the year of our Lord one thousand eight
hundred and thirty seven, and in the
first year of Her Majesty's Reign.

CANADA. MEETING IN MONTREAL OF THE CITIZENS OF AMERICAN ORIGIN.

The public meeting of the citizens of Mon-
treal, of American origin, took place yester-
day, it was very numerously attended; few
of the more respectable American resi-
dents being absent.

The Chair was taken at the appointed hour
by J. F. BURNHAM, Esq., and EDWARD
CHURCH, Esq., was appointed Secretary.

The following Resolutions were then sub-
mitted and passed unanimously.

Moved by C. D. DAY, Esq.—seconded by
J. A. PERKINS, Esq.
1st Resolved.—That in the present dis-
turbance of this Province, it is a duty
imposed upon all lovers of good order,
reasonably to maintain the authority of the
law and Her Majesty's Government, and to
counteract by constant and earnest effort,
the designs of the treacherable and seditious
rebels.

Moved by W. LYMAN, Esq.—seconded by
Logan Fuller, Esq.
2d Resolved.—That the leaders of the
revolutionary party have endeavored to ex-
cite the sympathy, and secure the support of
the inhabitants of the United States, in their
demerit enterprises, by comparing the situa-
tion of this Province to that under which
the older Colonies sought a separation from
the British Empire, and have pretended to
draw a parallel, which is as well founded
as a knowledge of the political circum-
stances of the two countries derived in the
one case from the page of history, and in the
other from personal observation, as from an
experience of the mild and equitable charac-
ter of the local Government are enabled to
declare utterly unfounded and perversely false.

Moved by J. E. MILLS, Esq. and seconded by
Charles Gates, Esq.
3d Resolved.—That this meeting, composed
of British subjects of American birth and
origin, impelled by the obligations of their
allegiance, and a desire to preserve the har-
mony happily subsisting with the neighbour-
ing United States, feel themselves called
upon to prevent to the utmost of their power
—the practice of a gross and wicked im-
position upon the citizens of that country to the
prejudice of this; and they accordingly now
express, deliberately and solemnly, their con-
viction founded on long observation and ex-
perience, that no just cause for dissatisfaction
exists in this province—but on the contrary
its Government is calculated to secure the
attachment and support of every honest man
and that the attempted revolution is to be
ascribed solely to the false representations
and unreasonable designs of a few ambitious
and unprincipled leaders.

Moved by J. T. BARRAT, Esq. seconded by
Harrison Stephens, Esq.
4th Resolved.—That with the opinions and
feelings above expressed, we will promptly
and fearlessly stand forward in defence of
our adopted country in the hour of need—
and we now declare ourselves in readiness
by every means in our power, by our coun-
sils, our influence and our physical strength
to aid in enforcing obedience to the laws, and
in restoring peace and good order under the
sovereign Government throughout the land.

Ward, Esq.
Resolved.—That copies of the foregoing
Resolutions, together with the requisition
for a meeting to be held at New York
on the 1st of January, be submitted to New York
for publication in the
papers of those cities.

Resolved.—That all eligible
volunteers for six months
receive 1s. per day, and

DEPARTURE OF THE ROYALIST TROOPS
FROM MONTREAL FOR SOREL.—The North
British mail arrived yesterday afternoon, bring-
ing by Burlington, Montreal dates of the 22
inst, and Quebec of the 20th ult.

The Montreal Transcript furnishes us the
following extracts:
The strong hold of the rebels at St. Char-
les, has been destroyed, and the band that
garrisoned it scattered. But although we
have scotched the monster rebellion, the spirit
of revolt is not dead. The activity of the
insurgents is remarkable, and it is not just
ice to admit the personal bravery displayed
by their deluded followers. How lamentable
that a people so largely educated with these
two essential qualities should apply themselves
to the destruction rather than the advance-
ment of their native country.

A detachment of troops left Montreal for
Sorel, by steamboat, on Thursday afternoon.
These men, we presume would move upon
St. Dennis in the course of yesterday, so
that news from that quarter may be expected.
Strong bands of armed rebels are col-
lecting about St. Charles, ready to unite at
some given point, whenever their plan of
operations is complete.

REBELLION AMONG THE REBELS.—We
have the following statement from a Cana-
dian on whom every reliance can be placed.
General Brown having abandoned the stan-
dard which he had so manfully assisted to
raise, was stopped by a band of his own
party.

