DESTROY THE RAIL WAY

Russians Are Making a Permanent Job of It This Time.

The Inference is Drawn That Tney Do Not Contemplate Recovering the Situation-Natives Gredit Japanese With Almost Hopeless Attempt to Transfer Bulk of Five Armies to Vladivostock in a Roundabout Way. London, April 3.-The correspondent

Japs' Big Undertaking.

Gunshu Pass (108 miles north of Tie Pass), April 3.—The situation here is unchanged. Gen. Mistchenko has moved forward into close touch with the Japanese and keeps up constant skirmishing. Elsewhere everything is quiet. Native reports, which may be taken for what they are worth, state that the Japanese are leaving the Russian front, only a screen, capable, with the help of the Mukden and Tie Pass fortifications and garrisons, of holding in check Gen. Linevitch, and are transferring the bulk of their five armies to Vladivestock by means of a wide movement through Mongolia to Teitsthar. Considering the great distance involved the plan appears too bold and almost impracticable; but Japanese intoxication from continual success, bold initiative and determined perseverance must be regarded. The situation affords an apportunity for Russian cavalry, which thus far has played an insignimust be regarded. The situation affords an opportunity for Russian cavairs, which thus far has played an insignificant role, to distinguish itself by penetrating the Japanese intentions. Gen. Linevitch has ordered the resumption of drills, keeping the soldiers occupied in the daytime, and music in the bieuvacs at night. An energetic regime is being instituted.

Tokio, April 3.—The following official advices have been received from army headquarters in Manchuria:

"Our scouts advanced toward Hallung and collided with 300 of the enemy's cavalry at Shauclengts, 30 miles southwest of Seilung, on the morning of March 28. The enemy, 4,000 men strong, retreated to Hailung, leaving 2,000 troopers. There are large stores of cereals at various points between Yingacheng and Sanchengtzu. The situation is unchanged in the Changchun and Kirin directions."

Dangerous Scouting Feat.

With Gen. Kuroki's army in the field. April 1, vis Fusan, April 3.—Two detachments of Japanese cavalry, have returned to the army after the most extensive and dangerous scouting exploit of the war. The detachments were sent north early in January under the leadership of Col. Naganuma and Major Sasegawa and each numbered 150 men. Only 100 men of each detachment returned. They explored the Russian positions west of Mukden. They encountered and eluded many forces of Russian cavalry and penetrated Gen. Mistchenko's lines. Tokio, April 3.—The following report-dated April 1, has been received from the headquarters of the Japanese armies in the front:

"Our force in the direction of Sing-king (about 80 miles east of Mukden) reports that, according to information received from the natives, a force of Russians and mounted bandits, under Col. Madolitoff, which has been assembling at Hallung, has returned to the north. According to other natives, Kirin seems to be the place elected by the enemy for assembling.

"Our force at Welhuanpomen (25 miles northeast of Tie Pass) reports that there has been no change in the enemy's positions in the vicinity of Menhuachich. There are some Russian infantry and cavairy about 32 miles northeast of Kalyuan (25 miles from Tie Pass).

"Our force at Changiu (40 miles

northeast of Kaiyuan (25 miles from Tie Pass).

"Our force at Changtu (40 miles above Tie Pass) reports that the enemy's cavalry outposts retreated 25 miles north of Changtu atter burning the rathroad station at Sousactzu.

His (the Emperor's) visit was a recognition of this independence.

BLIZZARD AROUND CALGARY.

Memphis, Tenn. April 3.—Jockey Wonderly, the London rider, was taken to a hospital Saturday suffering from a supposed concussion of the brain. While schooling a two-year-old Saturday morning he was thrown into a fence, and his head struck a post. Later, Wonderly's injuries proved fatal.

BOMB THROWN AT LODZ

Police Officer in the Polish City Has Feet Blown Off.

Lured by Phone Message, Police Com missioner Szabalovicz Became Tar get for a Terrorist Who Carried His Deadly Explosive in a Basket-Ac companying Policeman Drew His Sword and Wounded the Commis sioner's Assailant So He Will Die.

