



THE BUSINESS REVIVAL

Ottawa, Aug. 31.—The revival of business throughout the country has begun to make an impression in customs receipts. Collections for the month of August showed that importers are getting more goods in than they were during months previous. While the wonderful record of last year has not yet been equalled officials at the customs department expect that within three months customs returns will be equal to or little above those of last year. Collections during the month of August totalled \$4,376,046, which is just about a million and a quarter less than was collected during August of the year before. However, the month showed a gain of half a million dollars in July, and September is expected to show still greater gains, as returns from customs houses for the past ten days are very large. During the first five months of the fiscal year customs collections have totalled \$18,834,791.





New Method of Using Cocaine as Anaesthetic a Marvel to Scientists.

Berlin, Aug. 31.-Professor Bier, the distinguished south German who succeeds the late Professor von Bergman at the head of the surgical fraternity of the University of Berlin, has devised a new and remarkable anaesthetic treatment for the use in operations on the extremities of the human body. By application of the treatment, which is described as venous transfusion, surgeons who are required to operate upon the legs or arms will no longer need to administer general anaesthetics for the purpose of rendering the patient unconscious, but will be enabled to work in a perfectly blood-

WIFE FOLLOWED HIM

Got on Wrong Train, and Jumping Off, the Woman Was Killed.

Dunnville, Ont., Aug. 31. - Mrs. Frederick Bier, of Buffalo, was accidentally killed at Canfield Junction, 9 miles west of Dunnville, this morning. She had been visiting friends at Nelles' Corners, and was returning home with her husband. They got off the Port Dover train and by mistake got on the train for Hamilton instead of that for Buffalo. They discovered their mistake when the train was moving, and Mr. Bier jumped off. Mrs. Bier followed him, falling on her head on the platform, causing concussion of the brain. She died an hour later.