Knowing that they were already deserted
by Piquette, O'Callaghan and Nelson, and
left to bear the penalties of their misdeeds
and counsel, they at first proposed to try the
General by Court Martial and shoot him—
but as he protested, that he was bound upon
some important business connected with
their cause; they doubted him, and proceeded
to search his person, a duty in which they
were great adepts.

Upon his person they found a large sum of
money, (it is said a little short of £2000)
which they satisfied them of and disbanded
him and let him go—detaining the money.

Several seizures of gunpowder have been
made at Montreal.
Little is now doing in Quebec but enrolling
volunteer companies. The best spirit
prevails, and in two or three days about a
thousand men will be armed and equipped
in the city, and have commenced drilling.

COMMUNICATION.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE STANDARD.

Sir,
The long communication which appeared
in your paper of the 11th ultimo, headed
"House of Assembly—Mr. Brown's explana-
tions," require some notice, and as one of
the friends of Mr. M'Lean, I feel compelled
however reluctant to make the following state-
ment to the public, whom that article is cal-
culated to mislead. It is well known to your
readers that Mr. James Brown junr. in your
paper of the 25th May last, has charged the
Rev. Mr. M'Lean of this town with (I quote
Mr. Brown's own words) being "capable of
such duplicity and intrigue as to procure the
substitution of a report deferring materially
from the original one." The paper here ter-
med "the original one," was a report made to
the late Governor, at his request, of the case
of Hannah Rogers, a person clearly convicted
of infidelity and blasphemy, who had
been recommended by Mr. Brown as a fit
and proper person to receive a school licence.
The charge advanced, then, is that of gross
fraud against a clergyman—and fraud of a
peculiar description; since (if well founded)
he must either have colluded with, or im-
posed upon the Provincial Secretary in whose
office the Report had been long previously
filed. But a prompt and complete disproval
of the charge was obtained from the Hon.
Secretary and his clerks—corroborated by let-
ters from the only two members of the Le-
gisature whom Mr. Brown had mentioned
as connected with the transaction in ques-
tion. I would further remind your readers
that the seriousness of the accusation, and
the office of the accused, imperiously demand-
ed the fullest evidence in its support, and
that the burden of proof lay clearly on the
accuser. All this Mr. Brown well knew,
and seemed to admit—for in the Standard of
the 30th June, he says, "the truth or falseness
of my last statement" (asserting the existence
of a second report) will determine and ter-
minate this desperate controversy—one of as-
sumed fact, and as a man of honour, integrity
and veracity, he who falls will fall "like
Lucifer never to hope again." The letters
here are Mr. Brown's own. Now, in this
sentence Mr. Brown evidently considers him-
self bound to prove the truth of his statement
since the other party had distinctly and un-
equivocally, and indignantly denied it. But
I would ask Mr. Brown to point out this small
item of evidence which he has adduced
in support. To this hour not a line has
been brought forward. And when Mr.
Brown's conduct in applying (in his place in
the Provincial Assembly) the epithets "gross"
"malicious," "villanous," "libellous," and
"intemperate," to a paper whose author he knew
could not meet him there to defend it—was
designated by its appropriate name, "a ruf-
fian like attack,"—feeling worsted before
the public, he fell back once more for con-
tenance and support on the House of Assem-
bly, whether he could not be followed. The
re-ut of the retreat and appeal appears to
be reported in your paper of the 11th of last
month—With that Report the friends of
the accused have reason to be abundantly sat-
isfied. To what, I ask, does it amount?
To a proof of the existence of two Reports
from Mr. M'Lean? No such thing. I wish
not to speak ill of the dead—but really I can-
not help reiterating the query—What do
your readers find on perusal of this extract
from the journals of the late House of Assem-
bly, an extract which was deemed too pre-
cious to send to the Newspapers in the regular
course of debate-reporting; but was laid up
in the depositories of Mr. Blatch, nursing it
carefully to keep it warm, until it could be
used with most effect—an extract which Mr.