Lodz, Russian Poland, April 3.-

Lodz, Russian Poland, April 3.— Police Commissioner Szabalovicz of the second district was seriously injur-ed Saturday by a bomb, which was thrown at him in the street. The Police Commissioner had been summoned by telephone to come to the office of the chief of police and started on foet, followed by a policeman. The former noticed at Konstantinowsk and Zawarski streets a poorly clad man former noticed at Konstantinowsk and Zawarski streets a poorly clad man carrying a basket. As Szabalovicz appreached the man suddenly hurled a bomb, which exploded with terrific force, blowing off the commissioner's feet and severely wounding him in the breast. It is feared his injuries will prove fatal.

Force of the Explosion. The force of the explosion tere hele in the ground two feet deep and twelve feet in circumference. The actwelve feet in circumference. The accompanying policeman drew his sword and wounded the commissioner's assallant on the head. When the prisoner was searched a loaded revolver and some cartridges were found in his pockets. He is reported to be dying from the sword cuts received.

The explosion was heard about five miles away. All the windows in the neighborhood were shattered. People in adjoining houses were thrown to the fleor. Szabalovicz is hated by the Socialists. He is charged with killing a Socialist during the disturbances here in December last.

Pessant Terrorize Lithuania.

Peasant Terrorize Lithuania. St. Petersburg, April 3.—The lates St. Petersburg, April 3.—The latest outbreak of peasant disorders officially reported is in the Werra district of Lithuania. Regular mobs of peasants are marching through the country, pflaging estates and demolishing the houses of the land-owners. One proprietor was shot. The peasants entered Werra, wrecked the volka shops, became drunk and terrorized the inhabitants. Troops were called for. The telegraph and telephone wires are cut, and communication with the outside world is severed.

Overshadows the War.

Overshadows the War. New York, April 8.—A St. Petersburg despatch to The Herald says that agrarian risings throughout Russia are assuming such serious proportions that they overshadow the war. These or incy oversnadow the war. These or-ganized disorders are the result of the spread of revolutionary literature, urg-ing that such risings are the only means of preventing the bread-winners being sent to the war. As a matter of fact, the troubles render the proposed mob-ilization impossible.

FOUR KILLED, 40 INJURED. Mob of Jewish Socialists Meet Treeps

in Warsaw Streets.

Warsaw, April 3.—A serious conflict occurred at 1.30 o'clock last night in Dzika street, where a Jewish Socialist society known as the Bund had organized a demonstration. The troops which came to disperse the gathering fired into the crowd, killing four persons and weunding 40 others.

The trouble began when, under the pretext of holding a memorial meeting for the late Jewish Socialist leader, a crowd of over 1,000, mestly Jews, carrying red flags, marched into Dzika street and was met by a mixed police and military patrol of 20 men. The

The police declare the Socialists fired revolvers at them, the leaders incting the mob to attack the patrol, which thereupon, fired several volleys into the crewd. The crowd remeved all but nine of the wounded, two of whom were wemen. These were taken to the hospital. It is expected that two or more of the wounded will die. The police made many arrests,

To Blow Up Schoels.

Conditions here are causing much uneasiness and nervousness. Handprinted proclamations have been found in the streets warning the public against walking near Government buildings and other places, as bombs would be thrown in these quarters. Several parents, whose children are attending school in deflance of the school strike have been warned by letter to withdraw their children, as the school buildings would be blown up.

Forbids Cholers Cengress.

Moscow, April 3.—The Assistant Minister of the Interior has forbidden the assemblage of congress to deal with the cholers epidemic because, according to official information, the promoters of the congress intended to give it the form of a demonstration against the Government.

Berlin, April 3.—A despatch from Tangter received here yesterday announces that the affair of the murder of a German subject named Genthe has been arranged. The two Moors who were implicated have been condemned to imprisonment for life, and the Government of Morocco has undertaken to erect a monument over Genthe's grave and compensate his family.

Francis Genthe, a newspaper correspondent and well known as a writer of hunting and military stories, was murdered in March, 1904, while traveling in Morocco.

