COTTON SHIPMENT

SENT TO FRANCE

First Direct Shipment From
New York Since the War
Started Sent on Tuesday

New York, Oct. 7.—For the first time since the war started in Europe a direct shipment of cotton from this country to France was made yesterday. It is supposed that most of the cotton which has been reaching France has gone through Great Britain, but yesterday's consignment was to Havre.

The total exports of cotton yesterday were 29,812 bales. This included 3,405 bales to France, 5,478 bales to Great Britain and 7,456 bales to other points on the continent. More than 12,000 bales went to Japan and approximately 1,250 bales to Mexico. This represents a gain compared with recent weeks. Exports for the season to date have totalled 181,721 bales. Last year in the same period 1,323,854 bales were exported.

ST ANDREW'S PRES.
CHURCH SENDS CALL

Congregational Meeting Held
Last Thursday and Call Extended to Calais Pastor

A meeting of St. Andrew's Presbyterian church was held on Thursday evening last for the purpose of extending a call to a minister for the vacant charge. Rev. Dr. Polley of Dalhousie, Interim Moderator of the session, presided and preached, and after the devotional exercises stated the object of the meeting.

The congregation having expressed its desire by vote that it was ready to proceed to call a minister, the name of Rev. R. A. McDonald of Calais, Me., and Rev. J. A. McKenzie of Lachute, were put forward and ballots were taken.

The result of the voting was made known by the presiding minister, and the Rev. Mr. McDonald having received a large majority of the votes cast, it was resolved to make the call unanimous. The call to Rev. R. A. McDonald was then read, and after the benediction was pronounced, it was largely signed by those present at the meeting.

Rev. Roderick A. McDonald is at present preaching in the congregational church at Calais, Me. He is a native of Halifax and a graduate of Pine Hill College, from which he graduated with honors. He is highly spoken of throughout the Maritime Provinces as a man of great power among young men, and it is felt that he will carry on the best traditions of St. Andrew's church, where he will receive a warm welcome.

BRITISH SUBMARINE SUNK GERMAN TORPEDO BOAT

Germans Admit Very Heavy Losses in the Fighting in Eastern Prussia—Spy Dressed as Woman Making Dolls Caught on East Coast of England

(Special to the Graphic).

London, Oct. 8th.—An official despatch says that the British submarine E-9 made a daring raid into German waters and sank one of the enemy's torpedo boats.

French army are displaying great dash and bravery. The unit of the German army sent to help to break the allies line has been held in check by the French.

A despatch from Berlin admits that the Germans met with heavy losses at the hands of the Czar's troops on the frontiers of Prussia.

The French northward movement is bringing their line close to the Belgian frontier.

Making and dressing dolls was the innocent occupation of a German spy arrested on the Yorkshire coast of England. He was garbed as a woman, and on examination the dolls bodies contained carefully prepared maps of the East Coast of Britain.

St. John, Oct. 8th.—The important feature in today's news is that the Germans have forced their way with heavy loss across the river near Antwerp, having damaged or destroyed some of the outer forts. They are now bombarding the city causing a panic. Thousands are fleeing into Holland. The Belgians declare they will be able to hold out, and they are fighting desperately. Germans big guns have been very effective.

The battle in northern France continues fiercely, but without result. Paris is optimistic, but declares the outcome is entirely a question of endurance.

Russia reports steady progress of her forces. Germans are now on offensive.

London, Oct. 8th.—A Rome despatch states that a message from Budapest announces the almost complete annihilation of Austrian battalion of Czechs in fierce encounter with Russians during the latter's advance on Marmaros Scigst. Every soldier in the battalion was either killed or wounded it is said.

New York, Oct. 8th.—A lengthy statement was issued last night at the Belgian embassy in Washington detailing the present European war. The New York Times characterize it as "A document to which the advocates of the German cause will find it exceeding difficult to reply."

Tokio, Oct. 8th.—At Tsing Tau the German fire is slackening. During the fighting the rope holding a German captive balloon was cut and balloon floated away.