Brown and his friends have often ap-
pealed to as containing a triumphant proof of
the fact advanced—and of course, as the
truth, not Mr. Brown but his antagonists
are to be forced to accept the part of the fallen
angel. Well! what do we now find—why, five
or six gentlemen, out of thirty-two, exhib-
iting sheer ignorance of the subject upon
which they were so gravely taking—debat-
ing that there was in it, remaining a mystery
—that it had never been properly ex-
plained—that surely there must be two Re-
ports, since Mr. Brown found a partial
explanation in a paper that had been before
the emphatically select Committee of the
House's case; and since he could not find an
explanation in the paper (in which there was
neither blot, erasure, nor apparent alteration)
handed to him for inspection, in Committee
of supply. Now all this pointlessness and fruit-
less speculation is more than neutralized by
Mr. Taylor's counter-explanation, nor can I
sufficiently wonder that a Public Body
whose aim must always be supposed to be
the explanation and support of the honest
truth, did not immediately act on Mr. Tay-
lor's suggestion, "That the Report was ac-
cording to the Secretary's office, and could be
produced, if required." But no—this would
serve Mr. Brown, and I can produce proof
that both the Secretary's clerks and some of
Mr. Brown's own friends, out of doors—ad-
vised him strongly but ineffectually to call
the office and inspect the document. But
no wonder he could not find the notorious
passage in the paper handed to him in Com-
mittee of supply. The friends of Mr. M'Lean
are now prepared to show that the passage
never was, and never could have been in
that paper, and that Mr. Brown (from his
admitted familiarity with all the documents
respecting the affair) must have known his
responsibility; though he managed to involve
the question in mystery. But the mystery
shall now at length be unravelled—and in
order to do this it will be necessary to men-
tion that Mr. M'Lean transmitted to the
only two documents to the late Governor, one
23 pages long contained merely the minutes
of evidence in the case of Hannah Rogers,
consisting of depositions taken down from
the mouths of witnesses on oath. The other
of only eight pages, was in the form of a let-
ter to the Provincial Secretary containing
remarks on the aforesaid evidence. The
commissioners had been directed not
only to investigate but also to report. It is
in this last mentioned paper alone that Mr.
M'Lean could have made any observations
obnoxious to Mr. Brown or indeed, any ob-
servations at all of his own. It is accord-
ingly, this last paper, viz. the report in a form
of a letter of 8 pages—that, Mr. Brown re-
peatedly declares, was handed to him by the
Member for the city (Mr. Burns) was carefully
examined by him—and was discovered by him
to be mutilated—altered in short forged. "The
writing was plain, close, and uniform" (says
Mr. Brown, which was his description of the
external appearance of the so-called original
Report in Mr. M'Lean's hand-writing) "but
the offensive paragraph was gone, vanished
quite." "I knew very well," adds he,
"where to look for it," but judge of my
astonishment confusion & shame when look-
ing in the place where once it was, I found
it was not there!"—Now keeping in view the
importance of gravity—the circular solemnity
with which all this is announced—What will
your readers say, when the friends of Mr. M'
Lean produce the deliberate and decisive
testimony of this very member for the city
who headed the aforesaid paper to Mr. Brown
This testimony is contained in a letter from
Mr. Burns to Mr. M'Lean, in which he de-
clares that Mr. M'Lean's letter to the Provin-
cial Secretary; or in other words his Report
was never in the house to his knowledge; that
he never saw it even. "And further you will
find him on the same distinct & pointed terms
testifying that it was the Minutes of Evidence
alone the paper of 23 or 24 pages length,
which he put into the hand of Mr. Brown
in the House. It was therefore, after keep-
ing the House in suspense whilst he exam-
ined this document, that Mr. Brown stood up
in his place and said (I again quote his words)
"The Report does not contain the passage
to which I alluded—but in some way alto-
gether unknown to me, it has been expurgated."
Mr. Burns feels a reluctance to his letter ap-
pearing in the public prints; but he says
that he is perfectly assured of the correctness
of its statement and that he has no objection
to its being shown about, as extensively as
possible, even to all the members of the late
House of Assembly. All who feel inclined
are therefore respectfully requested to call
on Mr. Thomas Burne, where the original
letter of Mr. Burns is left so that they may
satisfy themselves as to the truth of the ex-
traordinary facts here given to the public.

The above statement is not made with a
view of renewing a controversy of which your
readers must be heartily tired & which the
writer is determined not to continue but as a
set of Justice to the accused—and to explain
the mystery in which a few of Mr. Brown's
friends in the late House of Assembly, have
managed to involve the whole transaction.

CANADA.

From the Montreal Morning Courier of Dec. 4.
Latest from Colonel Gore,
OCCUPATION OF ST. DENIS AND ST.
CHARLES:—PURSUIT OF THE
REBELS TO ST. HYACINTHE.

We are happy to be authorized to state that the detachment of Her Majesty's troops under Colonel Gore, after spending Friday night at St. Charles, entered St. Denis early on Saturday morning. Yesterday they were at St. Charles; and to-day they are to march upon St. Hyacinthe, in pursuit of the rebels, Papineau and Nelson, who are supposed to have fled in that direction. St. Charles and the other principal villages on the Richelieu are to be occupied until further orders.

