Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 10.—Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg expressed the conviction that Germany was certain of final victory.

England and France in 1915, guaranteed to Russia territorial rule over Constantinople, the Bosphorus and the western shores of the Dardanelles with its hinterland, while Asia-Minor was to be divided among the members of the Entente.

Against this policy, whether it appears diplomatically as an encirclement, militarily as a war of destruction or economically as a world boycott, we, from the beginning, were on the defensive.

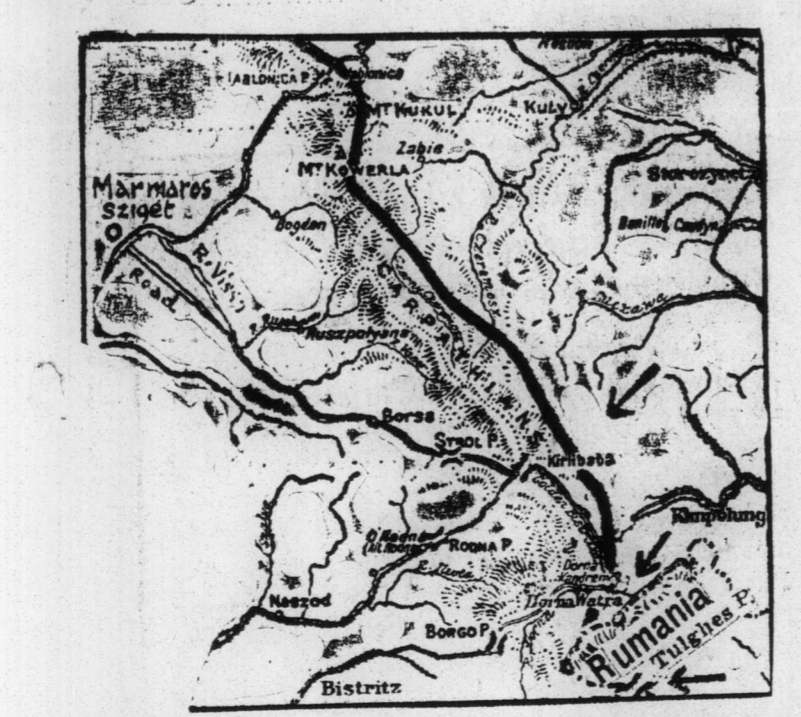
WEATHER BULLETIN.

Petrograd, Nov. 10.—Via London, 1.14 p.m.—Russian troops are now two miles west of Tchernavoda, fighting for the famous bridge across the Danube.

On the Transylvania front the Roumanians have suffered a reverse at the hands of the invading Austro-German forces.

Bucharest, Nov. 10.—Via London.—Heavy fighting is under way on the Transylvania front, but no important changes in the military situation are reported in to-day's announcement.

On the Western frontier of Moldavia (northern Roumania) as far as Predeluz, the situation is unchanged.

Along the Danube there was an artillery bombardment. An enemy monitor and two patrol boats, which approached the Ramada bridge at Giurgevo, were obliged to retire as a result of our artillery fire.

Pres. Wilson Retains His Position in White House

California is the Democratic Column But Three Other States are Still Doubtful--Many of the Returns Were Late Because Stage Coaches Had to Plow Through Snow

New York, Nov. 10.—Woodrow Wilson was elected president of the United States when California swung definitely into the Democratic column early to-day.

Three still doubtful.

The only states where the result remained in question to-day were Minnesota, New Hampshire and New Mexico, with 13 electoral votes.

Could still win.

If Mr. Hughes carried both Minnesota with 12 votes and New Hampshire with four, he would have only 259, seven less than enough to elect.

Mr. Wilson could lose New Mexico

and three votes from California and still win.

The result in Minnesota may be determined by the ballots of 2,135 national guardsmen now on the Mexican border, which will not be counted until the state canvassing board meets on the 11th.

Stage Coaches

It was not until stage coaches had come through from communities tucked away in the Sierras or settlements on the arid eastern slopes of the mountains that the result was known.

Similar difficulties were encountered in collecting the returns from the wilds of New Mexico and from the far corners of Minnesota.

Parties have already called for a recount in New Hampshire where less than 200 votes seem likely to determine the result.

Will Look for Errors

The Republicans contended, it was said unofficially to-day that since the Democrats claimed California by a margin of only approximately 2,000 out of nearly 1,000,000 votes cast, it was apparent there might be errors in the count.