Paris, Oct. 8th.—A despatch from Cetinje says that Montenegrin detachments operating in Herzegovina inflicted heavy losses on the Austrians and occupied important strategic positions near Gatzko. After hard fighting the Montenegrins occupied Abalak, Stephen and Kliputch, taking a large number of prisoners and much ammunition. Austrian aeroplane, while seeking to observe French battery, was hit with shells and fell into the sea.

London, Oct. 8th.—The Central News quotes the Vienna Reichspost as stating that furious fighting has taken place between Bulgarians and Servians, and that Bulgarians have besieged Istip in Servia. If this

SAILED ON SATURDAY

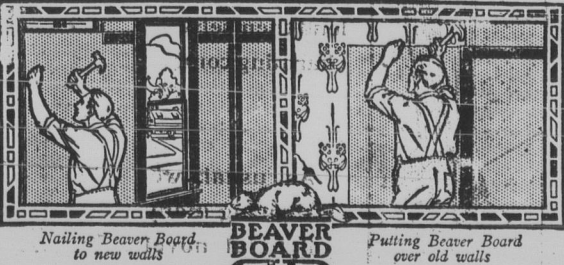

RUSSIAN WAR CHIEF.



GRAND DUKE NICHOLAS
The Grand Duke Nicholas, who by an Imperial decree named by the Czar on August 3, became Commander in Chief of the Russian Army, was born in Petrograd in November, 1858. He was formerly a general of cavalry and military commander of the Petrograd district. He has had a brilliant career in the Russian army and has done much to make it the finest fighting machine which it is now admitted to be. The Grand Duke is a man of splendid physique, with great energy and determination. He has all the instincts of a born cavalry leader and is thoroughly liked by the whole army.

WILL BE BROUGHT BACK TO MONCTON

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 4.—It is understood that the purchasing department of the I. C. R., which was established at Ottawa about five years ago, will be transferred to Moncton. The officials of the department have been notified to prepare for the transfer, which is expected to take place in January next. When this department was organized clerks from the I. C. R. offices here were transferred to Ottawa to take charge. The change now contemplated will necessitate their return to Moncton.

HEROIC BOY PERFORMED HIS DUTY

Shoots German Officer Who was Brutally Treating a French Prisoner

Paris, Oct. 3.—M. Paulist, Senator for the Department of the Chateaux, who has been in the north tells a pathetic story of a boy hero, Emile Despres, who shot the German officer who was brutally treating a French prisoner. A German lieutenant was quartered in a house, and at every step in the housewife who was serving him and his men. A French sergeant who was seriously wounded, was thrown into the corner and treated like a dog. His thigh was fractured and he could hardly move. The French soldier, maddened by the insults heaped upon the woman of the house by the Germans, bounded up, seized a revolver and shot down the officer. He was immediately knocked down by the soldiers, who beat him with the butt of their rifles, kicked him, and dragged him out, together with fifteen miners, who were now all accused of having fired on the men. They were ordered to be shot. They were taken two by two and executed in the presence of a captain.

The sergeant was to be the last, and as he was lying on the ground he saw a boy of 14, Emile Despres, and begged him to fetch him a glass of water. The boy brought the water, but as soon as the captain saw him he seized the boy and beat him with the flat of his sword and kicked him, telling him he would be shot with the rest. With that he took him by the neck and flung him on the ground.

When the boy's turn to be shot came his eyes were bandaged and he was made to kneel down. The captain, after waiting a few minutes, did not give the order to fire, but instead he told him to "take off the boy's bandage." Then he said: "Come along, my lad; you wanted to give the sergeant a drink; you'll do much better; give him a bullet instead. Here is a rifle. Take it and fire; and if you kill the sergeant your life will be spared." The boy took the rifle and pretended to take aim at the wounded sergeant. But he suddenly turned round and fired a shot point-blank at the German officer and killed him. The lad was immediately riddled with shot and stabbed with bayonet thrusts by the drunken soldiers; but he had avenged the sergeant.

CONTINUED EMPLOYMENT IN CONSOLIDATED RUBBER FACTORIES

The 6,400 employees of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co., Limited, will not suffer as a result of industrial conditions created by the war. On the contrary the war has brought to some of them a larger pay envelope. Full time having been resumed in the Montreal factory of the company, the employees of which had been working only 80 per cent. of full time for a considerable period prior to the breaking out of hostilities. The employees in all of the nine other factories operated by the company are working full time and some increases in the staff may be necessary towards the close of the year.

