MUST TAKE BOTH, SAYS MACKENZIE

Beck's Colleague in Cabinet Voted for Purchase of the Two Concerns.

Toronto, April 23. — By a vote of 22 to 9 the private bills committee of the Ontario Legislature this morning decided to confine the legislation with regard to the proposed purchase of the Toronto Railway and the Toronto Electric Light to the Toronto Railway Company alone.

"It will be easy," said Chairman Lucas, after the hour's discussion was over, "for the legal department to strike out ony reference to the Toronto Electric Light Company."

Hon. W. G. Hanna voted for the original proposal - the combining of the two companies in the question to be submitted to the ratepayers-and W. K. McNaught alone of the six Toronto members voted with the minor-

Mayor Hocken, who was in attendance, said Sir William Mackenzie's ultimatum was: "You can take both or

Hocken's View.

Mayor Hocken urged that the put chase of the railway company which presumably can be acquired only b also taking over the Electric Ligh Company, would save the city a projected expenditure of \$2,000,000 this year for civic car lines.

"You will save two million by incurring a liability of \$0,000,000 in the purchase of the Electric Light Company, whose acquisition will be no good to us," said George Goodernam member for South Toronto.

The consensus of epinion among the Toronto members was that the railway company would be a valuable conjustion in itself, but if its pur had to be accompanied by that of the Electric Light Company the ait nad better wait till the expiration of the franchise of the railway company eight

Family Gets Shock Whon Bolt Strikes Chimney of Home

Between 12 and 1 o'clock this morning the house occupied by Mr. H. W. Ashley, 515 Hamilton road, was struck by lightning. Mr. Ashley and his wife and several dren received a shock, on the house was the rear chi Te shingles ripped torn to pieces, off the roof for a die ince of ten feet. The bolt played some queer pranks on the house. Mr. Ashley, who is an employee of the Bell Telephone Company, says he thinks that it split when it struck the rear chimney ,one shaft going down the chimney, while the other tore its way along the roof and across the road connecting with an clectric light wire.

The family was asleep at the time. Mr. Ashley says that every membe distinctly felt the electricity, and that when the bolt struck it caused a roar like the firing of several large cannon simultaneously.

Mr. Chris. Butterworth, who lives two houses west of Mr. Ashley, was awake at the time, and says that his house was illuminated with a vivid blue light a second after the crash. The chimney down which part of the bolt is thought to have passed, comes to a dead end in the diningroom, and although the paper is torn from the wall near the stovepipe hole

the flue at that point is not damaged. A largeh ole is torn in the front gable of the house. The bolt must have run along the electric light wire, for 300 feet from the house in a diagonal position, it dropped from the wire and tore a hole between the crossing bricks and the sidewalk at Chesley avenue about two feet long and six inches wide, and five feet deep.

MONTENEGRINS CAPTURE THE FORTRESS OF SCUTARI AFTER TWENTY HOURS OF FIGHTING

Private Bills Committee Carried at Point of the Bayonet, Despite Splendid Defence-Victory Seriously Complicates the Situation With the Great Powers.

[Canadian Press.]

Cettinje, April 23.—It is officially nnounced here that the Montenegrin orces have entered Scutari.

After a final desperate attack lastng incessantly for almost 24 hours, during which they brought all their forces to bear to overcome the heroic Turkish resistance, the Montenegrin troops forced their way into the fortress of Scutari, which for just over six months, since the middle of October, 1912, had offered such a stubborn

The assault which gave the Montenegrins possession of the city, which has been the sole object of their war against Turkey, began on Monday night. The Montenegrin army then took the offensive along the entire They completely surprised the Ottoman defenders by pushing right up to the Turkish positions, where they engaged in close bayonet fighting against the Turkish garrison.

Turks Fought Well. The Ottoman soldiers made a number of counter attacks and tried with their utmost energy to drive the attacking force out of their works, but they were finally compelled to fall nands of the besiegers who received

LONDON MAN DIES RESULT OF FALL OFF SMOKESTACK

William Rodgers Fatally Injured at Tavistock After Long Career.

Drops Like Plummet After He Was Seen to Adjust Rope That Held Him.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Tavistock, April 23 .- William Rodgers, of London, a steeplejack for 8 or 9 years, received injuries that caused his death at 4:45 o'clock Tuesday afternoon, when he fell 60 feet to a tin roof and had his skull fractured. He died at Stratford Hospita this morning.

Painting Three Stacks.

Rodgers came to Tavistock Tuesday norning with an assistant to pain three smokestacks on Zimmerman Bros, box factory. He had finished one and was more than half through the top rim of the stack and fixed his seat. When about 60 feet up the stack he started to pull himself up or to lower himself, and he suddenly dropped ike a plummet.

His assistant and several others saw Rodgers fall to the roof of the boiler house. He was unconscious when they reached him, and when a physician arrived it was found that his skull had been crushed.



Bulgar and Greek Drifting Into War

London, April 22.-Bulgaria and Greece are rapidly drifting towards war over the possession of Saloniki, according to the Chronicle's correspondent at that town.

The Greeks have mobilized every available soldier and concentrated
