## THE LATH ARARKET

Although a considerable quantits of lath has heen purchased during the pract week, the demand does not seem to bave molerated. It is satd that $\$ 4$ is not an extradordinary price lut Nu. 1 whic pine with at Claming,
while No. 2 white pine and No. 1 hemlock and Norway has been sold at Duluth as high as $\$ 3.75$. This is an advance of over 200 per ceni. in prices in a little more than one year. A Buffalo white pine lath sells alwut $\$ 3.25$, although one firm is said to be asking $\$ 4$.

Current trade conditions. ontario.
What has been said in previous issues regarding the prosperous condition of the lumber trade of Ontario is equally applicable at the present time. The mills are busy with orders, have little stock in pite, and many of them sold largely in advance. On local account an increased volume of business has been done during the past week, indicating that the fall trade has commenced to move. The number of inquiries from the United States indicates that trade in that direction is also expanding, and allogether a further hardening of prices is looked for. Two Michigan dealers last week visited a Georgian Bay mill for the purpose of purchasing $8,000,000$ feet of boards, but when they arrived they found that 5,000 , 000 fect of the stock had in the meanume been sold for the Buffalo and Tonauanda mirkets. The balance of $3,000,000$ feet was purchased at a price said to be in the vicinity of $\$ 16$ per thousand. This is an indication ot the urgency of the demand. There is a a ery strong enywiry fut cuitiaion and cull lumber, which has steadily risen in price, but in the ligher grades. which are alvays saleable. the advance has not been somarked. In the Ounwa valiey prices have advanced about $S=$ per thousand within the past few weeks. Good sidings are now quoted at $\$ 32$ to $\$_{40}$, pood strips at $\$ 25$ to $\$ 30$, No. 1 dressed sidings at $\$ 17$ to $\$_{24}$ and strips at $\$ 16$ to $\$ 18$. Lath has made an advance of from 15 to 25 cents, quotations being St. 35 to $\$ 1.50$ for No. s, and \$t to \$1.to ior No. $=$ Shingles are sood stock and find ready sale.

A large local consumption of hardwoods has prevented any weakening in prices. In the Wiarton district rock clm is being sold at $\$ 20$, soft eln, common and better, at $\$ 14$, and maple of same grade at $\$ 15$, and at these prices theie is very little stock to be had. It is improbable that prices will show any material depreciation during the fall or carly winter, although a large output of logs next winter might have the effect of lowering prices.
qUEbFC and new brunswick.
The high freight rates are likely to result in reducing late fall shipments of lumber from the St. Lawrence and man:me province ports. Ship ownets are now asking 525. 64. from St. John to edst coast Ireland and west coast England, but shippers are reluctant to advance their ideas above 50s. It is not believed, however, that there is any oreat yuantity of stock yet to go forward to the i3ritish market, and shuppers are not likely to be seriously handicapped by the hugher rates. Considerable lumber is finding a market in the United btates and in bouth America, several cargoes having gone forward to the latter country withon the past month.

The lumber eperators are making preparations for their winters work in the woods. In view of the position of the wood markets of the world senerally, it is probable that the cut this winter will be slighty larger than for several seasons past. Wages this year are from \$iS to $\$ 20$ per month, while last season the average was about $\$ 16$.

The mills supplying lumber to Manitoba and the Northwest Territones are said to be now behind with orders. The
farmers are just finishing harvesting opcrations, and the fall demand for lumber has only commenced. With a scarcity at the present tume, it is to be expected that prices will advance in the near future. It is understood, however, that retail dealers are carrying quite liberal stocks, in the e:spectation of a brisk fall trade. The Rat Portape Lumber Co, are reported to have sold $6,000,000$ feet of lumber within the past two months. Burlding and min. ing operations in British Columbia are moving very freely, calling for a large quantity of material. A few days as? a meeting of the saw mill men in the interior of southern British Columbia was held to discuss the amalgamation of the mills. This wis not effected, however, alhough there is some prospect of it being accom plished in the near fulure.

## united staths.

A firm matket and somewhat weaker demand explains the condition of the white pine ltade of the United States. Prices have now reached a point where retail dealers and consumers refuse 10 buy except for immediate requirements. They believe thit prices will go no higher. On the other hand, there are some who predict that before the open ing of navigation next spring there will be a famine in white pine lumber. Another condition which has checked the demand is the most unpiecedented high fregght rates. Fiom Duluth to Lake Erie points the rate is now 54 , the result being that no sales can be made to the eastern trade for this year's delivery. the castern trade for this yeals delivery.
From the above remarks it must not be From the above remarks it must not be premised that prices show any tendency
to weaken. Dealers in the Buffalo and Tonawanda markets report prices as very firm, with a prospect of a further advance. From the Saginaw valley comes the same report. In that district mill culls are selling at from $\$ 12$ to $\$ 14$, and log run at from $\$ 16$ to $\$ 24$. Spruce lumber is selling readily at recent quotations, $\$ 17$ being paid for frames.
The hardwood market displays many elements of strength. Every variely is in short supply, while there does not seem to be any abatement in the demand. At Buffalo sales of cull elm and basswood have been made at $\$ 17_{1}$ and thick elm is quoted at $\$ 32$. A sale of low grade logs tot hoxes is reported, which is another indication of the scarcity of ordinaty box lumber.