As about \$1,500,000 worth of rubber clothing has been imported annually from Europe war conditions will stimulate the demand for Canadian made raincoats. It is partly in anticipation of the increased demand for this product that full time has been resumed in the Montreal factory of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co., Limited. There may be an increased demand for Canadian made automobile tires also as the war will likely result in a temporary reduction of the imports of automobile tires from France and the United Kingdom. The demand for Canadian made rubbers will not be affected appreciably as the imports of rubber footwear into Canada are practically nil.

The output of the Canadian Consolidated Rubber Co., Limited, during the past year was valued at approximately \$10,000,000, and the officials of the company anticipate an increase in output during the ensuing year. The production of that output will mean the expenditure of many millions of dollars in Canada—in wages, in factory supplies, in raw materials that are produced in this country, etc. The benefits accruing from such an expenditure at this time will be all the greater because of the fact that the expenditure will be distributed over the ten factories operated by the company which are located at various points throughout Eastern Canada.

ITALY NOW SAID TO REMAIN NEUTRAL

Situation Becoming Clearer And the Majority of the People Now Support Peace Policy

Rome, Oct. 8.—As time progresses the situation in Italy is becoming clearer. The present government has no intention to violate the neutrality proclaimed with the consent of the whole nation unless such events occur as endanger what Italy considers her vital interests or offend her rights. Similarly, Italy at this time does not intend to occupy either Valona, or any other Albanian point, unless forced to do so by the action of any country which in so doing disregards her predominant position in the Adriatic. Thus all talk of Italy's joining the conflict, at the present moment at least, is premature. Public opinion seems to understand the wisdom of the prudent policy of the cabinet, as demonstrations made in trying to force the Government to follow one direction or another have ceased and a large majority of the people are supporting the cabinet.

ROBBER MAKES HAUL AT GAGETOWN HOTEL

Guest Makes Free While Others Sleep and Decamps With \$36 And Many Valuables

Gagetown, Queens county, is in a high state of excitement and indignation, as well, to-day, with good cause. As the Circuit Court met on Tuesday there were many visitors to the shiretown, and Dingy's hotel was crowded. In some instances two persons slept in one room. During the day a man who engaged a room paid three days in advance and settled himself comfortably in the hostelry. But, apparently, the payment of advance board was part of a game to inspire undeserved confidence in him, for during the night while the lodgers were sleeping the sleep of the just—or unjust—the paid-in-advance man visited their rooms, secured \$36, two watches and other valuables, and then decamped. One of the losers was Coun. Beech, of Brunswick parish, all of whose money was taken. The identity of the thief is unknown, but it is hoped he will be captured. Sheriff's officers are now on his trail.

AN EXTRAORDINARY WIRELESS INVENTION

New System Invented Whereby No Poles or Batteries Are Required For Use

London, Oct. 7.—A despatch to the London Times from Rome says that a priest, Dominico Argenti, has invented a system of receiving wireless messages whereby communications may be received even in closed rooms. No poles or batteries are needed. The apparatus is of the simplest description and can be carried in one's vest pocket. It also is cheap.

The inventor says that he has been able to take messages sent from the Eiffel Tower and also from German stations. The police, having learned that messages from Constantinople near Rome, were overheard by Argenti, has seized all his apparatus, some of which was manufactured by the inventor.

ZEPPELINS ARE TO INVADE ENGLAND

Preparations Are Said to Be Going on Day and Night in Berlin Report

London, Oct. 7.—In a despatch from The Hague, the correspondent of the Daily Express says that German newspapers reaching there indicate that Count Zeppelin is now at Wilhelmshaven, on the North Sea, with his staff. Wilhelmshaven is the point from which the great air raid on the British Isles is to start. One of these papers publishes an interview with the Count in which he is quoted as saying that he had not forgotten England and would prove it very soon.

It is also reported, the correspondent of the Express continues, that Count Zeppelin was summoned recently by Emperor William to Mainz. The Emperor said to the Count that he relied on him for a great work, and offered to make him commander-in-chief of the German air fleet. The Count smilingly refused, but said he would accept the title after he returned from England.