THAT NEW ACT

ed the opinion that the Hamilton essment commissioner misconstrued that section of the new assess ment act which forbids assessors giving information to citizens with regard to assessed property. Commissioner Hall construes that section to mean that no information of any sort may be given by any official of his department, and that any official who gives out any information is liable to a penalty of \$200. The Herald pointed out that the law forbids the divulging of only such informa-

tion as is received in confidence by ors in the course of their official duties, and we said that assessors were at liberty to accommodate lawyers and real estate agents by giving out information respecting real estate values and measurements, as a matter of courtesy. The Herald's opinion is supported by that of the law clerk of the legis-

lature, Allan M. Dymong. In reply to a letter from Mr. Farmer, of Farmer & Gould, Mr. Dymond writes that he has had a conversation with the assessment commissioner of Toronto, who says that "he has no objection to giving out any reasonable information as to the value he is placing on lands and buildings." And the law clerk gives his own opinion as follows :-

"I do not think there is anything in the act to prevent an assessor from telling what value he is placing on lands or buildings. Of course he gives such information quite unofficially and merely for the sake of being obliging."

If assessors choose to oblige citizens seeking in the assessment department such information as has not been confidentially received by assessors as data for income and business tax assessments, the assessors need not fear the penalty of \$200 for obliging the citizens.-Hama ilton Herald.

MR. WICKETT: ON MUNICIPAL

In the Municipal World for April, just issued, Mr. W. L. Wickett, B. A., barrister, of this city, has a well written article of some length. treating of the "civil liability of municipal corporations," where damages are claimed in cases where accidents are due to non-repair of highways. Mr. Wickett quotes the statutes in regard to the matter, and compares the law of Canada with those in England and the United States, and shows that the laws in those countries are less etringent than the Ontario law. He submits that a municipality should not be held liable for defects in highways unless the defect "is of its own direct creation" and would have the law amended by eliminating the words imposing a civil liability. "Whatever grounds there may have existed for the imposition of civil fiability on municipalities in this province," says Mr. Wickett, "it is submitted that the time has arrived for the repeal of the statute imposing such liability. Persons using highways should do so subject to the taking upon themselves the and compares the law of Canada to the taking upon themselves the risks involved, and were such the case it is believed that the ratepayers of the various municipalities in this Province would take a greater interest in having the highways brought to a higher standard, and that municipal councils would get more sympathy from their consti-tuents in their efforts to minimize the dangers of public travel on highways."

Mr. Wickett thinks that to attempt to improve our highways to meet the requirements of the law as it now exists would mean finan-cial ruin for the municipality. It is abundantly evident that to

make a law to apply in regard to damages for non-repair of highways is next to impossible. Sometimes a washout causes an accident, and it is obvious that to tax the municipality in such a case is unfair; yet the person injured feels aggrieve Clearly, however, the accident was due to the natural elements, and not to neglect on the part of the municipality.-St. Thomas Times.

Bids Fair to Become the Greatest Educational Philanthropist Canada Has

Sir W. C. Masdenald, of Montreal, bids fair to become the greatest educational philanthropist Canadahas ever seen. The millionaire tobacomanufacturer has given liberally of his great wealth in the past for the cause of technical education, as the Macdonald Institutes bear witness, but his recent benefices throw previous gifts into the background, and set a new standard for future Canadian Carnegies to equal or surpass. Sir William is taking the wiser course in disposing of his fortune while he is alive and able to enjoy the good he is doing, and as to the direction in which his philanthropy turns there can be no two opinions. Outsrie's Big Whistle.

Speaking before the Canadian Club in Ottawa the other evening, Prof. Robertson said, in reply to an opinion that Ontario's system was peerless: "That reminds me of the story of Abraham Lincoln, who had remarked on one occasion, 'Why, I know of a steamboat that has a one-horse engine and a fifty-horse whistle. That steamboat drifted a good deal.

"There have been in our schools many additions and hardly any reforms. The schools reflect the people, and here we may ask, What do we want the schools to produce? We want them to produce the highest type of citizen, with occasionally the highest type of scholar. People send their children to school with the object of making them able to earn a genteel living in the easiest way. That is a deplorable ideal for a great people. But there is so little public enthusiasm for education that the most valuable servants of the community, the teachers, are rated lowest in regard to remuneration, while they are doing the most important work. We are slack and careless in regard to large expenditures for trivial and transient things and utterly penurious in matters that are of the greatest importance."