The Democrats maintained, on the other hand that no charges of fraud had been made by the state chairman Rowell, with the Republicans in the lead.

In a statement made to The Associated Press at San Francisco, Mr. Rowell made only a partial victory for Mr. Hughes was that the electoral vote of the state might be split on the official count as it was in 1912 when two votes went to Wilson and 11 to Roosevelt.

Both sides conceded that no matter what action might be taken in regard to a recount there was little likelihood of a contest being carried.

New York, Nov. 9.—(Montreal Gazette)—Leaders of the cause of women suffrage yesterday believed that the vote of women in the west had elected President Wilson, and that without these votes, Hughes would have been elected president by a considerable majority in the electoral college.

Of the ninety one electoral votes in states where women voted, 44 went for Wilson, the thirteen votes of California were uncertain, and the twenty-nine votes in Illinois and the five of Oregon were for Hughes.

Correspondents from Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Kansas, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, Utah, Washington and Wyoming have reported that the general belief was that the women vote in those states had gone heavily for the president. In Idaho, Kansas, Nevada, Utah, Washington, and Wyoming, states which have a total of thirty one electoral votes—it was believed to be very likely that the majority among the women for Wilson had overthrown a majority among the men for Hughes.

THE SITUATION.

The Russo-Rumanian continue to forge ahead in the Dobruja. They have recaptured Hirsova, which was set on fire before the Teutons evacuated the place, and are driving Mackensen's troops southward.

Nothing of importance has latterly transpired on either the Somme or the Italian fronts.

At the annual banquet of the Lord Mayor of London, the Premier, according to time honored custom, was the principal speaker.

Let there be no illusion about our enemies. They are great organizers and fine fighters in the field. They are also if not skillful, yet indefatigable workers in the sphere of propaganda, where they have a double motive—to divide the allies and capture neutral opinion.

Our peace must be such as will build up on sure and stable foundations the security of the weak, the liberties of Europe, and a free future for the world.

When the above system was developed it was heartily welcomed as a means of keeping surplus produce to be released during scant periods, so that stuff which would otherwise be wasted, could be available the year round.

Recent investigation in Chicago has shown that eight men with plenty of cold storage space at their disposal, have practically cornered the egg supply.

To-day the eggs are fetching forty-five cents a dozen in the city named, so that these manipulators are netting a profit of over one hundred per cent.

None would object to men, able to store up quantities of produce, securing a fair return for their investment and their enterprise, but when the thing partakes of the nature of a bare faced and brazen hold-up, then the authorities should step in.

The thing which to-day naturally makes wage-earners feel that they are paying too much through the nose for table necessities, is the fact that they see in trade and other papers the record of the fact that men and concerns dealing in commodities are piling up the shekels—wheat speculators, egg speculators and others of that ilk.

There was intermittent artillery fighting on various sections of the front, and also infantry skirmishing.

A customer, freshly lathered, leaped from a chair in Albert Goin's barber shop in Atlantic City, when Stephen Kelly, who had been shaving him, fell dead.

For the second time in a year fire fast night virtually destroyed the town of Wirt, Ok., in the Healdton oil fields. Fifty buildings were burned with a loss of \$125,000.

As the returns came slowly in from remote states, it became more and more evident that the swing was towards Woodrow. There has been a good deal of comment over the fact that it should have taken so long to reach even an approximate idea of the result. However, it should be remembered that the vast territory

known as the United States has many wild and scattered regions and that stage coaches and other primitive methods of transport still exist in many districts.

What have been the determining factors in Wilson's remarkable success, for it is remarkable in view of the fact that the political trend in the States has always been Republican—only three Democratic Presidents in all its history. Moreover, when he won last time in a three cornered fight, he was considerably over one million votes behind those cast for Roosevelt and Taft on the split Republican ticket.

Had the war anything to do with it? To an extent perhaps, in two essentials: (1) Many people were grateful to him for keeping the country out of it, at what expense to national honor they did not seek to enquire. (2) It was generally believed that Hughes was getting the Teuton vote and that incensed a great many no doubt, who did not desire to have any truck with the hyphen outfit.