The Zeppelin staffs are working day and night at Wilhelmshaven, and another station is being established at Emden for other types of airship.

Berlin, Oct. 7.—The following official announcement was given out by the headquarters staff of the German army the evening of October 6:

Continuous French outflanking movements against our right wing have extended the battle front until it is now north of Arras.

West of Lille and west of Lens, our advance guards are in touch with the enemy's cavalry.

No decision has yet been reached in our counter attacks along the line between Arras, Albert and Roye.

The situation remains unchanged along the battle front between Oise and the Meuse, in the vicinity of Verdun, and in Alsace-Lorraine.

There is no news from Antwerp. In the eastern theatre of the war the Russians advancing against East Prussia through the Province of Suwalki, have been checked. We have been successful in our attack against the enemy near the town of Suwalki.

Vienna, Oct. 7.—It is officially announced that the Russians invading Galicia in an attempt to besiege the Cracow fortifications, have been driven back from the line of the Donajec River by the reinforced Austrian army.

The Austrians have retaken Neusatz, on the Southern Galician Railway line, just east of the Donajec River. The above received from Vienna to-day by way of Rome flatly contradicts the Russian claims that they had occupied Tarnow and were about to cross the Donajec River for the purpose of isolating Cracow.

GREAT BRITAIN'S FOREIGN SECRETARY

Sir Edward Grey, the British Foreign Minister, is not one of those statesmen who finds any relief from the cares of his great office in social life. Mr. Gladstone was a great dinner-out and loved the theatre. He was in a box in a theatre when the news of Gordon's death was brought to him. Sir Edward Grey is never out of his own home when not at his office during the working days of the week. But at the end of the week, the sport-sacred week-end, he is always to be found at a little iron cottage he has built for himself by the side of the stream where he may indulge in his favorite pastime of fishing without the voices that would break in upon his solitude.

The death of his wife a few weeks after he had been appointed to his high office left him one of the loneliest and most solitary men in the world. There were, unhappily, no children born during those years of perfect comradeship and love, and when Lady Grey died he seemed to close forever the doors of his heart to all who would intrude as he kept trust with memory.

The circumstances of Lady Grey's death were to him a tragedy beyond even the losing of her. She was driving in the park on his estate in Northumberland, when the horses got out of hand and she was dashed against a tree. Sir Edward happened to be in London on state affairs at the time, and when the news reached him he rushed to Northumberland through the night on a special train only to find her unconscious, in which state she remained for two days, when she died. He gave it out that he never wished any reference made to it and returned to London, stealing against all the lights and glances of social life which would now be unbearable without her, and sought in the intensest application to his duties distraction that should preserve his peace and sanity.

ROLLING STOCK FOR GOV'T RAILWAYS

Car Building Now Being Rushed Ahead, Moncton Shops Receiving Big Share of Work

Moncton, N. B., Oct. 6.—The Intercolonial Railway continues to make additions to its motive power and rolling stock. Recently the railway received ten passenger locomotives of the Pacific type two switch engines, one hundred and eighty box cars of 80,000 pounds capacity, and four special steel pit cars, each with a capacity of 150,000 pounds. The "Pacific" came from the Montreal Locomotive Works, the switch engines from the Canadian Locomotive Company and the cars from the Eastern Car Company. The road has ordered four more special pit cars from the latter concern.

The P. E. Island Railway recently received an addition to its rolling stock from the I. C. R. Three passenger cars and one baggage car were taken across the Northumberland Strait on scows from Mulgrave, N. S., to Charlottetown, where their standard gauge trucks were changed for trucks to suit the narrow gauge of the Island line.

The Moncton and Buctouche Railway recently purchased from the Intercolonial an entire train consisting of one small locomotive, one first class car, and one combination second-class car and smoker.

The I. C. R. is taking up the construction of its own passenger cars. There are now under construction at the new shops in Moncton four baggage and two postal cars. They all have steel frames. The baggage cars are sixty feet over all and are fitted with Simplex four wheel trucks. The postal cars are sixty-five feet in length, and have Simplex six wheel trucks. When finished, it is said, they will be the equal of any product of the regular car-building concerns.

Engineers report the new block system between Moncton and Pictou Junction working splendidly so far.
