Muscovites Accused of Arranging Royal Butchery.

Public Incensed Against Russia for Compelling Trial of Seven German Socialists.

Koenigsberg, July 21. - At Tuesday's rial of the seven Social Democrats acused of smuggling anarchistic pamhlets into Russia, the defense created a sensation by declaring that Russia was responsible for the assassination of King Alexander and Queen Draga of Servia, and of Premier Stambu

off of Bulgaria. To prove their charges, the attorneys for the defendants moved the court to summon Mayor Petkoff of Sofia, Bulgaria; a former Russian dragoman, Jacobsohn, of Rushchuk, Bulgaria; and the editor of a Sofia newspaper, in order to prove that the Russian Government had been keeping agents in the Balkans since 1881 to inite the people against their rulers. They supported their motion by the declaration that Russia is not a civiliz ed state, and is not therefore entitled o the protection of the German courts. The state's attorney opposed the mo on, but the court took the matter under conisderation and adjourned.

Another sensation of the day was a telegram from the foreign office stating that a treaty between Russia and dermany, covering paragraph 260, of the Russian penal code, does not exist. The paragraph refers to punishment where a treaty explicitly provides

The Danger in the Near East The right of Russian warships to search vessels under neutral flags for contraband of war is perfectly clear. The European powers, in the treaty of Paris, assented to these propositions: 1. A neutral flag covers the enemy's goods, with the exception of contraband

2. Neutral goods, with the exception of contraband of war, are not liable to capture under the enemy's flags."

Within the past week three British steamers have been overhauled and searched by Russian cruisers. The first, the Waipara, was held for four hours and then released. The second, the Malacca, of the Peninsular and Oriental Line, was seized as a prize, charged with carrying munitions of war to Japan. It is claimed by the steamship company that the stores were consigned to the British dockyards at Hong Kong, and were marked with the broad arrow, the British Government's stamp. The third British steamer seized, the Allenton, was carrying coal to Japan in fulfillment of a contract made long before the outbreak of the war.

The term contraband was originally applied to certain prohibited domestic trade in time of peace. It was first used internationally in the treaty of Southampton, 1625, between Charles I. of England, and the States-General of Holland. The treaty declared that all foodstuffs, munitions of war, ships, arms, sails, silver, iron, etc., carried stipulations, and partly from the cus- Government organ. tom of belligerents at the beginning of a war to issue formal declarations to neutrals, forbidding all trade in certain articles with the ports of their enemies, that the international law of contraband grew up. It is very evident, however, that a convention of the powers rigid definition of contraband. Russia has taken it upon herself to place coal in that category, against the express understanding of the other great maritime powers. This arbitrary declaration was the subject of protest in the British House of Commons, and the Government is giving the matter ser-

The most dangerous question in volved in these seizures is the character of the so-called Russian cruisers, which are patrolling the Red Sea. They passed the Dardanelles as merchantmen, with guns concealed in their holds. As soon as they reached the Mediterranean the guns were hoisted to the decks, and the so-called merchant vessels were transformed into warships. This evasion of the spirit of the treaty of Paris, which interdicts stomach. the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus to warships, brought no protest from the Sultan of Turkey. It was a successful piece of sharp practice on the part of Russia, which is now in a position to say to the powers, What are you going to do about it? Great Britain cannot treat the Russian cruisers as pirates, without inviting war. More likely she will refrain from raising the question of the violation of the treaty of Paris while the war with Japan is in progress, and confine herself to demanding reparation for the wrongful seizure of British ships and goods.

The situation is fraught with peril to the peace of Europe. If Great Britain fights Russia she must fight Russia's ally, France, and the new growth of friendship between the French and British nations would be strangled in its infancy. Unless Russia is deliberately courting war with Great Britain, in order to cover up her humiliation in the far east, and compel France to come to her aid, prudent counsels at London and St. Petersburg will surely find a way out of the danger.


