Condemned Murderer Kills Death Watch In Hamilton Jail; Wounds Four More

Rumanians Moving To Overthrow Dynasty and Establish Republic

MURDERER AWAITING EXECUTION IN HAMILTON JAIL ATTACKS AND KILLS ONE GUARD, WOUNDS FOUR OTHERS

Paul Kowalski, Condemned To Hang, Throttles County Constable Springstead. His Death Watch-Arthur Auty, Another Constable, Is Dying As Result of Wounds-Sharpened Spoon Is Used by Man As Weapon To Attack Foreigner Runs Amuck At 10 o'Clock This Forenoon.

Hamilton, Nov. 28.-Running amuck in the corridor of Barton street jail. Paul Kowalski, condemned to hang for the murder of Amnot Tremluk, slow his death watch, County Constable J. C. Springstead, and serlously injured four turnkeys shortly after 10 a.m. today.

The condemned man had been allowed to walk in the corridor near the death cell for exercise, and this morning was alone with the watch. when he leaped upon the unsuspecting man, throttled him to death, and then hacked his throat with a sharpened spoon. Four turnkeys made a rush for the cell, and were met by Kowalski with a knife in his hand. Arthur Auty, chief turnkey, was the first to reach the desperate murderer, and received a knife thrust in his breast. Ex-Sergeant Lawrie of the Hamilton police force, was also stabbed, and William Berry, another turnkey, slacked about the head. The wardens grappled with Kowalski and threw him pack into the death cell.

Arthur Auty is dying, Sergeant Lawrie is in the hospital in a serlous condition, and the two other turnkeys are badly hurt.

COMMITTEE RECOMMENDS PURCHASE OF FLUSHER; **NEXT COUNCIL TO DECIDE**

Another One Needed to Clean Streets of City.

The purchase of another flusher motor truck to be used in cleaning the city streets next year with the one flusher now in use was the most important matter considered last evening by No. 2 committee of the city council, which met in the city hall at 7 o'clock. It was finally desided that the matter be referred to the next meeting of the council with the recommendation, in case the council decides to purchase a new flusher, that either a Tiffin motor flusher or a National flusher with the Studebaker attachment be ordered. This motion was advanced by Ald. E. Seabrook; it included a statement of the probable cost of each flusher, the Tiffin price being \$9,980, and the National being \$10,875, and also the recommendation of City Engineer Brazier that the

Tiffin truck be purchased.

The necessity of purchasing another flusher was recognized, for although the present flusher is satisfactory in every respect, it was believed that a second truck would be needed next year by the street cleaning department, especially if the large pavement program of the council is put into effect in 1920. I think that the city should have two street flushe s," said Ald. G. B. Drake. "If all of the pavements are not cleaned during the sammer season the people will complain about the dust." "Democracy is sweeping the world like a tidal wave, not only where gov-ernments are concerned but in the in-dustrial world. We find it demanded and granted, too, at a rate that is dustrial world. We find it demanded and granted, too, at a rate that is alarming. But a man who has studied a dozen governments' reports that those in which the people had the least to do and say were best." said Professor E. G. Many people talk about democracy without knowing the true definition. Democracy is the control of all things of common interest by the people as a whole rather than control by an individual or a class. Democracy should stand for liberty, fratern'ty and equality. The demand for freedom, for democracy is a great evolutionary struggle. Everyone is wanting individual freedom.

THE COAL SITUATION.

The settlement proposal of the coal question by the United States Government will probably strike the general public as eminently fair, to all parties. In allowing the advance of 14 per cent in miners' wages, Fuel Administrator Gar field explains that he has "given the industry as a whole an average increase commensurate with the increase in the cost of living," and then "let that amount of increase be apportioned in accordance with the wage bases that are accept while to the employers and employees."

According to the figures of the Bureau Labor Statistics at Washington, the cost of living has risen 79.8 per cent since 1913 in the United States. The increase now necessary to bring the average wage of mine workers up to this point is 14 per cent. There was a general impression among the public that miners were already enjoying large wages, and certainly great many of them are. But Mr. Garfield's figures show some average increase necessary to put the miners where they were in 1913, and his suggestion as just noted is that increase in wages be apportioned according to local circumstances of both operators and miners here

Mining is a hard life and perhaps the aver age wage should be such as to place the worker in a more advantageous position than he had six years ago. But few would quarrel with the Government's decision to make the miner as well off now as then. And, as Mr. Garfield points out, even lacking the increase of 14 per cent, he is better off than the general run of workers, who have lost considerably in the ratio of advanced wages to advanced prices.

As for the operators, they are not to be allowed to charge more at present for the coal. The operators need not complain, for a statement of the Internal Revenue Bureau at Washington shows that the coal mines east and west have made "fabulous profits" in the last three years. ranging all the way from 15 to 800 per cent on recently invested capital and averaging around 100 per event. OUR ARCTIC RESOURCES MOST VALUABLE It is announced from Ottawa that a government ommission has been appointed and is soon to meet o make a study of the resources of the Arctic and Sub-Arctic regions of Canada, as the result of recommendations made by Vilhjamir Stefansson, the Canadian Arctic explorer, who returned a little over a year ago from a five-year voyage of discovery financed by the Dominion. It would seem that we are now about to reap some of the benefits of our indertaking and its attendant expenditure. Stefansson reports conditions favorable to the raising of immense herds of reindeer, sufficient to make Canada the meat reserve of the continent. The commission may find a way of establishing rein deer herds up there and getting the meat down to the centres of population.

It is not generally known here that for many years English manufacturers have been turning out gloves of finest quality from the skins of Russian reindeer, an industry which, of course, was suspended during the war. If Canada had great herds of reindeer in the north, these would not only be a source of wealth for the meat they would supply, out might bring even greater wealth for their skins, which are of greater value than any other kind for glove-making purposes, and which are at present in everwhelming demand. Men of this stamp in Germany may not constitute a large class, but they have the floor, and their capacity for keeping dislike and hatred of Germany alive is indefinite.

Street Car Calculations That Went Astray

TWENTY=FIVE YEARS AGO-in 1895-the mayor and council and representatives of the London Street Railway sat down to figure out a scale of fares for the new electric cars.

Before that time a group of horse car lines catered to London's transportation needs.

Councillors and officials pondered probable costs of service. They knew cars then cost \$1,800 each; that men were paid 121/2 to 15 cents an hour. They provided what they believed would be a moderate and just return for the people who loaned their money to establish and maintain the railway, and they said: "We will give a passenger a ride any time for about $3\frac{1}{2}$ cents, or in ceratain hours the fare will be $2\frac{3}{4}$ cents."

That was how they fixed today's rates of 7 or 9 tickets for a quarter.
