RUNNING RISK OF CAPTURE.

LONDON, June 18.—Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.—Reuter's correspondent at Italian headquarters points out that unless the Austrians can establish solid bridgeheads where they have crossed the Plave and get guns over, especially onto the small section of Montello, which they still hold, probably the only result of their crossing will be that they will become prisoners.

Pincers Not Closing.

London, June 18.—The Austrian pincers are not closing upon Italy with the precision of last October, when they forced back the Italian armies of Gen-

eral Cadorna from the Julian Alps to the Plave river, and from the northern PARIS NOT WORRYING the Plave river, and from the northern mountain regions almost to the plains of Venetia. In fact, they do not seem to be closing at all. The upper jaw, in the Venetia Alps, is stalled under the resistance of the British, French and Italian forces, and neither one seems to have the force necessary to bring it across the Plave River and push back the Italian troops which are clogging its path. In the Alps the Austrians have been unable further to advance their lines, since their initial onslaught-last Saturday. Everywhere, from the Asiago plateau sector eastward to the Plave River all their attacks have been quickly repulsed by the Allied troops, who, in their turn, have delivered counter-attacks, regained lost terrain, inflicted heavy casualties on the enemy, and taken a considerable number of prisoners. FOE REOPENS OFFENSIVE; SMASH AT RUINED CATHEDRAL CITY FAILS

German Attempt To Encircle and Capture Rheims Broken Up By French Fire and Fierce Counter-Attacks-Unable To Reach Even Front Lines At Most Points-Gain Footing In Woods to East of City But Are Quickly Expelled.

Paris, June 19.—The Germans last night, after a violent preparatory bombardment, began an attack on the Rheims front, between Vrigny and La Pompelle, the war office announced today. On the western front of the attack the enemy was not even able to reach the front line. In the centre, before the city, the Germans were completely repulsed and suffered heavy losses. East of Rheims the French were equally successful.

The French are resisting the German blow with entire success. The text of the statement follows:

"Last night at 6 o'clock the Germans delivered a violent preparatory artillery fire along the whole front of Rheims from the region of Vreigny, west of the city, as far east as La Pompelle. At 9 o'clock the enemy infantry began an attack on the French positions between these two points. 'The French troops resisted the German attack with complete success, the counter-barrage of the French artillery proving very strong.

STOPPED BY FRENCH FIRE.

Between Vreigny and Ormes the German assault troops were stopped by the French fire and forced to return many times to their lines of departure, and were not finally able to reach the French positions.

Around Rheims violent combats developed, during the course of which the enemy sufheavy losses and was everywhere repulsed.

"East of Rheims the fighting likewise ended to the advantage of the French. The Germans having been successful in penetrating the woods northeast of Sillery, were driven out by a French counter-attack.

"Prisoners taken in the region of Rheims declared that the town was attacked by three divisions, which were ordered to take the place at all costs during the night."

The front of the new German attack is the semi-circle drawn by the enemy about the city of Rheims in the recent offensive on the Aisne front. The Rheims region comprised the left flank of the German attack. Ground was given by the French on both sides of the cathedral city, but the town itself and the nearby protecting forts were held against the German onslaught and have

RHEIMS HEMMED IN. Rheims, however, was hemmed in on three sides by the enemy, and it has been considered only a question of time when the Germans would make a concerted movement to oust its defenders. The front of the present attack from Vrigny, west of the city, to La Pompelle, around the semi-circle to the east, is approximately fourteen miles.

In the mountains the Austrians have been generally on the defensive since they were checked and then thrown back over the terrain gained Saturday on the first day of the offensive. Indeed, so slight have been the Austrian gains up to the present moment that the world is bound to suspect that under German coercion Austria is making an offensive reluctantly and with little hope or expectation of a major success. An attack by seventy-two divisions—almost twice the force used in the initial attack in Picardy on March 21 and three times the force used in the Aisne attack on June 9—which has resulted in nothing more than local minor gains and the capture of even thirty thousand prisoners, as Vienna claims, must be accepted so far as it goes as a failure and as a very great failure. We have to recognize the possibility that later efforts may change the situation, but the Italians seem to have checked the Austrians completely on the whole front in three days and with insignificant gains.

PRIMA FACIE EVIDENCE ACCEPTED IF PAPERS

OTTAWA, June 18.—The fulfilling of the regulations requiring men who may be reasonably suspected of falling within class one of the military service act to carry documents showing age, nationality, marriage, former discharge, exemption, or other reasons for being in mufti, have been found somewhat difficult in certain cases. An order-in-council of May 22 specified the class of documents which must be carried in the various individual cases, and provides very severe penalties for failure to carry such documents or having them on one's premises.

In cases it has been found difficult for men to secure the necessary documents. This was specially true of passports, marriage certificates, etc. As a consequence, an amendment has been made which, without limiting the generality of the provisions as to the incharacter of the evidence, permits the submission of prima facie evidence to show that the person in question has satisfied the requirements of the authorities.

No Right to Order Men Into Service After Once Exempted.

CALGARY, Alta., June 18. - R. B. Bennett, formerly director-general of national service and member of Parliament for Calgary, introduced a sensational case in the appellate division of the supreme court here today when he applied with the necessary court documents for the release from military service of Earl Lewis, a farmer, contending that as this young man previously had been exempted by a military tribunal the authorities had no further right to force him into ser-

Mr. Bennett argued for habeas cor pus.
Judge John Carson appeared for the military department. He said that from 30,000 to 40,000 young men drafted for military service would be affected by the ruling of the court in this case.
The case is based upon the question of exemption, but it is understood that the whole question of right to order men into service by order-in-council contrary to the selective draft, as imposed by Parliament, will be taken up.

The court ruled that the case should be continued. Major Carson is com-municating with Ottawa and will ap-pear Friday morning.






