### WHAT GAMEY ACCOMPLISHES

Last week many were enquiring what good Gamey could do the Conservatives in North Renfrew. Here is an eloquent incident which answers the question:

Mr. Gamey proceeded to the platform and delivered his address. He told the audience his version of the Stratton incident with all its con-vincing wealth of detail that carries

After the meeting was over one o the first to congratulate Gamey and shake hands with him was Mr. Findlay. He said: "Mr. Gamey, I rethe meeting. Since that I have heard what you have said and I believe what you say is true."

That is what Gamey accomplishes in the constituencies. He tells the jury of the people his version of the Stratton affair and it is a recital which convinces his auditors that his statement on the floor of the legislature was substantially true.

And Hon. J. R. Stratton is afraid to appear on the same platform, notwithstanding numerous and pressing invitations, to rebut the statement and give the people an opportunity to judge his version of the case, even as he has been afraid to prosecute his recalcitrant heeler, Callaghan, for alleged perjury.

### LIBERALS ARE SELF-CONDEMNED

In 1894 Hon. Wm. Patterson, as re ported in Hansard of that year, page 1894, referred to Canada's taxes as fol-

"The hon, gentleman said that the taxes we had in 1878 were heavier heavier than they are now. This is a very strange statement for anyone to make. I want to give the hon. gentlemen opposite what I consider is a true way of measuring this, be cause the mere assertion made on one side of the House or the other will carry no weight. I would ask those hon gentlemen to turn to page 11 of the Trade and Naviga-tion Returns, prepared, not by Mr. Laurier or by the member for South Oxford, but prepared by the government themselves, and what is that statement? One of the columns shows the amount of customs duties paid per head of the population. taxation. Take the taxes of 1878 and see how much was paid by the population then. You will find it was \$3,13 per head. Take the sum this last year, and it was \$4.26 per head."

Mr. Patterson now professes to Mr. Patterson now professes to think it good policy to forget these old complaints, but we are forcibly reminded of them by the rapid increases in the country's taxation resulting from the extravagance of the Liberal party. In 1896, when they assumed control of the Government of the Government of the Country of the Government of the G they assumed control of the Government, taxation was \$5.57 per helad. per head, or an increase of 47.8 per cent. in six years. Measured by Mr. Patterson's own mithods we find our burdens affe becoming in-ordinately large, and when hard times reach us redrenchment will be impossible. No language was too strong for Mr. Pauterson in the old days when he called for a halt in expenditure. How can Liberals justify the present growth of "legal-ized robbery" under this adminis-



TREATY-MAKING POWERS.

IMPORTANT INTERVIEW WITH SIR WILFRID LAURIER.

Defines His Position Upon the Question to a Representative of The London Daily Mail.

London, Dec. 22.-The London Daily Mail publishes an interview with Sir Wilfrid Laurier by H. W. Lucy famous under the nom de plume of Toby, M.P.') regarding Canada and the treaty-making power. Sir Wil-frid Laurier said that at the instance

Sir Wilfirid Laurier said that at the instance of Britain Canada had consented to an inquiry into the A aska boundary and had looked for that inquiry to be conducted by jurists fire of partisan prejudice. Canadians were so certain of the fustice of their case and the impartiality of Lord Alverstone that they were confident of a favorable judgment apon the two points. Canadians would not get over their disappointment, and were unanimous that a repetition of the Alaska boundary incident would be rendered impossible by Canada having treaty-making powers.

This would not lead to separation, as the Domimon did not demand absolute treaty-making powers, but desired the arrangement of the preluminaries of all treaties affecting her trade and territory, leaving to the Sovereign the responsibility of vettein, them if the Imperial Ministers tilhis desirable in the interests of the empire. Townsend, the skipper of the lumber schooner Charles Buckley, the lumber schooner Charles Buckley, the prisoner admitted his guilt, and a wfitten confession was submitted in which he declared that he had shot the captain deliberately and with premeditation, because the latter owed him money, and that he desired to lacilitate the trial because he preferred to be executed rather than remain in prison. The confession further stated that the prisoner had previously killed threemen. For shooting a man in Charlestown, Mass., he said that he had served three years in prison. He had served a term in Hayana for killing a teamster, and had killed a man named Henry Hecker on which charge he was acquitted on a technicality.

SPEAKER GULLY MAY RESIGN. Has Held Office For Nine Years-The Conservatives' View.

