#### READ AT THE TENTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE PARKDALE

PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH.

# Report of Session.

In presenting its Tenth Annual Report the Session desires to express gratitude to God for the mercies of another year. Whilst remembering that it is only in the future we can rightly understand our lives, we yet are encouraged to hope that some fruit has been gathered, unto everlasting life. It is gratifying to see the large congregations that assemble from week to week, making it evident that the new church was not erected any too soon, and that not any too much room has been provided. May we not be satisfied with, nor attach too great importance to numbers. It is only where the Holy Spirit is working that there is anything to give solid satisfaction.

The Sabbath School is managed and worked with a great deal of energy and devotion. The gratitude of the congregation is due to the Superintendent and Teachers for their unselfish zeal in that important department of service. May they be rewarded by the Master Himself who bids us feed His lambs.

We think the interest in the weekly prayer-meeting steadily improving. We earnestly hope that we are not mistaken and that the interest will intensify until very many of the members of the church will find it impossible to stay away because of its sweet, refreshing influences.

The Session has also for some time enjoyed exceedingly its own Monday night prayer-meetings. They have been precious seasons of fellowship in the word and prayer. How pleasant it is for Brethren to dwell together in unity !

Some of the organizations of the congregation have been less active than last year—such as that entrusted with *tract distribution* which has been nearly altogether discontinued—but in other directions there has been greater prosperity.

As there are in the congregation now over 265 families, we feel especially the need of more visitation on the part of the older members. Many new families would greatly appreciate such calls, and would become in that way more attached, and their church life be made more enjoyable and profitable. We are glad to report that some of the ladies of the congregation have been always diligent in that respect, and that a large number of others have recently joined them. We trust that they will be able to make their visits of such a character as that much good will result.

It is particularly desirable that during and after the Sunday services the pew-holders should exercise the utmost cordiality in the recognition and entertainment of strangers. It must be a pleasure to all truly interested in the work to inconvenience themselves for the accommodation of visitors.

We notice with thankfulness, that, notwithstanding the heavy demands, the revenue has not only met the present requirements but that there is a material increase in the contributions for the schemes of the church. It is to be hoped that the congregation will very soon be able to respond to the desire felt by many, and support entirely, or in part, a Missionary that we can call our own, as many congregations are now doing.

We are also thankful to report that there has been a comparatively small number of cases of sickness and death last yearvery much less than the previous year-yet there have been some cases-one especially painful in which three children were, within one week, snatched from one family. With all these distressed and sorrowing ones we express our deepest sympathy, commending them to the God of all consolation.

In the Session itself some changes have taken place. We were greatly strengthened by the election of Messrs. Joseph Norwich and James Stewart—but soon after their ordination, Messrs. M. Swartout and R. Sabiston saw it to be their duty to resign, which left the Session as to numbers where it was. To these Brethren the congregation is greatly indebted for valuable services, whilst in the Şession and since their resignation. We trust that if not in the cession, still in the Master's service they will continue to make for themselves a good record and enduring name.

# REPORT FROM WEEKLY OFFERING SECRETARY.

# To the Chairman and Board of Managers Parkdale Presbyterian Church :

GENTLEMEN,—This being my first Report as Weekly Offering Secretary, and not having had charge of recording the offerings for more than eight months of the past year, and not having had the time at my disposal, this Report will not contain all the information I would have wished to give the Board. However I have based my report on the records which I have kept, as correctly as I could, for the last two quarters of the year 1888, and hope it will give the Board some conception as to what amount, and with what regularity the people of the congregation are contributing.

You issued a circular in the spring of 1888, and had it distributed in the pews through the church, requesting pew-holders and spaces on the contributors to fill out the cards, with their address and the amount they proposed to give weekly or otherwise, and return the cards, so as to enable the Board to have as nearly as possible a correct knowledge of what the rev-About two-thirds of the contributwould be. enne ors responded to the request contained in your circular. Those that did not do so, I debited for each week with the amounts they put in their envelopes the first time, or the amounts they gave the most regularly thereafter. I may here mention the fact that there are a number of pew-holders or contributors who, when absent for one or more Sundays, or who, when they neglect to put in their weekly offerings every Sunday, in many cases do not make up the amounts due, as you will see by the total of arrears in the attached statement. I might also mention, that there are a number of contributors who do not put in a regular amount each Sunday, but different amounts at different times, making it somewhat difficult to know what amount to debit them with. The Board will be pleased to know that several of the contributors have increased the amount of their offerings within the past quarter. Several pews have been allotted from which I have no record of having received any revenue. You will observe by the statement attached that the total amount of weekly offerings at the

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present time is \$87.17 per Sunday, provided all contributors give with regularity. The arrears for the last two quarters of 1888, amounting to \$309.90, as will be seen by the statement attached.

