

The programme was lengthy and decidedly meritorious. Those who participated and the ladies of the home have cause indeed for congratulation. THE OPENING ADDRESS.

The evening was opened with a magnificent rendition of Meyerbeer's Coronation March by the Symphony Orchestra, after which Mayor Taylor stepped before the curtain and briefly thanked the audience for its patronage. He then read the following sketch of the Protestant Orphans' Home from October, 1874, to May, 1891:

"The Women's Christian Association, in their work of beneficence through the city, found numerous cases of destitution. Among these were many little children unloved and uncared for. To meet the muchneeded necessities the ladies decided to establish a Protestant orphans' home, and called the first meeting in the City Hall to consider the subject on the 14th October, 1874. It was subsequently considered advisable that the home be made an organization separate from the Women's Christian Association, and on the 10th of November the first board of managers was elected. On the 12th application was made to the Ontario Government for an act of incorporation, under the name of the Protestant Home for Orphans, Aged and Friendless. A large brick building, 388 Ridout street, was leased, and in a short time was neatly furnished, a steward and matron engaged, and on the 1st oi December the home was formally opened.

"At this time five little children were admitted and formed the first small band."

"At this time five little children were admitted, and formed the first small band, which experienced the loving and fostering provision of this benevolent institution. During the first year the home sheltered and cared for 125 persons.

"As the building leased was only temporary it was decided to purchase a property and erect a suitable building. After much deliberation the site on which "Our Home" now stands was purchased at a cost of \$1,645, and negotiations were entered into for the erection of the present beautiful brick building at a cost of \$12,000.

"On the 14th of September the cornerstone was laid by our first president, Mrs. E. H. Gregsten, and the building was completed the 1st of June, 1877. A special effort was then made not only to free the property from the existing debt, but to endow the home. This was accomplished to annual income of \$1,000, which, with \$400 Government grant, \$800 from Board, \$1,200 from door to door collections and with the city grant (of the past two years) and donations from various societies, assures us a revenue of \$3,500 to \$4,000. This supports 50 homeless children in health and comfort.
