British Officers Killed.

DeWET STOPPED; AND FIGHTING.

MORE MOUNTED MEN FOR SOUTH AFRICA

Botha With 1500 Men.

SECOND CANADIAN CONTINGENT TO SAIL FOR HALIFAX.

The Boers have achieved another
success in South Africa. It is of no
very great importance, but carries
with it the sad loss of Col. Legge
and two British Captains. The
fight has been at Nooitgedacht, only
22 miles from Pretoria, and the Boer
Commandant in charge, has fully
2,800 men. Gen. Clements, who has
lost the three officers mentioned a-
bove, other casualties are not
known, is so hard pressed, that he
has asked for reinforcements. Lord
Kitchener has sent Gen. French with
his mounted men, to assist Clements.
London is very much excited over
this fighting, especially from its
close proximity to Pretoria, and
because of the casualties to well
known London Regiments in the
battle.

From Reddersburg comes better
news. It is said that General Knox
has stopped General DeWet, and that
the latter will have to fight. The
report in London is that a battle
still continues, and that DeWet,
this king of guerilla leaders, has been
brought to bay. If so, we do not
fear the result; but if DeWet has
not been stopped in his course, mat-
ters are serious in this part of the
Orange State, and will be so, until
this skilled leader is overthrown.
General Louis Botha is reported to
be near Standerton with 1500 men.
Mounted Infantry have been order-
ed to South Africa at once from Alder-
shot and Malta.
The Second Canadian Contingent
will sail almost immediately from
Cape Town for Halifax.

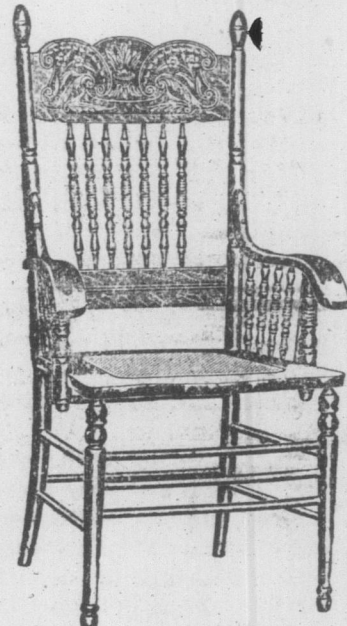

AN INTERESTING LAW SUIT.

The Responsibility of a Directorate to be Tested—A Suit for \$79,000 Damages, Etc.

Gold miners and those interested in mining operations will be interested in a peculiar suit that has just been entered in the Supreme Court in Nelson, B. C.

Mr. Ernest Mansfield, capitalist and mining promoter, has brought suit against Ren' Landi, Jules Savage, Charles Frederick de Baillencourt and Ferdinand de Baillencourt, all of whom live in France, for damage to the amount of nearly \$80,000. This mining lawsuit is one of the

most interesting that has ever been brought before the courts of British Columbia, as it involves various questions of extreme importance. It is a question between the directors of a company and the manager of the properties operated by that company. It is a question where the company did not advance the necessary money to operate the property, the consequence of which serious damages to the manager will try to be proven. Similar cases have happened before but none so serious as this where the manager was thrown into prison for the company's debt. It will undoubtedly be watched with the greatest interest by all mining men. The defendants make up the directorate of the company which is opera-

ting the property at Camp Mansfield on the south fork of Kaslo Creek. And against the company Mansfield has brought six charges, probably none of which would have been brought had it not been for the claim being reached when he was placed behind the bars.

The first claim is for \$14,000 due Mansfield for money advanced to work the property.

The second claim is for \$50,000 damages for the defendants' breach of contract in not furnishing Mansfield with the necessary money for the payment of the men engaged at the mine, and the result of which he was imprisoned for eight days.

Mr. Mansfield claims a fifth interest in two properties now worked by the defendants.

He also claims one-fifth percent of the profits realized from work up the claims, by virtue of his contract with the defendants. Mr. Mansfield had engaged with the company for two years as manager and engineer, and was to be given, in addition to a large salary, a fifth interest in the property.

He also asks for an injunction restraining defendants from disposing of his interests in the property, and he also asks for the cancellation of his contract with the company owing to their breach of contract that they had made.

The last claim that he makes is for damages to the amount of \$15,000 for this breach of contract in not furnishing the necessary funds to work the mines, and they were therefore closed down, and, of course, not only Mr. Mansfield, but all the stockholders, will not receive any income from them as the result.

