The bill further provides that refusal to do duty on the present employes of railroads or other public services may be punished by six months' imprisonment. If two or more persons rise in rebellion the penalty is increased to

four years' imprisonment for the ringleaders or those guilty of criminal acts. During the debate on the bill Saturday last the Premier, whose speech was received with cheers mingled with hisses from the socialists, dwelt on the danger of strikes to commerce, or in the event of the mobilization of troops and maintained the necessity for securing uninterrupted communication with foreign countries, and offering a firm front to the party disorder, which was terrorizing the country. The debate

It will thus appear that the Sultan's dilemma in dealing with his Albanian and Macedonian subjects is a very real one, and certainly would not be simplified if taken over by any of the great powers. There is practically no government at all in Albania, where the Turks have no real authority, while the unreconcilable nature of the various races and factions in Macedonia makes autonomy there practically impossible, even if the Sultan was willing to concede it. His next policy of subjugation would be speedily applied, and as it is known that there will be extensive resistance, a long series of terrible massacres seems assured.

It is even represented that Russian patience is weakening under the influence of the outrage on her consul at Mitrovitza.