## gore:g.

The position of foreign markets generally is satisfactory. From Great britain comes the report of a steadily increasing demand and a tendency towards higher prices. Spruce deals particularly are improving, and sales of large cargoes have prowing, and sales of large cargoes have been mage at $\chi_{6} 6155$ c.i.f. London and
Liverpool. At the latter port there was Liverpool. At the latter Dort there was
received during the monih of August received during the month of August
21,211 standards, the deliveries being 22,252 standards, or upwards of one thousand standards in excess of reccipts. The packing case makers are very busy, ard building operations in the cheaper class of houses, in the construction of which spruce deals and battens enter so largely, have not been so active for some time.

The advance in pine referred to former repouts has been mantanned, the high rates of freight contributing in some measure 10 this end. The stock of wood goods in London docks this year shows a shortage of about 18,000 standards, the exact figures being $17,339,119$ pieces, against $18,014,260$ pieces in 1598 . All classes of yoods, with the single exception of flooring, is in ligher stock than last year.
In timber, birch, either in the log or plank, is very scarce, the stock at Liverpool at end of August being only 150,000 feet, as compared with 314,00 reet in Aupust, 1898. In view of this condition an increase in price is looked for.
The trouble in South Africa does not appear to have any influence on the wood trade of Great Britain. Merchants there are buying all they can of stock on which the Snuth African demand misht have some effect, and it is only in respect to next year's business that the question is brought under consideration at all.

## StOCKS AND PRICES.

Mill culls are selling at \$10 a thousand at Ashliand, Wis., No. 3 boards at \$11.50, and No. 2 boards, $6,8,10$ and 12 feet , at $\$ 13$ to $\$ 1350$.

The ship Guilia R sailed from St. John, N.B., last week for Marseilles, France, with $1,168,157$ feet of deals, shipped by W. M. Mackay.

Wm. Allen, of Perth, Ont., has purchased the Muirhead property in Beck. with township, and will take out about 3,000,000 feet of logs this winter.

At Midland, Ont., the schooner Geo. Westley loaded lumber last week for Bay City, the United Lumberman for Tonawanda, and the Ellen Murton for Buffalo.
J. L. Reaume \& Co., of Essex, Orit., have boughe the timber on lots 14 and 15 . of the $14 \mathrm{th}_{2}$ concession of Colchester of the $14 h_{2}$ concession of Colchester
North, also that on a 50 acre berth and a North, also that on a 50 acre
30 acre beth in Maidstone.
The Hull Lumber Co., of Hull, Que., again started their mill last week, which bad been shut down for a fortnight owing to scarcity of logs. The company have now 150,000 logs floating down the river.
The R. Laidlaw Lumber Co. are handling a considerable quantuty of Canadian pine through their Buffalo yard. The businsss card of this firm, whose head office is in Toronte, appears in this issue.
The Dommior government is abour to construct a telegraph line from Lig Roumaine, Que., to a point in Labrador, a distance of 315 miles. The contract for supply. ing thenecessary poles has been given to C J. Bickerdike, of Montreal.

Lumbering operatoons in the vicinity of Owen Sound are very brisk. Maitland, Rixon $\mathbb{S}$ Co. estimate their cut this year at between 4 and 5 million feet. Pickard \& Rowan will cut over 2,000,000 feet, Henry l'edwell $1,500,000$ leet, and J. S. Findlay $3,000,0 c 0$ feel.
Pelion \& Reid, of Cheboygan, Mich., have just received a raft of Canadran loss coniaining about $4,000,000$ feel. They have still two other ratis on the Georgian Bay, but having all the logs they can cilt this season, will not take them over to Michigan until next spring.
In this issue Messrs. Geo. Yerry \& Co., packıng case manufacturers, Dublin, Ireland, ask for quotations for the supply of poplar, cottonwood, beech or white pine timber. If suitable for their requirements, as regards price and quality, they are prepared to purchase very large quantities.
The C. Beck Manufacturing Co., of Yenetanguishene, have three. camps in the woods, and will make a lal ; ecut during the coming winter. The Holland \& Emery Co., Byng Inlet, have two camps in, and will put in others. Pelton \& Reid, of Cheboygan, Mich., have one camp on he Indian Reserve.
At a recent sale held by Foy, Morgan \& Co., London, Eng., Canadian spruce, ex. Demand is good and likely to be better. We quote io and 12 inch at $\$ 18$ to \$19;9, 10 and 12 inch, $\$ 17$ to $\$ 18 ; 6$, 7 and $S$ inch, $\$ 15$ to $\$ 1650$; and scaniling, $2 \times 4$ and $2 \frac{1}{2} \times 4$, 10 in 20 fect long, Si'4.50 to $\$ 15$. Liths have had quite $a$ flurry-
about $15,000,000$ came in, and aboul all sold at all kinds of prires, ranging from $\$ 2.25$ to $\$ 2.75$, but $\$ 2.50$ is the cargo price at which bulk of recelpts were sold for. We think present prices can be leeld for balance of seasun, unless slipments are greally incieased."
The result of the action of the provincial legistature in prohibitung the exportation of saw logs has been to revive the lumber industry in the Pariy Sound district. Camps are already in operation in many sections. It is said that the Parry Sound Lumber Co. will take oul $25,000,000$ feet, of which $10,000,000$ fee has already been coniracted for. The company will put in two camps at Deep Bay and Blinil Bay, both in the township of Carling. In addition to these two camps, the company will let contracts to a number of jobbers. Win. Peters has four camps in operation, wo in Christie four camps in operation, wo in Christie