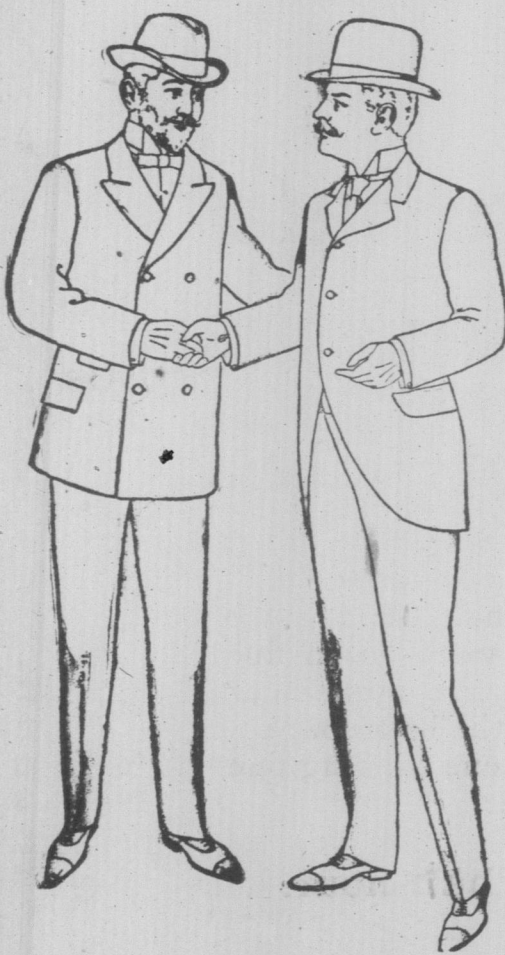

Formerly Truro has not taken that
place in hockey which would natu-
ally be expected from so central and
influential a place. The chief reason
for this is that there have never been
any opportunities to develop a team
which could compare favourably
with our sister towns.

The chief difficulty heretofore has
been lack of opportunity to practice
and this has been particularly evi-
dent among the young players.

Truro has the material for a strong
team and if the public will only
encourage the game, our hockey
team will soon reflect as much credit
to the town as our curlers have
done in the past.

In the interest of our national
winter sport the first factor of im-
portance was to centralize the con-
trol of hockey; the second to obtain
suitable time, place and practice.

The former has been brought about
by the formation of the Truro Hockey
Club, who soon accomplished the
second, the latter, by renting the
Metropolitan Kink for Wednesday
and Saturday evenings during the
winter season.

The Metropolitan rink possesses
the largest body of unobstructed ice
of any rink east of Montreal. Wed-
nesdays and Saturdays are suitable
evenings for the Truro public and
will be devoted entirely to hockey.

The Hockey Club has already formed
a Senior and a Junior League and
has secured three entries for each,
which ensures the public of at least
twenty-four games. The League is
open for entries in both series up to
December 22 d when the schedule
will be drawn up. Entries may be
made with the Secretary, Mr. Grassie
Archibald.

Besides the Leagues there are many
other minor differences to be settled
viz., the supremacy of the Academy,
Normal School, Bankers, Dry Goods,
Grocers, etc. The Secretary is al-
ready in correspondence with the
neighboring towns and the prospects
for matches with outside teams seem
very bright. It is also rumored
that a team of colored players will
give the club on "Smith's Island" a
good thrashing and so regain their
lost laurels.

There is much speculation afloat as
to the probable winner of the senior
league. At first glance, the team
known last year as the Rovers would
seem the favorites, but the Tigers of
last year have been much strength-
ened, and a third team, called the
Academy, has recently sprung into ex-
istence. There is a certain mystery
in regard to the personnel of this
team, and it is rumored it will con-
tain some experts of the game from
the western cities, and the other
teams are feeling a little doubtful of
their ability to win the coveted
trophy.

The Hockey Club are in need of
considerable ready money to defray
the expense of renting the rink, and
propose to cover part of this by sell-
ing season tickets good for entry to
all matches, both foreign and local.
In all probability there will be, at
the most conservative estimate, be-
tween twenty and thirty matches.
The price of the ticket has been
placed at the almost ridiculous figure
of \$1.00. We feel sure that all lovers
of good clean athletics will give the
club this slight support. This fea-
ture of selling season tickets has
been carried on with great success in
other towns, and the purchasers have
always been well satisfied.