We ought to add, that the bowitzer, and the five wounded men left behind on the 23d ultimo, were recovered; and that the property of the rebel Nelson, as well as the houses from which he and his gang fired on Her Majesty's troops, were burnt.

Thus, within the short space of eight days have forty-five miles in extent of the most populous and wealthy portion of this district been traversed in arms by Her Majesty's troops, in vindication of the outraged laws of the country, and the rebels who had compelled the deluded peasantry to take arms against their lawful Sovereign, completely put to flight. A large reward, we understand is offered for their delivery into the hands of Government.

One of the murderers of Mr. Chartrand has been arrested, and confessed his crime. His name is Langlois. It appears that Chartrand was made a prisoner by a body of about a dozen men, of whom he, Langlois was one; that they dragged him to a school-house near, and after a few women's mock-trials sentenced him to death as a spy, though he had left St. Johns on private business.

Five of their number accordingly shot him on the spot. At the first discharge he received three wounds, but was not killed; and another of the party then stepped up and shot him dead. Langlois was induced to confess and make confession by the influence of the priest, to whom he confessed his crime.

Our readers are generally aware of the fact that four militia Colonels in Gloucester County have volunteered to bring down their regiments to Lower Canada; and that the Laws of Upper Canada allow the Governor to require the militia of that Province to serve here in case of need. The following extract of a letter handed to us yesterday, refers to this subject.

Lancaster, 27th Nov. 1837.

Dear John—I take the opportunity of informing you that I went yesterday to see Col. Alex. Fraser, A. M. Martin, and John McGillivray, Esquires, who are determined to go down when called for, and say that they can raise at least 2000 effective men between the Counties of Gloucester and Stormont, at a very short notice; in fact, in Lancaster, and near our place particularly they are all a man ready, even those we used to call Radicals, are ready to turn out; they say although they are radical to reform, they never will fight against Britain. On my way down I met with a number of inhabitants who declared that they were always ready to give every assistance in their power, to their friends in Lower Canada; and that they would lose the last drop of their blood before they would allow the tyrant Papineau, General Brown, or any other rebel whatsoever, to tyrannize or rule over the free-born sons of Britain. THOMAS S. BROWN.—Many of the United States papers have endeavoured to exalt the rank and form of this renegade, and have claimed him as a citizen, and native of Vermont. To this claim we should have heartily assented, if the following letter had not come into our hands.

St. Andrews, 14th Dec. 1837.

Mr. Editor, I observe in a number of the Provincial and United States Journals frequent mention made of Mr. T. S. Brown, who is forcing himself into notice as an Agitator and rebel, connected with the Papineau faction in Lower Canada.

This "worthy," as you style him in your last number, (worthy of a halter I hope you mean) is a native of this town; his name is Thomas Storrow Brown, being called for a Capt Storrow on the half pay list, who resided on Campbell, and afterwards in St. Andrews, and was married to an aunt of our Hero by the mother's side. His father Henry P. Brown, was long Clerk of this place and Saint Stephen; a respectable, loyal, and very useful member of Society. He removed from this place in 1806, when T. S. B. was about eight years old; of course he is now about thirty nine. After trying his hand at farming on an extensive scale in Worcester, he removed to Boston and kept a genteel Boarding House in High Street. In his younger days I do not believe that Storrow himself could have discovered a bump on his perianthium, indicative of pugnacity, and I think that till this day, like his leader Papineau, he had rather be the spectator of, than the actor in a battle field.

His mother was a lady esteemed and respected by all her acquaintance wherever she resided; and his paternal grandfather taught the young idea how to shoot, for very many years in Halifax, Nova Scotia. I thought the foregoing hasty and imperfect sketch might be interesting to some of your readers. And am, Sir,

St. Stephen, 11th Dec. 1837.

High Sheriff of Charlotte County,

Sir,—Pursuant to the second resolution in the enclosed account of the proceedings of a public meeting held at St. Stephen's this day; I herewith transmit you the same, with a request that they may be read from the chair at the county meeting called by you for the 13th instant.

I would also remark that it is regretted by many of the loyal inhabitants in this section of the county, that the present almost impassable state of the roads will prevent their attending the general meeting; and in consequence they took this mode of proceeding, to show that they do not in any way disavow the call of the chief Magistrate on so important an occasion, nor that they will heartily respond to any expressions of loyalty that may emanate at the county meeting above alluded to.