Wilson doubtless scored to quite an extent in the two respects named, but most decidedly not altogether. There were also large domestic considerations. His insistence on an eight hour day for the railway men was one factor, and his administration had shown many effective measures, rural credit bill on behalf of farmers, a greatly improved banking law, a new income tax law bearing more heavily on the well-to-do and so on.

No one reason counted most perhaps, and it was probably all combined. At any rate Mr. Wilson has attained, single-handed, to all intents and purposes, a most notable vote of public confidence.

Woodrow reacted to some purpose. In the matter of letter writing, Mayor Bowley is evidently endeavoring to emulate President Wilson.

The Democrats claim that Wilson captured a majority of the women votes. It was the great Dr. Johnson, who in answer to his Biographer, Boswell, who had criticised a widower for marrying again so soon exclaimed in effect: "Not at all sir. His speedy re-marriage was the greatest compliment he could pay his dead wife. His course demonstrated that she had made him happy in the marriage relationship." Perhaps Wilson's haste to get into wedlock once more helped him with the fair sex.

A Court of Honor, appointed by the Montreal City Council, has found that Mayor Martin insulted the City Clerk when he called him "an old dish cloth." The Clerk wants the slur wiped out, but probably not with the alleged cloth.

In Buchanan, N. Y., a young lady punctured a would-be nasher, in three places, with a hat pin. He felt the point and skidded.

Mrs. Wilson will have at least the consolation of know that she didn't do her Fall house cleaning for another woman.

Seventy-seven aerial combats were fought on the Somme front yesterday. The War Office reports that in these encounters a Fokker and nine other German airplanes were brought down.

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SMITH-DORRIEN AGAIN IN THE LIMELIGHT. Gen. Sir H. L. Smith-Dorrien inspecting Dutch College O.T.C. He addressed the boys and deplored the degrading nature of many of the present-day postcards, posters and cinema films.

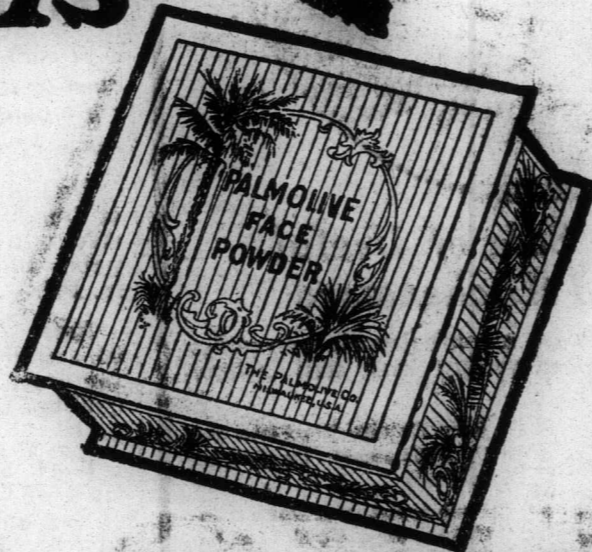

Send Gifts to Soldiers Now Abroad at the Front

Instructions Given How to Post and Address Parcels To Be Shipped to the Soldiers Overseas.

If you wish to send a Christmas gift to your soldier on the continent or in camp or hospital in England, do it NOW! This is the dictum of the post office authorities, and is based on the belief that the sending of a Christmas gift naturally desires the person to whom it is sent to receive it before, on, or very shortly after Christmas Day.

Already the postoffice authorities are in the midst of the Christmas rush for the soldiers of the Canadian expeditionary force. Christmas parcels for the soldiers sent from the Montreal office alone already run about 20,000 per week.

That is why the wise Santa Claus will mail his Christmas gifts to the trenches or to the training camp early. If it is destined to the trenches, the earlier the better, but even to the camp in England, the element of time must be considered. For after all, heavy as the volume of

Christmas packages from Canada will be, it is but one item in the tremendous mass of Christmas mail sent from all parts of the Empire to the men in khaki in Europe.

Many Sending. Australia, New Zealand, India, South Africa—these and many more have sons fighting for Britain and themselves. In addition to these contingents, there must be considered the immense number of English soldiers at the front, all of whom may reasonably expect to receive tokens of Yuletide from their relatives and friends at home. So great as may be the congestion of mail from overseas, the congestion of cross-channel mail will be vastly greater.

There have been modifications of the arrangements for sending packages to men at the front since last year, due to the restrictions of the French parcel post. That is, for packages destined for men on the continent, the French regulations must be observed. For presents to men still in England the old regulations, of course, still prevail.