# Report of Mission Fund.

It affords us great pleasure to be able to report that the monthly subscriptions continue to increase and that most of the new members are contributing to the missions by envelope, yet we cannot but feel that we ought to have still better results, as about onethird of those who have envelopes do not contribute to the mission fund. We might here state, for the information of all the members that envelopes can be obtained at the south entrance of the Church, every Sabbath, morning and evening.

Taking the last three months as an average the following is as nearly as possible an estimate of the contributions per month: Two give \$5, three \$2, thirteen \$1, one 75c, eighteen 5oc, three 35c, one 35c, one 35c, forty-three 25c, three 20c, one 15c, thirteen 10c, one 5c, one 3c.

ANNUAL SUBSCRIPTIONS ARE: Three give \$5, one \$2.20, one \$2, one \$1.25, one 75c., seven 50c., two 45c., two 40c., one 30c., one 20c., one 15c., three 10c., one 7c., two 5c., one 1c. Sundry amounts \$4.50, being an average of about \$55.68 per month.

We pray that the Lord who has protected us, and given us so much prosperity during the year that has gone, may continue his goodness to us during the one we have just entered, and at its close we hope to be enabled to show even greater results than the above.

# Sabbath School Report.

The year 1888 has been one of prosperity and advancement in our school, outwardly at least. New rooms for the Infant and Bible classes, and new seating accommodation for the whole school have been provided and a new Library has just been selected. Another new feature is the organization of a children's choir

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ement in fant and ne whole en selectn's choir under the training of Mr. Hendry. Whether, however there has been a corresponding increase in spiritual growth, eternity will only reveal. We fear that we do not realize the additional responsibility laid upon us by the advent of these facilities, together with the large increase in attendance, and we trust that the congregation will strengthen our hands not only by their cordial assistance, but by their prayers.

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We regret to say that in one particular we have not received the assistance we desire from the congregation. There has been considerable difficulty in getting 'teachers—men and women who are able and willing to give the school a first lien upon their affections and time—and on different occasions classes have gone for weeks without a regular teacher. This should not, we respectfully submit, occur in a congregation such as ours, and we trust it will receive the prayerful consideration of those who are competent to teach, and can spare the time necessarily involved in preparation for, and the prosecution of, the work.

We have only to express our pleasure at the growth of the adult Bible class under the tuition of the Rev. Mr. MacKay, and our appreciation of the labors of our Librarians, Messrs. Macbeth and Hewish, in the selection and cataloguing of our new library, and to extend a hearty invitation to all, old and young, to be present with us on the Sabbath afternoon either in the Bible classes or school.

# Report of Parkdale Auxiliary W. F. M. S.

It is with feelings of gratitude to God that we present this, the Third Annual Report, of our Auxiliary, and although we have not increased in membership, we are pleased to report an increase in contributions and also an interest in the work, all of the ladies being ready and willing to take part in the meetings which have been held regularly during the year.

Our roll still shows a membership of thirty-three, thirteen being members of the General Society, and an average attendance of twenty per month.

In April work was begun for the North-West Indians, Mrs. Bryce Mrs. Gordon, Mrs. Jack and Mrs. Campbell kindly giving their homes for the purpose of holding sewing meetings and socials in the afternoon, the ladies engaged in sewing, and in the evenings a choice programme was rendered by friends, the collections amounted to \$51.60. The sum of \$1.25 has also been sent to the Secretary from a friend in England, making a total to this fund of \$52.85, this has been chiefly expended in suitable clothing and material for the Indians, a large bail being sent in September.

The girls' sewing class, which met for some weeks at Mrs. Inglis' also provided 1 doz dressed dolls, 7 scrap books, and 2 patch work quilts for the same purpose; 2 doz. dressed dolls were sent by the same society, and  $1\frac{1}{2}$  doz. by friends to India.

In October we held our first thanksgiving meeting, and it was indeed a blessed meeting to all present, the offering amounted to \$21.70.

The total receipts this year are \$182.30, being an increase of \$69.67 over last year.

In closing we would like to call the attention of the ladies in the congregation to our work, and if a few can aid so much in sending the "glad tidings of great joy to those who sit in darkness," what might be the result, if every woman in our church felt it not only a duty but a privilege to help in the glorious work of spreading the Gospel of Christ among their sisters in heathen lands.