To effect which, this meeting will be prepared to give all the aid which loyal subjects in their circumstances can afford.

Mr. McLean and the Rev. Mr. Verker, as a committee for that purpose, which being unanimously agreed to, these gentlemen retired for a few minutes and then proposed the following Resolutions and Address which being read by the Hon. J. Ainslaw and then by the chairman, were unanimously adopted.

Resolved, That this meeting views with unfeigned regret and abhorrence the unnatural rebellion excited by a factious party in the neighbouring Province of Lower Canada, a rebellion which cannot be foreseen, and therefore deems it expedient to lose no time in assuring His Excellency the Lieut. Governor of this Province of the ardent attachment of this portion of Her Majesty's loyal subjects to Her Majesty's Government and of their entire confidence in His Excellency to whom its administration in this Province is confided, and that it is ready to tender its best services for the maintenance of Her Majesty's Government, and its legitimate authority in whatever way His Excellency may deem most expedient and beneficial.

Resolved, That an Address to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor founded upon the foregoing Resolution be immediately prepared and forwarded without delay.

To His Excellency Major General Sir JOHN HARVEY K. C. H. & C. B. Lieutenant Governor and Commander in Chief of the Province of New Brunswick, &c. &c. &c. May it please Your Excellency.

We the Clergy, Magistrates, and principal Inhabitants of the County of Charlotte deem it an imperative duty, now that Rebellion is openly manifested in the Province of Lower Canada, and that the lives and property of Her Majesty's loyal and faithful subjects in that Province are exposed to wanton and wicked destruction; to express to your Excellency, the great value we set on the privileges we enjoy under the British Constitution, and we are satisfied that this feeling entirely pervades the great mass of Her Majesty's subjects in this Province.

Convinced as we are that the great body of the disaffected in Lower Canada are deluded by a few designing and factious individuals who aim at nothing short of the dismemberment of a portion of Her Majesty's Colonies from the British Empire, and who have seduced from their allegiance, the ignorant and misguided peasantry, and contrived to obtain a melancholy influence over their minds; We find it difficult to convey to Your Excellency in appropriate language, our feelings of indignation at the conduct of those disturbers of the public weal and peace, and our unqualified sorrow for their deluded followers in the Rebellion now too fatally manifested.

In order to place Her Majesty's forces as much as possible at the unembarrassed disposition of the Executive Government in this province. We take this early occasion to as-

sure Your Excellency, that the Inhabitants of this County can never forget their origin, and will ever glory in their loyal attachment to Her Majesty and to the constitution derived from the paternal Government of Her Ancestors, and that we are ready and desirous to support the same, whenever and wherever occasion shall or may require, and in whatever way your Excellency may deem most beneficial for the restoration and maintenance of the peace, order and the supremacy of the Laws.

Three tremendous Cheers for the QUEEN and CONSTITUTION were given by the Assembly at the conclusion of the foregoing proceedings.

Previous to leaving the chair, the Sheriff as Senior Lt. Col. of the Charlotte Militia, requested the officers present to remain after the general meeting broke up, when a numerous assembly of the gentlemen belonging to the four Battalions took place in the Jury Room.

Lieut. Col. Wier was called to the chair, and adjutant Whitlock requested to act as Secretary.

After briefly stating his motive for requesting their attendance Lt. Col. Campbell moved the following resolution which was seconded by Lt. Col. Hatch and adopted unanimously.—That a loyal address be presented to His Excellency the Lieut. Governor and Commander in Chief, expressive of the devotion and attachment of the Charlotte Militia to Her Majesty's Person and Government, and of their determination to support and preserve inviolate, the glorious British Constitution, with heart and hand to the utmost extent in their power.

On motion of Capt. Brown second by Capt. Hunter, resolved that Lieut. Col. Campbell Wier, Hatch and Mowat be a committee to prepare and forward the Address.

On Lieut. Col. Wiers leaving the chair, it was taken by Lieut. Col. Hatch who addressed the Meeting in an animated and appropriate speech,—when thanks were voted to the former gentleman for his able conduct in the chair.

Capt. Boyd commanding the Rifle Company of the 1st Battalion then addressed his Commanding officer Lieut. Col. Campbell, and tendered his services with those of his Company to perform garrison duty or any other duty that might be required by His Excellency.—His spirited letter, a copy of which is annexed will form an interesting feature in this days proceedings, and is highly creditable to that active and zealous officer and the excellent Company he commands, who if called into active service will be found as efficient as any in the Province.

