father, Son, and Holy Ghost, and avouch him this day to be our God, our Father, our Saviour, and our Leader, and receive him as our Portion for ever. We give up ourselves to the Lord Jesus Christ, and grace, and rely on him as the head of his people in the covenant of eternal blessedness.

We acknowledge our everlasting and indispensable obligations to glorify God by living a holy, righteous, and godly life, in this present world, in all our several places and relations; and we engage by the ansistance of the Divine Spirit, to improve our time, strength, talents, by Divine help, to walk in our houses as becomes those professing godiness, and to maintain the worship of God in our families, and to train up those under our care in the ways of religion and virtue.

We also give up ourselves to one another in covenant, promising to conduct towards each other as brethren in Christ, watching over one another in the love of God-reproving, rebuking, and admonishing one another for good as occasion may require; and if we at any time know that any members of the church are guilty of immoral conduct, that we will not expose it by tattling it to others; and if we have any personal difficulty with our brethren, we will not cherishenmity or speak of our grievances to others, but will faithfully labour with them, according to the direction of our Lord—Matt. xviii. 18, 17—that sin may be put away from among us, and that iniquity may not be harboured in the We engage to watch not only against the most gross evils, but also against all foolish talking and jesting, which are not convenient—
vain disputing about words and things which gender strife—disregard ing promises, and not fulfilling engagements—tattling and backbiting, spending time idly at taverns, or elsewhere, and vain, unnecessary worldly conversation on the Sabbath, and whatsoever else is contrary to sound doctrine, according to the glorious gospel of Christ.
