





40 POINTS AFFECTED

The Crow's Nest Pass agreement between the federal government and the C. P. R., which has the effect of having a producer in one city pay a higher freight rate than the pro-ducer in another town of equal dis-tance from the ultimate destination of the product, is the question that is occupying the thoughts and energies of the members of the United Boards of Trade of Western Ontario.
"The Crow's Nest Pass is of vital importance to Western Ontario,"

stated Gordon Philip, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, today. Under the Crow's Nest Pass agreement, an Owen Sound firm pays 98 cents per hundred pounds freight, while a Meaord company pays \$1.24½.