London, Dec. 22.-The Right Hon William Court Gully has announced his intention of refusing to offer himself for re-election as Speaker of the House of Commons on the completion of his present term. He has held the office for nearly nine years, and will on retirement receive, as usual, a cension for the pension for the remainder of his life of \$20,000 a year, together with the Peerage, which in the case of ex-Speakers invariably takes the form of a Viscountcy. It is possible that the "First Commoner in the Land" a title which the Speaker of the House of Commons holds by virtue of a statute enacted several centuries ago, may resign before the dissolution of the present Parliament, and a good deal of Tory pressure is being brought in an indirect way to bear upon him in order to induce him to do this. It would enable the Tories, who possess a large majority in the present House, to elect one of their own party to the vacant chair. on for the remainder of his life

Chicago, Dec. 22.—Four thousand steel laborers at South Chicago, employees of the Illinois Steel Company, have been notified that they will be laid off next Thursday. Thirteen hundred employees have already been discharged. The reason given the men for their dismissal is needed repairs.

C. P. R. IN ENGLAND.

One person was sentenced to six months' impriwas sentenced to six months' impri-sonment and twelve more were acquit-ted, while civil actions brought against the accused were dismissed. The costs of the prosecution must be paid by the convicted persons.

Yesterday it was reported that Cashel's body was found reported that Cashel's body was found in a well three miles west of the city. Men from the barracks went to Alexander Macdonald's ranch, only to find that the body in the wel was that of George Bacon, a young man who worked on the ranch. It took a great amount of time to raise the body, as the well is a hundred feet deep. It is believed that Bacon slipped into the welf while drawing water with a bucket. The coroner is investigating.

AFTER NEWFOUNDLAND.

The Dominion Government Said to be in Earnest.

Ottawa, Dec. 22.-From what can be gleaned here the Dominion Government are in earnest in the desire for Newfoundland to enter the union, and would not be disposed to haggle unduly over the terms in any huckstering spirit. It is well known that, although duly over the terms in any huckstering spirit. It is well known that, although there was at one time some opposition in Newfoundland to the idea of union with Canada, that feeling has to a great extent passed away. Perhaps it is not generally known that in 1869 the Council and Legislature of Newfoundland were willing to cast in their lot with Canada, and a conference took place at Ottawa which resulted in terms being agreed upon. For some reason or other the whole thing was allowed to drop. As to the acquisition of Greenland, it would be reasonable to infer that the Dangh Government are being asked whether they will part with the island or not. If Denmark will sell, Canada will purchase. This ministakably is the attitude of the Dominion Government in the matter, it requires two parties to make a bargain, however, and it is impossible to say whether we can acquire Greenland say whether we can acquire Greenla until we have the Danish Governmen

SOO CANALS TRAFFIC.

Figures Show an Increase For Canadian Canal.

Sault Ste. Marie, Mich., Dec. 22 .-Although the aggregate traffic through the ship canals at this place for the year just closed shows a faung off of 1,286,709 net tons, all of this decrease 1,286,709 net tons, all of this decrease has occurred in the traffic through the American canal, the Canadian record being 773,834 net tons in excess of last year. The principal decrease this year was in building stone, which shows a falling off of forty-five per cent, while both wheat and flour lost twenty per cent. The only record which showed any considerable increase was that of hard coal; in this 271 per cent. increase is noted. Last year there passed through the Canadian canal 4.728,351 net tons of freight, while this season's record was 5,502,185.

Russian Minister and Foreign Minister Komura at the Russian Legation. Japan's reply is in no way in the nature of an ultimatum, but she asks Russia to reconsider certain essential points in her reply to Japan. Baron de Rosen is now sufficiently recovered to resume the negotiations.

Berlin, Dec. 22.—War in the far east is regarded in official quarters here as improbable for several weeks, for the reason that Japan will continue to negotiate, and Russia's policy is understood to be simply to "sit tight and hold on." make no specific promises concerning the territories in dispute, and meet an attack if Japan will be satisfied with nothing else. Russia will let nothing go. Japan must be content with that or fight. This attitude, it is believed, is approved by the Czar, who is not willing that Russia's should take the aggressive. The Czar's advisers are convinced that Great Britain and France will not be involved.

London Papers Say it Ran Away With London, Dec. 22.-London has been sputtering all day long over Emperor

William's speech at Hanover, in which he said the incomparable deeds of the German Legion saved the British army from destruction at Waterloo, The unanimous opinion of London is voiced by a harmonious press, Liberal, Con-servative, Radical, tariff reform and free food editors vieing in protest and lenunciation. They charge the Emper-or with grass and palpable perversion of history, and contradict point blank he statement that the Germans saved the British from defeat and annihilation. They credit Blucher with routing the enemy after they had been defeated but aver that there was no question when he came up of the French de-stroying the British. They charge the Emperor with unpardonable indiscre-Emperor with unpardonable indiscre-tion in making the speech needlessly and flagrantly offensive to the British. They do not forget to congratulate him-upon the recovery of his voice and on being able to speak with his old-time rotundity, but they advise him, in terms not lacking directness, that once more his tongue has been allowed to run away with his good sense, and has made him silly in the eyes of the world.
