The Irish Question.

Affairs in Ireland appear to be in a much better condition than they were a year ago. The agrarian outrages for the month of October numbered but 111 as against 511 for the corresponding month of last year. And now it would seem that Ireland may at no very remote date obtain a greater or less measure of that Home Rule which Parnell and his party have so long been claiming as her due.

The Montreal Board of Trade has concluded to ask the Government to abolish tolls on all the Canadian canals at the opening of navigation next year. This action is taken in consequence of the adoption of the free canal amendment to the Constitution of New York.

Mr. J. C. Langelier, a brother of Mayor Langelier, of Quebec, contends that at least 244,000 square miles of region about James Bay consists of good agricultural lands susceptible of the highest cultivation, and as good, if not better, than any in the fertile belt of the Saskatchewan.