Both additions and reforms were made possible when Sir William Macdonald made his first gifts to manual training. He believed that the system which then reigned absolutely and which still holds diminished sway magnified the value of the knowledge of books, of names, dates, rules and forms. He did not question their value, but he held that it was distorted, and that another world of knowledge was permitted to remain ignored and unknown. The great argument in favor of manual training is that it stimulates constructive ability, and develops the student's mental capacity by giving him to handle and use tools which are real to him. That it has a tendency to inculcate self-reliance is beyond dispute. Against this theory many old-time diucationists and trades unionists arrayed themselves, and for a time the dispute raged fercely, and even yet has not quite died away. School Consolidation. Gifts for Manual Training.

School Consolidation.

But the Macdonald fund won the day. Schools the philanthropy of Sir William Macdonald has done much. There are in Canada no fewer than 750,000 children attending school in the rural districts, compared with 450,000 in cities, towns, and incorporated villages, and the general feeling is that the rural school children acquire their education under unfavorable dircumstances. Specialization is impossible in the matter of instruction. The same teacher, usually a young girl, who teaches the children the alphabet, is expected to teach boys 16 and 18 years old the inner meaning of geometrical problems. The task is too great; only a genius could do it well, and genius is offered less than a day laborer's pay in most cases. Under this old system, the results were generally unsatisfactory, and the waste of the children was actively promoted. At Middleton, N.S., seven little schools have been closed, and one large graded school, thoroughly organized and well equipped in every way, has been extended to bring distant pupits to and from school; with hardly any inconvenience the transformation has been wrought, and one of the most important results is reflected in the attendance, which now exceeds by 70 per cent, the combined attendance at the seven. The latest phase of the Macdonaid educational scheme takes the shape of an institution which is expected to become the headquarters of advanced rural education in Canada. It will be established at Ste. Anne de Bellevue, twenty miles west of Montreal, and is thus described by Prof. Robert-

is thus described by Prof. Robertson:

"The general plan provides for a department of research, with special laboratories and equipment for work in bacteriology of soils and products, biology in plants and the animals dealt with in agriculture, physics as applicable to rural life, and agricultural chemistry. The institution will also comprise a department of farms. These will be used for illustrating the most economical and best known profit-making methods of agriculture. There will be at least three special farms, the dairy farm, the meat-producing farm, and the small cultures farm. Provision will be made for receiving apprentices on those farms, and within each farm will be a series of small apprentice farms. That is merely an enlargement of the idea of the school garden at the consolidated schools. On these smaller farms of from one to five acres groups of apprentices will have full charge, and learn by doing and managing for themselves.

"There will also be a department of instruction, and a farm school, and what will practically be a college of agriculture on lines somewhat similar to those followed at the Ontario Agricultural College at Gualph."

AN AMUSING TOY.

The Way to Make and Use the Trich

Take an ordinary tobacco pipe and stop the bowl with a tightly fitting cork. The pipe may be either a wooden or a clay one, but it should be new and clean.

Bore a small hole through the cork,

near one side, just big enough to hold a straw. The straw should be a little longer than the cork, and at the top it should be slit down an inch or so and the pieces spread out in the form of a

with a little paper funnel pasted to the top of it. If the straw or tube does no

fit the hole exactly a little wax at the top will make the joint air tight. Now take another cork, cut it down to a round ball as big as a small marble, "a miggle," and pierce it through the center-with a long hairpin from which you have broken off the greater part of one leg. The straight end should stick farther out of the ball than the other so that the hooked end will be higher and will stay on top. Now in the other side of the large cork nearest the stem of the pipe stick a long wire, bent over and above and ending in a hook exacty over the little funnel and three or

four inches above it.

Then drop the cork ball into the funnel, put the pipe to your lips and blow.
Your breath rushing up the little tube will lift the light ball and keep it danc-ing in the air for a second or two. When it falls the funnel catches it, 4,ad

your breath sends it up again.

The trick is to make the hook attached to the ball catch on the hook above so that the ball remains suspended; that is all.—New York Mail.

Canon Hill, of St. Thomas, Officiated-The Rev. James Walter Hodgins Preached his First Sermon Last Night-Made a Strong Impression


