New York, Nov. 9 .- (Montreal Gazette) -- Leaders of the cause of women suffrage yesterday believed that the vote of women in the west had elected President Willson, and that without these votes, Hughes would have been elected president by a considerable majority in the electoral college.

Of the ninety one electoral votes in states where women voted, 44 went for Wilson, the thirteen votes of California were uncertain, and the twenty-nine votes in Illinois and the five of Oregon were for Hughes

Correspondents from Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, Utah, Washington and Wyoming have reported that the general belief was that the women vote in those states had gone heavily for the prosident. In Idaho, Kansas, Nevada, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming, states which have a total of thirty one electoral votes-it was believed to be very likely that the majority among the women for Wilson had overthrown a majority among the men for Hughes.


