
The entire line of the Alt river in Roumania, running north and south through the country from the Transylvanian Alps to the Dan-ube, is now in the hands of the Teutonic Allies. In all directions the Invaders are continuing to make progress, with Bucharest, their main objective, daily coming nearer. The southern and eastern drive in the Alt region has brought the

The southern and eastern drive in the Alt region has brought the Teutonic forces across the Topolog river, while to the south between Rochi De Vede and Valeni their line has been drawn considerably near-er the Roumanian capital. Alexandria, 47 miles southeast of Bucharest, has been taken by Field Marshal Von Mackensen's troops. Considering the swiftness of the advance of the Teutonic Allies through Wallachia comparatively few prisoners have been taken, although semi-offical re-ports credit them with having captured considerable supplies of need-ed stores. Near Orsova 28 officers and 1,200 men were made prisoner, while in the Alt region, near Tigveni, ten additional efficers and 400 men fell into the hands of the Teutons.
