





CROPS IN P. E. ISLAND. Little Province Has Had Prosperous

The Prince Edward Island crop report for the month of July shows that agriculture on the Island is in a prosperous condition. Rains have been frequent, and the weather favorable for the growth of grass, so that up to the present there has been no shortage of pasture for the stock. Clover generally was killed out by the severe weather during the latter part of the winter, but the timothy came on, and during the month of July grew very rapidly, so the yield of hay is very good in most districts. There has been considerable wet wea-

The chief grain crop grown is oats. They are somewhat later than usual on account of the late spring, but they have made a strong healthy, vigorous growth, and promise to yield well above the average. Spring wheat and, barley where sown have also done well. The acreage devoted to taken advantage of the lowest potatoes is large. Strawberries were a fair crop. In a few sections the crop was large, but as a rule the yield was below the average, due to winter killing of the plants. Bush fruits are very good. Cherries and plums will only be a medium crop. Many plum trees be a medium crop. Many plum trees have been destroyed by the black knot. Early and fall apples promise to be fairly abundant. Winter varie-ties, however, except in a few places, will be a light crop. Spring frosts in some districts injured the bloom and reduced the yield to some extent. Injuries from insects up to the present have been rather light. The joint worm has been working in a few wheat fields, but the damage has only been slight. Potato beetles are quite numerous as usual. The cut worm and the turnip flea beetle have done a little damage to the root crop. The bud moth and canker worm appeared in some orchards in small numbers, but did not do any extensive injury. Aphids have been noticed at work lately in a few places. Root

Inspecting Fruit In British Columbia.

Far from the least important work undertaken by the British Columbia Department of Agriculture is the inspection, and condemnation or fumigation when necessary, of all important nursery stock, fruit and vegetable produce. The coast province is remarkably free from orchard pests and diseases, and the credit for this happy state of affairs must be given principally to Mr. Thomas Cunningham, provincial fruit inspector, and the officers of his division. Besides exercising constant oversight over the orchards of the province, stamping out immediately on first appearance fire blight or other trouble, the force passes on all of the immense quantity of produce shipped in from

the United States. One week's record illustrates the scope of their activities. Within seven days recently there was condemned at Vancouver 889 boxes of apples, 1,492 boxes of pears, and 2,-395 boxes of peaches, a total of 4,776 packages. All this was returned.







PREMIER OF P. E. ISLAND.

Hon. John A. Mathieson Has Been In Politics For Fourteen Years. The Hon. John Alexander Mathieson, Premier of Prince Edward Island, who has recently announced a war gift of one hundred thousand bushels of oats to Great Britain from the island province, is one of the most energetic and persistent politicians in public life in Canada to-day. A strong physique and an sanguine, irrepressible temperament fit him to play the part. He is fifty-one years of age and of mixed Scottish and Irish ancestry. He was born at

Brackley Point on the north side of the island, but represents in the Legislature the straggling constituency of Georgetown at the extreme southeastern end. In his own constituency he is very strong, electorally, making it a point to visit every division once a year. In his younge day he was a schoolmaster, but is at present a lawyer with an extensive practice before the provincial bar. He has been Premier three years and before attaining power had to defeat

power for twenty-two years. Mathieson was first elected to the P. E. I. Legislature at the general elections of 1900 and had been a member for less than three years when elected to the leadership of the

The Provincial Opposition was a very passive affair until Mr. Mathieson's advent. He had lived out west for some time and while there had imbued some western ideas on politics and other matters. He was firmly impressed with the fact that so long as the Opposition contented themselves with mild academic discussions of the Government they might remain content to sit in Opposition. He told his colleagues how he felt and forthwith plunged into an aggressive campaign against the powers that were. His methods ap pealed to his colleagues and the Conservative electorate, and he was asked to accept the leadership. After that he maintained an aggressive campaign on the hustings and on the, floor of the Legislature, and with such effect that at the general election of 1908 the once overwhelming Government majority was reduced to Two bye-elections, bitterly two. fought by the Opposition under Mr. Mathleson's leadership, wiped out their small majority. Premier Pal-mer resigned and the lieutenant-governor sent for the leader of the Opposition to form a Government. This Mr. Mathieson did, and at once ap pealing to the country, was sustained by an overwhelming majority, only two Liberals being returned to the Legislature.

A Hint To Cities. If people in cities are as good as their word, and are desirous of increasing the acreage under crop in 1915, they might begin first on the arge areas of farm land that have been bought by enterprising real estate men, for subdivision into city There are hundreds of acres lots. around Toronto that could thus be brought under cultivation this fall and made to produce something more than the land surveyors' stakes, a beautiful park gate entrance, and an occasional house or two. And Toronto is not alone in this respect either. There are other centres where a beclouded vision has taken hundreds of acres of land that should be producing food, and brought them under the spell of the real estate man. If they have not yet been brought under production, there must be thousands of these suburban acres adjacent to western cities. Nearly every city, therefore, has an opportunity at its very doors to increase the wheat acreage of 1915. City plowing bees should be in order just now. There are many idle teams, and men, too, in our cities. The plows are all that are needed, and they can be secured very easily. First bring the unused suburban acres under the spell of the plow. When that is accomplished the movement should be extended to the country and assistance given the farmer in preparing more land for the 1915 crop. Farmers will welcome their co-operation Many farmers on account of the help question have as much as they can well attend to without bringing more land under cultivation. But with the help and co-operation of people in cities they may be able to extend Canadian farming