So, if a parcel is being mailed to a friend in the trenches seven pounds must be the limit. There are two tariffs. On parcels up to three pounds, or fraction thereof, the rate is 24 cents. On parcels, weighing from three to seven pounds, the rate is 32 cents.

The rate for parcels addressed to soldiers still in England is 12 cents a pound, and the limit is 11 pounds. Correct Addresses.

The following is the correct method of addressing mail to soldiers: a. Regimental number, b. Rank, c. Name, d. Squadron, battery or company, e. Battalion, regiment or other unit, staff appointment or department.

SUNDAY SCHOOL.

Lesson VII.—Fourth Quarter, For Nov. 12, 1916. THE INTERNATIONAL SERIES.

Text of the Lesson, Rom. xiv. 13, to xv. 3.—Memory Verse, xiv. 16.—Golden Text, Rom. xiv. 21.—Commentary Prepared by Rev. D. M. Stearns.

This is called a temperance lesson and is no doubt intended to be used as an exhortation and a warning against the use of intoxicants, a most important topic, and a line of service on which we cannot do too much, but when I consider the intemperate people who are so often prominent in what is called temperance work I feel increasingly the need of getting at the root of the matter rather than prescribing for symptoms.

The great topic of this epistle is righteousness, the word being used at least thirty-five times and fifteen of these in chapters xv and xvi. As in Paul's talk with Felix and verse 17 of our lesson, righteousness comes first. In I Cor. vi. 9, 10, where the drunkard is mentioned among other gross sinners, the opening sentence is "The unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God." Frederick Hempster, who is 21 and 8 ft. 2 in. in height, is by far the tallest recruit in the British Army. He was born in Bayswater.

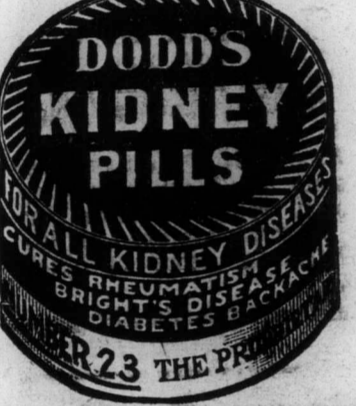
Charles Horton, of Otham, near Maidstone, who celebrated his 102nd birthday, is believed to be the oldest inhabitant of Kent.

When he lay dying he wrote to Tolstol: "I feel to have been your contemporary."

And yet even then he himself was still regarded as the greatest Russian writer!

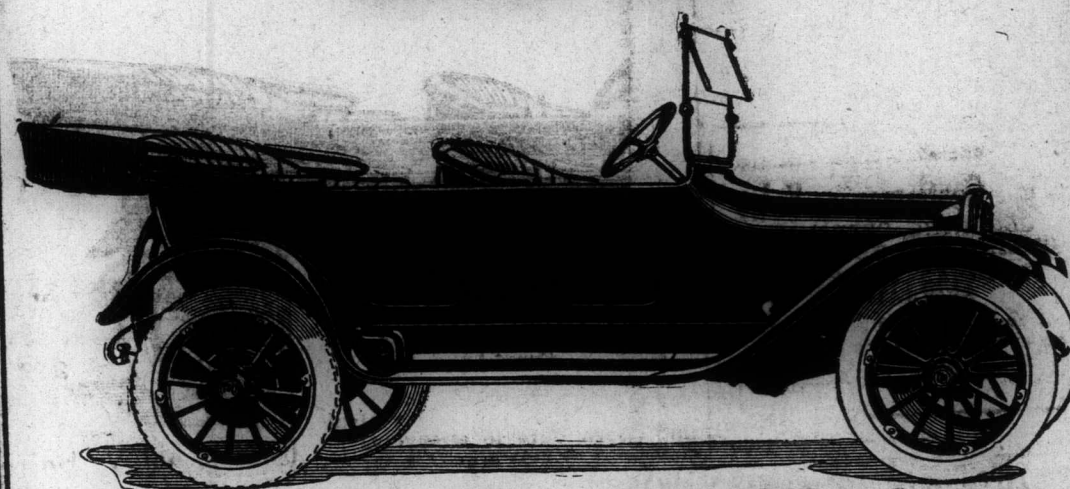
