







**Live Stock Markets.**

If anything prices for cattle and hogs were lower at the western cattle yards to-day. Receipts were somewhat heavier and calves were lower. There were 99 carloads, came in to-day, which included 2,322 sheep and lambs, 2,500 hogs, about 10 milch cows and 6 calves.

Export cattle—Prices were off about \$5 per head in this line to-day. Real choice cattle are hard to get. The ruling figures to-day were from 8 1/2 to 9 1/2 per lb. Calves are lower. About 5 carloads remained unsold at 5 o'clock but it was expected that a deal for them would be closed before night.

Butchers' cattle—It is the same story in this line. Prices are low. The top figure touched was 80 per lb mostly only 2 or 3 fancy heifers going to 8 1/2 per lb. Top many poor cattle offer Common were quoted as low as 1 1/2 per lb, the range being from that up to 30 per lb, for extra choice butchers' for immediate killing. A bunch of heifers, 800 lbs average, sold for 1 1/2 per lb; 3 cattle, 2140 lbs weight, \$88 for the lot; 1 carload cattle, 1,000 lbs average, 80 per lb; 1 carload cattle, 900 lbs average \$2 80 per cwt.

Stockers—Not many changed hands. The market is quiet at from 1 c to 2 1/2 c per lb, according to quality.

Feeders—There was perhaps the best activity in this line, but nothing to-day can be quoted higher than 30 per lb. About 300 or 400 head are yet wanted. One carload 900 lbs average sold for 2 1/2 c per lb; 11 head 1080 lbs average 20 per lb, less \$5 on the deal; 1 carload 1,025 lbs average \$2 80 per cwt. Quite a few sales were made in the region of 2 1/2 c per lb and 2 1/2 c.

Bulls—For good ones the demand is fair, but poor stock bulls are dull and low priced. Some of the worst sold at 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 per lb. A few bulls for feeding purposes sold for 20 per lb. Choice bulls for export sell at 30 per lb, but that is about the best.

Sheep and lambs—Steadier. Prices for all kinds for shipping purposes except bucks rule at from 30 to 3 1/2 per lb. They must be very choice to bring the latter figure. To-day 3 1/2 c was paid for some choice sheep to ship out immediately. Bucks are not wanted.

Calves—Steady; offerings light. Prices rule at from \$4 to \$7 for good to choice and \$2 and \$3 for common. Good ones are wanted.

Milch cows and springers—Not many offered and the market was about steady for good cows. Poor ones are not wanted. One choice cow, about the best one on the market, sold for \$38. The ruling figures were from \$28 to \$40 according to quality.

Hogs—Offerings were heavy in spite of the warning that prices would go lower. To-day the top figure, weighed of cars, was \$3 85 per cwt. One or two lots which had been contracted for brought 40 per lb. Sows sold at 30 per lb. Prospects are for lower prices.


East Buffalo, Nov. 8—Cattle—79 cars through and 4 on sale, including a few hold over; market slow and weak; no good cattle on offer; a few fair to good cows sold at \$3 10 to \$2 85; veal calves in good demand at \$6 to \$6 75.

Hogs—12 cars through and 79 cars on sale; market dull and 5c to 10c lower, with pigs more off; good to choice heavy grades \$3 80 to \$3 85; good 125 to 210 lb mediums \$3 80 to \$3 85.

Sheep and lambs—2 cars through and 40 on sale; market dull and 10c to 1 1/2c lower for good grades both kinds, with common to fair fully 1/2c off; extra prime heavy export lambs 130 to 105 lbs average \$4 20 to \$4 25; good to choice handy lots 80 to 85 lbs, \$3 90 to \$4. Cattle closed dull with a few unsold. Hogs closed slow and lower, the bulk late sales. Sheep and lambs, including hold over, closed dull and slow, but all sold.