After some discussion, it was concluded upon that the Commandants of the several Battalions should immediately call their officers together, to give such as were absent an opportunity of expressing their sentiments.

The Quebec Gazette of Dec. 6, contains a proclamation by Lord Gosford, Governor General of the Canada, declaring the Montreal district under martial law, and offering a reward of £1000 for the arrest of Mr. Papineau, and £500 each for others who distinguished themselves by their opposition to the royal authority.

The continuation of our article on Prince Edward Island, has been interrupted by a crowd of local matter, but will be resumed anon; in the meantime we can inform those who take an interest in all the doings of all these Colonies, that the great meetings of the 8th and 15th Nov. took place, of which a correspondent of the Colonial Herald says

"the occasion, the numbers in attendance, their loyalty, blended with a spirit of freedom and independence, are above all my powers to describe." Agitation is the byword of the times—but agitation conducted in subordination to moral and political rule by persons petitioning for the correction of abuses and asserting their reasonable rights—is a very different thing from the tumultuary assemblages of misled herds like the poor devoted simpletons of Lower Canada, who have broken away from the pale of the Constitution, as Kiah's Asses did from his enclosures, but without a goal to seek for them. The cause of the P.E. Island farmers; those industrious, ill used people, sounds righteously in the ear of justice; and it is to be hoped that their constitutional procedure will eventuate in securing to them the means of prosperity and peace.

UNITED STATES.

THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE.—The following extract from this state document, contains all that is said on the Boundary Question; which, it will be perceived, leaves the matter much in the same position it has maintained for years past.

"Of pending questions, the most important is that which exists with the Government of Great Britain, in respect to our north-eastern boundary. It is with unfeigned regret, that the people of the United States must look upon the abortive efforts made by the Executive, for a period of more than half a century, to determine, what no nation should suffer, long to remain in dispute the true line which divides its possessions from those of other powers. The nature of the settlements on the borders of the United States, and of the neighbouring territory, was for a season such, that this perhaps was not indisputable to a faithful performance of the duties of the federal Government.—Time, has, however, changed this state of things, and brought about a condition of affairs, in which the true interest of both countries imperatively require that this question should be put at rest. It is not to be disguised, that the full confidence, often expressed, in the desire of the British Government to terminate the war, are apparently as far from its adjustment as we were at the time of signing the treaty of peace in 1783. The sole result of long pending negotiations, and a perpetuating arbitration, appears to be a conviction, on our part, that a conventional line must be adopted, from the impossibility of ascertaining the true one according to the description contained in that treaty. Without dissenting in this opinion, which is not altogether to be well founded, my predecessor generally the strongest force of the present administration, by proposing the submission of the question to a conventional line, if the construction of the treaty in the question could be ascertained. The Trustees of the Liverpool Docks and Harbour, do hereby give notice, that, for the better guidance of the mariner in and out of this port, the following alterations will be made in the Fort by, Leasew, and Bidon Lights, and exhibited on and after the evening of Saturday, the eleventh of Nov. next.

Formby Light.—This Light will be distinguished as a Fixed Red Light, and in order to give a clear berth to the North-westward and South-eastward, the lights of the banks of the New Channel, which have changed their positions, it is necessary when inwards bound from the Westward, to take the Bar of the Channel with the Red Shore Light, upon the left, and the Southward of the Formby Floating Light, and, after crossing the bar, which, the soundings will show, open them as much to the Northward, and then passing the Floating Light, instead of taking up and preserving these Lights in one.

This alteration in the character of the Formby Shore Light will also afford a distinction for identifying it when approaching from the Northward.

Leasew Light.—This Light will be so marked so as to give a defined light in the Rock Channel, within certain limits, and will suddenly disappear, bearing N. W. to the vessels inward bound, when off West Wharf Buoy, R. 3, Red, and suddenly appear when outward bound.

Bidon Light.—This Light will also be marked so as to give a defined light in the Rock Channel within certain limits, and to vessels inward bound will suddenly disappear on the bearing off SSW, when abreast of East Wharf Buoy, R. 4, Red, and suddenly appear, when outward bound.

These lines of marking and unmarking intersect at the point of the Cressy Channel, where the course alters, so that, running up from the Formby Floating Light, the mariner must haul up from SSE. 14 to S. by E. 14 E. on leaving Bidon and Leasew Lights, and on running down keep away from N. by W. to N. N. W. 14 W. on their opening out.
